Census Estimate Shows Baird-Eastland Gain

In Population

The towns of Eastland and Baird have shown some growth since 2000, according to the latest estimate by the U.S. Census Bureau. Cisco and Ranger have held their own, with 0.0 growth and 0.0 losses. But the same estimates show that the overall population of and Eastland Callahan Counties has declined slightly.

Bureau released tabulations for the first time since Census 2000 for all of America's 19,451 incorporated places, as well minor its civil divisions. This Population Estimates Program (PEP) released figures from the year 2002

The estimates were considered accurate only for cities with 10,000 or more -so the local figures are for Texas showed 21,325, 018, interest only...

population Eastland was listed in the 2000 Census as 3,769. It is estimated that the city has experienced a growth rate of 0.8 since that time.

Eastland County tabulated with a population of 18,297 in the 2000 Census. The latest figures for the county are 18, 210 on July 1, 2002...

In the 2000 Census Cisco was listed with a population of 3,851, and Ranger with 2,584. The Bureau hasn't tabulated any changes there.

In 2000 Carbon was listed with a population of 224, Gorman 1,226, and Rising

Counties Slightly Down Star 835. No changes have been listed on these localities.

In Callahan County, Baird was listed with a population of 1,623 in the year 2000. The latest estimate shows Baird with a growth of .01.

County's Callahan population in 2000 was 12,905,and the latest estimate is 12,863. This is tabulated as a loss of 0.3.

A number of the area towns and counties took a On July 10, 2003 the loss in the estimate, with Breckenridge showing some decline in population. Stephens County also lost population, according to the latest figures. . Albany and Shackelford County showed some gain, but most areas of rural West Texas took a hit in this PEP estimate.

> Where was the population going? To the big cities, of course. The current population of the State of with much of it concentrated in the DFW Metroplex, San Houston, Antonio, Austin and El Paso areas.

Nationwide, cities California and Arizona, Nevada were the fastest growing.

The largest U.S. cities as of July 1, 2002 were, in order, New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, Houston, Philadelphia, Phoenix, San Diego, Dallas, San Antonio and Detroit.

Besides the influx of people from rural areas, the cities are still experiencing a growth from of emigration from foreign countries.

Here's a strong piece of evidence for keeping public notices in print- 86 percent of adult readers believe legal notices should be published in newspapers on a regular basis.

The statistic comes from the Public Notice Survey 2002, which provides conclusive research showing that Texans support the use of newspapers for public notice.

The survey was conducted by Newton Marketing & Research of Norman, Okla., for Texas Press Association. Every county in Texas was included in the sampling of 1,002 adults taken Oct. 21-Dec. 2, 2002.

The survey found that 81 percent of adults read a Texas community newspaper. While 19 percent did not read a state community newspaper, 60 percent believe that legal notices should be published in newspapers on a regular

Nearly half of those surveyed (44 percent) said they usually or sometimes read legal notices in the newspa-

Texans overwhelmingly turn to the newspaper as their source for notice of public meetings and public notices. Forty-two percent listed the

Interstate 35 North

One of the great fun things a family can do for vacation is to pick an interstate highway and plan their trip around traveling that highway. My pick this month is I-35 which we'll start travel on from Fort Worth, Texas and head north.

One of the first places of interest is Gainesville, Texas. Not large, and certainly not fancy, but the Morton Museum of Cooke County is one-room display of artifacts from the area. Crossing over into Oklahoma, the RV and camping crowd has welcome arms into three stops. First, Lake Murray State Park offers horseback rides, hiking, secluded swimming, and the usual state park facilities.

Next, just one mile from S. Davis exit on US 77 there is the Turner Falls Park. Here is a natural swimming hole with a lovely picturesque 77 foot waterfall. Among the "things to do and facilities are: Cabins, 3 Natural caves bath houses, RV hookups, campsites, picnic sites, Rock Castle, wading areas, Geological formations, hiking trail, concessions, volleyball, novelty shops, horseback riding, fishing, sandy beaches paintball concession and climbing wall.

The Chicksaw National Recreation Area is just up the road about 14 miles, and then East on Okla. 7, South on US 177 in the park. With 3.4 million visitors per year, one could easily figure this place is worth a visit. It was Oklahoma's first National Park.

Korea 50 Years Later

The guns are silent. The date is July 27, 1953, and the Korean War Armistice has been signed. 36,000 Americans have given their lives; 103,000 have been wounded in action; and 7,100 have been taken prisoner. However, millions of South Koreans are

This was the first war in history in which troops from the United Nations (U.N.) fought to stop an aggressor nation. Total U. N. casualties were over 450,000. The United States furnished most of the troops with Great Britain, Australia, Canada, France, The Philippine Republic, Turkey, and many other countries furnishing some troops to represent the U.N. force.

