



COUNTY AGENT NEWS By Richard Spencer

A "red alert" is being sounded throughout the state as screw worms continue to assault livestock and other animals." Fisher County has recorded 2 cases to date, and it's vital that all animals be inspected closely and regularly so that infestations can be poinpointed and treated with sterile flies, "says County Agricultural Agent Richard Spencer. The latest case was confirmed on the Ben Neeper farm, 9

Weather conditions were favorable for heavy screwworm buildups last winter in northern Mexico as well as in parts of the Southwest. Some infestations were also spread by transporting infested livestock last fall, and the insect pest spent the mild winter in new quarters. This spring, overall conditions were "ripe" for a massive screwworm invasion.

According to Spencer, more than 2,300 cases have been confirmed in Texas this spring, the earliest and heaviest outbreak in the history of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

Although sterile fly production at the Mission Lab is running at its peak--200 million a week--- treatment with these flies is not enough to stop the destructive, fleash-eating livestock pest. Spencer urges all livestock producers and owners of other animals (dogs. cats) to follow certain precautions: 1. Carry out all approved pre-

ventive practices to help eliminate screwworms.

2. Inspect animals regularly and carefully and treat all wounds whether they are wormy or not.

3. Delay all surgery until cool weather this fall. Shearing, docking, castrating and de-horning only provide additional wounds for worm infestation. Studies show that almost 90 percent of all worm samples come from calf navels and man- made wounds.

To The Residents of Fisher County, Texas, And All Other Interested Parties:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that after due publication hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its second special session of the 62nd Legislature in 1972 for the passage of an Act authorizing the creation of a Hospital District over all of Fisher County, Texas, under the authority granted by Article IX. Section 9 of the Texas Constitution, the general purposes and nature of such Act being expressed as follows:

Adding fabric softener to your laundry restores soft ness and fluffiness to all washable fabrics.

But perhaps more important, it reduces or eliminates static cling that often makes it neces sary to peel away synthetics and permanent press items when folding laundry or wearing garments.

Some fabrics no longer need ironing when softener is used. and those that do require ironing dry with less deep-set wrinkles. Though it isn't necessary to add fabric softener in every washload, frequent use is recommended. If softener is used with towels when fluffiness is desirable but moisture absorption is also important, skip the use of the additive occasionally.

Two types of fabric softeners are marketed. The most familiar is the one used in the rinse cycle. Either dilute it with water first and add to the rinse water, or pour it into the washer's fabric softener dispenser, if available.

It's important not to add other agents--bluing, water conditioner or any other additives---- to the water when a rinse cycle fabric softener is used. In fact, though fabric softener is effective in both hard and soft water, it should not be used in rinse water containing a packaged water conditioner.
