
Red Cross Fund Also attending the camp with ForHurricaneArea were held up by the quarantine.







United States will not use its power and that he can eventually be certain of victory. In a declared war our free and open society has no hesitancy in invoking voluntary restraint on sources of information which might aid the enemy. In today's explosive World situation such voluntary restraints are no less desirable. It should be practiced by all who come into possession of

sensitive information. The best kept secret in our history was the development of the atomic bomb. More than \$2 billion dollars was laid out for its production. Only about a half dozen people really knew what it was all about.

We are living in a world of dictators and totalatarian governments who can part their hair on the other side tomorrow morning. We compete in literally a life and death atmosphere.

To sum up, this deadly game cannot forever be successfully played with the cards face up only on our side.





Saving Runoff **Water Important**



If you have ever crossed the Double Mountain fork of the Brazos North of Rotan when the river is on thre rise, you have probably noticed how red and dirty the water is. Soil lost from unprotected cropland and rangeland is polluting the water. Many urban residents drink this water.

The Soil Conservation Service works with farmers and ranchers to control water pollution. The SCS assists ranchers and farmers apply structures on their land that will release water slowly with a minimum of erosion such as terraces, waterways and farm ponds. Assistance is also provided that will help landowners select crops which provide maximum

protection against erosion and also maintain and protect the natural ertility of the soil. SCS assistance can help landowners select the best possible program of erosion control on their land.

The SCS has extended their activity to work more closely with feedlots, cities and urban residents in further fighting pollution. Although water pollution from farmland is considerable, much erosion is also present in the urban areas.