Why Korea? The Korean War was actually an extension of World War II even though World War II had been "officially" over for more than four years when the Korean War began.

The Japanese had controlled Korea for over 30 years when World War II was over. At the end of World War II in 1945, Soviet troops occupied Korea as far south as the 38th parallel. The United States forces occupied the Southern portion of the Korean Peninsula. The two occupying powers could not agree on a government for all of Korea and referred the

problem to the United Nations.

In 1948, a U.N. Commission supervised democratic elections in South Korea. The Communists of the north refused free elections and set up a Soviet-type dictatorship in North Korea.

Communist ruled North Korea suddenly attacked South Korea on June 25, 1950. This attack was a surprise and the Communist forces almost pushed the South Korean forces off the Korean Peninsula before the recently arrived American forces gained a toe hold and started an offensive to the

The U.S. troops continued to move north and with the arrival of the British and other U. N. forces, it looked like the war would be over in a few months. This was not to be. As the U.N. forces continued their northen push, suddenly thousands and thousands of Communist Chinese troops entered the war unexpectedly from the north.

Again the U.N. forces were pushed south but regrouped and fought their way back north again by June 1951, were a few miles north of the 38th parallel (the boundary between North and South

The last two years of fighting was a "Battle for the Hills." Names such as "Old Baldy", "Bloody Ridge",

"Heartbreak Ridge", "Pork Chop Hill", "Bunker Hill", "The Punchbowl", and "Siberia Hill" all became scenes of bitter battles. Each of the hills were important because the troops who controlled them also controlled the valley supply routes. Many of the hills were not named but had numbers based on elevation.

Truce talks began in July 1951, but that did not stop the fighting.

General Dwight Eisenhower was elected President of the United States in 1952. His World War II record probably added strength to the U.N. side of the truce talks.

Finally, on July 27, 1953, the Armistice was signed. The 38th parallel again became the boundary between North and South Korea and is now known as the Demilitarized Zone of "DMZ." About 37,000 United States troops are still stationed in South Korea to this day.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 68, Section 1)

HJR 68, Section 1 would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use excess receipts in the Veterans' Land and Veterans' Housing Assistance funds for payment of revenue bonds, and use excess assets in those funds to provide veterans

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide veterans homes for the aged or infirm and to make principal, interest, and bond enhancement payments on revenue bonds."

PROPOSITION 2 (HJR 51)

HJR 51 would expand from six months to two years the period in which the former owner of a mineral interest that was sold for unpaid property taxes may buy back the

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to establish a two-year period for the redemption of a mineral interest sold for unpaid ad valorem taxes at a tax sale."

PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 55)

HJR 55 would authorize the legislature to exempt from taxation land owned by a religious organization that is leased for use as a school or that will be used to expand or construct a place of religious worship that yields no revenue.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property owned by a religious organization that is leased for use as a school or that is owned with the intent of expanding or constructing a religious facility."

PROPOSITION 4 (SJR 30)

SJR 30 would authorize the legislature to allow conservation and reclamation districts to use taxes to develop and finance certain parks and recreation facilities. Also, the amendment would authorize the legislature to allow local elections for the issuance of bonds to improve and maintain parks and recreational facilities in the Tarrant Regional Water District or a conservation and reclamation district located in whole or in part in Bastrop, Bexar, Brazoria, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Montgomery, Tarrant, Travis, Waller or Williamson County.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the provision of parks and recreational facilities by certain conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 25)

SJR 25 would authorize the legislature to exempt from all property taxes certain tangible personal property, which could include a travel trailer not substantially affixed to real estate and not used as a residential dwelling.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation travel trailers not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 23)

HJR 23 would authorize a qualified homeowner to refinance a home equity loan with a reverse mortgage loan.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting refinancing of a home equity loan with a reverse mortgage."

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 44)

HJR 44 would reduce the number of persons who make up the jury in a district court criminal misdemeanor case from

the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a six-person jury in a district court misdemeanor trial."

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 62)

HJR 62 would authorize the legislature to permit a person to assume office without an election if the person is the only candidate to qualify in an election for that office and the election is required by the Texas Constitution. This proposition applies to state and local political subdivisions, whereas Proposition 18 applies only to local political subdivisions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a person to take office without an election if the person is the only candidate to qualify in an election for that

PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 68, Section 2)

HJR 68, Section 2 would redefine the com-

school funds by requiring during the next two fiscal years, and authorizing thereafter, annual distributions to the available school fund of a percentage of any increase in the value of the permanent school fund's total

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the use of income and appreciation of the permanent school fund."

