

Sun.-First Baptist Nat'l. Wheat Vote To Be Postponed

Secretary of Agriculture, Clif- feed grain, and similar programs. ford M. Hardin, has announced postponement of the national wheat referendum previously scheduled for July 27-31. according to J. W. Landers, Chairman of the Fisher County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. The action was authorized by Congress.

The postponement permits the USDA to delay holding the referendum not later than October 15, 1970, or 30 days after Congress adjourns, whichever date is earlier.

Accordingly, the U.S. Depart ment of Agriculture's ASCS. which administers the wheat,

has instructed its State and county offices across the nation to withhold ballots and other referendum materials. The Chairman explained that basic farm legislation requires a referendum for wheat marketing quotas. However,

the Agricultural Act of 1965 suspended this referendum requirement from 1965 through the 1970 crop year. Unless new farm legislation, now pending, is enacted by the Congress. basic legislation will again go into effect, and a referendum will then be required in 1970 for the 1971 crop years.

Statistics may seem like a hore to a lot of people, but to the Texas State Department of Health its Records and Statistics Section is an active and very necessary part of its services to the people of Texas. The Bureau of Vital Statistics is the one place for storing the vast numbers of records of Texas births, deaths, marriages, divorces, adoptions, and other

In earlier times the fact that you were alive and breathing was enough to satisfy any inquiry about your birth. But now most schools require a birth certificate for children entering the first grade. A birth certificate is the best proof of citizenship for your passport. You may later need it to satisfy military requirements, to satisfy the Internal Revenue as to your dependents, to satisfy Veteran Administration, or other claims against the government or to apply for social security.

With over 250,000 children entering the first grade each year, the demand for certification is great. Many times these records can be obtained in the counties or cities of birth, or they may be obtained from the Austin office of the State Health Department for a \$1.50 fee. Searching for records -- on request -- can be a time consuming process. The quantity alone makes the task a tremendous one. The "searching" branch of the Vital Statistics division last year conducted 307,000 searches of the files upon request. A total of 200, 000 certifications and verifications were made. Parents are urged to obtain copies of birth certificates now before the volume of requests causes delay.

Every certificate must be checked for omissions or errors to make certain they meet statutory requirements. Mistakes could result in a lot of problems later on. Last year more than half a million current records went into the files. By the end of 1970, total vital records on file will reach the 17 million

Signs of moisture stress on trees and shrubs are most evident in a wilted condition of the leaves.

If a slight wilt on leaves during the afternoon recovers before sundown, the stress is not severe. However, should the leaves remain limp in the early evening, the tree should be given a deep soaking of

If the tree is planted in sandy soil, it should receive deep saokings every five to six days, however, if the tree base is in heavy, clay-like soil, waterings should be spaced to every seven to 10 days. Heavy soils will take water more slowly but hold it longer, whereas sandy soils soak up water rapidly but also lose it faster because they are

The type of soil in which the tree or shrub is planted is a deciding factor in determining just how much water is adequate.

A plant growing in sandy soil will also need a larger volume of water because much of it will be lost through evaporation and watering in the morning will accomplish two desirable

First, water is allowed time to soak into the group before the midday sun evaporates much of it. Second, there will be less chance of mildew, fungi and root rot.

The plant will store up the water so you can water less frequently or decrease the soaking time a little and this will help to reduce the water

A mulch of lawn clippings, manure or other organic materials will keep the soil moist longer, A muich of barnyard during the past couple of months manure should be used only if winter growth has dried and the tree or shrub is not planted in the lawn.

In watering a tree, the watering area should be larger than the circumference of the branches. Only then will be feeding roots of the tree be in moist

The fallacious notion that the main woody roots that sometimes protrude at the tree base are the organs through which water is absorbed, influences home gardeners to water just under the trunk of the tree. It is the small feeder roots which spread about the same area as the above-ground protion of the tree that enable the plant

During June there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$1, 440 according to R. L. Springer County Chairman. Sales for the first five months totaled \$16, 761 or 34 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$50,000.

Texas sales during the month were \$13,658,647 compared to \$11, 549, 134 during June of 1969, a rise of 18 percent. Year-todate sales totaled \$90,771,252 for 50 percent of the 1970 goal of \$179.9 million.

New purchases of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares over the nation during June amounted to \$465 million a 25- year peak-while sales for the first six months of 1970 were \$2, 514 million, 1 percent above 1969. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$123 million were reported for the first six months which represents a 31 percent increase over exchanges through June

As of June 30, 1970, \$52.0 billion in United States Savings Bonds were outstanding, which is 23% of the privately-held portion of the public debt.



