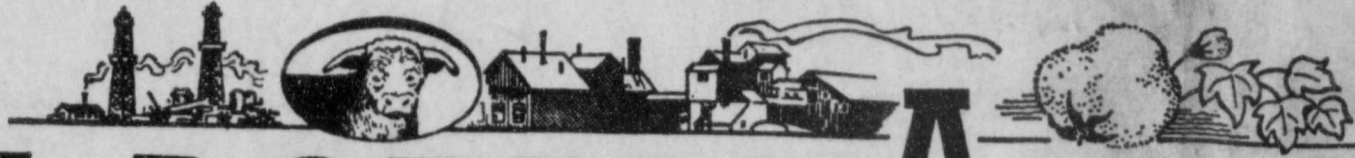

In the regular monthly meeting of the Rotan School Board held Monday night, January 11, it was voted and passed by members to extend the contract of Superintendent K. C. McCasland for one year. This extension gives the school Superintendent a 3 year contract through 1974.

A report was given on school enrollment to date, and according to the report there are 307 students in grades Kindergarten through the 4th grade; 255 in junior high school; and 220 enrolled in high school. This brings the total enrollment in the Rotan School System to 782.

Water Plant Operators Receive State Citation

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Jack Aaron and Z. C. Randolph, both water plant operators of Rotan.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

Texas Traffic Toll A Major Disaster

Governor Preston Smith today described the recent New Year holiday period traffic toll as a Texas tragedy and a disaster of major proportions.

"At least 57, men, women and children lost their lives on the streets and highways of Texas between 6 p. m. December 31 and midnight, Sunday, January 3", the governor said. "This far exceeded the Department of Public Safety estimate of 35 and allowed Texas to lead the nation in traffic fatalities for this period. Had this toll of human life occurred from a natural disaster such as a hurricane, I am sure a state of emergency would have been declared and outpourings of grief and compassion would have come from all parts of the nation."

