This writer was amazed at the vast complex when he was afforded the privilege of viewing the enormous operation, from start to finish, first hand.

Far more important to the Gyp Mill employee than the economic benefit he generates, is the feeling he experiences as he performs his daily task.

One can readily sense the pulsating presence of pride as each workman carries out his job. He is aware that he is a member of a team that's the best at what he is doing.

Other impressions become slowly prevalent as one walks through this monstrous layout. The first is that all millers must be on the verge of going blind. Every individual out there wears glasses. One quick question concerning the glasses revealed that company safety policies required that all workers wear hard hats and safety glasses. Another first impression is that there must be at least 473 janitors on each shift to keep the plant as immaculate as it is. The answer: "Good housekeeping practices produce pride in production."

The entire "gyp crew" from the lowest common labor worker to the highest salaried executive gives one the impression that "everything is under control" and that their contribution to the overall production plan is important. This is a tribute to both labor and management.

The Gyp Mill's economic thrust on our economy is no accident. It comes about because interested employees take pride in their work and pride reflects in production, and production produces profits.

The next time a Gypsum employee spends a dollar with you, let them know that you appreciate their business. He is an important member of the team that pumps untold dollars into the economic strength of our county's economy.

Where Is Dad

If just the fathers of all the Rotan football players attended a Booster Club meeting there would be approximately 70 dads answer the roll call. If all the dads showed up and brought only 50 percent of the mothers, some 91 people would be there. If one half of the 91 people invited another member of their immediate family, the total would jump to 136.

It was a pathetic state of affairs when less than 10% of the parents of boys actively involved in football showed up for Monday night's Booster Club meeting.

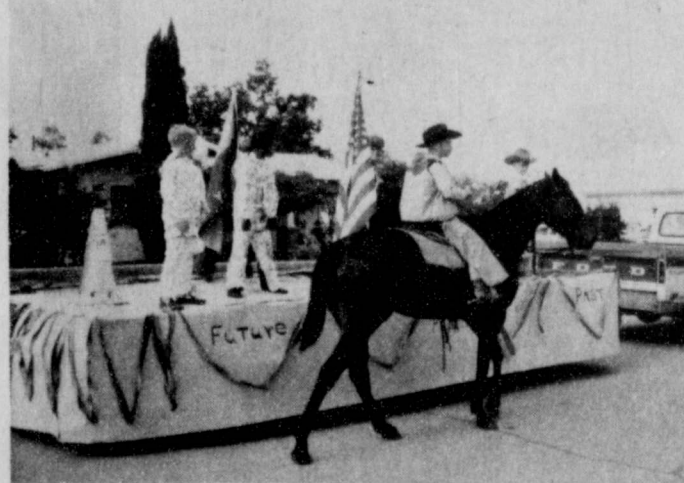
In a few short years these young men will be leaving home and a cause that affords us the opportunity to be actively involved in the support of an athletic activity may not be as accessible as it is today.

Direct Distance Dialing For Rotan Coming Sept 21

Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) will be inaugurated in Rotan on September 21. With DDD, Rotan telephone customers may dial their own station-to-station long distance calls.

Installation and testing of equipment is underway, said Bud McCasland, manager for Southwestern Bell.

"This improvement is another step in Southwestern Bell's effort to provide the best possible telephone service," McCasland said.

With DDD, long distance calls will be billed through the use of automatic equipment which will store on paper tape the calling number, the called number and the length of time of the call.

A maximum of eleven digits will be dialed for a station-to-station call. Customers will dial "1" for access to the DDD network, then the three digit Area Code and the seven-digit number being called.

For calls to other telephones

in the 915 Area Code, Rotan residents will dial only eight digits - "1" and the seven-digit number. The 915 Area Code will not be required.

McCasland noted that customers on eight-party lines will be intercepted by an operator after they dial DDD. The operator will ask for the caller's number, and the call will proceed. McCasland explained that the interception is necessary because of the number of customers on the line.

However, customers with one and two party service normally will not be intercepted.

Rotan Head Coach Names Tentative Starting Eleven

Head Football coach Charlie Davis has named the following Yellowhammer varsity players as tentative starters for the Seymour scrimmage this Friday. The contest will begin at approximately 7:30 following scrimmages by the freshman and junior varsity teams.

Senior Norvelle Kennedy will get the nod as quarterback for the Seymour game. Kennedy played end last year where he was tapped as an All-District offensive and defensive end. He is one of the permanent co-captains for 1971.

William Duke, a junior, will line up as the starting fullback. He started last year at defensive tackle. Duke is one of the Yellowhammers that will see action "both ways" this year. He will hold down the defensive line-backer slot when not pounding out yards as a fullback.

The wingback position will be held by senior, Dave Springer. Lettering last year as a junior, Springer will be counted upon heavily this season to give Rotan the break-away threat. He will play the comeback position on defense.