Tax Man Sam Sez'

The Internal Revenue Service has been criticized recently for failing to get the tax forms simple enough for some older Americans to understand, IRS Commissioner Thrower, in a recent speech says that this is not so, and that Internal Revenue has made a special effort to help older Americans get the full benefit that Congress has provided for retired taxpayers. Commissioner Thrower pointed out that Internal Revenue has issued a special publication to help these taxpayers claim all of the available benefits. Publication 554, "Tax Benefits for Older Americans", is distributed to retired groups and is available at all IRS offices. Mr. Thrower also pointed out that the tax forms cannot be made simple for older Americans, since a good part of our older Americans are subject to many of the complex provisions of the law. He says that Internal Revenue works with retired employee groups and other organizations to train taxpayers to take advantage of in many foreign countries and the Retirement Income Credit, the over 65 age exemption, and other important provisions.

American Airlines is inaugurating a new flight to New Zealand and Australia and we are invited, along with my colleague from Ft. Worth, Jim Wright. The Ambassadors of New Zealand and Australia are to be guests on the trip. Mayors of several cities and other officials will be along.

The flight will leave from New York City on August 1st, stop in San Francisco and then to Hawaii. From Hawaii the next stop scheduled is Pago Pago and from there to Aukland, New Zealand. After two days in New Zealand the flight to Sydney, Australia, will be the end of the line.

On the return to Hawaii, another stop will be made in American Samoa. After a layover of a day or so in Hawaii, the trip will end back in New

It is entirely possible that important matters in the Congress may prevent our making the trip but as of now we plan to go. On crucial votes an attempt will be made to have what is known as a "live pair." This simply means that a Member who is going to vote opposite of the way I vote, would announce his vote, withdraw his vote and vote "present". This cancels each against the other. A "general pair" is a record only and does not count in a tally of the total of "for" or against."

Neither Ruth nor I are enthusiastic travelers. We have been invited a number of times to make foreign "junkets" of one kind or another but have been too busy to take advantage of the invitation. Just recently friends invited us on a fishing trip to Norway where salmon fishing in lakes below Bergen is supposed to be the best in the world. No strings attached, but we simply felt we could not be away at the time and besides, it was to be a pretty fast pace. So is the schedule to New Zealand and Australia but there are opportunities on this trip as well as pleasure.

Our Country has a great deal in common with these English speaking Nations. We have some competition in trade matters, mainly in meats. Imports of beef from both these countries are an issue of importance to our cattle raisers. Voluntary agreements are now in effect but imports are a question involved in the Reciprocal Trade Bill now pending in the Ways and Means Committee of which I am a member. It would be highly preferable to have agreement on the amount of beef and lamb imports without legislation but it may not be possible and protect our own producers. Something might be accomplished by some direct contact with the people who produce, rather than through the formal negotiations of diplom-

New Zealand and Australia have been on our side since World War I, They fought with the Allies in World War II and have contributed more than any other Nation to our side in Viet

There are many American investments in these two Countries. As a matter of fact, we have a considerable American interest in ranching in both Countries which complicates

the meat proposition. Of course, this is true in hundreds of cases in manufacturing and producers makes foreign trade exceedingly complicated.

The man who inspired this thought, were he still living would probably never remember me. I was only one of many boys who labored in the shadow of his example of patience and kindness. Uncle Tom was not illiterate. He was of the top class of his day. He used the above phrase to add a little humor and spirit to the difficult times in which we struggled for survival. In other words, he was the type that made hard times easier. The Great Depression was in its darkest hour; work was hard to find. Yet, being a carpenter, Uncle Tom afforded me-a stranger- a day's work. He was putting siding on a house. He would cut a bord, and as I held one end to the corner of the house, he would say, "Do it tetch?" To my reply of "yessir" would come the command: "Nail it

Even to this day I never see or do any kind of construction but that I am reminded of Uncle Tom's question: "Do it tetch?" We live in better times now, and are hardly aware of the hard times through which that generation passed. But Uncle Tom taught me a very significant lesson, and I would like to share it with you.

There are people, young and old, whose spirit is the same as mine was then as a teenager. They are under the influence of our words and deeds. Oft times they pass under our very shadow but are unnoticed by us. So let us "Be not weary in well-doing." For even after we have departed this life, our influence-things done and said may well come to the minds of someone passing through difficult times. Will such remembrances make life easier, or more difficult? The real lesson I learned from Uncle Tom is this: before I say or do anything, I should hold the deed or statement up to the Cornerstone (Jesus Christ), and ask myself, "do it tetch?", and if the answer comes back "Yes" then "Nail it".

Congressman Omar Burleson today announced that nearly 20,000 families -- about 60,000 individuals -- have been provided with mail delivery services for the first time under a recent order from the Postmaster General.

The order benefits those persons served out of about 17,000 first, second or third class post offices that do not have city delivery services.

Where they live more than a half mile away from the post office they have been eligible for rural delivery services all along. However, under this new order, they will need to live only a minimum quarter mile away to get the service.

Many additional persons are qualified but service has not vet been extended because the advantages of the new program are not fully understood in some communities. For this reason, the Post Office Department has distributed information on the program widely.

Under the new order, those desiring the service in qualified areas need only contact their postmasters.

A total of 841 post offices have already provided mail deliveries under the new liberalized standards.
