Editorial Comment

A few months ago our "County Fathers" voted in Commissioners Court to order a feasibility study, to determine what needed to be done with respect to our existing Fisher County Courthouse. They wanted to have something concrete to help them make a decision on (a) remodeling the Court House (b) constructing a new Court House o: just letting the old one rot where it is.

Monday morning, September 13, Max Lovett, with Lovett & Sellers Architectural Firm, presented four plans of action as a result of the feasibility study conducted by his firm.

Of the four plans presented, only one in my opinion deserves any consideration. That is the one that calls for the complete destruction of the present facility and construction of the "Wing Type" one-story structure. The estimated cost of construction is in the neighborhood of \$350,000 to \$370,00 depending on the addition or deletion of a few extras in

Now that the Commissioners Court is really getting down to business on seriously studying the construction of a Court House, a few major items need to be aired.

First, do we really need a new Court House and why. In our opinion something definitely needs to be done. From all facts that we have received to date, the only really sensible thing to do is build a new structure. No one wants to throw good money away and in our opinion that is exactly what we would be doing if we spent one more thin dime on trying to patch up the present court house. It is the responsibility and duty of the Commissioners to furnish adequate building space and to maintain proper health standards in the court house.In our opinion the courthouse has deteriorated to such an extend that unless they start and seriously proceed with some program, the commissioners are not fulfilling their responsibility to either the people or the county employees.

Aside from the fact that the bats have completely taken over, the unsanitary conditions be cause of the bat debris, the deplorable odor, and the unlikely condition that the bats could ever be 100 % eliminated, lies many other arguements in favor of constructing a new structure. The office space is deplorably inadequate. Many dollars would have to be spent on slipshod additions to afford our county workers the privacy and working area that they need. The District Courtroom is a disgrace. Ventilation is so acute that in the summer when court is in session, the old evaporative cooler type air conditioners have to be turned off in order for the jury to hear testimony. Huge cracks in the structure make one question the safety of the structure. The list goes on.

Second, what is going to happen to our county tax value and valuation? We called Judge Ralph Ammons on this matter and were informed that from all sources he could sample, he expects no major change in either the present 95¢ county tax value nor the present trend in County Valuation. The evaluation engineer can see no decline in the next 8 to 10 years in oil valuations. Judge Ammons is of the opinion that the county taxes should not have to be increased one penny to construct the Court House. If you'll study the "Fisher County Tax Valuation and Rate Schedule" found in this week's paper, you'll notice that for the past 40 years our valuation has climbed, with a few exceptions, from 8 million dollars to 30 million dollars. This is due to the increased valuation on oil property in Fisher County.

ARCHITECT PRESENTS FOUR NEW COURT HOUSE PLANS

The new Fisher County Court House feasibility study, ordered by the County Commissioners, was presented at the regular meeting last Monday.

Max Lovett, representing Lovett & Sellers Architects, presented the commissioners with four plans of action.


The first plan calls for the complete removal of the existing Court House and the construction of a modern one-story building to be erected in its place. This plan would cost an estimated \$350,000 to \$370,000, depending

upon whether or not the commissioners accepted or rejected a glassed in court yard. This proposal called for adequate office space for the present and additional expansion facilities for the future.

The second plan Lovett presented also called for the destruction of the present Court House, but the proposed new facility would be rectangular in shape. This plan would cost an estimated \$350,000.

The third study would utilize the existing







Dear Kim:

Most Texas newspapers and an unfortunately large number of our citizens reacted to our position on the wage-price freeze, as it affects State employees and teachers, on the basis of emotion, without realizing that there were very good, logical and legal reasons for our position -- reasons which compelled us to take that position.

The issue is not, as has been suggested by many, that we or the State of Texas oppose any reasonable means of curbing inflation. Nor is it that we want special treatment for our State, its employees or teachers.


It is simply a question of whether Texas will be treated in a manner consistent with other States, almost all of which have already had pay raises go into effect for their employees in the past year, whether the Governor is supposed to protect and defend the Constitution and laws of his State, or simply forget his oath of office, and whether the Congress actually could authorize, or did authorize, the President to avoid State laws.

Indeed, we in Texas have been in the vanguard of the fight against inflation and recession. We operate under a spend-as-you-go budget, unlike the federal government's inflationary policy of deficit spending, which put this nation more than \$20 billion in the

red last year. We have cut spending wherever possible and even vetoed the entire second year of the biennial appropriations bill so that we could reduce spending to more sensible levels. We have prevented the enactment of unnecessary taxes which would have placed an added burden on the already economically strained pocketbooks of our citizens. And, more than a year ago, we called on the Republican Administration in Washington to revise its failing economic policies in favor of well-planned, reasonable wage and price controls.

Obviously, there are many complex legal problems involved which make it difficut for the people to understand the action we took. Hopefully, greater understanding of the necessity for our action will become apparent as more and more people acquaint themselves with the facts.

If a plant fails to survive because of poor production and handling before you bought it, then it is no bargain at any price. You actually

Quality is a very difficult thing to define. To be assured of good quality plant materials, always deal with a local established and reputable nurseryman.

To help identify a bargain the next time you are in the market for nursery stock, ask yourself the following questions:

1. Can you recognize quality nursery stock? If not, does the

3. Are the sales people able and willing to offer opinions on what plants might best fill your

4. Do you have a varied choice which to choose?

isfactory anser to each of these questions, in all likelihood you have a bargain.

Over 400 Area II Young Farmers and Young Homemakers will meet Saturday, September 18, in Wall for their tenth annual Convention and Awards Banquet.

Twenty-two organized local chapters representing over 600 active members have been organized in West Texas since 1961. These chapters are organized through local departments of Vocation Agriculture in high schools and in cooperation with the State Department of Educa-

Active membership is limited to young men engaged in agriculture and less than 36 years of age with a desire to meet regularly and discuss ideas concerning scientific farming and agriculture. 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
