



#### SCS Personnel Strong On Brush Control

Weedy and wood vegetation on rangelands steal more water every year in Texas than is used by all the towns, all the factories, all the farms, and all the people, notes Virgil Helm of the Soil Conservation Service in Rotan. These plants annually use almost five times as much water as is stored in all the reservoirs in the state.

Most woody plants are extravagant users of water. Many shrubs require 2 to 4 times more water to produce a pound of dry matter than do the perennial grasses. Also, when some of the shrubs become established in normal grassland, they have the effect of increasing the aridity of the area because they provide little protection against runoff and make it almost impossible for the grass to become established naturally. A 1967

study revealed that a mesquite. stand that shades at least 50% of the soil can use up to 9 inches of water per month during the growing season.

Removal and control of undesirable woody vegetation gives ranchers a major oppor tunity to conserve water and to increase grass production in West Texas. By practicing such brush control measures as root plowing, treedozing, and aerial spraying, several Fisher County farmers and ranchers have increased the production of their rangeland from 25 to 50%. This control can usually be accomplished at a cost of ten to 15 dollars per acre to the landowner.

Soil Conservation Service personnel in Rotan are available to help landowners plan a program of brush control on their land.

#### As It Looks From Here

The Insurance Industry, covering life, health, accident, fire and other disasters-particularly automobile, is coming under scrunity of the Federal Government.

There are those who would set Federal standards by which State regulatory agencies must comply or the government itself would step in. The process would be the same as that now applied to certain safety standards -- the same as now in effect for meat

More and more the idea of setting Federal regulations as a substitute for State regulations is being talked and advocated in the name of protecting the consumer.

As our society becomes more compact and State lines less distinguishable, uniformity in matters of safety, pollution and other problems not expecially peculiar to any community or State, may become desirable, if not necessary, to be efficient and effective. On the other hand, this trend toward Federal direction if further eroding States' authority and control.

Take automobile insurance as an example, It is not the fault of the local agent that our automobile insurance is high and seems to be getting higher. His rates are fixed and he can do nothing about it. Complaints of cost increases and difficulty in settlement of claims is nation-wide.

Secretary of transportation, John A. Volpe, established the Administration's position favoring a modest start in the "no-fault" insurance concept. This concept provides that no matter who is at fault in an automobile accident the claimant collects. This, it is reasonded, would provide faster adjustments, reduce bureaucracy and court litigation in many cases. The theory is that it would eliminate costs all along the line and thus trim cost of

Actually, there is little experience to provide guidance for this idea. Massachusetts, from which State Secretary Volpe comes, has had "no-fault" insurance since last January. A number of States have the matter under consideration by their Legislatures. Senator Hart of Michigan has offered a bill which would in fact, nationalize the idea. His Committee has held a series of hearings on the proposition and will likely hold more.

These hearings have developed evidence that "no-fault" insurance for small accidents would formalize what is already a policy of some companies. To look further, however, the issue is not quite that narrow. The wider and longer-range view touches on the moral question of what personal responsibilities a driver assumes for the privilege os using the highways and streets. It raises the question of whether safe drivers would not, in the end, subsidize the unsafe ones. Further, under proposals now being considered in the U.S. Senate, a disturbing aspect of the "nofault" idea is that citizens in lesser accidents would be compelled to waive rights to use the courts to settle a claim they thought to be unjust.



One of the fastest growing causes of adult disability in this ountry is emphysema, a disease affecting the lungs.

Causes and effects of emphysema were known, but the disease Bessie M. Nichols, Snyder, W. received greater emphasis in 1964, says the Texas State Depart- L. Burk, Roby; J. W. Criswell, Peament of Health. A report that year by the U.S. Surgeon General's cock; Miles Ellison, Aspermont; Advisory Committee on Smoking and Health incriminated cigarette smoking as a contributing cause of the disease. It was found that for cigarette smokers the death rate from chronic bronchitis and emphysema was six times greater than for nonsmokers. Emphysema and chronic bronchitis are closely related although they may develop independently. Emphysema often develops from chronic bronchitis.

Deaths due to emphysema have increased about five times in the past 10 years. Frequently the victims live in areas where air pollution is a constant problem.


Emphysema is described as an impairment of the bellows action of the lungs. In the course of the disease, the walls of the millions of tiny air sacs (called Alveoli) within the lungs are gradually destroyed. As the air spaces become larger, the victims find it increasingly difficult to expel all the air inhaled, and air becomes trapped in the lungs. As the disease progresses increasingly large amounts of air are trapped in the lungs, causing the lungs to become enlarged. At the same time, they become less efficient in exchanging oxygen for carbon dioxide.

