Final Rites For Barney Bigham

Barnette (Barney) Bigham, 78, a retired barder, died at 10:15 a.m. Thurday, March 25, in Callan Hospital. He had been in ill health several years and had been hospitalized two weeks.

Funeral was held at 3 p.m. Saturday in the Church of Christ with Dr. Rex Kyker of Abilene Christian College and the Rev. Marshall Stewart, pastor of Church of the Nazarene of Hamlin, officiating.

Burial was in Belview Cemetery under direction of Weathersbee Funeral Home.

Mr. Bigham was born Nov. 24, 1892, in Marlow, Okla., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas H. Bigham. He came to Fisher County in 1907 from Taylor County. He married Elizabeth Lambert March 3, 1925 in Roby. He had operated a barber shop in Rotan 41 years until his retirement nine years ago.

Dr. Maurice Callan Gives Tips On Kicking Cigarette Habit

With evidene that more than half of all cigarette smokers understand the dangers of the habit and would like to give it stated in an interview.

Here's a suggested first step for some one who wants to quit, Dr. Callan said. "Name a future date when you hope to stop completely and as it approaches, gradually cut down the number of cigarettes you smoke, day by day or week by week. For example, Dr. Callan added, You can resolve to smoke only once an hour, or to stop smoking gradually extend your nonsmoking by an hour, two hours,

"Or, you can decide to cut the number of cigarettes you smoke by half, each week, giving yourself four or five weeks to Q-Day, "Dr. Callan said.

Dr. Callan then discussed that all-important period, the week before Q- Day. "Think over your list of reasons why you should not smoke, " he explained. These can be different for different people. It can be the risk of cancer, the danger of emphysema and other diseases related to cigarette smoking. Or it may be the spoiling of the taste of food, the high cost of smoking. the smoker's cough, the bad breath, the mess and smell of norning-after ashtrays. Mrs. Iola Mitchell of Rotan has preserved over the years an old reproduction of the Ulster County Gazette, printed in Kingston, New York, on Saturday, January 4, 1800.

The paper was given to her by her grandmother, Mrs. A. C. Moore of Lingleville, Texas (Erath County) when whe was 16 years old.

Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell moved to Rotan from Salinas, California last September.

The newspaper owned by Mrs. Mitchell was evidently printed as a special edition. It contained information and letters from foreign dignatories and Senate and even an "Answer From The President", John Adams, dated December 22, 1799.

The paper contained a letter from the Senate to President Adams that stated "To The President of the United States" The Seante of the United States respectfully take leave, Sir, to express to you their deep regret for the loss their country has sustained in the death of General George Washington".

The paper also contained numerous classified ads offering for sale such merchandise as a "sleigh" and one desiring to trade "peas for wheat".

Mrs. Mitchell did not know exactly what year the paper was printed, however did remark that "I wouldn't take anything for it". She remarked that she had been advised to put the paper in a museum because of

Beef cattle which have been on dry ranges for the past six months are faced with serious nutritional deficiencies. The first deficiency is a lack of sufficient range grass or forage. It is further complicated by the low quality or absence of sufficient total digestible nutrients. This kind of roughage contains phorous or Vitamin A.

Decisions are difficult to make during such stress periods. One management practice is to attempt to get animal units cormay be weaned earlier than usual or creep fed to help relieve grazing pressure and thus improve cow conditions. Less replacement cattle should be kept and herd culling is always in order. Non-breeders, slow breeders, irregular breeders, and cows which have consistently produced lower grade, light weight calves need to be marketed. Palpate cows to determine pregnancy and sell those which are not pregnant.

There is no cheap way out when pasture for a ge is gone. However, there are some ways to reduce losses. Under extreme droughty conditions it may be advisable to confine foundation herd to small acreages. 


