JOHN JACKSON ENDS 52 YEARS AS RAILROADMAN

J. M. Jackson, veteran local agent for the Texas Central Railroad, ended a career of 52 years, 3 months, and 10 days with the railroad in Rotan last week. Mr. Jackson learned that the officials of the railroad were closing

the Rotan depot on June 30, 1972. This is the first time in 65 years that an employee of the railroad is not stationed at the local depot.

The Texas Central Railroad extended their westward termi-

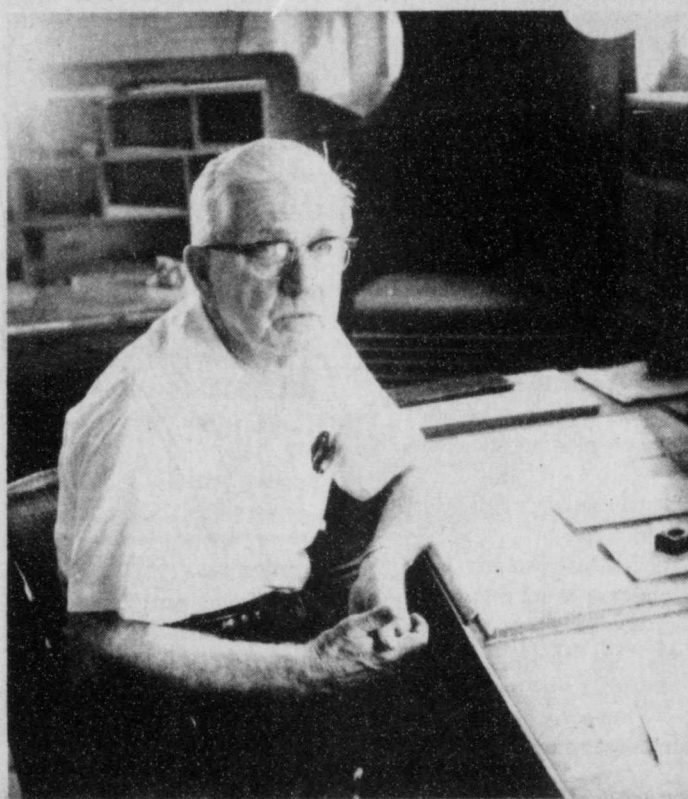
nus from Stamford to Rotan in February of 1907. The town of Rotan thus began springing up around the new terminus. In 1914 the company sold out to the MKT, known as the Katy system. Jackson went to work for the Ka-

ty in Hamlin in 1915, but prior to that he had been employed by the railroad at Royston in 1912, and then at Iredell and Lueders, Jackson went to Mangum, Okla. for a short stay, and was working in Burkburnett when he entered the Army in World War I. He served for 14 months.

After his Army discharge, Jackson returned to the railroad, working at DeLeon and Stamford before coming to Rotan as agent in 1920.

J. M. Jackson has been in the American Legion for over fifty years and has been a member of the Masonic Lodge for 51 years. For the past 28 years he has served as Treasurer of the American Red Cross, Fisher County Chapter.

He is the oldest member of the Rotan Lions Club, having been a member since 1949.

FHA Changes Rural Housing

Many additional families in Texas are now eligible for rural housing loans from the Farmers Home Administration, FHA State Director J. Lynn Futch announced recently.

"In families where both husband and wife are employed," Futch explained, "the new policy permits half of the wife's gross income to be excluded in determining whether the total family income is within the maximum limit for loan eligibility."

For example the husband is the principal source of income with \$6,000. His wife earns \$4,000. His entire income, plus half of his wife's, or \$2,000, total \$8,000. This is within Texas' moderate income level of \$8,000 so the family may be eligible for a Farmers Home Administration loan.

