Every person that registers as of April 5, 1972 in Fisher County will be able to vote in the May 6th primary election. Likewise, every person that registers by October 7, 1972 will be permitted to vote in the November 7th General Election.

There were 2,629 registered voters in Fisher County during 1971.

In 1968, the last presidential election year, 3,296 Fisher County persons registered to vote.

have registered to vote so far this year.

The voter registration certificates that are issued Fisher Co. personnel during 1972 are permanent certificates and will not have to be secured on a yearly basis providing their right to vote is exercised.

Fisher County personnel must vote at least every other year to keep the certificates on a permanent basis. If a voter misses voting for as many as three years his certificate will be void and an additional application will have to be made for a new one.

Fisher County residents that do not have a white "voter registration certificate" will not be entitled to vote in the 1972 elections. These certificates can be secured from the Tax Assessor-Collector's office in Fisher County Court House in Roby or from the Rotan City Hall.

The Roby "Mothers March" is still planned for the original time of February 3rd at 6 p. m., according to Mildred Brown.

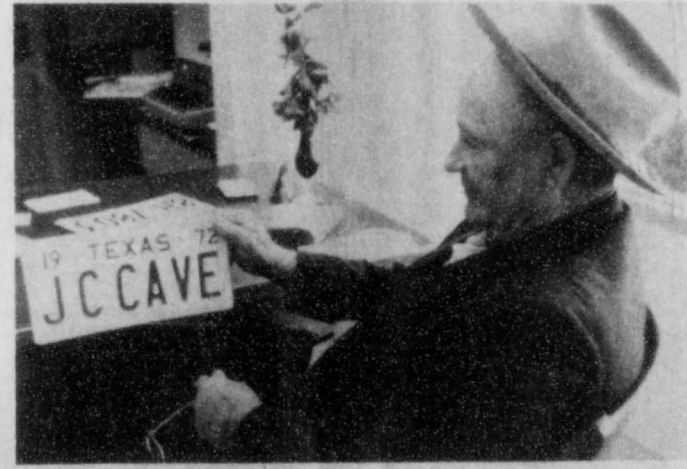
### Rotan Cubs Will Have Part In Church Services

Commercial pickups will carry a prefix beginning 2A6775 and farm pickups will begin 8H7750.

## Adult Farmer Swine Short Course Set For Roby High

A swine short course for adult farmers will be held February 7 thru 10 under the sponsorship of the Roby High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Ray Pruitt, Superintendent and Mr. Jim Laurie, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Mr. Earl Behrens, swine specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Behrens holds a B.S. Degree in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M University; a Master of Education degree from

Vandalism to Texas Highway Department signs and markers in Fisher County ran approximately \$21,000.00 in 1971, according to Leon Donham, office manager of the Texas Highway Department in Roby.

Gaylord Price, maintenance foreman, remarked that with the \$21,000 that had to be spent to

repair or replace signs and signals in Fisher County, due to destructive vandalism, the Highway Department could have resurfaced approximately 10 miles of roads.

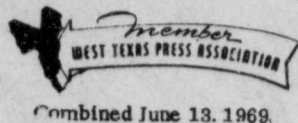
Most of the destruction is showing up in the area north of Rotan; in the Sylvester-McCaulley area; and the area around Ham-

Gentlemen of the Roby Banner & Star Record:

Beautiful day in California, a high fog; the airplanes don't land in early morning.

I use to live in Roby before Rotan came in existence. My father came to Roby in a covered wagon in Dec., 1900. My father use to be a barber in Roby, later he bought 160 acres of land west of Roby, about 3 miles. He built a house and started farming. When we went to Roby, I and my brother started to school in Roby. There was a teacher by the name of Miss Stella Hooper. Her father often visited my father out on the farm (Edd Hooper). He use to show my father how to grow German Millet and bale it.

So we use to read the Roby Banner, that was the Timmons brothers use to run the paper. I think Harold's wife still lives around Roby (Miss Tomlinson).

West Texas use to be a great place of opportunity before the Texas Central Railroad came through the North part of the County and stopped at Rotan.

