Decision on Feed Lot Near Field Tour Planned Wed.

Gentle Rain Over Most of County

General rainfall Sunday and Monday over the county varied from half to near 2 inches. The fall was gentle and little runoff resulted. This will greatly benefit rangeland and small grain which was recently drilled.

Cotton was opening rapidly during the hot days of last week but will slow down with the cooler weather.

Many farmers plan to defoliate early in October rather than wait for frost as the past two

years late rains have damaged cotton and made stripping delayed.

Yield is estimated to be well above last year with some excellent crops. The hailed out strip across the county is the darkest spot and some farmers in this area shredded cotton after the hail and a number of others state they will probably follow the practice.

The cooler weather was welcomed by everyone following several days of last week when 100 degrees was recorded.

New Grain Seed Is Developed

Fas Gro Brand Triticale, a new small grain crop for fall or spring planting, is being introduced into the Big Country by G&R Triticale Dealers of Roby and Wichita Falls, Texas.

Rasberry Brings First Rotan Bale

First bale of the current crop was brought to Rotan Wednesday, Sept. 9 and ginned by Farmers Gin Co., J. C. Edwards manager.

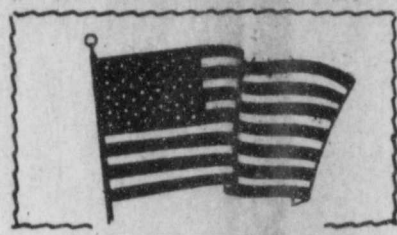
The bale was brought to Rotan by Lee Rasberry, who farms seven miles southeast of town.

The bale was hand-gathered from three or four row acres. There were 1800 pounds of seed cotton which ginned out a 450-pound lint bale. The gin gave the ginning and the wrapping free and also paid a premium price of 21 cents per pound for the cotton. Total paid for the cotton and seed was \$116.10.

The Chamber of Commerce presented Rasberry with a \$50 check.

Rasberry stated his cotton would average about three-quarters of a bale per row acre. He said he plans to have all of it hand-gathered.

The Constitution of the United States of America was adopted September 17, 1787, ratified June 21, 1788, in effect March 4, 1789. On January 5, 1956, Senator William F. Knowland introduced the following Senate Joint Resolution 105:

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled, That the President of the United States is authorized and requested to designate the period beginning September 17 and ending September 23 of each year as Constitution Week, and to issue annually a Proclamation inviting the people of the United States to observe such week in schools, churches and other suitable places with appropriate ceremonies and activities."

This Resolution was adopted July 23, 1956, and signed into law (Public Law No. 915), August 2, 1956.

Constitution Week is sponsored by the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution.

Sept. 21-26 Is Farmers U. Week

Governor Smith has proclaimed the week of September 21-26 Texas Farmer Union Membership Week. According to the Farmers Union state office, the proclamation commemorates Farmers Union's growth in Texas and its program in behalf of farmers, ranchers and rural dwellers.

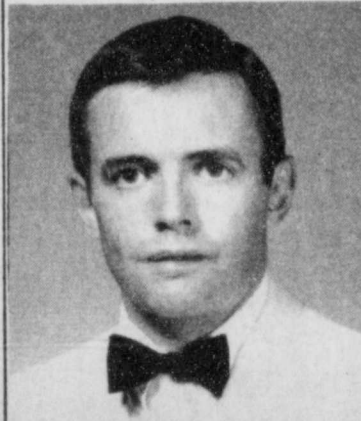

Cotton Insect Report No. 4

The fourth week of field examination for cotton insects, September 7-11, yielded the following comparison of fields sprayed in the program and fields not sprayed: The percentages given represent the low percent of punctured squares and the high percent punctured squares found in each community.

Roby west, sprayed 5-7% unsprayed 8-11%; Roby east, sprayed 5-26% unsprayed 33%; Roby south, 6-13% sprayed, 16-22% unsprayed; Roby north, sprayed 8-17% unsprayed 36%; Claytonville 25% unsprayed, 3% unsprayed; Hobbs 10% sprayed, 4% unsprayed; Sylvester 28-27% sprayed; Royston 6-24% sprayed, 58-74% unsprayed; North Roby 28-54% unsprayed

Bollworm damage increased in many parts of the county the past week. The county high was 18% near Royston, the second high was 7% south of Roby. The increase in bollworm damage was noted in both sprayed and unsprayed fields with large numbers of bollworm eggs located as well as the damage previously mentioned.

