Red Cross Fund For Hurricane Area

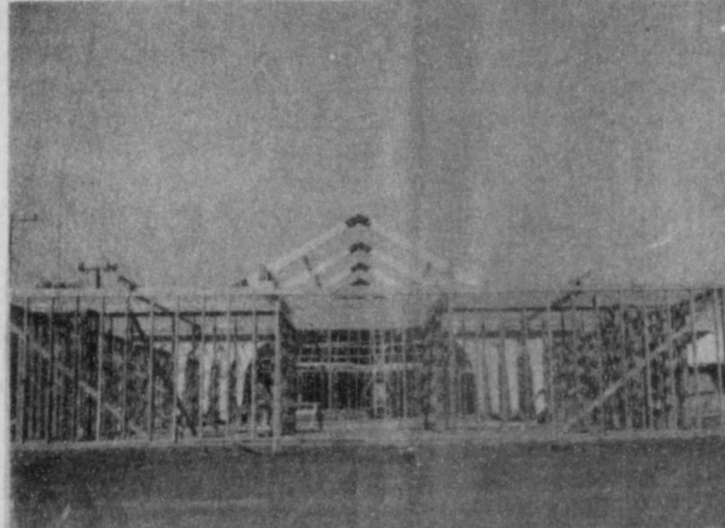

Home From Camp Philmont



The above 14 boys and two adult leaders were among the 4,000 boys and leaders who were quarantined at Philmont Scout Ranch in northeastern New Mexico, following death of James Morris, 12, a Scout from Jackson, Michigan, who died Thursday while on a hike.

The local group started home immediately after the quarantine was lifted and arrived in Rotan early Saturday morning.

The area troop left Rotan July 26 for their annual two weeks at Philmont and were scheduled to return home Saturday night, but were held up by the quarantine.

The 14 boys at Philmont from the area include, from Rotan, Mike Cade, Vick Burk, William Cleveland, Bruce Jones, David LeBleu, Robin Roberts, Obie Kelley, Clay Helms, Marsh Hill, and Neal Summers. From troop 79 in Abilene are Doug Ryles and Mike Boness. From Abilene Troop 8 is Bruce Cain. Billy

Jackson if from Troop 18 in Merkel. Adult Leaders were Scout Master, Lawrence Brede-meyer and Asst. Scout Leader, Luther Summers.

According to Associated Press release Tuesday morning "an unusual form of pneumonia" caused the death of James Morris, 12, at Philmont Scout Ranch last week, the Health and Social Services Department confirmed Monday.

Some 3,000 to 4,000 youngsters at the Boy Scout camp are in no danger whatsoever of incurring the same infection, HSS Medical Director Dr. Bruce Storrs said.

Morris, of Jackson, Mich., was at the camp with his parents, who were taking a volunteer leaders' training course.

Health officials quarantined the camp for 24 hours after an autopsy on the boy's body disclosed bleeding in the lungs and other internal organs, indications of pneumonic plague, a highly contagious

disease.

But Storrs said Monday a series of tests showed "There was nothing contagious."

"As far as my department is concerned, the case is closed," Storrs said.

The quarantine was lifted after tests by the State Health and Social Services Department laboratories and by the National Communicable Disease Control Center in Atlanta, Ga.

Laboratory tests completed late Monday identified the cause of death as "fulminating staphylococcus pneumonia," Storrs said, and he added, "This is not a communicable disease."

A fulminating infection is sudden and "overwhelming," Storrs said. The "staph" organism doesn't usually go into pneumonia, but is usually identified with food poisoning and skin infections.

Storrs said the form of infection in young Morris "can act very fast." But he said there was no evidence that he contracted it at the camp.

Majorettes Home From SMU Camp



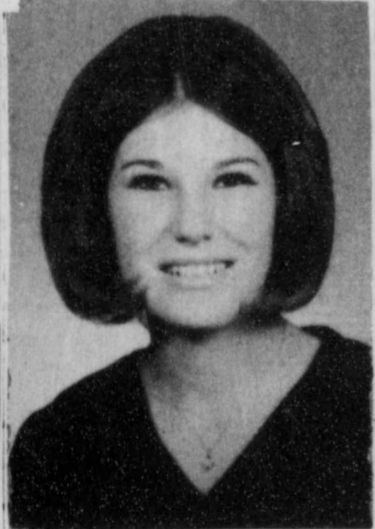

Attendants were Sherry SoRele, matron of honor, the bridegroom's sister. His brother, James Robert Edwards was best man.

