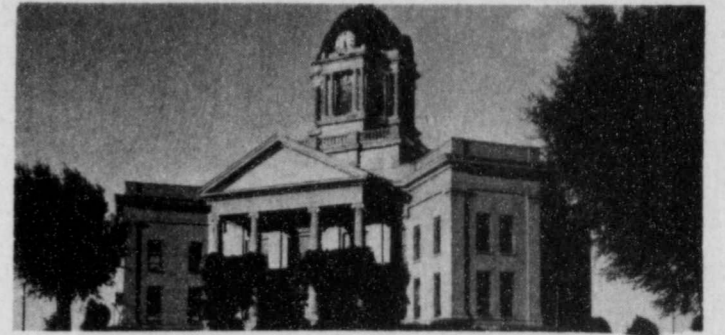

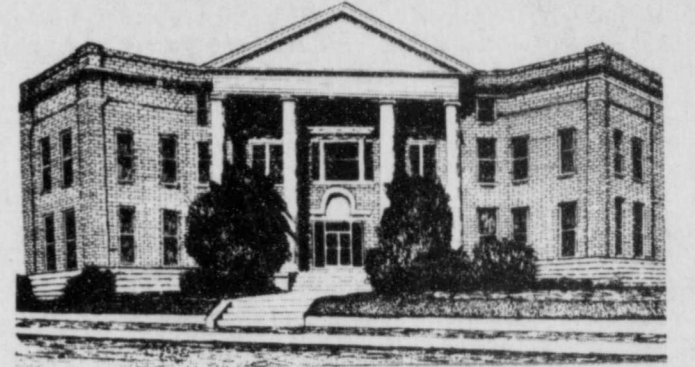

Next Monday morning at 9:00 a. m., the four Fisher County commissioners and Judge Ralph Ammons will meet for the regular monthly meeting of the court.

There is a strong possibility that a vote will be taken at this meeting on the possible construction of a new Fisher County Court House.

We understand that some county residents are opposed to this construction for various reasons. Some think that five people should not have the power to place Fisher County in debt from \$350,000 to \$400,000.00. Others feel that we don't need a new court house and still others feel like the location of the County Court House should be changed.

This newspaper believes in the great democratic system and is of the opinion that every person has the open free right to express his personal opinion on an issue like this.

We feel that those in opposition should contact the commissioners and express their disapproval just as those in favor of the construction should also express their approval.

We are sure that each commissioner will weigh the remarks that he receives and base his vote accordingly.

Gary Landes Receives Christian Scholarship

Five Howard Payne College students—all members of the school's newly-formed Institute of Christianity—have been named recipients of scholarships from the Paul Alta Cates Religious Foundation.

The students are Tim Crosby of Brownwood, Elzie Teague of Pampa, Gary Landes of Rotan, Mark Long of Houston and Dale Moreau of Kerrville.

The students, who rank in the top 5 percent academically among approximately 165 students involved in the Institute program, are all majoring in theology at Howard Payne.

They are also members of the school's honors and pre-graduate studies program, designed for superior ministerial students who want to pursue terminal degrees.

The honors program is open only to junior and senior ministerial students who have and maintain an academic level of at least 3.0 (based on a 4.0

system) either at Howard Payne or at a college from which they may have transferred.

In the fall, the five students were admitted to HPC's Institute of Christianity, which has been described by Howard Payne

president Guy D. Newman as "an involvement approach to the teaching of Christian studies on the college level."

