### Forest For The Trees

Our Texas teachers have long been entitled to a raise in pay and our nation is likewise long overdue on a realignment on inflationary measures. It is unfortunate that President Nixon's 90-day wage-price freeze should hit at a time that will seemingly delay that raise to our most deserving teachers.

It is unlikely that Texas Governor Preston Smith would be so selfish to flaunt President Nixon's 90-day price freeze (including salaries) in seeking a \$3,500 personal pay hike for himself as well as attempt to gain favorable votes from state officials and teachers who he thinks should be exceptions to a national freeze.

A prior contract signed for state officials or teachers should be no exception! After all, probably 65 million people in these United States either are employed as government personnel or in the teaching profession. Who's left?

The only error made by President Nixon in the freeze is that it is about 2 years late in coming.

The responsibility of Texas belongs to Texans but believe me, inflation is national in scope and Governor Preston Smith should be big enough to realize in asking state agencies to invoke the raises to state employees and teachers is asking exceptions for all states—all cities, including individual businessmen.

Governor Smith is saying by his actions that the leaders of cities within the state of Texas has the right to flaunt the laws of this state.

Responsibility, Leadership, Patriotism.

What has happened to the example that once was honored, trusted and respected in high office?

The Governor has even stated that beyond the price freeze questions lies a far more important question of whether the President of the United States has the authority to overrule our Texas laws.

The blemish on the annals of Texas politics takes on an even darker tint as the stains of the stock scandal are now being smeared by flaunting a Republic under which a Texas citizenry holds much allegiance.

I'll take the freeze and the three month consequence to get our national economic household back in order and feel most Texans will be happy to do the same. Maybe the puffy black eye that Governor Smith now has will get some relief if he would stare over the trees and look at the forest.

## Lottery Will Determine Fisher County Juries

Fisher County joined with other counties throughout the state recently in implementing a new system of selecting jury panels.

The new "jury wheel system" went into effect August 15, and according to District Judge, will change the exemptions on many local residents.

In years past the list was

almost endless giving exemptions to nurses, doctors, pastors, etc., now according to Kirk, only those over 65 years of age, and females with children under 10 years of age at home will be excused from serving on jury panels.

All registered voters in Fisher County are eligible to serve on jury panels. The names of all

voters have been typed on individual cards and placed in the new jury wheel.

The new jury panels for the next county and district courts will be selected by drawing the names from the lottery type jury wheel.

During a normal year there will be three juries selected, one for the District Court and 2 for County Court. Those selected for jury duty during the coming year, will have their names placed back in the jury wheel for possible selection next year.

The new lottery jury system selection replaces the old method of appointment juries.

The jury wheel will be permanently housed in the Fisher County Courthouse under lock and key and will require two keys to open it when panels are to be selected. One key is kept by the District Clerk, Eula Mae Hull, and the other by the Sheriff's Office.

