

City Of Rotan Announces Immediate Water Rate Increase

In a special session, Tuesday morning, the Rotan City Council passed on first reading an ordinance hiking local water rates.

The action was taken following notification from the City of Snyder, from whom Rotan purchases treated water, that

its rate to the City would be increased, beginning in January. The increase will total somewhere between \$11,192 and \$12,435 based on recent history of local water demand.

The City increased the minimum charge from \$3.00 to \$3.35

which takes care of the first 2,000 gallons of water used in a month, and also increased the charge for additional water used over the minimum from 70 cents per thousand gallons to 85 cents per thousand gallons. At the same time, the Council changed the system for calculating the water rate break from 12,000 gallons to 15,000 gallons, where the overage rate will be lowered from 85 cents per thousand gallons to 80 cents per thousand gallons. This entire package is expected to bring in about \$12,000.

In taking this action, the Council noted that the increase would take care of immediate needs only. In fact, this will enable the City to finish out the fiscal year with a balanced budget. Also, this is the first water rate increase since Rotan began the treated water con-

tract with the City of Snyder in 1963. The Colorado River Municipal Water District announced its rate increase to Snyder after it sold \$6,750,000 in revenue bonds to finance a development of a water well field in Ward

County and install pipelines and pumps to connect it to the CRMWD system. The new project will ensure a water supply for the district regardless of the condition of its two lakes. The project has a target date of June 1, 1971 for completion.

more than \$2 million from 1968-69 figures, with livestock contributing a large part of the gain. The projections are based on studies of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are part of the "\$3.76 in '76" program, a state-wide project to increase Texas agricultural cash receipts by more than one billion dollars.

Total cash receipts from all agricultural enterprises in Fisher County are presently about \$9 million, says Spencer. The most important ones are cotton, beef cattle and wheat. They are expected to account for about 60% of the projected 1976 totals.

The county will be aided in its production efforts by the Rollings Plains Economic Program.

The projections are based on estimates from the County Program Building Committee; after separate predictions were made by extension economists. The figures were published for each county, Extension district and economic area in Texas.

"Fisher County producers will have access to production information and techniques that can help spell success for the Texas goal of \$3.76 billion in 1976," says Spencer.



TIPS By Alice K. Ballenger County Home Demonstration AGENT

What room can be the most dangerous in the house? Research shows that it's the kitchen, but it does not have to be so, according to Jan Slabaugh, Extension specialist in housing and home furnishings.

The kitchen is a combination factory, bakery, cannery, butcher shop, restaurant, household workshop and children's playground. "Each family member should put into practice all he knows about safety in this busy place", Mrs. Slabaugh says.

Safety is an attitude of sincere concern for the well-being of oneself and others. Mrs. Slabaugh adds. It is a willingness to accept rules and regulations and to apply them in all activities.

A safe kitchen starts with the development and practice of good habits in the selection, preparation, serving and storage of food. Safety continues its march to actuality as long as the family members observe strict rules designed to prevent fires and mishaps.

Keep matches in metal containers. Light gas burners by holding lighted match to the burner before turning on the gas. Be careful not to place trays, pot holders and plastic or wooden utensils on electric range units which could be hot without showing red.

Mrs. Slabaugh also suggests that range burners should not be turned on until they are needed. And, they should be turned off as quickly as they are not needed.

Such flammable items as wax-

ed paper, towels, cleaning agents and other combustibles should be stored away from the range. Turn pan handles to the rear or side of the range to prevent scalding from an accidental bump or spill. A supply of dry, thick pot-holders should be on hand for use with hot objects.

A fire extinguisher should be a part of every kitchen, and each family member should know how to use it," Mrs. Slabaugh reminds.

When using the oven, pans and other utensils should be placed or removed by pulling out the rack. Such precaution will save a lot of hand and arm burns.

Smother grease fires with salt, soda or a pan lid, but the best control is to not let them start in the first place.

"One important safeguard against disaster in the kitchen is to train the children in safety measures," emphasized Mrs. Slabaugh.