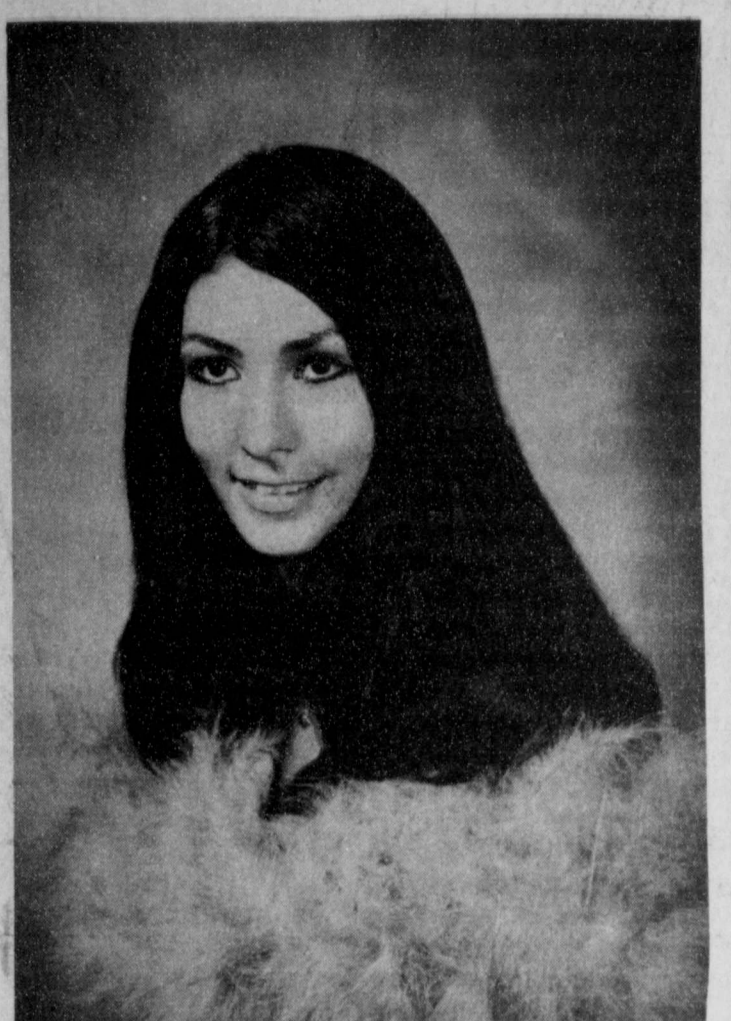
Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a short white lace empire gown with scooped neck and long sleeves. She carried white carnations on a white prayer book.

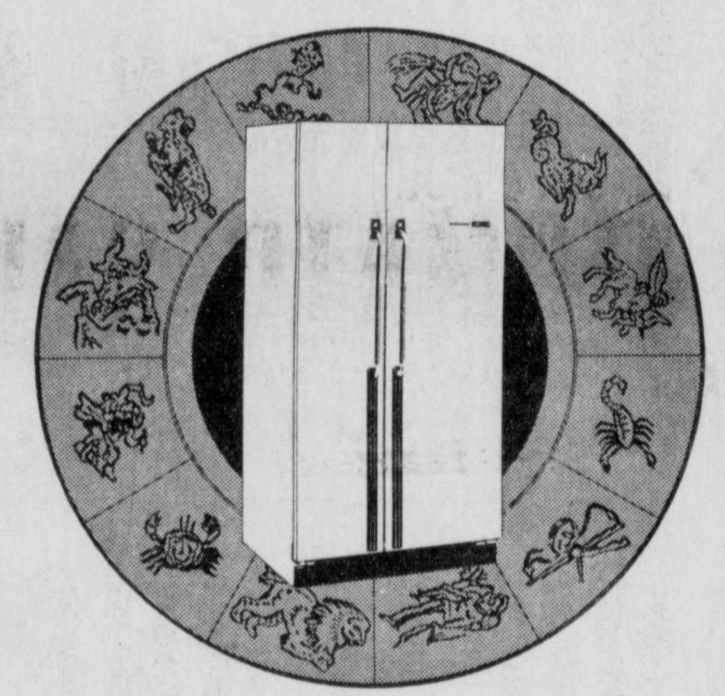

Nowadays it seems everyone
in public life thinks he has
a few words of wisdom which the
Country is entitled to hear. It
is called our "open society"--
and thank goodness we have it.

On the other hand, our enemies
must get comfort and, doubtless
a great benefit, from information
we give them in public
statements.

