

Are you puzzled by what you can serve for that bridge party or just having friends drop in? How about some appetizers or lips to have ready in a jiffy? We all like to cut short the work.

"King Crab Party Dip"

1/2 pound frozen Alaska King Crab or 7-1/2 oz. can

1 package onion soup mix

1 pint commercial sour cream

Defrost and slice frozen crab or drain and slice the canned crab. Mix with onion soup xim and sour cream. Serve with small slices of melba toast, buttered and toasted, very good.

Here is a suggestion for small, muffin cup size appetizers... really not fussy and they are delicious and really make an impressive Hors d'oeuvres-- Try it.

"Bacon Quiche"

Make about 18 muffin tin size pastry cups (I use pie crust) -nicely fluted and pour this mixture into unbaked cups, about 2/3 full and bake in pre-heated 400 deg. oven for 25 to 30 min. or until silver knife comes out clean and crust is golden brown. Allow to stand in pan about 5 minutes before removing. Serve warm or cool, .. Here is the filling -

8 slices bacon, diced

1-1/2 cups choppped green 4 eggs, beaten onions 1/2 cup shredded

cheddar cheese 2 cups sifted flour

3/4 cup shortening

1-1/2 cups milk 1 t. onion salt

1/4 t. liquid red pepper

seasoning

1 t. salt 4 to 8 T. water

Cook bacon until lightly browned, drain off excess fat. Add onions and cook 5 minutes longer, stirring frequently. Blend together eggs, milk, cheese and onion salt. Stir in bacon mixture; set aside. Sift together flour and salt into mixing bowl. Pour this filling into cups and bake as stated above. Then enjoy your

2 - 7 oz. cans tuna

1 T. lemon juice

2 t. Horseradish

2 - 3 oz. packages cream cheese, softened





Notice is hereby given that Atmospherics Incorporated of 4981 East Dakota, Fresno, Calif. 93727, who hold License #2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in an operation to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District located at P.O. Box 869. 2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced can be described as follows:

Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence northnortheast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the north border of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84;thence southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County, thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence southsouthwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City;thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 sq. miles include a 3cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered apte to the atrificail nuc ation of clouds or weather sys-

4. The program will be operational during the period from April 15, 1972 throught October 15, 1972.
