Demand for money will make it necessary for greater selectivity in the allocation of funds. We'll probably see that there will be some marginal businesses in agricultural industries that will find it hard to get credit. As we find the pressure on profit margins, we'll find that there will be more mechanization and automation in the Agricultural industry. Because farmers will be searching for ways of making efficient use of the capital and they will be trying to find ways to lower cost. There will be a scarcity of skilled labor. Now, those farmers who carry

out strong, profitable commercial operations in the 70's will be able to secure credit and capital that will be at a cost, but they will be able to secure it and they will make a profit out of it. Now what are some

things that they should avoid and what are things they should do?

The commercial farmer should be able to be large enough to avoid the pitfalls of uneconomical small operations. He will need to maintain accurate records on his operations, because this will allow him to support the borrowing; this will allow him to demonstrate his ability to identify costs, produce profits and service his debt. crop. The adult female weevil is brownish in color; its body is about 3/8" long and its snout is as long as its body. The male has a somewhat shorter snout.

Pecans on which the pecan weevil feeds prior to hardening of the shell, fall from the tree. Eggs are deposited in pecans after the shell begins to harden. White, legless grubs hatch from the eggs and feed within the pecan. The grub later emerges from the pecan and burrows into the soil. The life cycle requires from two to three years. Control is based upon application of insecticides after the adult weevils begin to emerge from the soil. To be effective, insecticides must be applied before extensive egg laying has occurred.




