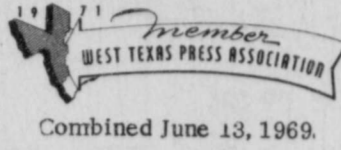

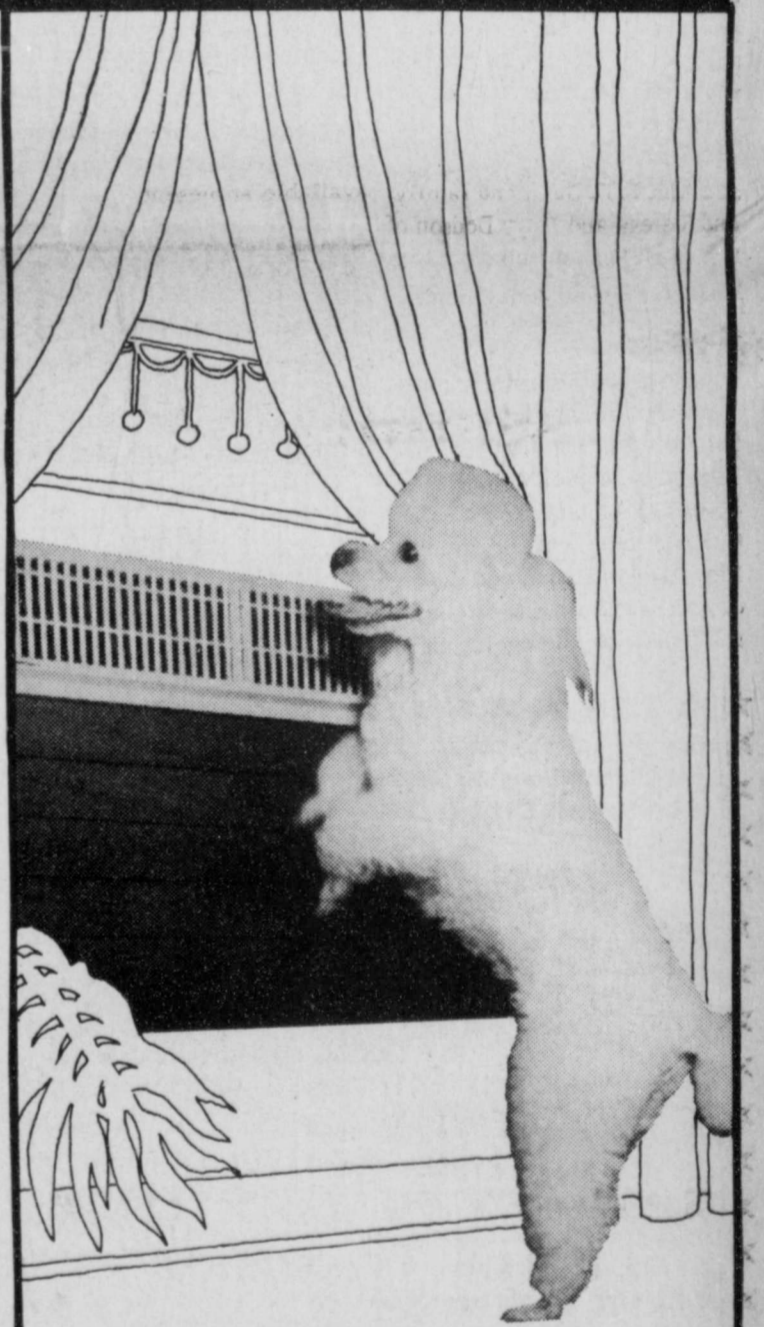

The place, still known as the "Old Rector Place" has changed hands only twice since the Rectors sold it, and the present owner is Mrs. Phil J. Malouf.

Glenn Rector and his wife are charter members of the Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star Lodge at Rotan. His father helped organize the Masonic Lodge in Rotan after the town was established in 1907.

A total of 160 persons registered from various areas in Texas and New Mexico. Lea Dickenson was recognized as a representative of the oldest pioneer family present at the reunion. His father came to Newman in the 1880's when the T & P was built through Metkeel.

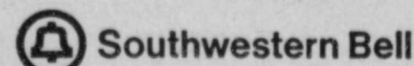

his knees and snapping his red suspenders with his thumbs." Or do you "remember on cold nights taking a heated footstone to bed to warm your feet. The climate in the bedrooms seemed like the north pole. One barely moved all night after getting a small spot warm. By morning the footstone would be quite cold and so would the feet." Remember when, "A housewife could take a dollar bill, spend an exciting afternoon shopping in a five and ten cent store, and still emerge with a quarter in change left." And, "Do you remember seeing an older aunt teasing her hair and puffing it into "dog ears", painting her cheeks by wetting red crepe paper."

CONTINUED from Page one years of age or older. Diphtheria, minimum of 3 doses with last dose within 10 years. Booster dose only after initial series. (Td adult type.) Smallpox, one vaccination within the past 10 years.