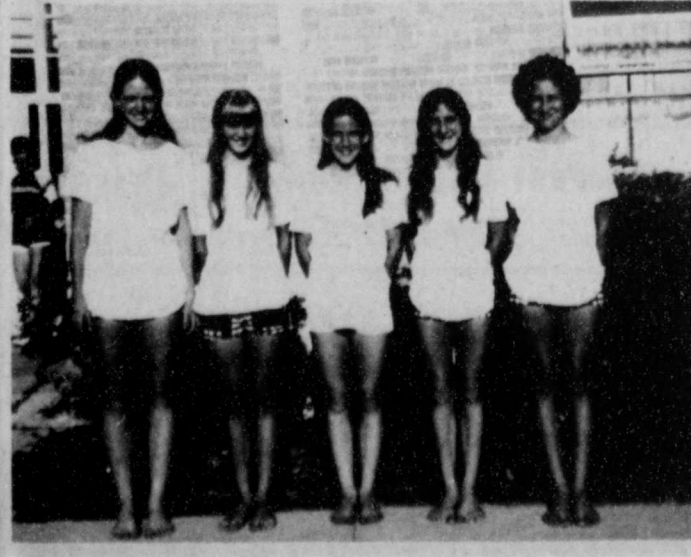
James V. Smith, National Administrator of Farmers Home Administration emphasized that newly-eligible families must

demonstrate that they otherwise merit FHA financing, and that credit is not available from regular commercial sources.

"The new policy will assist families in which the wife's income is needed to improve the standard of living. Note that if the wife is the principal breadwinner, the rule does not apply. This change will in no way affect our expanding service to low-income families," Mr. Smith said.

Loans may be made to families that will buy or build homes in open country or towns of up to 10,000 population, and who are not able to secure credit from regular commercial sources. Complete information is available from the agency's 143 county offices located throughout Texas.

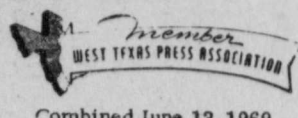

Boyhood Days In Texas 90 Years Ago

by James Thomas Holder

I was born in Tennessee at the
foot of the Cumberland moun-
tains, near Winchester, Tenn. and
in the town of Cowan. My par-
ents left Tennessee when I was
between the age of 6 months
and a year old. The wagons and
horses were floated across the
big Mississippi river as there
was no other way along the
trail we were taking. We landed
in Wood County, Texas where
my father started farming in
the backwoods. In the center of
the County, nine miles from
Mineola, eight miles from Quit-
man and three from Golden.

In that day and time chills and
fever were common and folks
had what they called the three
day chills. I finally grew to be
a good sized boy alone as I had
lost six brothers and my dad be-
fore I was nine. They all died
with a jaundice that turned fol-

low. The mesquitos were
bad in the day time and we
didn't know what a screen door
was. At night we would build
smoke fires all around the house
to keep them away and then
they would eat us up. We had a
mesquito they called the gala-
sniper, he was about four times
larger than the small ones. He
had a sharp bill about one quar-
ter of an inch long and if he
got a chance to bill you, you
would jump straight up and hol-
low and I won't tell you what
else.

When I was 7 years old they
started me in what they called
summer school. Maybe we would
get to go about one month, then
they would take us out and give
us a hoe and to the field we
would go, chopping that cotton
and thinning corn. Well, if you
were ever in East Texas, you

know how that crab grass grows.
When we got it all cleaned out
we would start back to school.
Maybe, we would go about 3
or 4 weeks in the last part of
the school.

In those days, we went bare-
footed and of course in our
shirt tails all the sports we had
was playing marbles & mumble
peg. If the other guy drove the
peg pretty deep, you had a bad
time rooting it out. Somebody
would yell, "here comes them
dad-blamed girls!" They would
try to catch us and flip up our
shirt tails and the race was on.
Down through the cow lot,
around the barn, back through
the cow lot and then we would
take off for the woods & down
through the fields. That was all
of that.

