

# FISHER COUNTY RECIPES The Elf's Corner

The Elf's Comer, Drawer A, Rotan, Texas 79546

Just now Black-eved Peas are in most every field-very plentiful-why not cook a pot of these (and make an all day production of pea shelling and preparing for your freezer). This is one of our southern specialties along with....

"Southern Fried Chicken"

1/2 cup finely crushed potato chips

1/2 cup commeal

2 t. salt 1/4 to 1/8 t. black pepper

3 lb. cleaned frying chicken cut into pieces

Combine flour, potato chips, com meal, salt and pepper in a large paper sack. Drop washed, wet pieces of chicken in and shake until all pieces are well coated.

Heat shortening in large frying pan, using enough shortening to measure about 2 inches deep when large pieces of chicken are added to the pan. Cook meatier pieces first, wings and gizzard last. Cook over medium high heat until chicken begins to brown. Reduce heat, cover pan, cook until golden all over, turning once. Drain well on paper towels. Serve hot or cold with cream gravy.

This chicken is delicious along with a pan of hot com bread-what could be better?

Just now there are a lot of small tomatoes and these certainly do make wonderful marmalade and they are so pretty, and come winter- along with ham or mast this goes so well

> "Tomato Marmalade" 8 cups peeled, and chunked tomatoes

2 medium sized oranges

4 to 5 cups sugar

(5 cups makes a very sweet marmalade)

1/2 t. each, salt, ground allspice, ginger and nutmeg

2 T. lemon juice or vinegar Wash, drain, scald, skin, and cut tomatoes in 1/4 to 1/2

inch chunks. Cut off and discard thin yellow part of orange peel-leaving as much of white part as possible. Slice oranges paper thin, cut slices into small wedges. Drain free juice from tomatoes, don't press it out. Cook

tomatoes and oranges over moderate heat for 20 minutes, or until tender. Add all the other ingredients and boil rapidly, sitrring often until mixture thickens, avoid over cooking. Mixture thickens after cooling. Quickly skim off foam and pour hot marmalade into jars bout 1/4 inch from top of jar. Put dome lid on jar and screw cap tight.

If you wish conserve-- after cooking add 1 cup chopped raisins and a few chopped nuts or half and half. This is very good if the budget isn't too tight.

These small jars of marmalade or conserve make such lovely small and such appreciated gifts for special people on your gift list, come Christmas, and I'd like to be one of those special ones-





Outstanding among the many lovely ante-bellum homes on the yearly Jefferson Prilgrimage in May, the Freeman Plantation house is located in a most beautiful setting of 16 acres of wooded property. A natural stream runs through the Plantation.

Built in 1850, virgin timber cut from the plantation was used in construction. The hand-hewn beams, fourteen by fourteen inches in thickness, support and extend the length of the building. The first floor is old brick with ground to eaves pillars. The four towering columns that uphold the roof of the suspended porch are built of hand made brick. Each of the original eight historic rooms has a large open fireplace. The Texas DAR has been most fortunate in obtaining the lovely house with most of the original antique furniture.

In recent years a large wing has been added to the rest of the original house to provide facilities for modern living including central air conditioning and heating. The kitchen, now modemized, still has its open fireplace and iron kettle

A weekly public service feature fromthe Texas State Department of Health

Doctors are increasingly worried over what seems to be a general confusion among the public about measles and German measles. They are two distinct diseases caused by two different viruses.

Measles, or rubeola, is perhaps the most underrated of all childhood diseases. Measles can kill or, more often leave a lifelong legacy of brain damage or deafness. Since encephalitis occurs in a small but significant number of measles cases, and permanent disability occurs in a fair porportion of these, this year's upsurge will sentence several thousand children to some sort of brain damage. Rubeola most frequently strikes pre-schoolers.

Until 1963, measles was virtually unstoppable. Today, one dose of measles vaccine given to children 12 months or older offers almost 100 percent protection. It's the best odds a parent can find anywhere in child health care these days.

German measles, or rubella, is less contagious and occurs more frequently among young adults. Women stricken with rubella during the first three months of pregnancy run a great risk of bearing retarded or handicapped children.

