



A package of noodles and sauce mix parlayed into this scrumptous dish. You may omit curry if you aren't fond

1 - 53 4 oz. package noodles

with sour cream sauce mix

115 oz. can (about 2 cups)

2 T. allpurpose Flour

1'2 t. Salt

Dash Pepper 1 lb. Beef Chuck cut

in 1/2 in. cubes

2 T. Butter or Oleo

1 t. Curry Powder 1/4 cup finely crushed rich 1 T. instant minced Onion round crackers (Ritzorother)

In paper or plastic bag, combine flour, salt and pepper. Add beef cubes a few at a time; shaking to coat. In skillet, brown meat in first 2 T. oleo. Add water and instant onion; cover and cook 30 minutes. Meanwhile, cook noodles from noodle mix according to package directions; drain and blend in sauce mix. tomato sauce, the remaining oleo or butter and the curry powder. Stir in meat mixture. Pour into 1-1/2 quart casserole. Cover and bake at 350 deg. oven for 30 minutes. Uncover and cover with cracker crumbs and bake 10 minutes or until slightly brown.

"Raspberry Cream Cheese Coffee Cake"

1/2 cup raspherry preserves 1 cup sifted confectioners sugar

1 to 2 T. Milk

Cut cream cheese and butter or oleo into biscuit mix. until crumbly. Blend in the 1/3 cup milk. Turn onto floured board: knead 8 to 10 strokes. On waxed paper roll dough to 12x 8 inch rectangle. Turn onto greased baking sheet; remove paper. Spread preserves down center of dough. Make 2-1/2 inch cuts at 1 inch intervals on long side. Fold strips over filling. Bake at 425 deg. for 12 to 15 minutes. Combine sugar, remaining milk and vanilla; drizzle on top. This is really good.
