



WHEREAS, Cancer will strike more than 50 million Americans now living if present rates prevail, and


WHEREAS, it is known that at least one out of two of every cancer patients could be saved if more people saw their physicians for early detection, diagnosis, and treatment and

> Bagworms are destructive pests on many evergreen and deciduous shrubs and trees, and sometimes on neglected fruit trees. Late March and early April is the time to control them.

First, remove the bags from infested plants and destroy them. Then when temperatures stay above 60 degrees for 6 to 10 hours during the day, start applying control measures. The

pesticide applications should be continued at 7 to 10 day intervals until the infestation is eliminated. Sevin, chlordane, lead arsen-

ate or toxaphene will effectively control the bagworm. Directions for mixing and applying the materials are given on the label container and should be carefully followed.