That was when there were two passenger trains a day came to Rotan, returned and a great big long freight train came to Rotan loaded with merchandise for west Texas. That was the beginning of all the farming days.

Mr. Edd Hooper was a rancher and a cattle man those days. Roby was a railroad town too. They first started the Estagato and Gulf railroad from McCaulley and quit at Pledger, and then a man by Eastland started a railroad from Fisher (North Roby) to Roby. I believe this railroad was called Roby & Northem. So I went West and came to Los Angeles. I became a conductor on a railroad and I met a man from Germany. He says this country is great, my heart is still in Germany. So as my heart is still in Texas, getting the Roby paper is like getting a long letter from old kin folks. Keep up the good work.

problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Laurie.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Ray Pruitt, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Jim Laurie. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Swine Production Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each student who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Behrens states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as selecting and breeding, feeding and feeding requirements, management, disease and parasites, housing and equipment, and marketing.

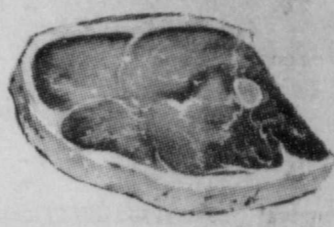

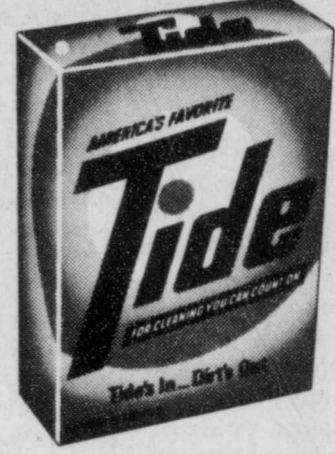

# COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station announces the release of three early maturing, stormproof, disease resistant cotton varieties for planting in 1972.

These varieties were developed by Dr. Luther Bird during the past 8 to 10 years. The varieties have been grown in demonstration planting test plots in all cotton growing areas of the state and in several adjoining states. Several articles about the "SP" varieties appeared in farm magazines and local papers in 1969 and 1970 so they are fairly well known to many cotton producers.

Foundation seed lots are of excellent purity and seed quality is good. The seed will be in 50-pound bags, acid delinted, and treated with either a mercury (Panogen) or captan (Orthocide) seed treatment. Seed will be stored at College Station, Hillsboro and Pecos. Details will be worked out later as to where each variety or lot may be obtained.

The price of foundation seed of the new varieties is \$980 per ton or 49¢ per pound F.O.B. the storage location. Seed will not be reserved for anyone after February 10 unless paid for in full.

Several cotton producer groups expressed definite support of the release of these varieties. They stressed the importance of making planting seed available as soon as possible to cotton production of certified seed in 1972.

All orders for foundation seed of Tamcot SP 21, Tamcot SP 23, and Tamcot SP 37 must be sent to the Foundation Seed Section at College Station. If it is necessary to prorate foundation seed, first priority will be given seed companies now eligible to produce registered seed in Texas and who send in orders before February 10, 1972.

An application for a Plant Variety Protection certificate has been made for each variety. The application specified that seed of each variety be sold by variety name only as a class of certified seed.

Tamcot SP 21 has no unusual botanical seed or seedling characteristics. The flower is medium in size and the corolla and pollen are cream colored which is the case for most commercial varieties. The leaves are medium in size and are smooth (glabrous). The main stem is strong, smooth and turns red with maturity as compared with Lankart 57 and Stoneville 7A which are hairy and the stem remains green. A variant of Tamcot SP 21 is about 80% hairy plants. Type of growth is determinant to intermediate with occasional vegetative branching. The bolls (fruit) are small, oval in shape and storm resistant as compared with Lankart 57 which has large, round and storm resistant bolls and Stoneville 7A which has small, oval and open bolls (seed cotton loose in bur). The mature defoliated plant stands erect, fruiting branches are prominent and the seed cotton is compact in the bur. Stems or branches have a prominent dark red color.