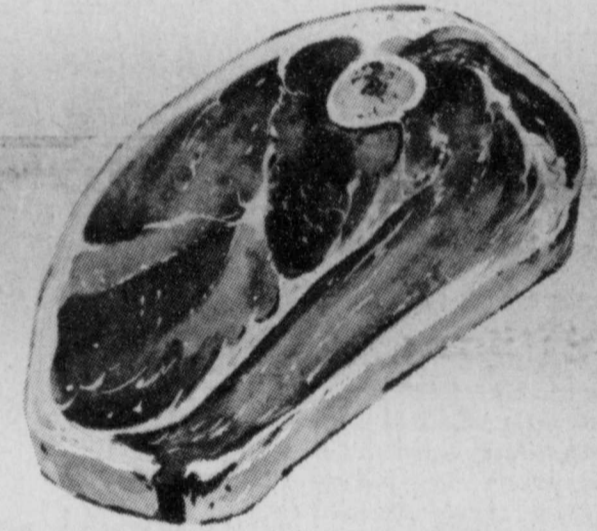

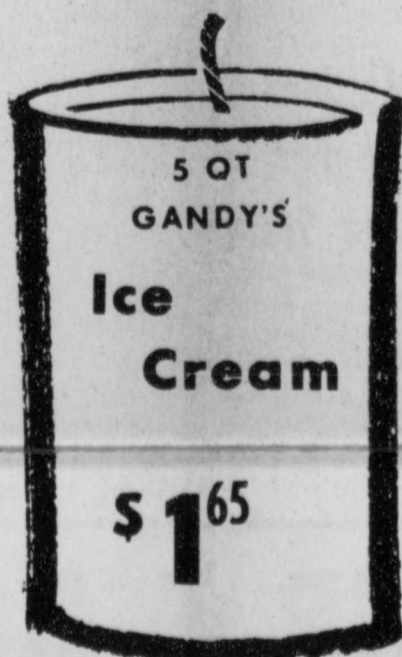

# NEW LAW REQUIRES LIVESTOCK OWNERS TO REGISTER BRANDS

All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be recorded with the County Clerk after Aug. 30 according to a new law passed during the last sessions of the state legislature.

The new law is a result of efforts by state county clerks and farm organizations.

## VETERANS ADMINISTRATION Information Service

Editors Note: Veterans and their dependents are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.

Q.--I draw compensation for a 100 percent service connected disability, and have been granted a waiver on my G.I. life insurance premiums. Recently, I received an insurance dividend check. Since I do not pay anything into the insurance fund, I am wondering whether I should return the check?

A.--Don't return the check. You are entitled to the dividend. Under the waiver provision of your insurance policy, the insurance continues in force as though premiums are being paid.

Q.--I was just discharged from the Army after serving four years, part of it in Vietnam. Can I get a G.I. home loan and go to school under the G. I. Bill at the same time?

A.-- Yes. There is no bar against participating in each of these programs at the same time.

Producers will be given a six month period (August 30, 1971 through Feb. 29, 1972) in which to register the brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using. After this time, any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first come, first served" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be rerecorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional coun-

ties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have it recorded in his name.

It will be illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brands and or marks which may be recorded in a county by a single person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and rerecording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or rerecorded as provided by the new law.

The County Clerk must assure that no more than one brand of a kind is recorded on the same location of the animal in each county. Therefore no two persons in a county may record the same brand in the same location. Also it is the responsibility of the County Clerk to make certain that in recording any brand for a person, that the part of the animal on which the brand is to be placed be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fineable offense of not less than \$10 or more than \$50.

The Grand Parade will kick off the Fisher County Fair and Rodeo, starting at 5 o'clock on Thursday afternoon. It will feature Riding Clubs, Bands, floats marching groups, and any one who can ride a horse, cart or bicycle is invited to participate in the parade.

## Burleson Announces Coast Guard Accepting Academy Applications

Congressman Omar Burleson has announced that the United States Coast Guard Academy is now accepting and processing applications for appointment as Cadet, U. S. Coast Guard, Class of 1976. Representative Burleson stressed that appointments to the U. S. Coast Guard Academy are tendered solely on the basis of an annual nationwide competition with no congressional appointments or geographical quotas involved. Applications for appointment must be submitted to the Director of Admissions, U. S. Coast Guard Academy, prior to 15 December, 1971, and candidates must arrange to participate in the prescribed College Entrance Examination Board Tests prior to or including the 4 December 1971 administration. The competition for appointment as Cadet is based on the candidate's rank in high school, his performance on the CEEB (1) Scholastic Aptitude Test, (2) English Composition Achievement Test, and (3) either Level 1 or Level 11 Mathematics Achievement Test, and his leadership potential as demonstrated by his participation in high school extracurricular activities, community affairs or parttime employment. Most successful candidates rank in the top quarter of their high school class and demonstrate proficiency in both the mathematical and applied science fields.