Sometimes called German measles (though it has no relation whatever to the other variety), rubellas is one of the mildest infectious diseases of childhood. Many youngsters actually go through rubellas without knowing they have it. But when the virus is transmitted to the pregnant mother the results can be devastating. Following the 1964-65 rubella epidemic, an estimated 20, 000 babies were born with severe birth defects.

With another epidemic predicted for 1972 or 1973, the only way to prevent an equally large harvest of deaf, blind, and mentally retarded infants is immunization of children between 12 months of age and puberty. The epidemic is expected because rubella outbreaks historically run in cycles of seven to 10 years.

Separate immunization shots are available for both rubeola and rubella. Unfortunately most mothers are unaware of this and assume that a single shot protects children against all types of measles. This misconception leaves the children open to infection by one or the other of the viruses.

### COUNTY AGENT By Richard Spence

Dodder, a parasitic weed with a peculair name, can spell trouble for alfalfa unless it is carefully controlled. It shows up as a straw-colored tangled mat of vines would among alfalfa and certain weeds

Dodder can literally suck the life out of a valuable alfalfa. crop if it is allowed to spread unchecked. It is most often introduced on a farm by contaminated crop seed, although it can only. be spread also by combines, or by mud or namure on animals and farm equipment.

Dodder is a parasite, and must live on a host plant to survive. The emerging seedlings are rootless and leafless with a fine yellow thread-like stem about one to three inches long. The seedlings rotate slowly until they find an object to vine on. If the object is the stem of a suitable host plant, the parasite twines

The seedling in direct contact with the soil then withers and the dodder thrives at the expense of the host plant. If it fails to reach a host plant, the seedling will die.

After becoming attached to the alfalfa or other host, the dodder produces many stems in a tangled mass and grows as much as three inches per day. A single plant may spread 10 feet or more in a year.

Don't buy "bargain" alfalfa are not present. seed, because it may be contaminated with dodder.

This bargain seed can be extremely costly in terms of yield loss and later control expenses. Dodder seed that is in hay can pass through an animal's digestive tract and still germinate later. The seed can remain viable in the soil and produce seedlings over a prolonged period of time, which makes control even more difficult.

Animals fed hay that is contaminated with dodder should be confined to a feedlot or the field where the hay originated. They can calo be put on nonhost fields where crops such as cotton, corn, or grain sorghum will be grown the following

Do not spread manure suspected of containing dodder seed on clean fields. Be sure to clean for-



age equipment thoroughly before moving from a dodder-infested field to a clean field. Use compressed air and water to clean the equipment.

There is very little danger of spreading viable dodder seed if the forage is harvested before the parasite matures, and the alfalfa is made into alfalfa meal. silage or even fed green.

Don't let dodder grow along irrigation ditches, because the water may carry the seed from field to field.

With this parasitic plant, an ounce of prevention if literally worth a pound of cure. Dodder that is allowed to become established can be controlled, but the methods are expensive.

Any equipment that thoroughly stirs the surface soil and expose it to drying will give good control on small dodder seed-

Dodder can also be controlled by mowing or shredding the host plant below the point where it is attached. It is important to control dodder before it has time to produce seed.

Chlorpropham (CIPC) can be applied in a granular form at six pounds of active chemical per acre on moist soils. This will control the parasite for about 4 weeks. Application should be about five days before irrigation when the alfalfa is at least four inches tall.

This provides shade to keep the soil surface cool and moist. which in turn prolongs the persistance of the CIPC. The shade also retards later emergence of dodder. Other herbicides such as dichlobenil (Casoron) and DCPA (dacthal granules orwettable powder) are registered for use in alfalfa grownforseed

Burning is another control method that will prevent dodder seed production, but flaming will not kill dormant seed buried in the soil. Watch for emergence of the dodder seedlings and then stake the area so these spots amy be identified for fol-

low-up control. If the fields are severely infested with dodder, the most effective and economical control measure may be to rotate to a around the host and sends suckers non-host crop. The parasite will germinate, but the plants cannot survive in sugar beets, com, cotton, grain sorghum, and most vegetable crops.

> Although alfalfa is a primary host for dodder, it is by no means the only susceptible plant. Texas blueweed, a broadleaf perennial, is also an excellent host plant. Blueweed growing around the edges of cropland should be killed or mowed frequently.

> Dodder just cannot survive and spread if the proper host plants





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