Tamcot SP 21 is the first of 3 initial varieties developed in the multi-disease resistance and escape program of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It has high resistance to bacterial blight, resistance to the Fusarium wilt-root knot nematode complex, tolerance to Verticillium wilt, slight cold tolerance for seed germination, slight escape from Phymatotrichum root rot via earliness and escape from other adversities in production. It has a good average yielding ability combined with the above traits along with having smooth (glabrous) leaves and stems, a storm resistant boll, earliness and fiber length and strength equal to those of the Delta varieties with the advantage of having a lower micronaire value.

Tamcot SP 21 should be of real value to the cotton growers of the Trans-Pecos and South High Plains irrigated areas, who desire to produce a Delta type fiber, or where smooth leaves

and stems may aid in insect control and to reduce trash in cotton. It should be efficient in narrow-row plantings.

Tamcot SP 23 has no unusual botanical seed or seedling characteristics. The flower is small in size and the corolla and pollen are cream colored which is the case for most commercial varieties. The leaves are large in size and are hairy. The main stem is strong, hairy and tends to remain green the same as Lankart 57 and Stoneville 7A. Type of growth is determinant with occasional vegetative branches. The bolls (fruit) are small oval to round in shape and storm resistant as compared to Lankart 57 which has large round and storm resistant bolls and Stoneville 7A which has small, oval and open (seed cotton loose in the bur) bolls. The mature defoliated plant stands erect, fruiting branches are prominent and the seed cotton is compact in the bur.

Tamcot SP 23 is the second of three initial varieties developed in the multi-disease resistance and escape program of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It is immune from bacterial blight, has good resistance to the Fusarium wilt-root knot nematode complex, good tolerance to Verticillium wilt, tolerance for seed deterioration, cold tolerance for seed germination, escape from seedling disease, and escape from other adversities in production. SP 23 has the best potential for reducing disease losses. It has a very good average yielding ability combined with the above traits along with having hairy leaves and stems, a storm resistant boll, earliness, fiber length as short as that of Lankart 57, fiber strength greater than Lankart 57, and fiber micronaire lower and more desirable than Lankart 57. Tamcot SP 23 should be of real value to the cotton growers of the High Plains and Rolling Plains dryland areas and all areas where the wilts and seedling diseases are a problem. It should be efficient in narrow-row planting.

Tamcot SP 37 has no unusual botanical seed or seedling characteristics. The flower is small in size, the corolla is cream colored and the pollen is yellow. A variant of Tamcot SP 37 is about 2 to 3% cream pollen. The pollen for most commercial varieties is cream colored. The leaves are large in size and are hairy. The main stem tends to be weak. It is hairy and tends to remain green the same as Lankart 57 and Stoneville 7A. Type of growth is determinant to intermediate and vegetative branches are rare. The bolls (fruit) are small, round and storm resistant as compared with Lankart 57 which has large, round and storm resistant bolls and Stoneville 7A which has small, oval and open (seed cotton loose in bur) bolls. The mature defoliated plant stands erect, fruiting branches are prominent and the seed cotton is compact in the bur.

Tamcot SP 37 is the third of three initial varieties developed in the multi-disease resistance and escape program of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It is immune from bacterial blight, has slight tolerance to the Fusarium wilt-root knot nematode complex and Verticillium wilt, resistance to seed deterioration, good cold tolerance for seed germination, escape from seedling disease, escape via earliness and delayed kill from Phymatotrichum root rot and escape from other adversities in production. SP 37 has an exceptionally high average yielding ability combined with the above traits along with having hairy leaves and stems, a storm resistant boll, fiber length equal to that of the Delta varieties, fiber strength slightly lower than the Delta varieties and a fiber micronaire lower and more desirable than the Delta varieties.

Tamcot SP 37 should be extremely valuable to the cotton growers of the Blacklands, the Central River Valleys, Coastal Plains and the Lower Rio Grande Valley. It should be efficient in narrow-row plantings.

## FISHER COUNTY RECIPES The Elf's Corner

These cold days seem to call for something hot and really hearty, say like a Dutch Pot Roast with an array of colorful vegetables that simmer with the meat - then to top off this a good dessert, say a "Chocolate Cheesecake" or a "Mayonnaise Cake".