Our mother taught us not to
steal but you know boys. The

watermelons at home did not
taste good. Our uncles would tell
us, "Boys, there are plenty of
melons down in the field, go
and help yourself." Their mel-
ons were just like ours. Uncle
Joe's were better. He would
not give us one at all but if he
had one marked X for seed, that
is the one we would get.

We would be down at the barn
and one of the boys would say,
"Look, here comes Uncle Joe,
he will tell Ma about the stolen
watermelons."
Ma would come and say, "Boys,
did you get in his watermelon
patch?" No, Ma, we didn't. What
a big lie.

In those days we had one pair
of shoes a year and when they
were gone, you went barefooted.
Well, I done lots of milking in
them shoes. Milked with both
hands and be milking away.

pinch the old cow on the tit
and wham, she would kick the
bucket over and away went
milk, bucket and all.

In those days you had your
milk, butter, chickens, eggs, pork
and beef, if you had to buy ba-
con, it was 4¢ a pound. Eggs, 10¢
a dozen, Fryers 10¢ a piece.

There was a Dr. in each town,
the doctor we used was Dr. Coop-
er. He drove a large gray horse
and his buggy was called a 2
wheel gig. It did not matter how
far out in the country he would
come. His charge was \$3.00. How
times change, in this day and
time we go to the Dr. or a hos-
pital.

When I was nine years old, I
ran down a two spike buck with
the help of the hounds. Boy, I got
ahold of that deer's neck and
twisted it until it was broken
and help came, if it is a wonder

he hadn't kicked me to death.
After this, I always considered
myself the fastest boy in Texas
at the age of 9.

Please excuse my bad spell-
ing and English for I am past 90
years old. I live in the Fisher
Rest Home in Rotan, Texas. My
name is James Thomas Holder.
I lived in Iran between 1929
and 1935.

Tell Blackie, Gay and Casey
hello for me and of course Jack
Lee. So bye, I will see you when
they ring them golden bells for
you and me.

