## Mijares On R&R Leave in Hawaii **Show Date Set**

The annual Fisher County Jr. Livestock Show has been set for Saturday, January 9 at the County Barns in Roby.

Judge for the event will be Eddie Puckett of Loraine. Frank Brownfield of Colorado City will classify the lambs.

The show is being sponsored by the Fisher County Young Farmers.

Tommie Jack Stuart will be General Superintendent, assisted by Ronnie Sheffield. Beef Superintendent is Gene Terry. Gary Floyd is Sheep Superintendent and Mike Terry, Swine Superintendent. Show Secretary is Genia Terry.

The rules and class breakdowns are as follows:

1. Only 4- H Club members and Future Farmers of America presently enrolled in Fisher County Clubs and Chapters will be eligible to exhibit animals fed under supervision of the County Agent or Vocational Agriculture Teacher in the

2. All animals must be on the ground no later that 9:00 a.m. date of show. However, animal may be put in stalls and pens Friday before show, but individual will be responsible for his or her animal.

3. All owners of property or others having same in charge shall care for, guard and protect and preserve the same as the Fisher County Young Farmers or Fisher County Fair Association does not undertake to do so, and it shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to said property or persons.

4. Judging will start promptly at 9:30 a.m., date of show (January 9) Judging will be in order listed.

5. Animal must be weighed at the show in the presence of the division superintendents and put in classes so they will be a credit to the show.

6. A certificate of registration on each beef heifer must be available prior to judging. Tatoos will also be checked.

7. Each club sponsor will list individually each entry he has to enter one week prior to show

8. Ribbons will be awarded to the top ten places in each class. Money prizes will be awarded each exhibitor in each class, but only two money places will be awarded any individual in any class.

9. Judges decision will be final in all cases.

10. Lambs will be classified prior to judging.

11. If only one animal in a class, ribbon, and placing will be on the merit of the animal. More than one animal must whow in class for showmanship and no Grand and Reserve will

12. Second place animal to Grand Champion will show for Reserve Champion.

13. Showmanship Awards:

Trophies will be awarded, in each of the four division, to the boy or girl who in the opinion of the judges does the best all-around job of presenting his or her animal. These 4 trophies are being made available by the Fisher County Young Farmers Chapter.

14. Interpretation of Rules: The management and superintendents reserve the rights to interpret, change or suspend these rules whenever in their judgment a change if for the best interest of the Fisher County 4-H and FFA Livestock

15. Interference: Any Exhibitor receiving coaching after the animal enters the show ring will have his or her animal disqualified. Coaches or parents will not be allowed in the ring when animals are being judged

16. Protest: All protest must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$10.00 which will be refunded if protest is sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the General Superintendent of the Show immediately after the occasion for such protest. Decision will be made by General Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent.



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
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

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### COUNTY AGENT

The following comes from the Texas Animal Health Com-

mission concerning Brucellosis. There is an advantage if cattle are tested at the sale ring. All female cattle over 8 months of age should be tested at the sale ring before taking home, due to new regulations.

If cattle are not tested and brucellosis reactors show up later on MCT (Market Cattle Test), the entire herd including calves up to 6 months of age become quarantined.

If cattle are tested at the sale ring and a reactor is found, only the cattle from the origin of the reactor are affected and quarantined. These cattle should not be moved and mixed with clean cattle.

Cattle from quarantined herds can move only to a packer or a quarantined feedlot.

Plant diseases should be given a lot of attenion, Research has established the fact that many plant diseases become more severe as a result of continuous cropping to one crop of crop family over a period of time.

For example, if a field has been continuously planted to cotton and is heavily infested with cotton root rot fungus, one should consider using a member of the resistant grass family such as grain sorghum, corn or small grains in rotation.

Crop rotation programs are not "cure- alls" but when used plant disease control practices. they will lower disease losses caused by soilborne disease organisms.

Information on crop rotation plans and on plant disease control practices are available rom our office.

Should a community feature only one kind of tree in their beautification plans? Many Texas towns and communities are asking this question and the answer is the disadvantages

outweigh the advantages. The chief disadvantage is the possibility of large scale losses due to disease or insect infestation. When 70 or 80 percent of the tree population is made up of a single specie, a community can get into trouble in a hurry.

Many northern communities have suffered serious elm tree losses from Dutch elm disease and several years ago towns in the northeast lost practically all of their chestnut trees to chestnut blight. In both cases, losses were especially serious because large tree populations were affected. Not only did it affect the aesthetic value of the communities, but there were serious financial difficulties involved. The cost of removing large numbers of trees at one time to prevent storm damage to utility lines and property became a serious burden to many community governing bodies.