Frequent respiratory infections, increasing breathlessness, a feeling of tightness in the chest, general weakness and a tendency to tire easily are signs of the disease.

Eventually, emphysema destroys the elasticity of the lungs--the ability to expand and contract. As interference continues, an increased burden is imposed on the heart which must work harder to pump blood through the damaged lungs. Under such strain, the heart may enlarge and eventually give out.

Emphysema doesn't strike suddenly but comes on gradually, sometimes after several seasons of bad colds, each accompanied by a severe cough and often with chronic bronchitis. The cough may become chronic.

There is no known cure of emphysema, but with early treatment under a doctor's care most patients get some relief from their attacks of breathlessness. Treatment can enable many to live comfortably for a long time.



#### V.A. Questions And Answers

Editor's Note: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office. Q-- I am a disabled veteran

receiving additional compensation for my 17- year-old-son who recently enlisted in the Navy. Must I report his enlistment to the VA, and will VA stop the additional compensation because of his enlistment? A -- The answer to both ques-

tions is "no". The additional compensation will continue until your son reaches 18, regardless of his military service.

Q-- My son received 36 months of training under the Dependents Educational Assistance Program and has now been ordered to active duty. Will he still be eligible for educational assistance under the GI Bill?

A -- Yes. If your son serves on active duty at least 181 days and receives an other than dishonorable discharge, he will be eligible for additional education assistance. A veteran may use up to 48 months when he is entitled under two or more programs, but all time used under laws administered by the

Q-- My father was a World War II veteran, and after his death I received \$40 per month death pension. I am now a 22year-old Vietnam veteran enrolled in college under the GI Bill. Am I still eligible for the pension benefits in addition to my veteran benefits?

A -- Yes, if you have never married, and meet the income limitation of \$1,800 maximum you will be eligible for the \$40 pension benefit until you reach age 23. Your GI Bill payments, in excess of the amounts expended for training, are considered income.

Q -- My fahter has a serviceconnected gastritis condition which, for several years, VA rated him at 60 percent disabled. Since the condition prevents him from being employed, am I eligible for an educational allowance as a child of a disabled veteran?

A -- No. The veteran must be rated by the VA as permanently and totally disabled. However, since you indicated that your father may be unemployable, he should submit proof of this fact and request his claim be reopened. If he should be rated 100 per cent disabled based on individual premployability because of his disability, you might then become

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White says that considerable confusion has developed among farm vehicle drivers following adoption of the new safety standards, but that an amendment to the regulation adopted January 1st, 1971 exempts drivers of farm vehicles for a six-month period until July

Commissioner White says that according to the amendment, farm vehicle drivers must be 18 year old, rather than 21 as re-

cluding written examinations, road tests and physical examinations -- will not apply. White pointed out, however, that farm vehicle drivers are defined as persons who are at least 18 years old, are driving a vehicle controlled and operated by a farmer and are being used to transport produce from the farm or supplies to the farm. In addition, the vehicle being driven must have a gross weight, including load, of 10,000 pounds or less and is not used in the operations of a for-hire carrier.

#### COUNTY AGENT **NEWS** By Richard Spencer

Farmers and ranchers should have a smile on their faces due to the recent rain. Of course. this is only a start, but we can hope and pray for more.

Box seat reports are coming in very slow from the Fair Grounds in loby. If you own a box seat please let me know. We are trying to bring our list up to date and get the box seats repaired.

During 1971 many Rolling Plains Farmers may consider planting guar as an alternate crop on set-aside acres and taking less government payment. Listed below are the major points to consider in planting guar on set- aside acres:

1. Guar may be planted for harvest on set-aside acres. At the time of certification the farm operator will designate the exact location of his setaside acreage.

2. Guar cannot be harvested on conserving base acres.

3. There will be a flat reduction rate of \$10.00 per acre for all acres of set-aside which are harvested.

4. Dates for 1971 are not confirmed at this time. In 1970, a farmer who planned to plant guar for harvest on diverted acres was required to certify these acreages with the ASC office by May 1; he still had until October 1, 1970 to decide whether he would harvest the guar. If he did not harvest, his payment reduction was rein-

5. The profitability of planting guar on set-aside acres will depend on a farmer's (a) expected yield for guar; (b) expected prices; (c) cost of production.

Guar seed cost \$12.00 per cwt last year. Planting rate is 41 lbs. to the acre. Yields ran from 850-1350 lbs. per acre and sold for \$6.00 per cwt. This year the Box 54

mill is guaranteeing \$5.00 per ewt, but the price can go up as happened last year.