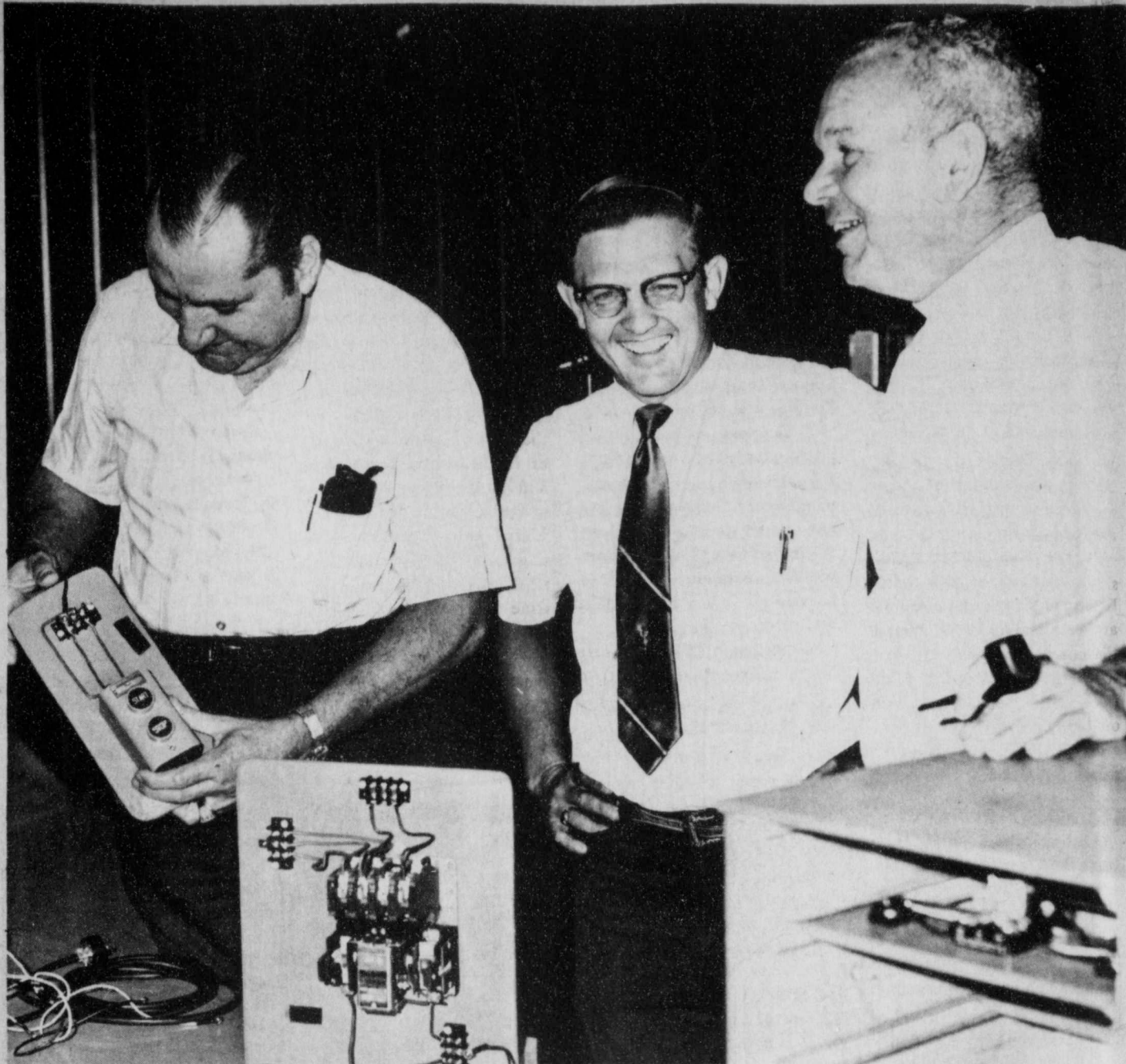

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

That "white stuff" on your favorite rose or crepe myrtle might be powdery mildew. This mold first appears as whitish patches on leaves and then spreads over the entire leaf. Such growth produces thousands of fungal spores daily. Winds carry these spores long distances to infest other plants.

Particularly susceptible are photinia, rose, crepe myrtle, verbena, euonymus and zinnia. Products containing Benomyl, a relatively new systemic material, are some of the best controls. Other materials including Folpet, Phaltan and Actidione PM are also effective. Unfortunately, not all fungicides will control powdery mildew. Check the label to see if the product contains one of the suggested materials.

Generally a spray schedule of every 10 to 14 days is required. Follow the directions on the label of each material used, and handle all with care. After use, the containers should be properly stored or disposed of if empty.

Early summer is the time to treat lawns with insecticide to control white grubs. White grubs are the larvae of several species of May and June beetles. They are whitish to gray, have brown heads, and usually lie in a curled position. Grubs feed on grass roots an inch or two below the ground. As they cut off roots, the lawn will gradually die out in irregular spots.

Grubs hatch from eggs laid in the ground by several different kinds of tan to dark brown to green beetles commonly called May or June beetles. Since the beetles are attracted to lights, lawns near street lights or lighted patios often become infested.

Treatment should be based upon finding grubs in the lawn. Make a close check by cutting the turf and removing four to six inches of the underlying soil. Lawns can be damaged when two to four grubs per square foot are found.

Aldrin, chlordane, dieldrin or heptachlor can be applied as either granules, wettable powders or sprays. If grub control is difficult with these insecticides diazinon should be used.

Now the lawn just before applying the insecticide. Once the insecticide is down, water the area heavily. If grubs are already present, several waterings may be necessary to wash the insecticide into the infested area. Two or three weeks may be required to bring a heavy infestation of large grubs under control.