Many authorities are currently recommending that a single tree specie represent no more than 15 percent of the total population in a given area. While this may be somewhat conservative, it does signify the concern for the need of diversifying tree

Examples of some of the better medium to large trees that should receive consideration for community plantings are listed: They include Thornless

Honeylocust, sycamore, cedar, elm, live oak, Shumard oak,

Texas oak, pecan, fruitless mulberry and many others. Among the small trees, consideration should be given to redbud, crabapple, golden rain, and western soapberry.

This list is by no means complete but does include good tree species that are adapted for use in many communities of the state.

Ice removal from sidewalks, streets and driveways often presents a problem and common salt is frequently used. Homeowners should be very careful in using salt because shrubs, trees and lawn grass can be severely damaged.

As the ice or snow melts the water can carry the salt onto areas where the damage may be done. Visible effects may not appear until early next summer. On trees, marginal leaf burn may occur or complete leaf browning and death of the leaves or in extreme cases loss of valuable trees and shrubs can

Ammonium nitrate can be used to meltice in areas where the drainage pattern moves the water into lawn and shrub borders. This material will fertilize the plants as well as melt the ice. It if its not available, commercial fertilizers relatively high in nitrogen and potassium may be used with much the same effect. But only enough of the material should be used to melt the ice. Continued use of these materials over long periods of time is not recommended because soil con-

enough to cause plant damage. Sand may be used on icy walks and drives for better traction; however, many people object to its use because it is tracked into the house. Actually it is no more damaging to floors and rugs than common salt which is also carried into the house on shoes.

Before salt is uded on drives or walkways, drainage pattern away from the area to be salted should be checked to make sure it will be away from valuable plants. A little caution at the time of application can prevent the loss or damage to valuable landscape plantings.

#### Computers will never replace health, air and water pollutants and many more necessary areas.

Barrington says, "The storage capacity and speed of access to information in one of the big advantages of using computers, together with the flexibility of storage and the printed output potential. " As one example, he said that a full year's birth records ---- more than 200,000 now in Texas--were put on one reel of magnetic tape.

Necessity for such service has paralleled the growth of the State Health Department and its extension of service to more and more people. The office of Data Processing, formerly Machine Tabulation, emerged after World War II and the first computer was obtained in 1965. Records and reports which formerly were put on punched cards were switched to the computers. Use of computerized information, and the need for such data, has grown tremendously, and will continue to expand. One of the first uses was to replace the punch card accounting machine.

The Data Processing office has two components, systems and programming, and opera-

The most time-consuming part is in programming. "You can't just push a button and expect to get needed information, said Barrington. "You have to do a lot of planning and work to tell the computer how to handle the data once it is put into the machine." He said computer programming is a technical, highly-specialized

Q. I will not finish my college work until I'm 23. Can an exception be made to permit me to receive student benefits

A. Sorry, but no exceptions can be made to the age 22 cutoff for student benefits. Your benefits are intended to replace some of the support you lost because of your parent's death, retirement, or disability. The benefits are intended to be paid as long as it is reasonable to assume that zayou would be supported by your family. The law sets age 22 as the upper limit. However, there are a number of other public programs and some private ones that offer financial assistance to college students. You may want to write to the Office of Education, U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, 400 Maryland Avenue, SW., Washington, D.C. 20202, about this.

Q. My son, now 22, is a high school drop-out but has been doing construction work since he was 17. He is disabled mentally as a result of a head injury on the job. He has "blackouts" so often that he hasn't worked for the last 8 months. I'm at my wit's end. Could he qualify for disability payments?

-A. Possibly. You and your abson should visit your social security office now and apply for benefits. The people at the office will tell you what medical information you will need to furnish. Under the social security law, your son can be considered disabled if he has a severe physical or mental condition which prevents him from working and which has lasted, or is expected to last, at least 12 months or to result in death.