To qualify for the competition, an applicant must be unmarried and must have reached his 17th but not his 22nd birthday by July 1, 1972. The minimum educational requirement is a high school diploma; however, high school seniors assured of graduation by June 30, 1972, are eligible to compete provided they have at least fifteen credits by that time. Applicants must have completed three units in English, and three in mathematics including algebra and plane or coordinate geometry or their equivalents, and must fulfill the basic physical and moral requirements.

Congressman Burleson emphasized that cadets obtain an excellent undergraduate education at no personal cost and, in addition, receive pay and allowances fully adequate to fulfill all their ordinary living expenses. The constantly updated Academy curriculum offers liberal arts, engineering, and professional subjects with a choice of thirteen academic options which include: general, ocean, marine, electrical, nuclear and civil engineering; mathematics; computer science; ocean science; physics; chemistry; history/government; and economics/management.

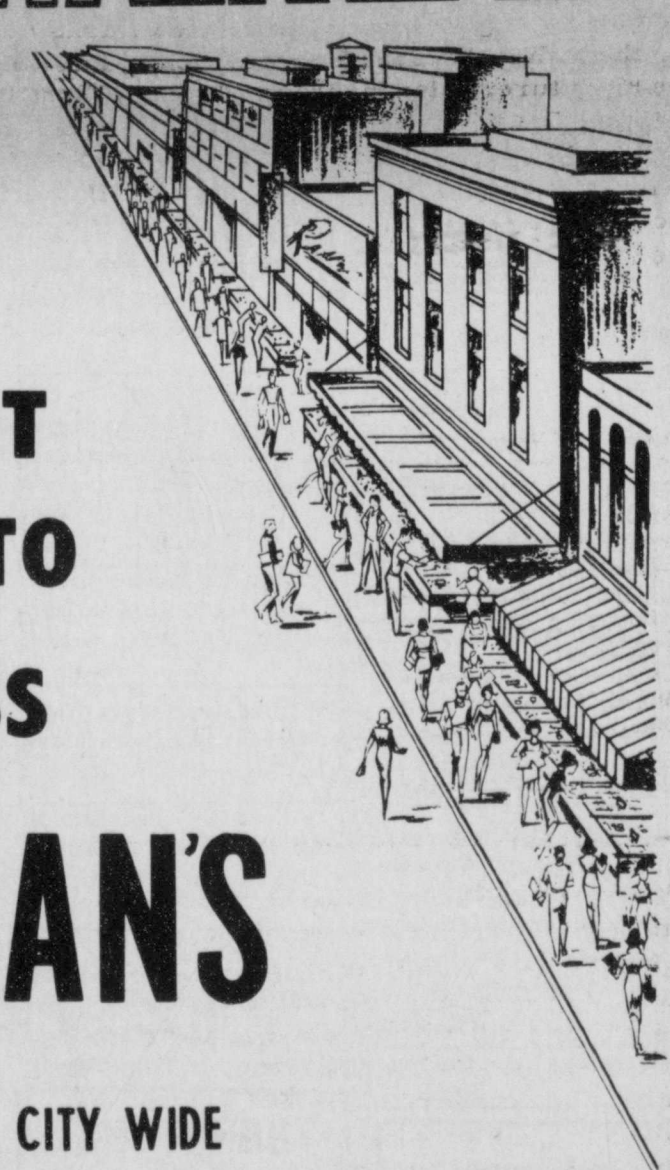

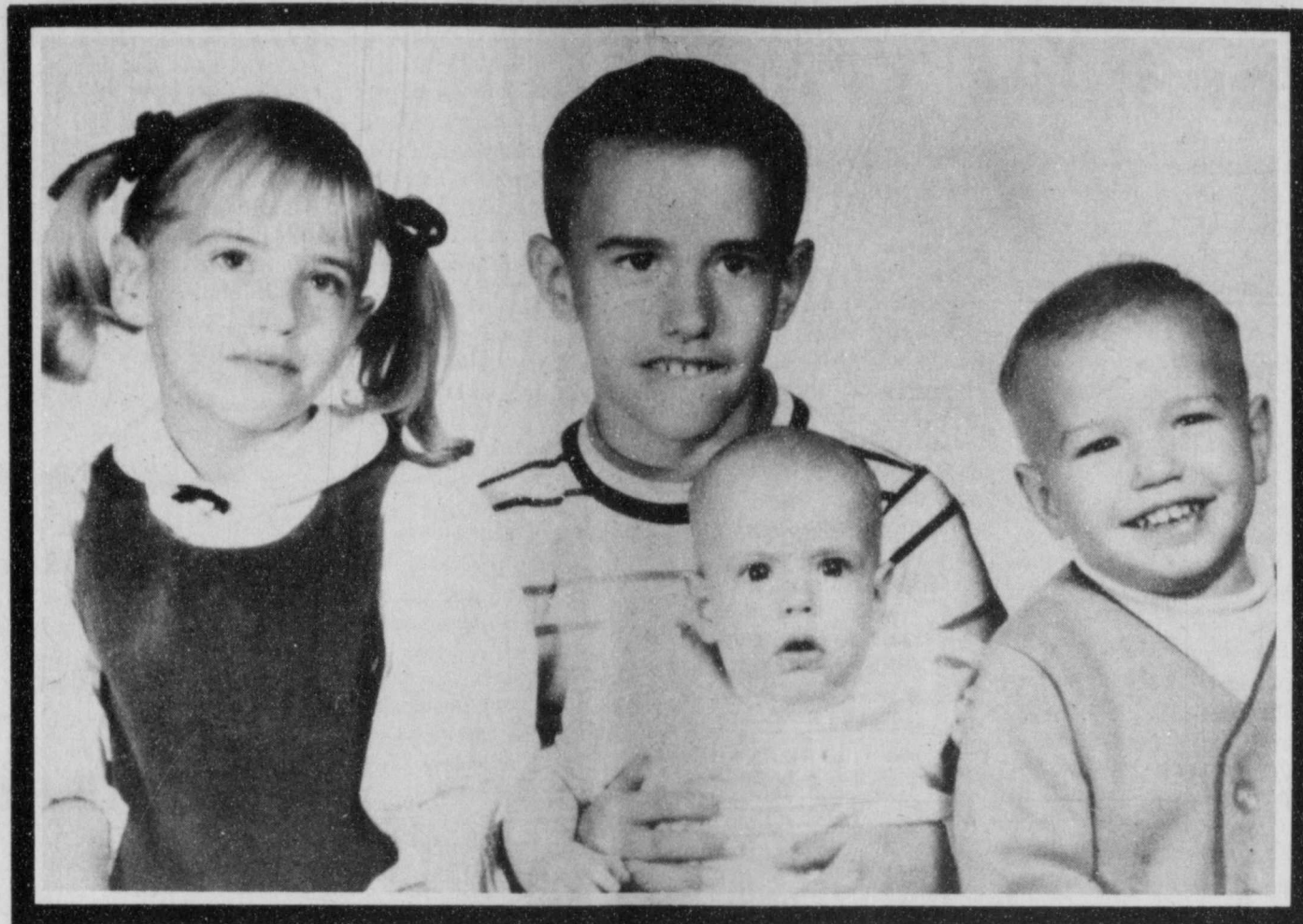