Many people fail to realize the danger of a piece of equipment they have all used--the lawn mower. With the lawn mowing season in full swing, we offer a few simple safety precautions that may prevent damage to property or even save someone's life.

Before each mowing it's always a good idea to check your lawn for pieces of wire, stones, pieces of wood or other objects--including bones left by your dog or someone else's. Such objects can be hurled at dangerous speeds by a lawn mower--especially today's rotary blade type. The blade tip on a 20 and 30 inch rotary type lawn mower moves at 208 and 312 miles per

hour, respectively.

Just think of the damage that could be done if a stone or piece of wire picked up by the lawn mower blade hit you, a pet, a car, or someone you love.

Before cranking up the lawn mower, be sure the blade is sharp, tight and balanced. Balancing is even more necessary on a lawn mower blade than on the front of a car since the blade travels so fast. A sharp blade will make mowing easier, make a better looking finished job, and will do less harm to the grass. A dull mower blade shatters the tops of grass blades, causing them to dry. This gives the lawn a brownish appearance.

When servicing or checking the mower blade, be sure to disconnect the spark plug wire on gasoline engine driven mowers and to unplug electric mowers. Just turning the blade a little may be enough to start a gasoline engine. Unplugging an electric mower may avoid injury if the switch is accidentally flipped. In either case, the difference could be the number of fingers remaining on your hand.

On gasoline-powered mowers fill the gasoline tank before starting the engine--and always do this outside. Handling gasoline indoors may result in a large enough build-up of fumes to cause an explosion. If refueling is necessary, let the engine cool first. Even a drop of gasoline spilled on the muffler or any other hot part of the engine could start a fire and cause an explosion.

By observing a few safety rules, you can make your lawn mowing season easier and one unmarred by injury.

Procedures for treating screw worm cases in Texas have been announced by Dr. M. E. Meadows, Jr., director of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

All confirmed cases are being treated by sterile fly drops.

The extreme South Texas area--where heaviest infestation is occurring--is bounded by a line that runs north of Maverick, Uvalde, Medina, Atascosa, Wilson, Gonzales, Lavaca, Victoria and Refugio Counties. A grid release pattern is utilized here.

The "grid" consists of parallel lanes, flown 10 miles apart east and west, once a week to establish a total coverage of 1,600 sterile flies per square mile.

"Additionally, on alternate weeks, these lanes are flown between prior lanes, making swaths five miles apart both directions every two weeks. Within this grid, cases are not longer being hot-spotted.

"Hot-spot" treatment consists of 100,000 sterile flies being dropped on a single confirmed case. In a secondary grid pattern, north of the grid described and covering areas having less infestation than the extreme southern part of the state, fly releases are being made at the rate of 500 to 800 sterile flies per square mile.

"Within these grids, confirmed cases are also being hot-spotted with 100,000 flies per case. Scattered screwworm cases that occur outside of the above named areas--such as the cases in extreme North Texas and the Oklahoma case--are being hot-spotted with 200,000 to 400,000 sterile flies.

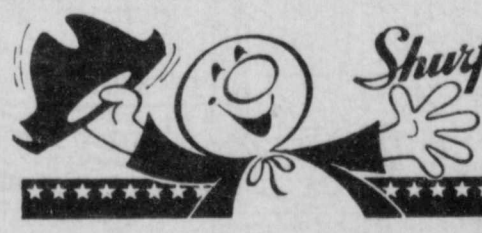

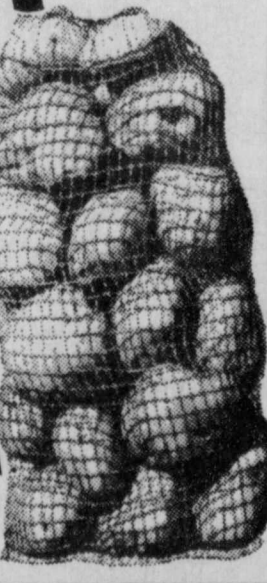
