If you miss the last test, you can not be considered for jobs filled by this application and for maximum consideration, you should apply as soon as pos-

The Congressman noted that applicants rated eligible in 1970 need not take the written test again unless they wish to improve their scores. They will automatically receive a special form form by December 1 to update their qualifications and indicate their availability for employment in 1971.

The 1971 Farmers Tax Guide will be available at your County Agent's office, as well as all the Internal Revenue Service offices, within a few days. If you are one of that vanishing breed of Texans that still till the soil for a living, you had better pick up a copy and start plowing through this year's tax problems. Cotton Classing

Sample receipts continue to pour in at the USDA Cotton Classing Office, Abilene. Officer in Charge, B. B. Manly, Jr., reports that 29, 000 samples were classed for the week ending November 6, 1970 compared to 1, 200 for the same period last season. The seasons total is now 55, 800 samples classed compared to 24, 200 for a season's total a year ago.

Sixteen percent of the cotton classed was in the white category, 81 per cent was light spoted and 3 per cent was spotted. The predominant grade was 32 at 48 per cent.

Predominant staple lengths were 30, 47 per cent and 29, 29

Micronaire reading showed 75 per cent in the premium range. Pressley or strength readings showed 83 per cent reading 80, 000 PSI and better.

The Consumer and Marketing Service, Abilene, reports average gross prices for some predominant qualitites are: 3220 brought 20.70¢; 3230 brought 21.05¢; 4229 brought 20.20¢; and 4230 brought 20.50¢.

Fickle Nickel

Nickel can give the metals it s alloyed with seemingly contradictory characteristics. One nickel alloy can stand heat that would melt most metals, while another can endure sub zero cold. Nickel is used in the most powerful magnets. In some combinations it is no more magnetic than wood. Some nickel alloys make thermostats work because they expand with heat and shrink with cold. A major effort toward drug abuse education and prevention has been launched by the Texas State Department of

The Department's Division of Food and Drugs and Public Health Education Division are cooperating in the development of new programs and services for the citizens of Texas.

The State Health Department is planning a series of 10 regional seminars on drug abuse and its community health implications The first one is scheduled November 17 in State Health Department Region 7, headquartered in Tyler. Health professionals and community officials from the 36-county East Texas region will be eligible to attend the one-day seminar in the auditorium of the East Texas TB Hospital Annex.

The seminar will focus on the health aspects of drug abuse, detail current programs underway and examine possible future directions a local and state campaign against drug abuse

may take. The course content will include a history of drug traffic, the problem today, current state attack, and how communities can be organized. State Health Commissioner Dr. James E. Peavy will keynote the pro-

How may I file a request for Medicare payment? When should I file for a payment? Where do I get the forms to file a request for payment? Where do I send the request for payment? What can I do if I can't pay the doctor bills? According to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene. these questions are commonly asked by persons covered by Medicare.

Medicare is now more than four years old and still there are those not fully aware of its be eligible for some Medicare enefits, or if you have a parent, relative, or friend who may be eligible, contact your nearest social security office. The trained representatives there will be glad to answer your questions and help you file a request for Medicare payment.

Under the law there are some time limits for claimin a refund of your medical expenses. 

Farmers prefiguring their final tax bill for 1970 shouldn t overlook those 1969 revisions in the Federal tax code, many of which went into effect for the first time this year.

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 contains nine provisions that deal specifically with reporting income from the farm, as well as numerous other changes that affect all taxpayers.

Producers would do well to consult the new regulations before deciding whether to buy or sell a particular item between now and December - or whether it would be more advantageous taxwise to wait until 1971. The goal of tax management isn t to avoid taxes. but rather, it is no minimize taxes paid, by taking advantage of all the provisions of the tax laws, as they apply to the farm-

er s particular operation. Two of the Act s provisions affect the reporting of income from sales of livestock purchas ed for draft. breeding, sporting or dairying purposes. Formerly, all such income could be treated as capital gains, which are taxable at the lower capital gains rate.