We have gotten to the point
that it is demanded of the
President, in televised news
conference, that he discuss matters
we once thought of as being
classified in the interest of
National security. Now, if he
does not do so, he is accused
of not informing us. In Committees
of the Congress, demands
are made of military
officials and others in sensitive
positions to reveal highly secret
information. A few years ago
members of Congress on certain
Committees were privileged
to high confidence but
something has happened. The
"something" is that a few--
a very few, which is too many--
could hardly wait to see a
newspaper reporter. What was
supposed to be highly confidential
statements were available
in the press in the night
edition.

This is our "Open Society"
but how open should it be.
While trying to let our own
people know what is going on,
the question of revealing so
much to those who would
destroy us, is the dilemma.

Just having seen Pearl Harbor
after having been there
during World War II, 27 years
ago, is a reminder that the
Japanese didn't send us a
postal card advising they were
going to attack our ships tied
up at that port, the masts of
some still showing above the
water.

Should the Commander-in-
Chief of the United States be
required, either by the demands
of some member of
Congress or the news media,
to tell our enemies what we
will do or not do on the battlefield?

We are in a "Limited" war
in Southeast Asia. We are
faced with a festering war in
the Middle East. We are
threatened with the possibility
of a war of global proportions
by Nations who have made
clear their aim to dominate
the World.

In the name of "Tell All"
Hanoi is more comfortable to
know exactly our intents.

Would their rulers be less
comfortable if we had not
ruled out air attacks on their
vital installations? Would
they not be less comfortable
if we had not ruled out the
destruction of the harbor of
Haiphong and the bombing of
the dikes holding back their
mighty Red River?

Bit by bit, piece by piece, in
official statements, in hearings

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)
 General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(10) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(11) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a

home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

 General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under

such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

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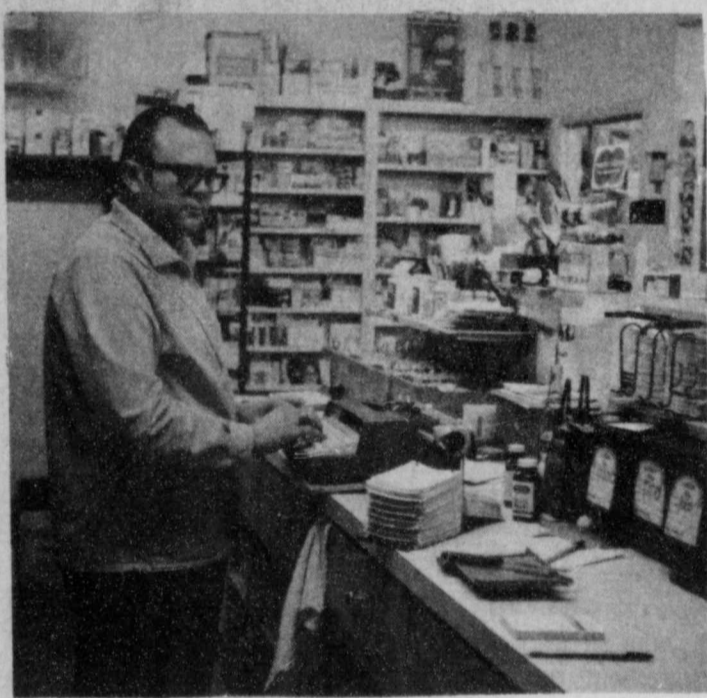