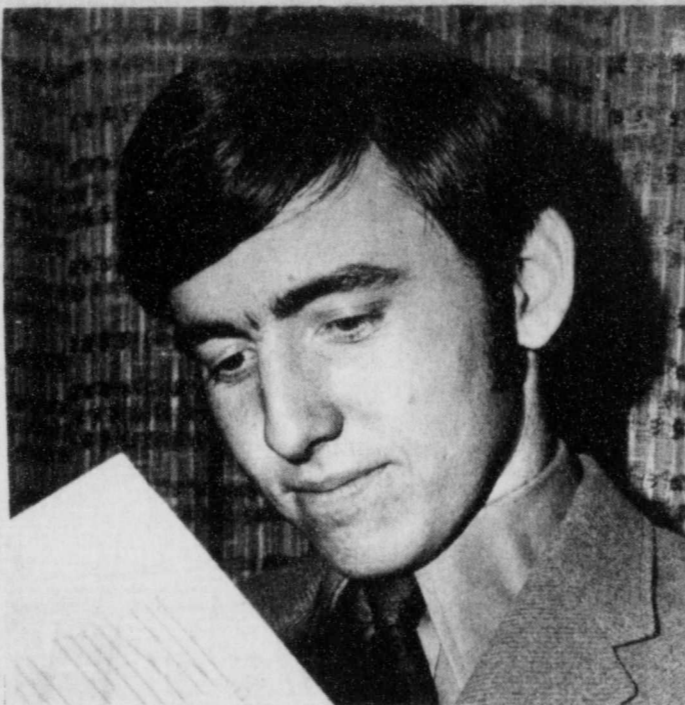
According to Dr. Joe T. McClain, head of the Institute of Christianity, the five students

were also selected because of their proficiency in Greek. All are studying the language under Dr. Jose Rivas, professor of Religious Education and Greek at Howard Payne.

"The awarding of the Paul Cates scholarships is a significant honor indeed at Howard Payne," Dr. McClain explained. "These five who are the first to receive this scholarship are among the best students in the college."

Top student among the five is Long, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Long of Houston. The student has never made any grade lower than "A" and currently has a 4.0 grade-point average.

The grade-point average of the other students are Crosby, son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Crosby of Brownwood, 3.0; Teague whose hometown in Pampa, 3.51; Landes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Loys Landes of Rotan, 3.8; and Moreau, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Moreau of Kerrville, 3.3.

Tom Ray Gets Archaeologist Post In Bryan

Tom Ray, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Ray of Rotan, has been employed by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee as a Survey Archaeologist. It was learned this week.

His new job started on Sept. 9 and he will be working in Bryan, Texas for the next five or six months locating Indian and pioneer sites in two proposed reservoir areas. After his work in Bryan he expects to be working in the Lufkin and Cuero, Texas areas.

The American's Creed

The American's Creed is destined to live in American history as it is a composite of fundamental patriotic literature. It was written by William Tyler Page as the result of a nationwide contest. When the contest had been in progress for some time, the idea was presented to Mr. Page that he should enter. Coming home from church on a Sunday in May, 1917, the thought occurred to Mr. Page to compose a creed fashioned along the lines of the Christian or Apostles' Creed.

The compilation of the proposed creed was changed day by day until it was completed to his satisfaction. In March, 1918

Mr. Page was notified that he was the successful competitor among more than 3,000 contestants. Three days after he received the one thousand dollar prize money, he bought Liberty bonds and gave them to his church. The text of the creed follows.

"I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic, a sovereign nation of

many sovereign states; a perfect union, one and inseparable, established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

"I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it; to support its constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its flag; and to defend it against all enemies."

Examples of documented phrases in the American's Creed are as follows:

"The United States of America. -- Preamble, Constitution of the United States.

"A government of the people, by the people, for the people -- Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

"Whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed. -- Declaration of Independence.

"A sovereign nation of many sovereign states. -- from Article 1, Section 10, Paragraph 3.

Sen. Benson Introduces Evidence Legislation

Major legislation granting courts broader authority in admitting evidence has been introduced by Texas senator Lloyd Benson. The legislation is aimed at preventing criminals from going free on certain procedural technicalities.

"If law enforcement personnel commit the slightest error or infraction in gathering evidence, that proof must be suppressed and thrown out, no matter how conclusive it is," Benson explained.

"People cannot help but lose respect for the courts when it looks as if a game is being played in which the cleverest strategy wins, no matter who is guilty," he said.

Benson's bill would amend a judicial regulation known as the Exclusionary Rule which calls for suppression of evidence not gathered strictly according to proper procedures. Convictions have been overturned and criminals freed by higher courts when faulty evidence-gathering intentional or not, was cited.

The Senator emphasized that the Exclusionary Rule has become a loophole through which a criminal can walk to freedom; we must plug this loophole now. I am tired of seeing the courts locked in this straight-jacket to the point where criminals are going free.

Benson said his measure is designed to provide the courts with

an opportunity to weigh the seriousness of the offense charged to a person on trial and then consider the circumstances and

nature of the offense in seizing or searching for the evidence.