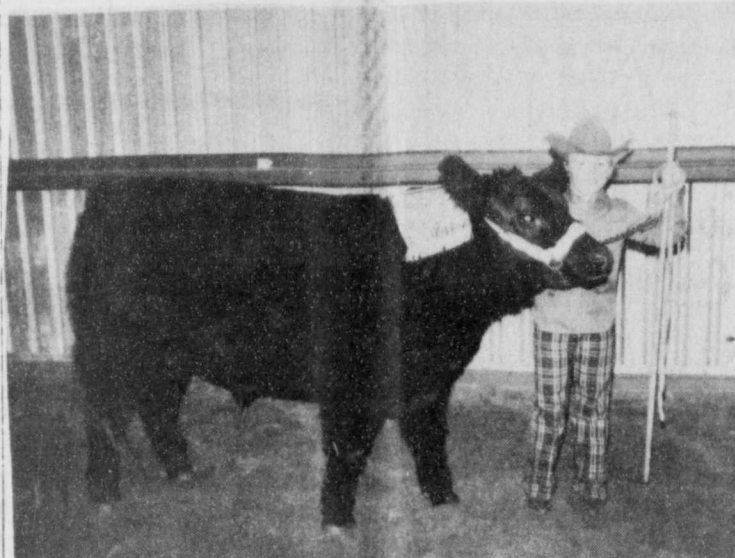

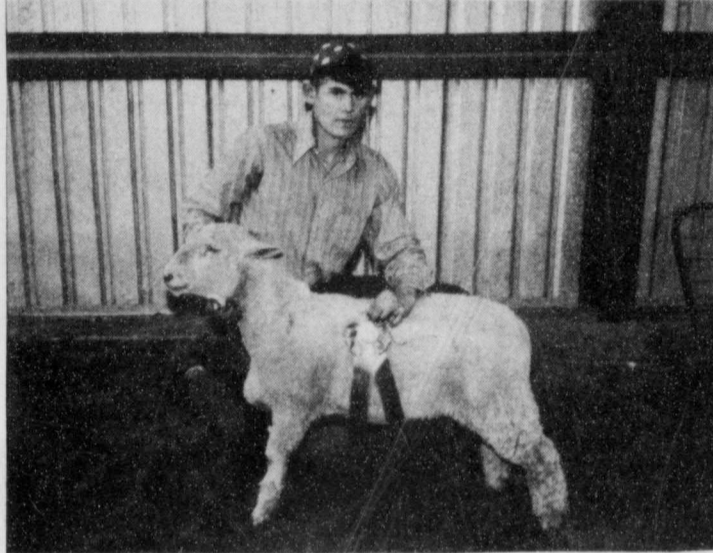

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Pecan phylloxera are small insects that cause the galls on the leaves and stems of pecan trees early in the spring. Phylloxera pass the winter in the egg stage in bark crevices. In the spring the egg hatches and the tiny nymph feeds on tender young growth. The nymph secretes a substance which stimulates tissue to develop into galls. The resulting gall will attain a size of 1/10 to 1 inch diameter.

After the nymph matures, numerous eggs are deposited inside the gall. Nymphs of the succeeding generation develop within in the gall which splits in 1 to 3 weeks liberating them. There are several generations each year. Four to five weeks are required per generation and new generations continue to develop as long as young tender growth is present.

Control can be obtained by the spray application of dormant oil (3 1/2 gallons 97% oil emulsion in 100 gallons of water) during the winter. The tree trunk and rough bark on the limbs should be sprayed thoroughly. The oil kills the phylloxera in the egg stage.

A shock from a faulty electrical appliance is no laughing matter. In fact it can be deadly. Regular checks should be made of all electrical appliances and their wiring for any indicators of trouble. If something is spotted, corrective measures should be taken immediately.

One of the first things to know is the location of the main switch of the electrical system. Be sure it can be reached in case of an emergency. An ample supply of correct size fuses is another must. Remember, a fuse is there to limit the current in the wiring so a 15-amp fuse should never be replaced with a 30-amp because the wires will overheat and could start a fire.

Bare wires should be sought out and repaired. Only a few minutes are required for the inspection and replacement of a service cord.

So-called "octopus wiring", having several wires coming from a single receptacle, is a too common practice and should be avoided.