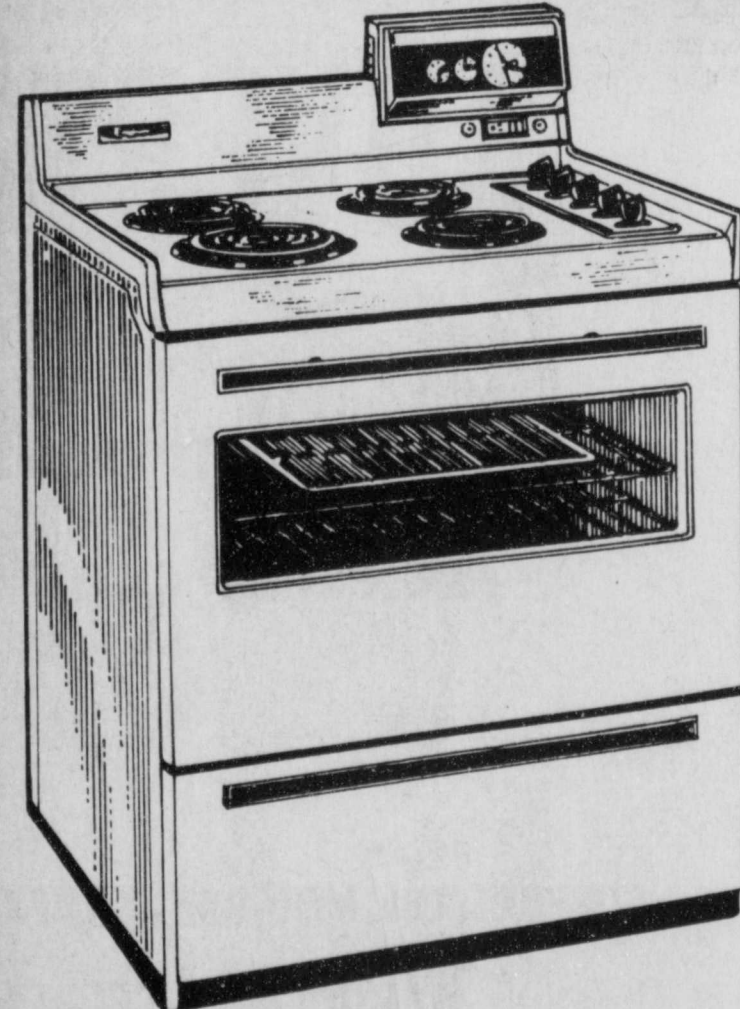

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# COUNTY AGENT NEWS

While all phases of Texas agriculture added nearly \$10 billion to the State's economy in 1970, about 80 percent of this total was generated from the manufacture and supplying of tools for production and the processing and distributing of agricultural commodities.

The remaining \$2 billion consisted of values added in farming and ranching and government payments to agriculture. Cash receipts from farm marketings during 1970 were \$3.1 billion compared to \$3.0 billion in 1969. Livestock and livestock products sales totaled \$1.96 billion while crop cash receipts were \$1.9 billion in 1970.

The total value of farm assets in Texas is about \$29 billion including \$27 billion for physical assets and \$2 billion in financial assets. Real estate taxes paid by Texas farmers were just over \$119 million in 1970 compared to a \$70.6 million level the year before.

Agribusiness provides employment for 35-40 percent of the Texas labor force. Farm and ranch operators or members of their families working on farms numbered 190,000. Hired workers on farms and ranches numbered 92,000; were paid \$250 million in 1970. An additional 1.3 million workers were engaged in off-farm agribusiness employment.

The off-farm percentage has increased as Texas farms have enlarged, commercialized, specialized and mechanized. The rural population has dropped to approximately 2.3 million out of a total of more than 11 million, but many who live in cities own farms for revenue, recreation or other purposes.

The number of Texas cattle on pastures and in feedlots on the upswing according to recently released figures of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

On July 1, cattle on feed in the state, totaled 1,700,000 head, up 26 percent from a year earlier. This established a new record and makes Texas the leading cattle feeding state, replacing Iowa. Iowa feeding numbers showed a 13 percent decline, enabling Texas to become the top feeding state.

Beef cows that have calved reached 5.8 million head on January 1, 1971, showing a four percent increase from the same time last year.

During the year that ended March 1, marketings of cattle and calves reached 6.3 million. Half of this number was accounted for by fed cattle marketings from feedlots.

