Scott's farming operation is geared mostly for raising livestock. He normally runs approximately 80 animal units of cattle on the cropland and rangeland. He tries to grow enough forage sorghum to graze the cattle on the cropland in the summer months. This allows the rangeland to rest (or be deferred) during the time grasses are growing and producing seed. A look at the grass on his rangeland shows that these rest periods are very beneficial. Scott stated. "I usually have grass when others are feeding. People seem to think that I am wasting grass, but I do

not like to abuse it." A feeder pig operation has recently been started whichwill further diversify the Scott farming operation. Scott and Callan George formed a partnership to develop a sow-feeder pig operation. Armed with a tentative permit from the Texas Water Qaulity Board they began construction on feeder barns. "3.76 in '76 Week'

WHEREAS, the Texas agricultural industry, in all of its phases, continues to be our most important industry, and

WHEREAS, agriculture continues to have great growth potential in our county with the rewards from such growth accruing to the benefit of all citizens, and

WHEREAS, there is an urgent need for an active crusade to increase the public's knowledge, acceptance, and appreciation for the highly significant contribution which agriculture makes to the economy of our county and to the level of living enjoyed by its citizens. and

WHEREAS, it is recognized that all citizens of this county have a vital stake and a legitimate self-interest in the general wellbeing of the farmers and ranchers who provide the great abundance and variety of food and fiber of highest quality which we all enjoy. and

WHEREAS, "3.76 in'76" is a well-conceived program designed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, with the endorsement and active support of agricultural agencies, organizations. and individual leaders, to help the agricultural industry achieve its full potential through an intensification of efforts by producers agri-businesses. and professional agriculturists to bring about an increase in income to Texas farmers and ranchers of \$1 billion by the end of crop year 1976, and

WHEREAS. \$610 million of the \$1 billion goal has been achieved through the 1971 agricultural season, and

WHEREAS, the achievement of an increase of revenue in agricultural income by the end of crop year 1976 will improve the net profit and competitive position of Fisher County farmers and ranchers and make highly significant contributions to the future economy of the county,

County Farm Income Should Exceed 11 Million By 1976

Cash income to farmers and more than \$2 million from ranchers in Fisher County should be more that \$11 million by the end of 1976, according to Richard Spencer. Fisher County Agricultural Agent.

1968-69 figures, with beef cattle contributing a large part of the gain. The projections are based on studies of the Texas' Agricultural Extension Service This will be an increase of and are part of the "3.76 in '76"

program, a state-wide project to increase Texas agricultural cash receipts by more than \$1 billion.

Total cash receipts from all agricultural enterprises in Fisher County are presently about 9.5 million, says Spencer. The most important ones are cotton beef. and grain sorghum. They are expected to account for about 65% of the projected 1976 totals.

The county will be aided in its production efforts by the Rolling Plains Economic Program. Extension specialists will hold conferences in the Fisher County area on January 31 to discuss improved production of beef and cotton.

These projections are based on estimates from the County Program Building Committee after separate predictions were made by Extension economists. The figures were published for each county. Extension district and economic area in Texas. "Fisher County producers will have access to production information and techniques that can help spell success for the Texas goal of \$3.76 billion in 1976". says Spencer.

Ag. Secretary Butz For **Farmer Bargaining Power**

Secretary of Agriculture Earl following eleven points:

"1. First, I am for farmers. It may seem unnecessary for me to say that. But not everbody is for farmers. I am. and I want you and everybody else to know it.

"2. I am for farmers getting a fair economic return, both on their labor -- and no one works harder-- and a fair return on heir investment -- and agriculfure is the biggest business in he nation. A fair return on farm costs have leveled off. Farm inabor and investment means ligher farm prices and net reurns. And I'f for that. And I hink that consumers are in avor of farmers having a fair eturn too.

"3. I am for farm products eing able to move to market t harvest time when the crop is ready. And I'm against farners losing millions of dollars. s'they have during the dock trikes and the work stoppage at the elevators here in Chicao. I'm against that kind of disegard for foramers, for consuners and for our overseas markets.

young farmers having a chance to grow and dream and have maintain an average of 3.25. those dreams come true. I'm not in favor of perpetual poverty. That means that small farmers and young farmers must have a chance to grow into an economic unit that keeps up with the times--so that they can live like other people. So that they can live like the people who are shedding such big tears while espousing a kind of economics that would tie farmers of the 1970's and 1980's to the farm size of the 1930's and 1940's. And anybody with any barnyard horse sense knows better.

"5.1 am for farm women having conveniences and decent things in their homes that they can be proud of and enjoy. That





"6. I am for farmers having more bargaining power so that they can have more"say" over their prices and terms of sale so shall. that they-the farmers- remain in control of farming. I stated 3 weeks ago before the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry that I stand solidly behind the right of farmers and of TENNESSEE farmer cooperatives to bargain with handlers and processors, just as surely as we have given that right to labor and to other groups. We obvisously need legislation to implement that right. The American Farm Burea Federation, along with other interested groups. is strongly backing the Sisk Bill. This is one of a number of bargaining bills before the Congress.