Rotan Dubs Spur With 38-12 Win

Coach Charlie Davis' Yellowhammers pleased him very much, as well as fans Friday night when they overpowered Spur Bulldogs 38-12 at Spur.

The Yellowhammers drew first blood in the contest when senior halfback Mickey Early swept around end five yards to paydirt. A 25-yard pass play from quarterback, Walter Hargrove to tight end Norvell Kennedy set up the TD. Hargrove booted the PAT to put Rotan in the lead that was never topped.

Early rambled for the second TD on an 84-yard play off tackle with Hargrove again booting the PAT.

Before the end of the first quarter, Early had again hit paydirt, this time with a 58-yard sprint. The PAT failed and the quarter ended showing Rotan in a commanding lead, 20-0.

In the middle of the second quarter, Hargrove connected on a 15-yard pass to Early who added 49 yards after the reception to cross the end stripe for the fourth time. At the end of the half the scoreboard gave Rotan the nod with a 26-0 score.

The Hargrove to Early combination worked again in the third quarter with a 16-yard pass good for six points.

The last period saw another Hammer breaching into the scoring when Hargrove tossed a 16 yard pass to Kennedy who made a leaping catch to tally the six-pointer.

Spur got moving late in the last period with two TD's. Both used the same combination of a Chuck Harrison pass to end Benny Ball, from six and 16 yards respectively.

Steve Henshaw, nearly four minutes deep into the fourth period scampered up the middle of the Roby defense for the only Sweetwater score of the game. The PAT failed.

"Ye Shall Know The Truth"

Ascertaining Truth

To determine the truth or error of any religious teaching or practice, there are at least three basic attitudes that are essential.

1. A proper attitude toward the word of God. Paul commended the Thessalonians because "when ye receive the word of God which ye heard of us, ye received it, not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God" (1 Thess. 2:13). The Bible did not originate in the minds of men and thus cannot be placed on the same plane as the words of men. It must be treated with all the respect that we would give its Author. It should hold a place of high esteem in our hearts as the word that will judge us in the last day (Jn. 12:48).

2. A willingness to prove all things. The Bible says, "Prove all things; hold fast that which is good" (1 Thess. 5:21). "Believe not every spirit, but prove the spirits, whether they are of God; because many false prophets are gone out into the world" (1 Jn. 4:1). Take no teaching for granted, but put it to the test of God's word. The mere assumption or supposition that a teaching is true is not sufficient. Each person should examine himself, his belief and his practice in the light of the Bible. He should then discard the bad and cherish the good.

3. A willingness to hear all things with unprejudiced minds. "He who will not reason is a bigot; he who cannot is a fool; and he who dares not is a slave" (Drummond). The Bible says, "he that answereth a matter before he heareth it, it is folly and shame to him" (Pro. 18:13). Prejudice robs man of his ability to investigate impartially and discern truth from error. It closes the heart to the truth.

In the next several weeks, we are going to present a series of articles regarding the New Testament Church—its nature, origin, mission, etc. It is our earnest desire that you will read carefully these articles and give them a fair hearing, and that you will study with a desire for the ascertaining of truth and with a view to eternity.

Mayor's Proclamation

WHEREAS, September 17, 1970 marks the one hundred eighty-third anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution of the United States of America by the Constitutional Convention; and

WHEREAS, The Constitution gives us the foundation for a free, prosperous, and independent life for every citizen, but each generation must work for and claim it; otherwise, through carelessness or indifference, the rights and liberties we have enjoyed may vanish; and

WHEREAS, The independence granted to the American people to enjoy such freedom and liberty, unknown to any other country, should be celebrated by appropriate ceremonies and activities during Constitution Week, September 17-23, as design-

ated by proclamation of the President of the United States in accordance with Public Law No. 915.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Wendell Morrow, as Mayor of the City of Rotan, do hereby proclaim the week of September 17-23, 1970, as CONSTITUTION WEEK and urge all our citizens to pay special attention during that week to our Federal Constitution and the advantages of American Citizenship.

In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the City to be affixed at Rotan this seventeenth day in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred seventy and the independence of the United States of America, the one hundred ninety-fourth.