The use of approved materials and good workmanship are musts

in safe wiring. Don't overlook the U-L label. This means the equipment has been thoroughly tested by the Underwriter's Laboratory and meets the requirements of the laboratory's standards. And finally, wiring jobs should be done by a reputable contractor who works according to the National Electrical Code.

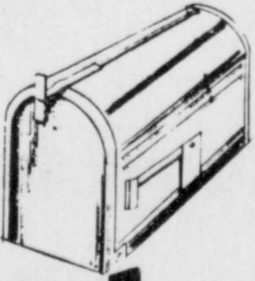

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Texas Teacher Salaries Below National Average

National figures just released on average teacher salaries indicate the folly of freezing Texas teacher salaries, as suggested by some business groups, the president of the Texas State Teachers Association said today.

Mrs. Jewell Harris of Abilene, TSTA president, pointed to statistics published this week by the National Education Association.

The survey shows Texas teacher salaries have moved up from 39th place among the states last year to an estimated 29th place for the 1970-71 year. The Texas statistics are based on official reports from the Texas Education Agency.

"This indicates that teacher pay in Texas is gradually catching up with that in other states, but we still have a long way to go before reaching even the national average," Mrs. Harris said.

The Texas average for this year was pegged at \$8,325, up from \$7,277 in 1969-70. This year's figures still is \$940 below the national average of \$9,265 paid to teachers in all states.

Twenty-eight states are ahead of Texas in the amount they pay teachers, including neighboring Louisiana, which ranks 28th.

"This illustrates the utter folly of a well-publicized proposal to freeze teacher salaries at the present level," Mrs. Harris explained.

"The long-range compensation plan enacted by HB 240 of the 1969 Legislature was designed to move Texas teaching salaries up gradually, to avoid undue strain on state and local finances," she added.

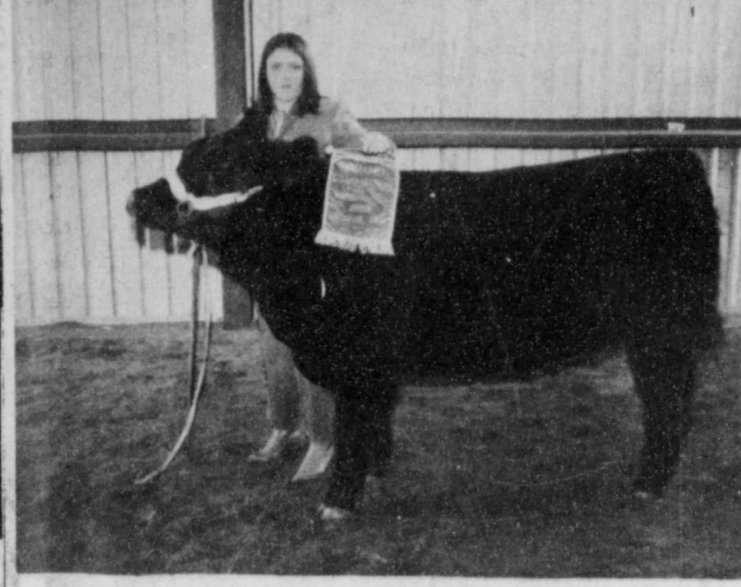
"We had to take a pretty good step in the first two years, as indicated by the move from 39th to 29th place, to get back in striking distance of other states," the teacher leader noted.

"But now the long-range plan is about to go into operation next year, to help us gain more ground," she added.

"It would be tragic to throw out all of the forward-looking actions of the 61st Legislature before we even begin the long-range plan," Mrs. Harris said.

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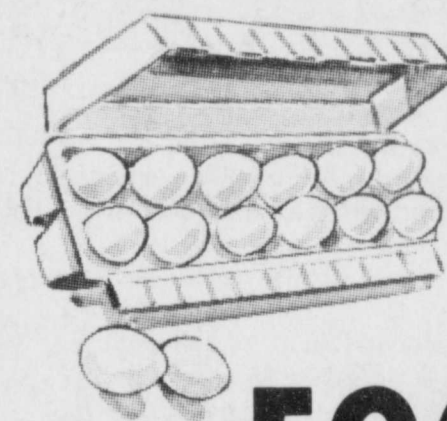