"If a police officer puts the wrong address on a search warrant and finds a dead body at the right address, the murderer could actually escape conviction on this technicality," Benson noted.

Senator Benson indicated that while his legislation would afford the court more reasonable flexibility in dealing with evidence, it would in no way be a threat to the Constitution.

"Chief Justice Burger has called for just such legislation as mine and I am pleased to respond," Benson stated. He added, "The courts must also protect society."

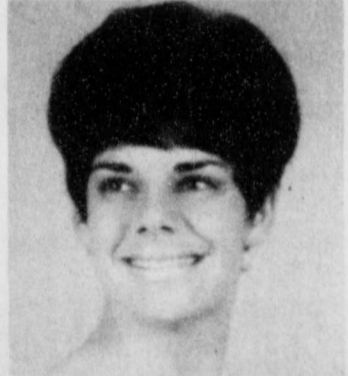

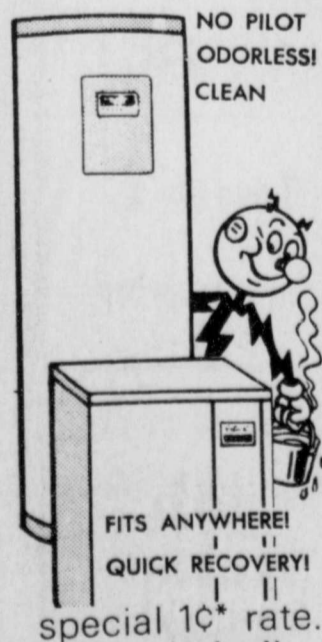

This week just a few money saving suggestions that will help keep that budget within bounds.

You know that an equal amount of potatoes peeled, cooked, and mashed costs seven times less than prepared instant potatoes. Take time and prepare your own and save there. Bake your own cakes and pies—unless you are flushed—plenty of money—and you really can serve more and better desserts to your family.

It is so easy to feed your family real good nutritious meals and save money. Let's have a sample, such as this "Double Delicious Meat Loaf" that makes two meat loaves or a big one to serve, and if you make two, bake both and let second one cool thoroughly then wrap in foil and freeze, wrap tightly by doubling folded edges of foil.

"Double Delicious Meat Loaf"

4 lbs. lean ground beef
1/2 cup each finely chopped celery and parsley
3 t. salt
1/2 t. pepper
1 t. oregano

4 t. grated onion
4 t. Worcestershire sauce
1 No. 2-1/2 can tomatoes
4 eggs, slightly beaten
3 cups bread crumbs

Mix together beef, vegetables and seasonings. Add eggs and bread crumbs. Toss lightly with fork until well mixed. Divide into two equal portions. Line two loaf pans with foil (if you plan two) otherwise line one large loaf pan. Place meat in pans leaving foil open. Bake at 350 deg. for 1 hour. Lift out loaves, using foil as handles. Serve one, freeze second.

You know it is getting cooler weather and your children come home so hungry, so how about a wonderful hot pancake supper, and here is a real treat, for both pancake and cornmeal lovers. This recipe makes about sixteen four-inch pancakes, try them and just good syrup and milk will really fix up those cool night suppers.

"Cornmeal Pancakes"

1-1/2 cups yellow cornmeal
1/4 cup all purpose flour
1 t. baking soda
1 t. sugar
1 t. salt

2 cups buttermilk
2 T. Cooking oil
1 slightly beaten egg yolk
1 stiff beaten egg white

Stir together cornmeal, flour, soda, sugar and salt. Add buttermilk, cooking oil, and egg yolk, blend well. Fold in beaten egg white. Let batter stand for 10 minutes. Bake on hot griddle, turn

white. Let batter stand for 10 minutes. Bake on hot griddle, turning just once and serve hot with lots of butter and syrup. Try them soon and enjoy them all.

Chickens are a good buy just now and smothered chicken is good, or delicious baked chicken and cornbread dressing. I'll be coming up with some good chicken recipes for the holidays, but you can save a bit, serving fried chicken and gravy, or prepared as your family likes.

How about a picnic ham; wrap in foil and bake slowly and believe me this will help with several meals used in casseroles, sandwiches and just sliced and served with a good raisin sauce.

I have a cake recipe that is a real good cake and can be kept well and it's good enough to make a baker jealous.