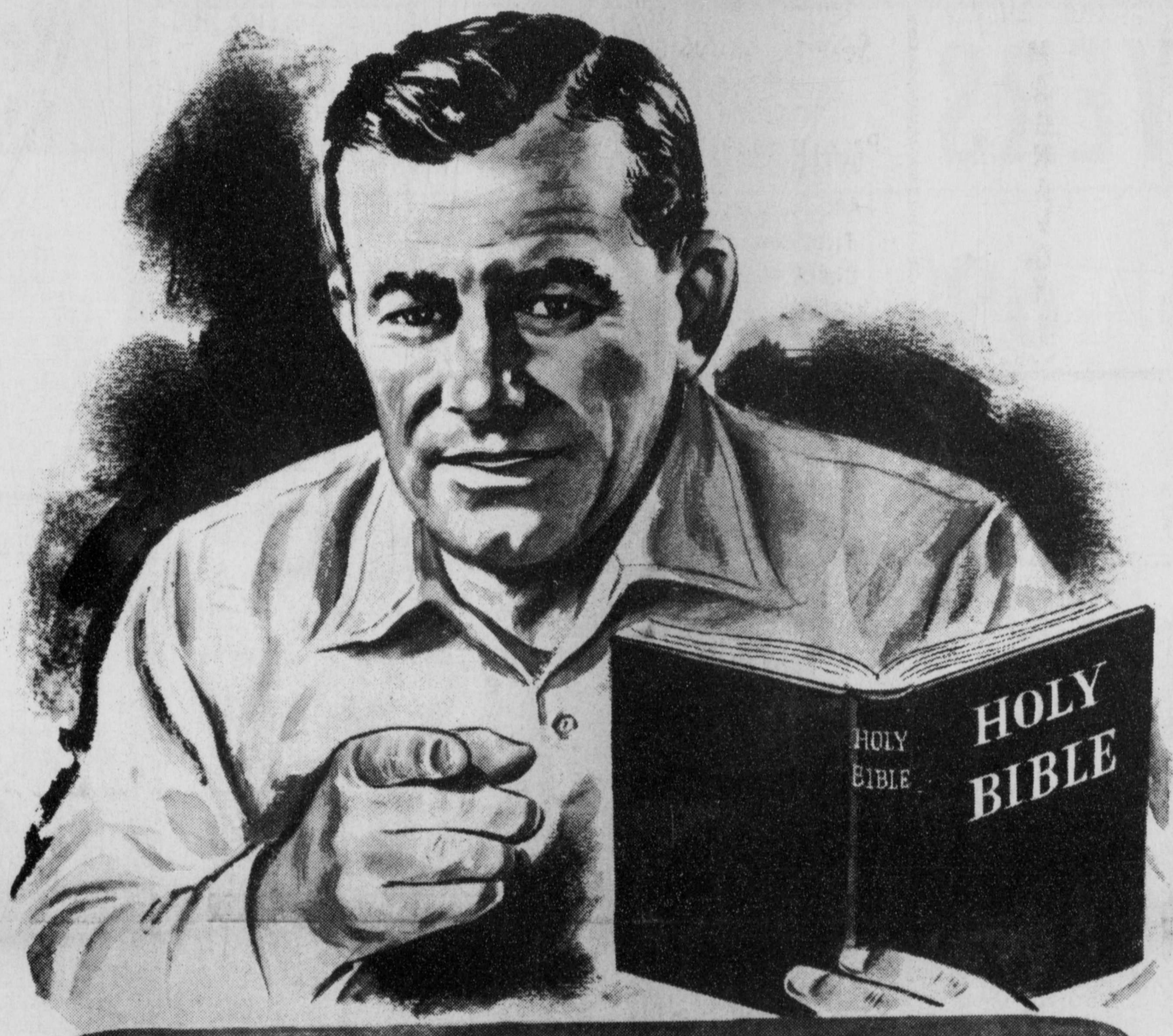

**Saving Runoff
Water Important**



If you have ever crossed the Double Mountain fork of the Brazos North of Rotan when the river is on the rise, you have probably noticed how red and dirty the water is. Soil lost from unprotected cropland and rangeland is polluting the water. Many urban residents drink this water.

The Soil Conservation Service works with farmers and ranchers to control water pollution. The SCS assists ranchers and farmers apply structures on their land that will release water slowly with a minimum of erosion such as terraces, waterways and farm ponds. Assistance is also provided that will help landowners select crops which provide maximum

protection against erosion and also maintain and protect the natural fertility of the soil. SCS assistance can help landowners select the best possible program of erosion control on their land.

The SCS has extended their activity to work more closely with feedlots, cities and urban residents in further fighting pollution. Although water pollution from farmland is considerable, much erosion is also present in the urban areas. Urban housing areas are frequently bladed clean with no consideration for its effect on pollution.

**ASC Committee
To Be Elected**

Eligible farm voters have only 5 days left in which to circulate and sign nominating petitions for ASC community committees. August 17 is the final date petitions may be filed at the Fisher County ASCS office. Mail elections are set for the second week in September.

"I want to re-emphasize to farmers who are eligible to vote that nominating candidates by petition is of prime importance. If six or more eligible candidates are nominated by petition in an ASC community, no other names will go on the ballot. In the past, the incumbent community committee also had the privilege of making nominations. Now a community committee may

nominate only if fewer than six eligible candidates are nominated by petition--and the committee may nominate only the number of candidates needed to make up a full slate of six nominees" J. W. Landers, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said.

"Our County ASC Committee hopes that this year farmers will nominate by petition every candidate whose name goes on the ballot," he concluded.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing con-

stitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
General Election Nov. 3, 1970
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two

years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."