At the present time, reinforcing or "booster" doses of Diphtheria/Tetanus and Smallpox vaccines are required every ten years after the last dose completing the series; however, boosters are not required for Polio, Measles, and Rubella.

All schools will be required to maintain records of the immunization status of individual students. The State Health Department is designing a standard form for this purpose.

Since many types of personal immunizations records are in current use, any document listing each immunization received by year will be acceptable during the 1971-72 school year for either initiating or updating school immunization records.

Signature or rubber-stamp validation of personal records by physicians or public health clinics is recommended but not required until the Summer 1972 Semester, after which validation of new records is required.

A new, standard Certificate of Immunization form is being developed; however, comparable documents will always be acceptable.

Effective at the start of the Spring 1972 Semester, and continuing thereafter, new enrollees (those not previously enrolled in the Summer of Fall 1971 Semesters) who have not completed the required immunizations at time of enrollment, must complete them as soon as is medically feasible.

Parents of Rotan school students will receive a letter from the Superintendent's office before school starts this fall regarding the immunization requirements.

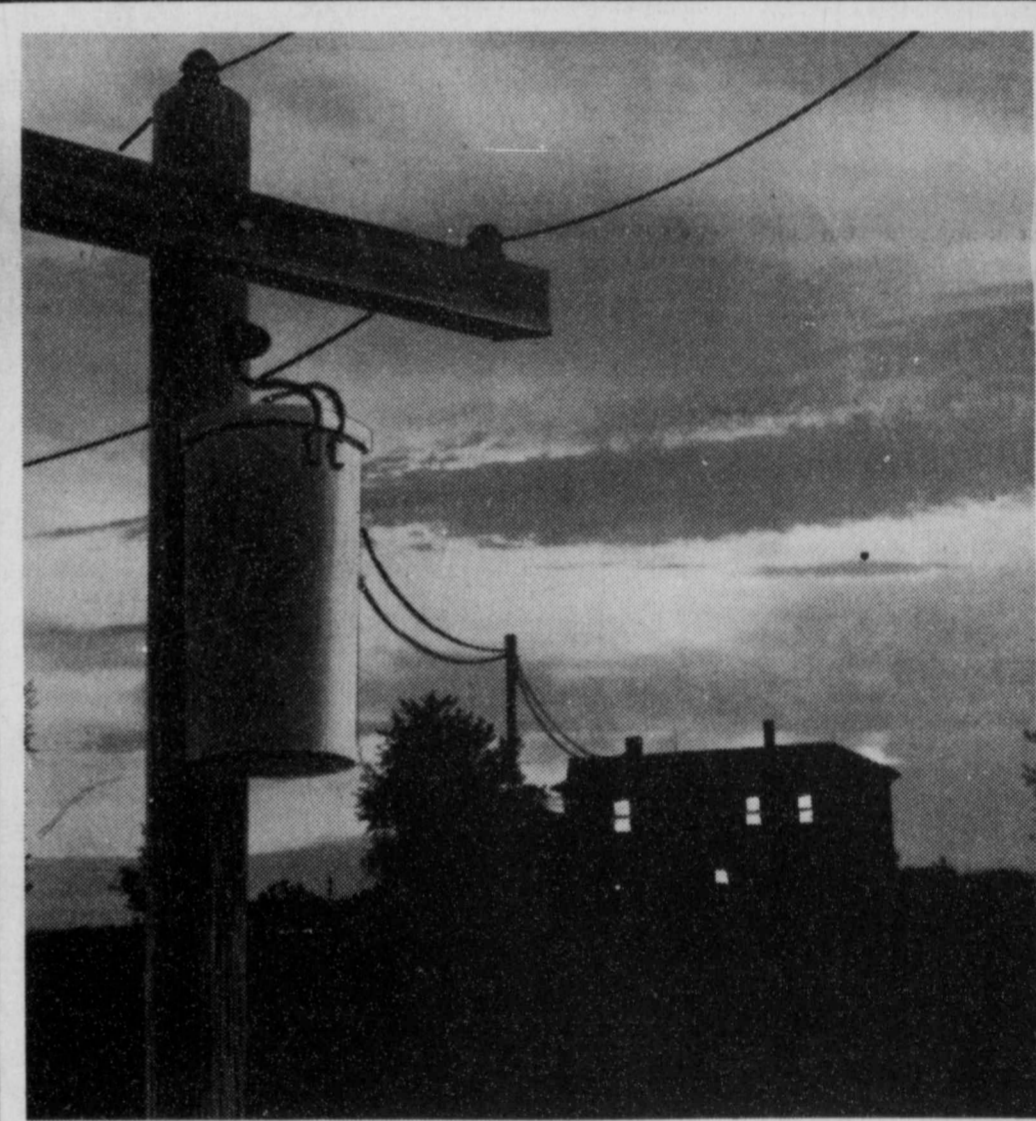