"Marble Pound Cake"

1-1/4 cups sugar
3/4 cups butter or oleo softened
1/2 cup milk
1 t. grated lemon peel
3 eggs
2 T. boiling water
1 T. sugar

1 T. lemon juice
2-1/4 cups sifted cake flour
1-1/4 t. salt
1 t. baking powder
1 square (1 ounce) unsweetened melted chocolate

In large mixer bowl, gradually beat the 1-1/4 cups sugar into the butter or oleo; cream till light and fluffy, 8 to 10 minutes at medium speed on electric mixer. Beat in milk, lemon peel and juice. Sift together flour, salt and baking powder, add to creamed mixture and mix on low speed till smooth, about two minutes. Add eggs, one at a time, beating one minute more, scraping sides of bowl often. Combine the boiling water, the 1 tablespoon sugar, and melted chocolate. Sift into half the batter. In greased loaf pan, alternate dark and light batter by spoonfuls. With narrow spatula, gently stir through the batter to marble it. Bake in slow oven (300 deg) for about one hour and 20 minutes. Cool at least 10 minutes before removing from pan. When cool sift powdered sugar over top of cake. This is velvety in texture, mildly chocolate and will surprise you with its subtle lemon accent. This is a Kaffeeklatch cake-- a cup of coffee and a friend. Until later...

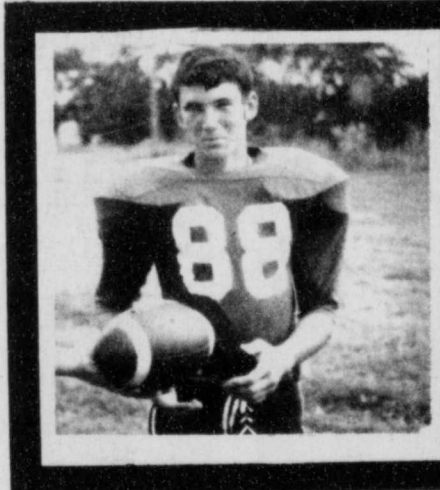
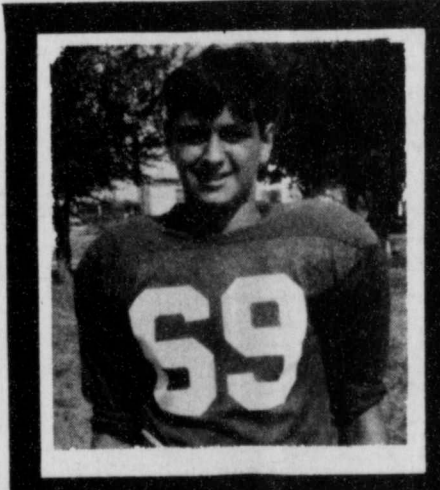

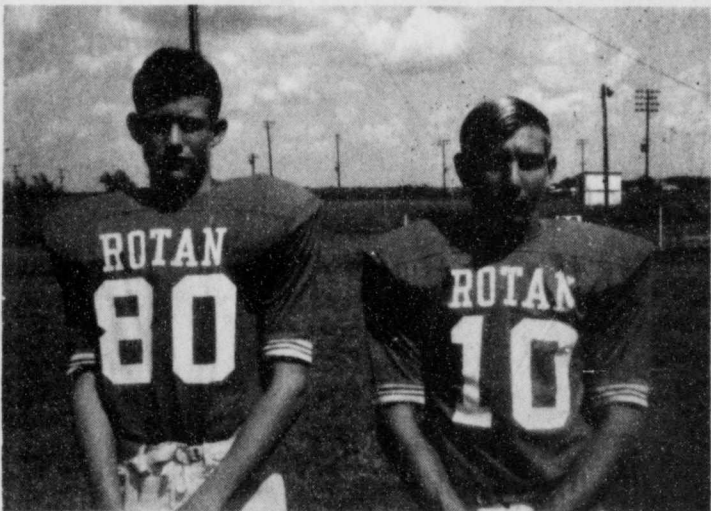

ROTAN WINS SECOND DISTRICT CONTEST

The Hamlin Pied Pipers from neighboring Hamlin clad in green uniforms and pale green shoes pranced around the football field for 48 minutes last Friday night, but could only muster 12 points on the score board for their evening work.

