The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution was founded October 11. 1890 and incorporated by an Act of the United States Congress in 1896. The Society functions through 23 National, and a number of Special and Standing Committees to further its threefold objectives: Historic Preservation, Promotion of Education, and Patriotic Endeavor.

HISTORICAL.

The Historical function of the Society is "to perpetuate the momory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence". This is carried on through the DAR Museum, collection of genealogical records, and lineage research.

The DAR Museum exemplifies the possessive instinct that compels us to keep things that have outlived their usefullness. This tendency is as old as the human race. If ashurbanipal and Sargon, ancient kings of the Euphrates and Tigris Valleys had not made collections of the articles made and used by their ancestors, we would know very little about Mesopotania previous to a thousand years before Christ. Had not King Tut's father and mother kept their son's toys and small gloves, the finding of his tomb would only have been the discovery of another mummy-- instead of what turned out to be a priceless collection of artistic pieces, and a whole unfolding of life as it was lived in Egypt long before the advent of Cleonatra.

The DAR Museum and State Rooms are an extension of this interest in our heritage. They exhibit objects of daily use in a bygone age, help us to understand the struggles our forefathlonged to Caroline Scott Harrison, wife of the president, and first President General of the

Is there any signature in the world better known than that of John Hancock? Here in the DAR Museum, is the Signer's desk--a small and dainty desk for such a massive, bold and brave signature! Also here is a pair of silver candle sticks by which Thomas Jefferson read and wrote, a chair used by John and Abigail Adams while in the White House, and silver spoons made by Paul Re-

The DAR Museum is a store house of living history because it preserves the heritage weenjoy, because the men and women who used these things were ready, and willing, and did, give everything for liberty. This is one of the historical services of Daughters of American Revolu-

Orders for fruit trees should be placed now because all orders are filled as they are received. By ordering early, you may get the pick of the best trees and varieties available.

All trees should be ordered from reliable nurseries. Always insist on disease-free stock. And, for satisfactory performance. order trees that are adapted to your locality. Just because trees are available, don't assume that cuts or wounds. they are adapted to the local

For peach and plum trees, select year-old plants that are three to five feet high. Apple and pear trees should be four to six feet tall. Such trees will transplant easilty and will become established quickly. Excessively large, bare-rooted trees should not be purchased.

"If sand and gravel are a problem, try placing an area rug with a soft backing on the carpet area that gets the most traffic, "suggested Mrs. Alice Ballenger, Fisher County Home Demonstration Agent. "Better yet, check your landscaping. Grass, a paved walk and door mat call all help keep sand, mud and gravel outdoors. "

To protect your investment in new carpeting, Mrs. Ballenger also pointed out that crushing may be avoided by using furniture glides under legs of heavy furniture. Furniture may also be shifted a few inches to keep the weight from being concentrated in the same place.

When tufts are crushed vacuuming may bring them back up. Mrs. Ballenger also recommended brushing tufts with a small stiff brush. "Dampen the brush with warm water and lift tufts gently. For shags, brush tufts in the same direction with a plactic or wooden shag rake.