Previously, livestock used in the farm business were specifically exempted from recapture of depreciation. Depreciation claimed in the past could then be deducted from ordinary

#### used in business, depreciation on which is normally recaptured at time of sale. A second provision affecting

The purpose of this change

livestock used for draft, breeding, sporting or dairy purposes, extends the holding period for certain animals before they can be sold and qualify for capital gains treatment. The old law allowed a 1- year holding period. The new retention period for horses and cattle in these categories is two years for stock acquired after Decem-

changed. The objective of the 2-year provision is to assure that cattle and horses are in fact being held for the purposes specified, rather than for sale in the or-

for other livestock remains un-

dinary course of business. Another revision in the tax law has to do with taxation of indemnities paid to farmers for crop damage or loss. The old law required farmers who used the cash accounting method to include crop insurance proceeds as part of the year's income, even though the crip itself might not have been sold until the following year, the farmer who customarily marketed his crop in the year following harvest was paying taxes on two crops in

The 1969 Tax Reform Act eliminates this hardship by allowing farmers to defer the reporting of indemnities until

the year following the loss, if they establish that under their usual practice, income from the damaged or destroyed crops would have been reported in the year following the year of the loss. This provision was effective for 1969 and subsequent

Ohter sections of the revised tax law that affect only farmers deal with limitation of farm losses, hobby losses, taxfree exchange of livestock of different sexes, recapture of soil and water conservation expenses and extension of the date for filing tax returns by farmers who do not file tax estimations.

Year-end tax moves should be aimed at leveling out income between tax years and avoiding the wide income

#### New Campaign Launched to Cut Drunken Driving

DWI Counterattack, a community action program to combatthe problem of drunken driving, was launched at the 68th Annual Meeting of the American Automobile Association, in Beverly Hills, Cal. DWI means Driving While Intoxicated.

Alcohol is a major factor in more than half of the nation's annual toll of 56,000 traffic deaths and the new program is said to represent an innovative and realistic approach to the rehabilitation of the drunken driver because it combines both disciplinary and educational measures.

The basic premise of the plan, adapted from a project that has been operating with promise of success in Phoenix, Ariz., for the past four years, is that violators can be helped through their own efforts.

Under DWI Counterattack. persons convicted of drunken driving are required to attend a ten-hour, four-session corrective course.

swings into the higher brackets. You do this by deferring or accelerating income and deferring or prepaying expenses to fit your particular income situation.

Take a look at your total sales of both ordinary and capital items to date, then subtract all production expenses incurred to date plus all personal exemptions and allowed expenses plus amount of depreciation taken last year from total income to determine your taxable

income picture. The amount of taxable income will tell you whether you should sell some more products before year end and hold off buying next year's supply of seed, fertilizer, feed and other production items, or if you should do just the opposite.

Most farmers are busy with harvesting at the present and their thoughts are a long way from income taxes, but decisions made during the remainderof 1970 can affect that final tax bill.



Many vesting processes is found in the land owners disk or plow strips wild-life of the countryside. Wildlife means many things to to promote weed growth for the different people but to some it's the thrill of hunting qualil. The hunt is even more enjoyable and more productive when quail need protective cover you know some of the requirements of good quail country,

Quail use a wide variety of foods during the year. In their first few weeks of life. quail chicks feed almost entirely on small insects and larvae. Adult quail also feed heavily on insects during the spring and summer. They also enjoy a wide variety of fruits and succulent plants. But as fall appraoches, the insect life and fruit supply diminish and quail become primarily seed eaters. They consume large quantities of weed seed, nuts such as acorns, and seed of certain kinds of grasses

Because of their preference for weed seeds during much of the year, quail are often found

To Fisher County residents along the margins of cropland of land near good quail cover

Even though they do much of their feeding in open areas. nearby where they can readily seek shelter when distrubed. their habits and what they eat. They rest in the shade of trees and shrubs during warm summer days and seek thick cover for shelter from storms or cold weather. Roosting sites are on open bare ground or in short grass areas where there are no obstructions to sudden flight to escape predators.