Good management, including fertilizing, mowing and watering, will be even more important in the weeks alread so far as the home lawn is concerned. Under the current weather conditions, the job ahead could be a real toughy.

Turf requires adequate amounts of plant food if it is to stay green and maintain growth under drouth conditions. Water requirements necessarily will have to be increased to take care of the lack of rainfall. And, underwatering should be

avoided if at all possible. Soak the soil to a depth of several inches at each watering; thus maintaining a good turf. In the long run, the amount of water used will be no more and may be less than when light sprinkling of the lawn is practiced.

Lawns should receive an application of a complete fertilizer in the spring about the time growth begins and another in the fall a month ahead of the first frost. During the summer, an application of nitrogen every 30 to 40 days will keep the lawn green and growing and the ground covered. Ground cover is important during periods of high temperature.

Nitrogen is the key element in turf production. It produces vegetative growth and gives the plant a deep green color. Phosphorus stimulates development of a good root system and potassium affects the physiological processes of the plant.

### Texas Commission Calls For Small Town Concentrated Growth

tor of the Texas Industrial Commission, has called for a concentrated industrial expansion program to repopulate smaller cities and stop the threat of overpopulation of metropolitan

In a Texas Industrial Week, statement, Harwell outlined a three-pronged proposal to help 166 Texas counties that lost population in the last decade, and close the growing gap between the average Texan's income and the national average.

Harwell pointed out that although Texas is a leader in instrial growth, the state is still

facing problems. He said Texas lost 52,000 manufacturing jobs last year due to tight money and federal cutbacks, and the trend toward concentrating industries in already-large cities threatens to overburden the areas' resources.

"We must stop the flow of people from our smaller towns and cities into the already overpopulated areas, "he said. "We must secure better, higher-paying jobs for Texans.

As an answer to the problem, the state industrial chief proposed a comprehensive planning program for the state's 21 industrial regions. He pointed out that the Commission is now able to match the needs of an industry with the assets of a city through a computerized program established within the TIC.

He also called for an incentive program to attract new industry to the less-populous regions of the state. "For all Texans to receive the benefits of industry, plants must locate not just in the big cities, but in all areas of the state, "he said.

Harwell said all states but Texas already offer financing incentives to new industry and

#### Quarantine Placed At Border

Agricultural quarantine inspectors intercepted more than 47,000 plant pests and diseases at U. S. border ports of entry during 1970, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This is an average of 129 pests or diseases per day. They were found in passenger baggage, ship and airplane stores, mail and cargo. The quaratnine inspectors are part of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service. Some of the most dangerous

pests, fruit flies, continued to be a major problem; and increased about one-fourth during 1970. However, this increase reflects a rise in quarantine inspection activities.

The stopping of the inbound agricultural pests included some of the world's most destructive insects and disease, capable of causing millions of dollars damage to U.S. crops, gardens, forests and ornamentals.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture cooperated with the Department of Defense in preclearing military cargoes and carriers from Vietnam for pestfree entry into the United States.



#### Military Aircraft To Fly Low Over Fisher County

of the 516 Tactical Airlift Wing (TAW), Dyess AFB, require Sylvester, Roby, Girard, Buffalo continuous low level flying training. The highest degree of proficiency must be maintained by the 516TAW aircrews in all modes of aerial delivery. As a result, C-130 Hercules and C-74 Caribou aircraft are flown at low altitudes over the "Big Country" on a daily basis.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 A. M. and midnight, Monday thru Friday, and less frequently on weekends. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the ground while night low level activities are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle or terrain feature within three miles of the prescribed track of the aircraft. Airspeeds will vary from 115 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are selected to provide maximum training and minimum disburbance of farms, ranches and communities. Towns, local airports, hospitals, hatcheries and stock pens are avoided when planning these routes and they will not be overflown under any normal circumstances. 516th officials would like to emphasize that, even though training must be conducted at low altitudes and high airspeeds in order to be realistic, all possible precautions are taken to prevent disruption of local agricultural and community activities.

Jeronimo Gaona of Roby, selected by Directors of Upper Clear Fork SWCD as comeback Farmer of 1970, has been named Region I Comeback Farmer for 1970 by the Ft. Worth Chamber of Commerce Award Committee Region I comprises 52 counties in the Texas Panhandle and Rol-

Gaona will be recognized for his outstanding farming accomplishments at an awards banquet to be held at Ralls, May 7. The Award recognized Gaona for overcoming almost impossible obstacles to become one of the top farmers in the state.

Jeronimo moved to Fisher County in 1955. He worked for Thurman Terry as a hired hand until 1965 when he decided that he wanted to go into the farming business himself.