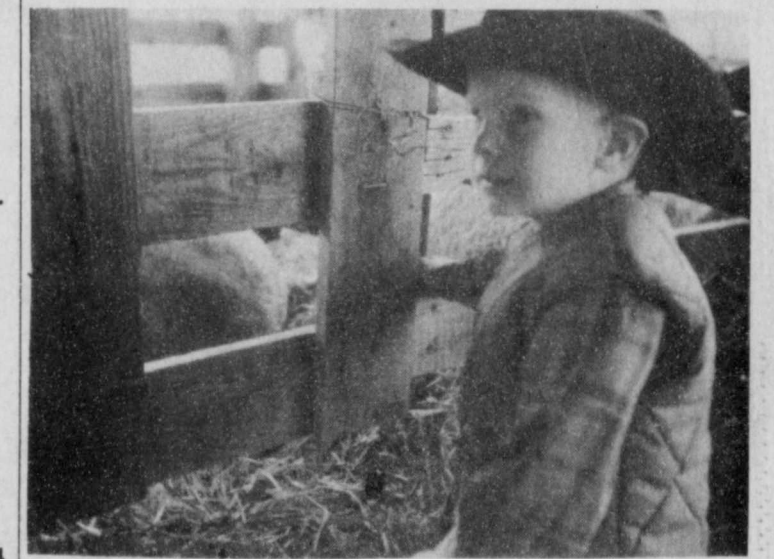

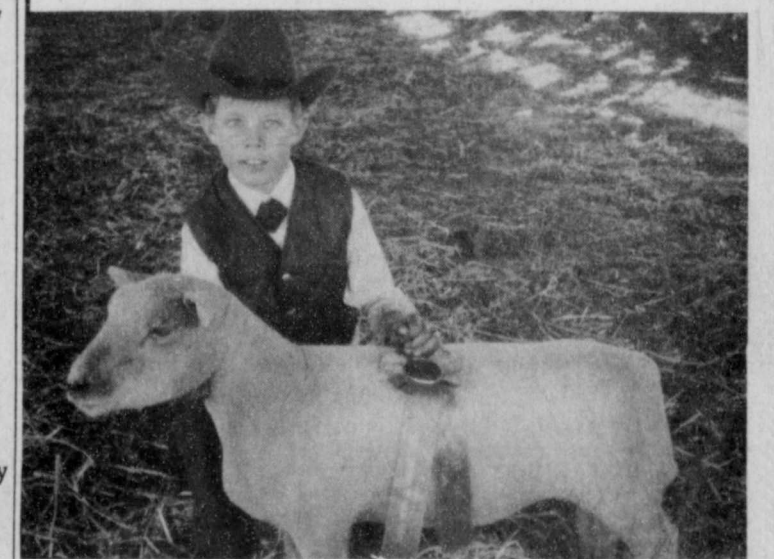

economic loss involved so many of our people so needlessly. I am deeply grieved for the Texas families who suffered these tragedies."

"The recent Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's holiday periods witnessed an all-out effort by newspapers, the wire services, radio, television and state and local enforcement agencies to reach the individual driver," the governor said. "All of these sources of communication and influence have my strongest commendation for their work."

"We know that certain steps must be taken by our legislators if we are to reduce traffic fatalities substantially. This I fervently hope will be accomplished by the incoming legislature. In fact, I have already forwarded to each member of

the House of Representatives and the Senate a summary of Texas traffic safety legislative needs along with my personal appeal for prompt and positive action," he said. "However, I would like to make one thing clear. No governor, no legislator, no other public official, and no enforcement body can solve this problem alone. We must have the full cooperation of the driving public itself."

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Lost at the Laundry

Katherine went to the neighborhood laundry to pick up her week's wash. But the proprietor greeted her with bad news. "We had a burglary last night," he said, "and your bundles were stolen. I'm afraid you are just out of luck."

But Katherine decided that he, not she, ought to bear the loss. Filing suit for damages, she pointed out that the back door of the laundry had only the flimsiest kind of a lock, even though the building had been burglarized before. The court found the proprietor guilty of negligence, and ordered him to pay Katherine's claim.



When you leave clothing at either a laundry or a dry cleaner, you are creating what the law calls a "bailment." The company, as the bailee, must take reasonable care of your belongings. Although not to blame for an unavoidable loss, it is liable for a loss it could fairly have prevented.

Suppose the company tries to protect itself by a notice saying it is not responsible for losses of any kind. Does that make a difference?

Most courts will recognize some limitation, but not a total denial, of the company's liability. Furthermore, a notice has no legal effect unless it is properly brought to public attention.

In one case a laundry inserted into each finished bundle a small printed notice, placing a dollar limit on its liability for losses. But when a customer demanded payment for some missing items, the company was held liable in full. The judge said the dollar limit could not be part of the bailment contract, because it was not even mentioned when the clothing was first brought in.

On the other hand, the company too is entitled to "notice" of what it is accepting responsibility for. In another case, a man negligently left a ring in the pocket of a suit he sent to the cleaner. The ring vanished, and he put in a claim against the company for compensation.

But after a court hearing, his claim was turned down. The court said he could not blame the company for losing what it did not even know it had.

Tax Man Sam Sez

Come January 1 each year the Government or Internal Revenue Service owes about 2/3 of our Nation's taxpayers a refund. On the day after Christmas there are probably more than 2/3 of our taxpayers who owe more Christmas bills than they thought they did. The Internal Revenue Service is perfectly happy to get tax returns right after New Years and to start processing refund checks. Of course, some taxpayers have trouble in getting their W-2's from their employers before the end of January but there are a lot of folks who sweat over Christmas bills bankruptcy that have a nice refund but haven't filed.

Don't expect IRS to provide instant cash to help you kick the wolf from the door, but you may find the solution to at least part of your problem by filing for that refund as early as possible.