Texas shipped out almost one-half of a million more cattle and calves than it brought into the state during 1970. Nearly two-thirds of the outshipments went to California, Colorado, New Mexico or Oklahoma. Over half of the in-shipments came from New Mexico or Oklahoma.

Texas ranked as the third most important state in the nation for cattle slaughter in 1970 and held the fifth position in calves. Cash receipts from cattle and calves amounted to \$1.4 billion with cattle prices averaging 5 percent higher and calf prices averaging about seven percent greater.

Texas sheep raisers watched stocker ewes, one year and older increase to 2.7 million head as of Jan. 1, 1971. This represented a five percent increase over year earlier figures. The report revealed that almost twice as many sheep and lambs were

moved out of Texas as were shipped in during 1970. Half of the outshipments went to Colorado while over half of the in-shipments were from New Mexico.

During 1970 sheep prices were down about one percent while lamb prices averaged six percent below year earlier figures. Wool prices were off 27 percent compared to the prices paid the year before. Total cash receipts from sheep and lambs reached \$39 million during 1970.

Livestock owners need to record all livestock brands and marks with the county clerk's office after August 30, according to the new brand law passed in the last session of the Texas Legislature.

Under the new law all brands now recorded will expire six months after the effective date of September 1.

This means that persons now using a registered brand or mark must register within this six month period (September 1, 1971 through February 29, 1972). After this time any unrecorded brand becomes available on a "first-come" basis. The brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years.

Periodic re-registrations are enacted to clear the records of brands no longer being used.

The Fair season is upon us. Fisher County 4-H members will be exhibiting Livestock at Abilene, New Mexico. Amarillo, Lubbock and Dallas Fairs this fall. Of course, the Fisher County Fair is where the season is kicked off. It looks as if everything is in order for an outstanding Fair and Rodeo this year. With all the recent rains, farmers and ranchers should come to the event with a big smile on their faces.

## Cisco Junior College Sets Registration

Registration for the fall semester at Cisco Junior College has been set for August 30 and 31 with pre-registration on Aug. 23 through 26, according to an announcement by CJC Registrar, Carroll Scott. Classes will begin on Tuesday, September 1.

Scott said that all students who have been accepted for admission to CJC have been notified of an appointed time to pre-register during the August 23-26 period and that they could either enroll then or could register during the regular enrollment period of Monday and Tuesday, August 30 and 31.

Registration for night classes will be held one time only, the registrar said, and that will be Tuesday evening, September 7 at 6:30 p. m. No early registration will be accepted for night school.

Cisco Junior College has had record enrollments for each fall, spring and summer school terms for the past several years and is anticipating another fine fall enrollment this year.

Students desiring information concerning attending CJC are urged to contact Mr. Scott or Dean Ralph Glenn as soon as possible, school officials said.

The school is a state-supported junior college with state college tuition rates and relatively low costs for room, board, and fees.

"Employment of the handicapped does not raise insurance rates," George T. Welch, director of rehabilitation for the Insurance Company of North America, said at a hearing of the Milwaukee Area Committee on Employment of the Handicapped.

"They are safer and more productive employees than most people," he commented. Mr. Welch emphasized that the handicapped individual must be properly placed if he is to work to his fullest capacity. "All too frequently we will rush in to employ our quota of handicapped persons and place them in work that is hazardous for the individual and other people that surround him," Mr. Welch said. "Unless we in rehabilitation properly place the handicapped we will do a disservice to them," he added.