7. I am for farmers having strong volunteer farm organizations that develop their policies in a democratic process, after study and discussion, from the local communities on up. And I'm for preserving the freedom of farmers to do that.

"8. I am for farm cooperatives that enable farmers to work together to market their products. to have electricity and telephones, and credit. And I'm for farmers running and owning these organizations.

"9.1 am for rural development and economic growth in the country-side so that farmers and rural towns people can enjoy schools, health care, housing and community services that are on a par with larger - cities. I'm for the kind ofstrong local, private economic activity that will generate the growth and the vitality that will make this possible.

10.1 am for reasonable farm labor legislation. Labor requirements are seasonal and unique for much of agriculture. Assurances must be maintained that such labor will be available when and where it is needed. Otherwise, highly perishable food will never be harvested.

FISHER COUNTY RECIPES The Elf's Corner

This week I went snooping in our meat departments and found pork roast was a good buy. so even being such a saving for our food budget-it must be prepared well if it is to really be a good buy-for there isn't a food I know that can be so "blah" as pork roast without good seasoning.

I think I have a good answer to this. A simple and delicious "Hawaiian Pork Roast" can be made by marinating a 4 to 5 pound loin pork roast with a combination of pineapple juice, and various conditments. This can be made hours before meal and reheated in foil, even outdoors on a grill, if desired.

"Hawaiian Pork Roast" 4 to 5 lb. pork loin roast

'Hawaiian Barbecue Sauce'

1/2 cup ketchup 1/2 cup Pineapple juice 1/2 cup Bottlbed Barbecue Sauce 1 T. Worcestershire 1 clove Garlic, mashed sauce 2 t. hot Mustard 1 t. Salt (As an alternate sauce, you add 1/4 cup all purpose Soy

Sauce and 2 T. light molasses). Slash fat on pork roast, making diamond shaped cuts. This allows barbecue sauce to penetrate. Prepare barbecue sauce of choice by combining all ingredients and mixing well. Pour barbecue sauce over roast cover and place in refirgerator 5 hours or over night (to save time, roast may be marinated for about 2 hours at room temperature without much loss of sauce penetra-

tion). Remove roast from marinade, reserving marinade. Place roast in foil lined roasting pan. Roast in preheated 350 deg. oven for about 30 minutes per pound, or until done. As meat roasts use half the reserved marinade to baste the roast about every 20 minutes, throughout the cooking time.

Just before serving, heat remaining marinade and serve with roast. To serve, slice roast between each rib, giving each person a generous serving.

This is a suggestion I like - serve a beautiful fruit salad and a colorful vegetable casserole with this roast, and believe me. a more appetizing meal could not be made.

If you are one of those persons who doesn't know beans about beans, you're part of the great silent majority. Beans have an important place in history, and it isn't Boston.

Beans have a higher protein content and I understand that next to cereals, they help to abate the hunger of the world. And treated well, beans are delicious, but please don't abuse beans. Don't over cook them. Here is a Green Bean recipe that is nice.

"GREEN BEAN SUPREME"

2 cups (1 lb. can or 10 oz. package) cooked and dranined Green Beans

The password to men's fashion this spring echoes easy- care, wrinkle resistant knits, reports Mrs. Alice Ballenger, Extension county home demonstration agent.

"Today's knit garments resemble conventional woven material, but boast the advantage of "give", says Mrs. Ballenger. Men can bend, stretch and sit freely in knit clothes. And, knits are immune to travel fatigue since the fabric will not bunch or bind.

Knit garments for men are available in almost all types and sizes. the agent says. Markets are stocked with knit ties, dress shirts, tailored shirts and sport coats and suits. And manufacturers promise even more knits for future styles.

When shopping for knits, Mrs. Ballenger suggests checking the fabric. Double knit fabrics offer built- in- give. while knits bonded to other materials limit natural give. Knit fabrics also vary from sheer nylon tricot to heavy. tures to firmly knit fabrics.

"If a knit garmet is lined, you she said. "A single knit or tricot is best. A woven lining reduces the knit's natural ease." Hangtags indicate fiber content of knit fabrics and often suggest quality, the agent adds. trademark of a material, such trademarks mean that the rapric used in the garment has passed tives. difficult tests to meet specific standards.

on fiber content and lining, most knit garments can be washed at home; and since knits resist wrinkles, the fabric remains attractive for long periods between cleanings.

When machine washing knits, use the permanent press cycle with gentle agitation. "the agent advists." Use a warm water wash and cold rinse. Since static electricity is inherent in man-made fibers, use a fabric softener in the final rinse. When drying, use the permanent press cycle and low heat; man-made fibers soften when heated. Don't overdry."

Sorting is also important for proper laundering, she adds. Sort by color because new knits may bleed the first few washes. Sort by weight so that each load consists of garments requiring similar drying times. Overdrying can then be avoided.

Removing oily stains, such as bodyoils, lipstick or salad dressings, requires only a few simple steps for knits. Turn the garment wrong side out over an absorbbulky sweater knits of acrylic or ent towel. Apply a small amount wood, or from loose lacy tex- of drycleaning solvent to the spot.