Rotan won their second district contest by beating the Hamlin

eleven 22-12 and now stand 5-2 for the season.

The Yellowhammers had a field day containing the Pipers in the first quarter, holding Hamlin to 3 total yards rushing with no first downs recorded in the first quarter. Hamlin's first TD came late in the first quarter when quarterback Steve Mackey tossed a 64 yard pass to David Willis.

Hamlin's only other scoring came midway in the second quarter when they received the ball after a 4th down play by the Hammers failed. Hamlin marched 71 yards for their 2nd score that came on a 13-yard run by Barry McDonald.

Dave Springer took Hamlin's opening kickoff at the 18 yard line and slashed 20 yards to the 38 before being stopped. Neal Summers carried twice (6 yards and 4-1/2 yards) to give Rotan their first of 10 first downs for the evening. The Yellowhammers bogged down on the 2nd offensive series however, and Harold Gruben was called onto punt on 4th and 4 from the 48.

Hamlin's McDonald picked up 2 yards, then two incomplete passes forced the Pipers to give the pigskin back to Rotan at the 47 yard line.

William Duke plowed over the center of the Hamlin defense, broke two tackles, and muscled out 39 yards to set the Hammers up with 1-10 from the 11 yard line.

Quarterback Norville Kennedy was credited with the touchdown on a keeper from 1 yard out. Ken Smith attempted the 2 point conversion but a bad pitch foiled the try and

left the score 6-0 with 6:15 in the first quarter.

Rotan was forced to punt on their next possession but alert Neal Summers recovered a loose ball on the play to set up Rotan's second score.

Norville Kennedy darted around right end for 6 points from 15 yards out and a pass from Kennedy to Earl Ray Pearson for 2 points gave Rotan a 14-0 lead.

As It Looks From Here

By Congressman Omar Burleson

This is about hunting. It won't interest a lot of people but-- since about the beginning of things man has been a hunter-- for food, for sport and for the destruction of predatory animals. The first and last of these reasons for shooting or trapping game is more easily understood than is the second, although there are obvious combinations of all three.

Hunting wildlife has come under more and more criticism-- some for good reason and some perhaps not so good. Times and conditions have changed in recent years--one wonders of those of us who enjoy the out-of-doors have recognized the change and adjusted accordingly, by failing to abide by common-sense rules which should not have to be written in a book of instruction. Hunters have invited an anti-hunting attitude in many parts of the country. The State Legislature of Connecticut is considering abolishing all hunting. A continuous effort is being made by some organizations, news media and other methods to create opposition to any type of hunting and most use an approach of considerable appeal.

A few simple observations for the hunter could considerably improve this situation. Of course if the criticism comes from those who feel that hunting game is inherently a social evil or those caught up in the general revision against guns as related to violence, then rationale on the subject would be of little use. There is still, however, a conscience to be exercised by the hunter even if for his own comfort and certainly for proper preservation of game for another day.

There has always been the slob hunter--there always will be. Fortunately, his type is few among many but brings reproach on all. He is the fellow who wounds game and makes no effort to locate it. It is sometimes easier to shoot more without looking for cripples. The "no-rules" fellow may waste and kill game illegally, careless of livestock, leaves gates open, vandalizes property and otherwise shows disrespect for the landowner and nature itself.

In most places the dove season has just closed. Soon will come quail and duck season, along with deer season. Space does not permit a review of what fish and wildlife experts say about thinning a certain number of birds and animals in order for their habitats to accommodate them, but one example. It is said that a quail covey should be reduced by one-third in each season and scattered to start new families. This theory may be good if there is enough cover for refuge. The trouble is that in many places there is less and less cover--and, yes, another "don't"---don't shoot the "house covey"--hunters know what this means.