PROPOSITION 10 (HJR 61)

HJR 61 would authorize municipalities to donate surplus fire-fighting equipment, supplies, or materials to the Texas Forest Service, which would be authorized to distribute based on need the equipment to rural volunteer fire departments.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to donate surplus fire-fighting equipment or supplies for the benefit of rural volunteer fire departments."

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 85)

HJR 85 would authorize the legislature to regulate the operation of wineries in Texas, regardless of whether a winery is located in an area in which the sale of wine has been authorized by local option election.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "A constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to enact laws authorizing and governing the operation of wineries in this state."

PROPOSITION 12 (HJR 3)

HJR 3 would immediately authorize the Legislature to limit non-economic damages assessed against a provider of medical or health care and, after January 1, 2005, to limit awards in all other types of cases.

The proposed amendment will appear on The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment concerning civil lawsuits against doctors and health care providers, and other actions, authorizing the legislature to determine limitations on non-economic damages."

PROPOSITION 13 (HJR 16)

HJR 16 would authorize a county, city, town, and junior college district to freeze property taxes on a residential homestead of a person who is disabled or aged 65 or

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit counties, cities and towns, and junior college districts to establish an ad valorem tax freeze on residence homesteads of the disabled and of the elderly and their spouses,"

PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 28)

HJR 28 would authorize the Texas Department of Transportation to issue

position of the permanent and available in notes or borrow money to fund highway improvement projects. The terms of the notes or loans may not exceed two years. The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for authorization of the issuing of notes or the borrowing of money on a short-term basis by a state transportation agency for transportationrelated projects, and the issuance of bonds and other public securities secured by the state highway fund."

PROPOSITION 15 (HJR 54)

HJR 54 would prohibit a local retirement system and the political subdivision that finances the retirement system from reducing or otherwise impairing certain accrued benefits under the local retirement system.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The Constitutional amendment providing that certain benefits under certain local public retirement systems may not be reduced or impaired."

PROPOSITION 16 (SJR 42)

SJR 42 would amend the Texas Constitution to allow home equity lines of credit and allow refinancing of a home equity loan with a reverse mortgage loan.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a home equity line of credit, providing for administrative interpretation of home equity lending law, and otherwise relating to the making, refinancing, repayment, and enforcement of home equity loans."

PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 21)

HJR 21 would prohibit an increase in school property taxes on residence homesteads of disabled persons.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit an increase in the total at of school district ad valorem taxes that may be imposed on the residence homestead of a disabled person."

PROPOSITION 18 (HJR 59)

HJR 59 would authorize the legislature to permit a person to assume an office of a political subdivision without an election if the person is the only candidate to qualify in an election for that office and the election is required by the Texas Constitution. This proposition applies only to local political subdivisions, whereas Proposition 8 applies to state and local political subdivi-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a person to assume an office of a political subdivision without an election if the person is the only candidate to qualify in an election for that office."

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the authority of the legislature to provide for the creation of rural fire prevention districts."

PROPOSITION 20 (SJR 55)

SJR 55 would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in a total amount not to exceed \$250 million that will be used to provide loans for economic development projects that benefit defense-related communities in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds or notes not to exceed \$250 million payable from the general revenues of the state to provide loans to defense-related communities, that will be repaid by the defense-related community, for economic development projects, including projects that enhance the military value of military installations."

PROPOSITION 21 (SJR 19)

SJR 19 would authorize current and retired faculty members of a public institution of higher education to receive compensation for service as a member of the governing body of a water district.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a current or retired faculty member of a public college or university to receive compensation for service on the governing body of a water district."

PROPOSITION 22 (HJR 84)

HJR 84 would authorize the appointment of a temporary replacement officer to serve on behalf of a state, district, or local public officer who is called into active military duty for longer than 30 days.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the appointment of a temporary replacement officer to fill a vacancy created when a public officer enters active duty in the United States armed forces."

My oldestchild just finished Kindergarten and will be enrolled in the first grade this coming school year. I have nothing but good things to say about the teaching performances in the two Kindergarten classes this past year. I have no doubt that he and his classmates will be as fortunate in the years to come.

I feel compelled to express this gratitude and appreciation publicly because of a great deal of misinformation that I have been hearing lately. As many of you know, the enrollment in the school is declining, as it is in many west Texas Towns. Much of this is due to a decrease or shift in population. Unfortunately, some of it is also on the account of students transferring out of the school district. Some have had problems in school and have been unable to deal with them successfully. Other, perhaps, desire to attend a larger school with more students, larger classes, and increased competition from within the school with the resultant loss in individual

opportunity and attention.