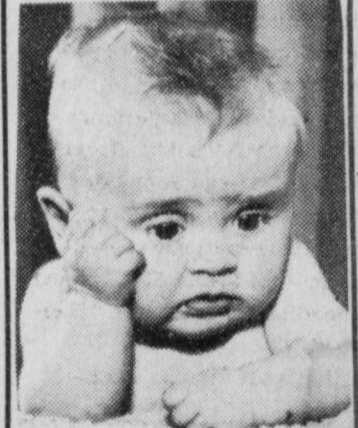

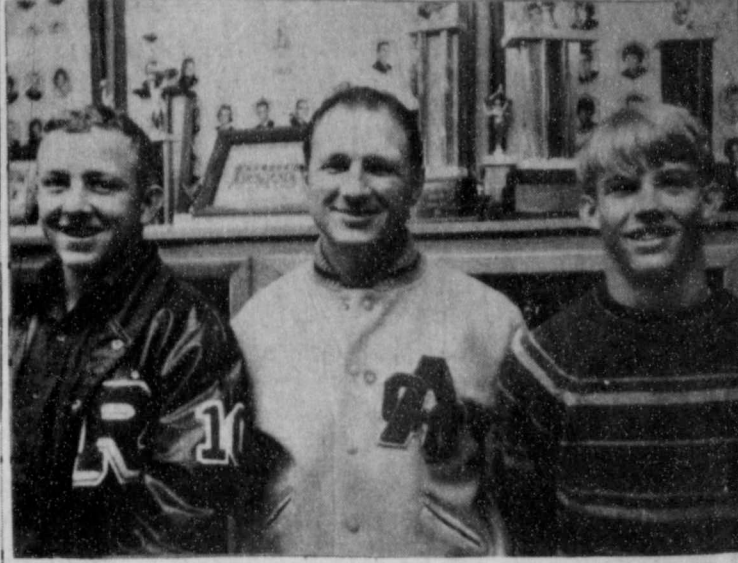
Head Coach Ted Posey said after that game that the turn around point seemed to be in the last 26 seconds of play with the score tied 40 - 40.

First United Methodist Church Rotan

The Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and have His life a ransom for many. Matthew 20: 28.

Here we have Christ's standard of greatness. It comes through self-denying service. In this lesson He took occasion to lay down the true principle on the whole subject, showing the true honor of His Kingdom and how they are obtained. 

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The recapture of investment credit is now possible under the new regulations of the 1969 income tax law.

Investment credit was repealed by the 1969 tax law for property acquired or construction begun after April 18, 1969.

Now credit may be claimed on property acquired by contract that was binding on or before April 18, 1969, or for property with more than 50% of its total adjusted basis under contract or more than 50% of the costs of parts and components held on April 18, 1969.

Property placed in service after December 31, 1970 will not be able to recapture credit. Investment credit recapture on dispositions after April 18, 1969, will be reduced if replacement property is acquired within six months after selling property qualifying under the old law.

The recapture will be reduced by the amount of investment credit the property would have been eligible for before the repeal.

Investment credit is recaptured on early disposition of credit claimed property, and the recapture is actually the amount claimed less the amount for which the asset qualifies.

In cases of casualty and theft losses of investment credit property before April 18, 1969, the recapture will be offset. There is no recapture on such losses occurring after April 18, 1969.

With the current low hog prices, commercial producers must strive for efficiency in order to withstand this price-cost squeeze.

The major factors that influence the efficiency or cost of producing a 220-pound market hog are fixed cost, feed efficiency, cost of grain and pigs marketed per sow per year.

Fixed cost, such as depreciation, interest on investment, insurance, miscellaneous and repairs cost approximately \$1.25 a head for each \$100 invested, provided 16 pigs are marketed per sow each year. It is impossible to produce hogs without any capital investment, but the amount invested should be the minimum required to provide proper environments for the pigs.