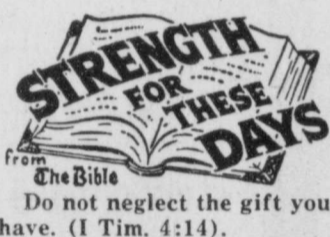

## 1040 U.S. Individual Income Tax Return Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q) I heard that since my wife and I both work we won't have enough taxes withheld from our paychecks to keep from owing money at tax time. What can we do to change this?**

**A) Estimate the amount of tax that will be withheld from your wages this year and the tax you will owe. This can be done by consulting tables available from your employer or local IRS office.**

**Then adjust your withholding to take care of any expected tax liability by filing a withholding certificate, Form W-4, with your employer, claiming fewer exemptions and, if necessary, having additional dollar amounts withheld.**

**Q) I went to a turkey dinner sponsored by my church.**

**Can I deduct the cost of the ticket as a charitable contribution?**

**A) Part of the cost may be deductible. If you paid more than the fair market value of the supper, the excess would be a charitable contribution. For example, if the supper had a fair market value of \$3 and you paid \$8 for a ticket, the excess of \$5 will be a contribution to the church, if the net proceeds of the supper go exclusively to the church. This is true even if you don't use the ticket.**

**Q) Are Social Security benefits taxable?**

**A) No. Social Security benefits are not taxable, whether they are received from the federal government**

**or from a state under the federal Social Security program.**

**Q) My son will begin college in the fall on a \$1,000 scholarship. Will this scholarship have any effect on whether I can claim him as a dependent next year?**

**A) No. Amounts received by a child, stepchild, or adopted child as a scholarship are not included in determining total support.**

**Q) I'm a doctor and I subscribe to a medical journal. Can I deduct the subscription price of the publication when I file my return next year?**

**A) Yes. Subscriptions to professional journals related to your business or profession are a deductible business expense. Also, if you are an employee, you may deduct the subscription price of the publication as an employee business expense incurred in earning taxable income if you itemize deductions.**

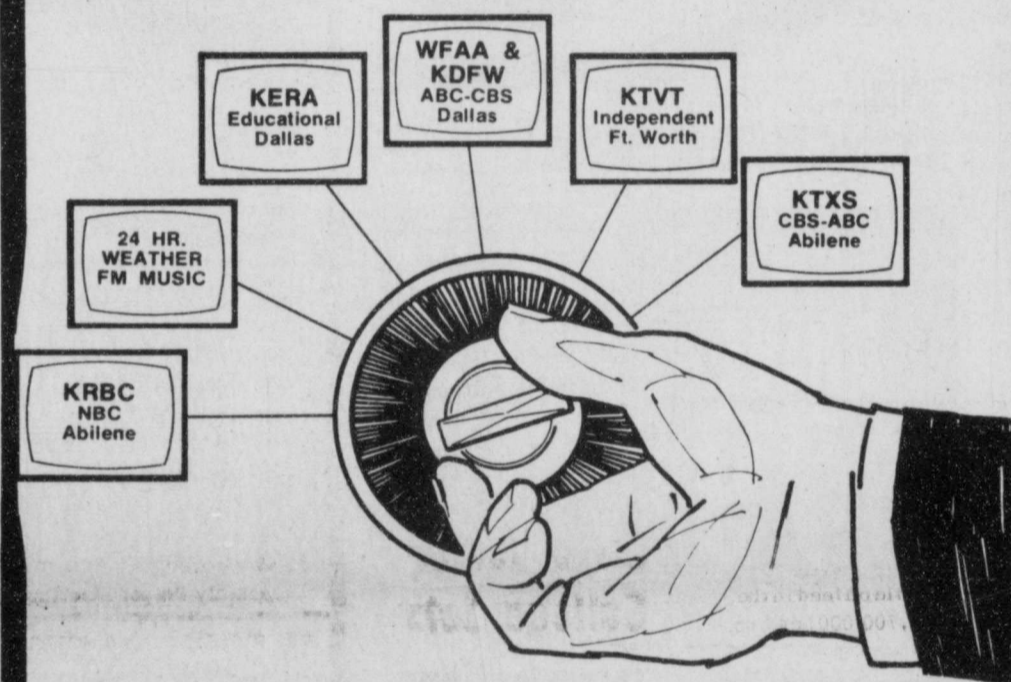