Maybe you've never had a failure but how long has it been since you really had a big success. Let's create a sensation with a quickie - a cake mix, it's easy and fun.

"Mayonnaise Cake"  
1 pkg. (17-1/2 oz.) Pillsbury Fudge Cake Mix  
1-1/2 cups Water  
2 Eggs  
1/2 cup Mayonnaise  
Generously grease and lightly flour a 13x9 inch pan. In large mixing bowl, combine cake mix, water, eggs and mayonnaise. Blend and beat as directed in package. Pour into prepared pan. Bake at 350 deg. for 25 to 30 minutes, or until tooth pick inserted in center comes out clean. Frost with chocolate frosting. Then for the "Cheese Cake", an elegant, yet easy, cheesecake, and it really was a winner in "Cook of the Month", honor for Fancy Chocolate Dessert, and it is using a mix also, which saves time. This could be the high spot of an ordinary meal or an elegant meal you might wish to serve to your guests but use it first for your family, they come first.

"Chocolate Cheesecake"  
1-10 or 11 oz. Package Cheese Cake Mix  
3 T. Sugar  
4 T. Oleo, melted  
1-1/2 cups cold Milk  
1 T. Sugar  
1 envelope (1 oz.) no-melt unsweetened chocolate  
Or 1 oz. unsweetened chocolate (melted)  
1/2 cup Dairy Sour Cream  
Chocolate Curls  
Combine crumbs from the cheese cake mix, the 3 T. sugar and the melted oleo. Press crumb mixture onto bottom and one inch up the sides of spring form pan. Chill. In mixer bowl, combine milk, the packaged filling mix, and the 1 T. sugar. Beat at low speed of electric mixer till blended; beat a medium speed for 3 minutes. Add chocolate, beat a low speed 1 minute more. Pour into crust; spread sour cream over top. Chill at least one hour. Garnish with chocolate curls. This will serve 6 to 8.  
Now lets do the pot roast and you will have a wonderful meal.

"Dutch Pot Roast"  
3 to 4 pound round bone pot roast or chuck roast  
1 t. Salt  
Dash Pepper  
2 medium Carrots, Chopped (1 cup)  
1 medium White Turnip, chopped (if you like turnip)  
1/2 cup chopped Green Pepper  
1/2 cup chopped Onion  
1/2 cup chopped Celery  
1/4 cup Water  
2 T. snipped Parsley (if you have it)  
1 clove Garlic, minced  
In Dutch Oven (or big pot with lid) brown meat in small amount of hot oil. Season with salt and pepper and tenderizer. Add remaining ingredients. Cover and simmer for about 2 hours or until meat is tender. Remove meat to platter; then spoon your vegetables over the meat. Serves about 6 people generously. You know, I like my vegetables cut in large pieces, so if you do also, just do them that way.

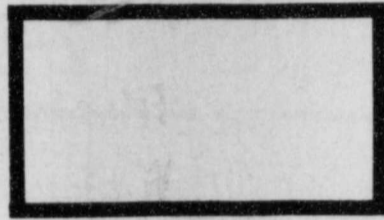

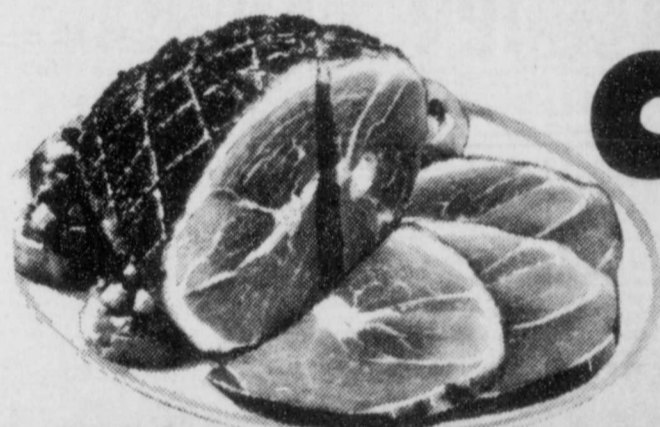