Feed efficiency, the amount of feed required to obtain a pound of gain, certainly affect the cost of production. If by following better management practices, adjusting feeders to eliminate feed waste and feeding various classes of pigs according to their needs, the feed requirement can be reduced by one-half pound for each pound of weight gained, an approximate savings of \$3.50 on each head would result if milo were costing \$2.40 a hundred-weight.

The price of grain sorghum also greatly influences the cost of production.

As the price of grain sorghum increases 40-cents a hundred-weight, the cost of producing a 220 pound market hog increases approximately \$2.70, provided a feed efficiency of four pounds of feed for every pound gained is obtained.

Therefore, producers should make arrangements for their grain needs when it is the cheapest, which is usually at harvest time. So start planning and making arrangements now for next years needs.

Pigs marketed per sow each year also influences the fixed cost per pig as well as labor required per pig produced and the amount of sow feed required per pig. Pigs marketed per sow each year is influenced by management. Productive cross bred sows respond to good management which results in increased productivity and efficiency.

It is the wise producer who keeps the four factors of fixed cost, feed efficiency, cost of

grain sorghum and pigs per sow in mind as he seeks ways to increase his swine profits.

Good lighting around the farmstead will provide year-round benefits for farm families.

These include keeping wild animals and prowlers away, preventing falls and accidents, saving time in farmstead night work and making activities in the build areas easier. Now with winter here and fewer hours for performing the outdoors chores, good lighting is even more important.

The mercury-vapor yard light is one of the best available. When located near the middle of the building area, it provides enough light to adequately cover the entire area. The 250-400-watt size lamps continue to gain in popularity over the 175-watt size.

The fixtures have a built-in photoelectric control to automatically turn the light or lights on at dusk and off in the morning. The mercury bulb has a rated life of 16,000 hours. This amounts to about 4 years of operation under automatic control.

Most electric power suppliers have a rental plan by which these lamps can be installed and permanently maintained for a small monthly charge.