Neal Summers, a junior with varsity experience, will take title to the tailback slot. He is a valuable asset to the overall performance of the squad and is another player that will go "both ways". He'll start at defensive linebacker as well.

Stuart Nowlin has won the starting berth at offensive center. He is a senior and started last year until he was injured in the Coahoma game. He had a knee operation and has seemingly fully

recovered. Randy Smith has claimed ownership of one of the guard positions. Randy is a senior and lettered as a starting guard last year. Smith has exceptional speed for a guard.

Henry Soliz will occupy the other guard spot. Soliz started last year and was named to the All-District first offensive team. He is extremely quick and should have another fine year.

The tackle position will once again be occupied by Santos Flores. He is a senior and started at the tackle slot last year on both offense and defense.

Marsh Hill, a junior, will be the other starting tackle. Hill played some on the junior varsity and varsity last year, but not enough to letter. He has good size and could have a promising year.

Earl Ray Pearson, a junior, should prove to be one of Kennedy's favorite targets at the

starting end post. He has good hand and speed. Harold Gruben, a senior, will inhabit the other starting end position. He lettered last year as the second team end and has pretty good speed.

Bruce Jones will likely be this year's back-up quarterback. Other backs are: Lupe Alaniz, Neal Hargrove, Sid Hariman, David Markham, Clay Helms, Scott McKinney, Joe Murphree, Ken Smith and Paul Wylie.

Don Aldridge and William Cleveland are the other prospective players at the center position.

Guards include Bub Allen, Earl Leach, Eramos Garcia, Jack McCall, Randy Murphree, and Ruple Weems.

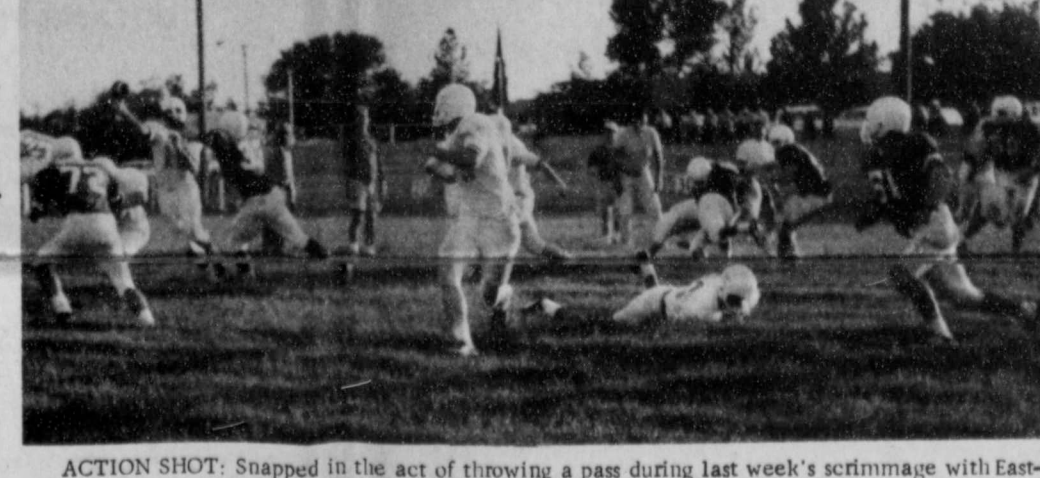

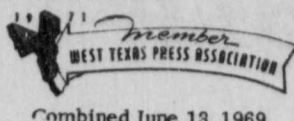
The church invites everyone in the area to share in the services next week.

St Joseph's Church Sets New Mass Times

Beginning with the first Sunday of September, there will be a Sunday Mass on Saturday evenings at 8:00, in St. Joseph's Church, Rotan, according to Father Hooman. There will be only one Mass on Sunday mornings, at 9:00.

The Jewish people of the Old Testament times and at the time of Our Lord counted their days from sunset to sunset. So their Sabbath always began at sunset on what we call Friday and went to sunset on what we call Saturday. When Christians began to celebrate the Lord's Day (the Lord Christ's Day, the day He arose from the dead) on the first day of the week, possibly during the lifetime of the Apostles (as is seen in many references in Acts) they often began with religious services the night before, that is, what later ages called Saturday night.

The Spanish people still speak of "Visperas de domingo". This time from about sunset of Saturday was, for them, the first hours of Sunday, the Lord's Day. Many years later, when the Mass was no longer allowed except in the morning (for reasons prevalent at that time) the Church no longer had divine worship during the early hours of Sunday, that is, Saturday night. Now, however, because there are good reasons for having Mass at other hours of the day or night, the Catholic Church is returning to the ancient practice of having divine worship during the early hours of Sunday, that is, from about sunset on Saturdays. Thus the new practice of the Catholic Church gives greater prominence to the Lord's Day, celebrating it for about thirty hours

instead of twenty-four. So those who take part in Mass on Saturday evenings are keeping holy the Lord's Day because the longer Sunday begins at sunset on Saturday.
