- 1 pkg.(17-1/2 oz.) Pillsbury Fudge Cake Mix
- 1-1/2 cups Water
- 2 Eggs
- 1/2 cup Mayonnaise

- Chocolate Curls


Combine crumbs from the cheese cake mix, the 3 T. sugar and the melted oleo. Press crumb mixture onto botton and one inch up the sides of spring form pan. Chill. In mixer bowl, combine milk, the packaged filling mix, and the 1 T. sugar. Beat at low speed of electric mixer till blended; beat a medium speed for 3 minutes. Add chocolate, beat a low speed 1 minute more. Pour into crust; spead sour cream over top. Chill at least one hour. Garnish with chocolate curls. Fhis will serve 6 to 8.

3 to 4 pound round bone pot roast or chuck roast

- 1 t. Salt
- Dash Pepper
- 2 medium Carrots, Chopped (1 cup) 1 medium White Turnip, chopped (if you like turnip)
- 1/2 cup chopped Green Pepper
- 1/2 cup chopped Onion
- 1/2 cup chopped Celery
- 1/4 cup Water
- 2 T. snipped Parsley (if you have it) 1 clove Garlic, minced

In Dutch Oven (or big pot with lid) brown meat in small amount of hot oil. Season with salt and pepper and tenderizer. Add remaining ingredients. Cover and simmer for about 2 hours or until meat is tender. Remove meat to platter; then spoon your vegetables over the meat. Serves about 6 people generously. 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
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