Now on deer hunting here are some facetious tips:

1. First you need a fast car--so you can get there early on the first day of the season--get the best place and save a chance of being shot at before you get in the brush. As a side benefit it saves the other guy some ammunition.
 2. Be sure to shoot at anything that moves. If it's not a deer, it might be your best friend.
 3. When you finally get your deer (maybe at 50 yards) be sure to pump a few more shots into the hams, backstrap and stomach.
 4. Be certain not to bleed the critter. The locker plant man would be disappointed if you brought in a clean deer with lungs removed.
 5. If you skin your deer, roll him around in the dirt real good and then wrap him in newspaper--(Sunday funnies are best because they stick well and the ink gives a delicate flavor of burnt rubber.)
 6. Next-- Drag your carcass to the car, place it over the hood--in the hottest place. This way it will dry out after awhile, catch all the dust and people can see you got one.
 7. On the way home, stop at a beer joint and after warming up, tell all about it. "He was at least 250 yards and running full speed...."
 8. By being delayed you won't be home until well after midnight. Wake the locker plant man and tell him the way you want every piece cut. While he's doing this tell him how you dropped your trophy with one shot at 450 yards.
- Well, the ideal hunter is a fellow like Burleson who couldn't hit that well-known bull with a big fiddle but likes to be outdoors--to smell powder and hear the crack of the shot. And, too, there are the colors of fall, the wind in your face and coffee around a campfire--and the game still safe.

Accent on Health

One of the most common ailments in America, at least everyone hears a great deal about from relatives and friends, is arthritis. Actually, arthritis is only one of several diseases in the family of rheumatic ailments--arthritis, gout, rheumatic fever, and a host of allied ailments that affect joints and muscles.

Today arthritis and other rheumatic diseases are among the greatest causes of chronic disability in the United States.

The total number of victims is as great as the total population of the State of Texas," said Dr. James E. Peavy, Texas Commissioner of Health. "Of the 12 million estimated to be ill, over a quarter-million are completely disabled."

Arthritis and rheumatism alone cause the loss of more than 115 million work-days annually, a figure equivalent to 470,000 persons out of work for the entire year. This amounts to more than a billion and a half dollars annually in lost wages.

Arthritis also drains away \$200 million in subsistence allowances to arthritics unable to support themselves, and \$200 million in lost income taxes.

Two types of arthritis, rheumatoid and osteoarthritis, account for about 70 percent of all the misery from the rheumatic diseases.

Of every 100 patients who come to doctors or to clinics because of rheumatic diseases, it is estimated that 30 to 40 have rheumatoid arthritis, and 25 to 30 osteoarthritis, a type of joint disease due to wear and tear and old age. Ten to 20 have rheumatism of muscles or other tissues. 7 to 10 arthritis brought on by injury, and 3 to 5 suffer from gout. One has rheumatic fever, 2 have arthritis following infection with gonorrhea, and 3 to 5 have other miscellaneous forms of rheumatic disease.

There are many theories as to the cause of these diseases. One is infection, but the guilty viruses have not yet been identified.

Another is that it is a change in metabolism--they way your body uses foodstuffs and carries on its work. A breakdown in the complex balance of body hormones also is suspected.

According to other theories it is a disease of blood vessels in the affected areas, a disease of the nervous system, an emotion-spawned or psychogenic disease, or some kind of hypersensitivity or "allergy."

Many things are known about these diseases, but we do not yet have all the facts. Much more work and research is still to be done. The important thing is to diagnose and treat the disease early," Dr. Peavy says.

County 4-H Members Show In State Fair

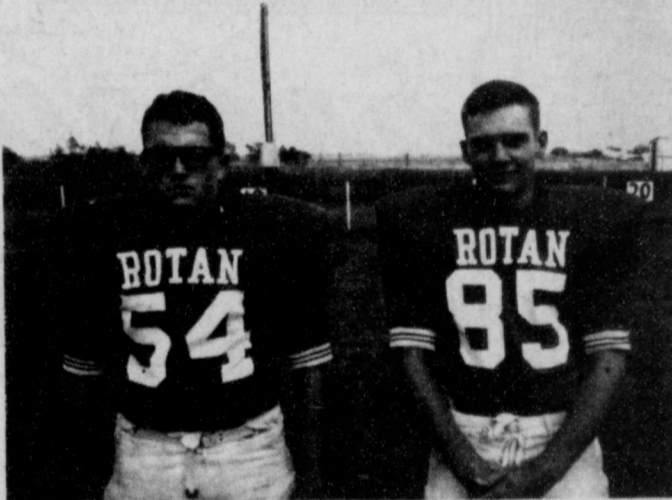
Fisher Co. 4-H members exhibited 16 head of sheep and cattle at the Junior Show of the state Fair of Texas Oct. 18-23.