Q. I'm attending Beauty School full time and receive student benefits. I also work part time as a babysitter to supplement my benefits. A friend tells me these earnings count for social security. Is it

A. Yes it is if the same person pays you \$50 or more in cash wages in any 3-month calendar quarter (January-March. April-June, July-September, October-December). As little as \$3.85 weekly from the same person can amount to \$50 by the end of the 13 weeks in a calendar quarter of a year. The law requires your employer to report the wages-when they amount to \$50 or over in a quarter-and to send the social security contribution to the Internal Revenue Service. Only cash wages count-not room and board or other kinds of payments. The \$50 rule also applies to anyone else who works in or about a private home-a cleaning woman, maid, handyman, butler, gardener, or chauf-

O. I work part time and during school vacations as a waiter. Do my tips count for social security?

A. Yes, if they amount to \$20 or more in a month from one employer. If your tips on a job amount to \$20 or more in a month, you must give your employer a written report of your tips within 10 days after the end of that month. Your employer will collect the contributions due on your tips from other wages he owes you or from funds you turn over to him for that purpose. Your employer will report the amount of your tips along with your other wages in his social security wage reports and on your W-2 form, but he does not have to match your contributions on the tips. If you do not report the tips to your employer, you must report them and pay the social security contributions directly to the Internal Revenue

One additional point. If you receive student benefits and your wages and tips will exceed \$1680 this year, report this information to your social security office. The people there will assist you in determining the effect of these earnings on your student benefits. They also can give you any additional details you need about your tips.

Q. I am a newlywed who plans to keep working until my husband completes dental school. My employer tells me I should have my social security card changed since it still shows my maiden name. Is this necessary? I understand you only receive one number in your lifetime anyway.

A. It's true you keep the same social security number for life. However, your employer is right. For social security recordkeeping purposes, your name and number both must be correct to assure proper credit for your earnings. The people at any social security office can quickly issue you a new card showing your new

O. I know social security helps older people, but what about young workers like me? What's in it for us? I'm 28 and see nothing ahead but contributions until I'm 65.

A. Social security provides a great deal of valuable protection for you and other young workers long before you reach retirement age. You, and your family, are protected against loss of income resulting from disability or death. If you should die, your dependents may receive a lump-sum payment and monthly cash bene-

Have a question about social security and its retirement, surdisability or Medicare benefits? Consult your telephone directory for the address of the nearest social security office.

extension wiring.

—Don't use string lights or extensions outdoors unless the attached label specifies you may do so.

-Don't use flood lights on or near flammable material. -Don't place electrical fixtures within a child's accessibility -Do buy only UL labeled string lights and cords.

Do inspect all wiring insulation for possible deterioration, especially if it has been stored for an indefinite per-

-Do use rubber light socket gaskets where provided and replace if needed.

While not seeking to minipreceding points, perhaps two should be stressed: circuit overloading and physical in

Basically, overloads are cre ated by placing more current on a wire than it can handle but not enough to cause a fuse to blow. At Christmas this is usually due to placement of too many bulbs on a single ex tension cord. Result: overheat ing; melting insulation; expos ed wire; shock; electrocution or fire. Hence, always look for the capability of the wiring supplying the lighting.

Examination of the insula-tion is a minor task but one of major importance. Wiring that has been stored in attic cellars for a long period of time can become vulnerable to the elements. Consequently, varying temperatures can easily affect the insulation to the Have a safe and very merry







During the recent political campaigns much was said about inflation, unemployment, high interest rates and tighy money. Everyone knows the effects of these conditions for few discussed remedies. Perhaps it is just as well since even the experts disagree on causes and remedial

There is, however, one fundamental factor involved which seemingly can not be ignored as the taproot of the problem-productivity.

This is not necessarily a political question but one within the scope of action by us as individuals.

No doubt inflation is due in part to the fact that the Nation has spent \$69 Billion more than the national income during the decade of the 1960's.

It is also true that the reluctance of the Congress to curb spending and stay within our ncome contributes heavily to the continuing increase in prices.

The unemployment situation has been aggravated by an uneasy economy and the fact that defense cutbacks have eliminated more than 300, 000 jobs. The recent General Motor's strike cost an estimated \$90 million a day in lost business. This is a key part of productivity as related to income and prices.

Productivity is the factor that nas made the working man of America unique. His ability to produce all others has made American goods competitive all over the world.

Productivity of the American orker has made the price of things he bought for his own needs and pleasures, a reasonable proportion of his own pay check. It has provided the producer with the highest income in the world and the highest standard of living.

Things get out of going when wage settlements reached in major industries have no relationship to output but are only designed to pay higher prices for goods and services. The higher prices in turn are created by the decreasing production of the individual.

This has brought in increasing demand from certain industries for tariff and quota protection. The Japanese for instance are able to outsell us in our own markets because they produce in quantity for a lot less than we can produce the same items in this Country.

This is why Washington can not have all the answers to this matter of high prices and all the side effects going with it. In the long run the final answer seems to lie in a free enterprize economy, with wage and price controls created and related to productivity. No government has yet been able to repeal the natural law of supply and demand in a free flowing