Apparently some have personal problems with the school or its personnel and have decided to take their children elsewhere. That attitude is rather foolish in my opinion, but within every parent's or grandparent's right to choose. However, when such people begin to falsely malign the school and its personnel in an attempt to legitimize their own actions, they have crossed the line. Encouraging other parents to abandon the school district on the basis of inaccurate and misleading information is inexcusable.

Students from Baird have

gone on to be doctors, architects, lawyers, nurses, engineers and members of virtually every other profession which comes to mind. At no time during my own pursuit of higher education did I feel the least bit unprepared. That is due in very large part to the

education I received in the Baird Independent School District. Every year, over half of our graduating seniors go off to college, and a large percentage earn at least one degree. We have many things of which to be proud, and a bright future ahead. Every year our young people reach new heights academically and athletically.

The school system in a small town is the lifeblood of the community. It is most often the largest employer as well as an institution with which most of the town identifies and takes great pride in supporting. Certainly, our school and our town has its share of problems; but all things considered, we are in a much better position than most. If you have a child in school or ready to enter school and have concerns about the school district, take the time to visit with the administration and the school board about issues that you find important.

Red Steagail Announced As Official **Spokeman For WTRC**

When Red Steagall was a 15-year-old boy living with his parents in the Texas Panhandle town of Sanford, he was diagnosed with polio.

That was in 1954 - just twelve months after the West Texas Rehabilitation Center was founded...and started treating Abilene-area youngsters who had polie and other disabling illnesses and inju-

Fifty years later, Steagall's left arm is still partially paralyzed from that long-ago illness, but it hasn't kept him from pursuing a remarkable career in entertainment that't led to international recognition - and, ironically,, to a recent handshake and commitment to be an official spokesman for WTRC.

"I coudn't be prouder to announce that Red Steagall is the honorary chairman for our 44th Annual Round-Up for Rehab," said WTRC President Woody Gilliland. "In addition, he'll be a featured entertainer on the Rehab telethon in January and throughout the coming months, will be Rehab's ambassador at a variety of events."

"It's just so 'right' that this icon of our western heritage, who's a rancher and horseman, is teaming up with Rehab as a spokesman for Round-Up - a fund-raising program through which friends in the ranching industry donate livestock for benefit auctions during Sept. and Oct.," Gilliland continued. And add to that the fact that Red is joining us in the year Rehav is celebrating its 50th anniversary! Truly it couldn't be a better match - or come at a more meaningful time."

Steagall returned the accolades: "My passion for preserving our western heritage and my devotion to 'old-fashioned' virtues like honesty,

hard work, straight talk, and compassion for all of God's creatures are clearly as important to the folks at Rehab as they are to me. 'Neighbor Helping Neighbor' is more than a catchy slogan at Rehab...it's a way of living and doing business. So, I'm delighted to have my name associated with West Texas Rehab Center."

And waht a name Steagall has made for himself! In April of this year, he was officially inducted into the Hall of Great Westerners at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City. The men and women receiving this coveted hoor represet the heart and spirit of western heritage and include such natables as Will Rogers, Teddy Roosevelt, Charles Goodnight and Charlie Russell.

Though he began playing guitar and singing in coffeehouses/clubs in the early 60's while traveling as a sales representative for Shamrock Oil, Steagall's first big step on the entertainment ladder came in 1967 when he co-authored "Here We Go Again" which was frst recorded by Ray Charles and later by Nancy Sinatra, Glen Campbell and eventually George Strait.

In 1985, Red's life - and career - took a dramatic turn when he attended his first cowboy poetry gathering in Elko, Nev. That's when he found his true love - writing songs and poems about the

West, going to cowboy poetry

festivals and chuck wagon cook offs. Though he and wife Gail live on their ranch near Fort Worth, Ted's on the road more than 200 days a year, performing at rodeos, major fairs, conferences and festivals.

A graduate of West Texas State University with a degree in animal science, Steagall's songwriting career has produced more than 200 compositions recorded and as a recording artist, he's had 26 consecutive records on the national charts and has released 20 albums. He's a familiar face a major rodeo performances and fairs throughout the U.S. and has completed tours of Germany, Spain, Australia, the Middle East, Far East and South America.

Red appeared as a regular on NBC's series Music Country USA and has had significant roles in several motion pictures. He also has two book to his credit - "Ride For The Brand" and :The Fence that Me and Shorty Built" both of which are collections of poetry and songs Steagall has written about the western lifestyle he loves and lives.

Since 1994, he's been host for a weekly on-hour syndicated radio show COWBOY CORNER, which is heard on 170 stations in 43 states. Not surprisingly, the program celebrates the lifestyle of the American west through the poems, songs and stories of the American cowboy.

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