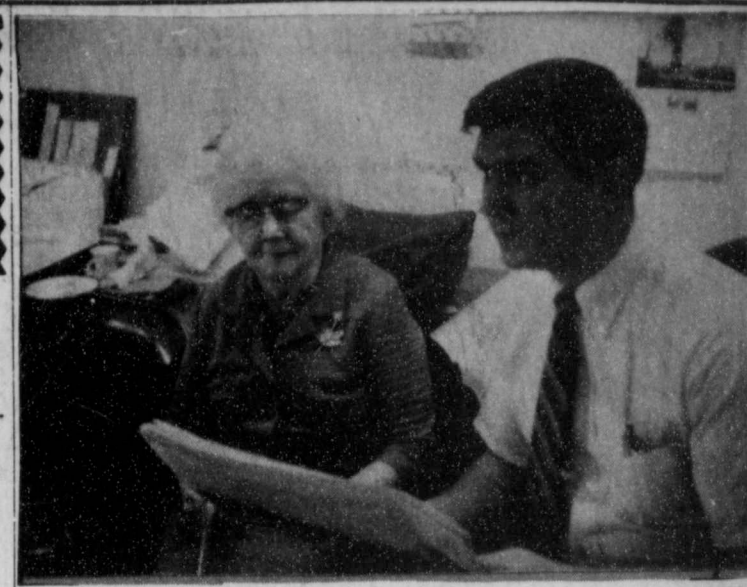

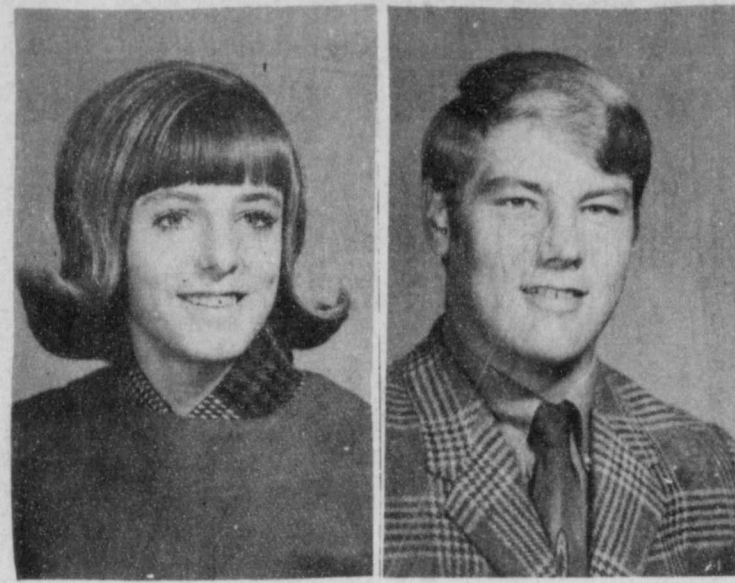

COTTON PROGRAM**

ALLOTMENT--About 67.4% of 1970 effective allotment and 3.1% more than 1970 domestic allotment. Payment made on total base allotment if as much as 90% of base is planted. No marketing quota or overplanting penalty--no limit on planting above base allotment, and for those who comply with set-aside, all production will be eligible for the loan. Planting less than 90% of allotment will result in loss of proportionate percentage of allotment unless allotment is leased or released. No cotton planted for 3 consecutive years will result in total loss of allotment unless leased or released.

LOAN--For 1971, 19.5¢ per pound, Middling-inch, 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire, net weight. Equivalent to 18.25¢ on average micronaire, gross weight. Loan is "anniversary type", extending 10 months from the first day of the month in which the loan is made. CCC will accept carrying charges of not more than 60 days. Cotton may be planted on non-allotted farms, without penalty but production will not be eligible for the loan.

PAYMENT--Preliminary payment of 15¢ per pound times base acreage times payment yield. Supplementary payment will be made later if needed to bring market price of Middling-inch, 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire cotton plus payment up to 35¢ per pound of 65% of parity, whichever is greater. Full payment will be made and allotment will be protected for producers who comply with set-aside and plant at least 90% of base allotment.

PAYMENT YIELD--For 1971, 2 times 1970 projected yield, plus 1970 actual yield, divided by 3, except (1) 1970 actual yield may be adjusted for abnormal weather and (2) 1971 payment yield will not be lowered if total farm production in 1970 is at least equal to 1970 projected yield times domestic allotment.

PAYMENT LIMIT--\$55,000 per farmer per crop of cotton, wheat and feed grains. Does not apply to loans. Administrative rulings on limit application have not been announced.

SET-ASIDE--Maximum set-aside for 1971 announced at an acreage equal to 20% of base allotment. Could be lowered prior to sign-up (March 1 to April 9). Probably will remain at 20%. Each farmer must comply with set-aside requirement and maintain conserving base to be eligible for loan and payments. Set aside acreage may be grazed except during 5 principle months of growing season, as determined by county ASCS Committee. Sweet sorghum on set-aside acres will be allowed.

SKIP-ROW--Same rules as 1970 will apply, except that 2 or more rows skipped in cotton can be counted as set-aside acres. One or more rows skipped will count toward conserving base. Land "set aside" by skip-rowing cotton can be used to meet set-aside requirements for all commodities.

SALE AND LEASE--Will be permitted across county lines if County ASCS Committee in county of origin determines there is no demand in that county for allotments. No limit on number of acres that can be transferred. For purposes of 1971 transfers, 1970 projected yield will be used. Acreage allotments should be out soon. Leased acreage will be considered as planted on leasing farm. Transfers to farm without allotment not permitted.

RELEASE AND REAPPORTIONMENT--Can be used to protect planting history.
RESEARCH AND PROMOTION--CPI Dollar-abale program will continue as now, and an additional \$10 million per year is to be allocated from savings that result from payment limitation. For 1972 and 1973, Secretary has authority to provide up to \$10 million per year more. Funds to be administered by Cotton Board.

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
