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Baker

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Tamwheat 101 was released by the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station and is recommended for irrigation on the High Plains of Texas. It is about the same maturity and height as Sturdy. Its straw is more flexible than Sturdy but it is resistant to lodging at high levels of fertility. The test weight of Tamwheat 101 is good, and it produces a high quality bakery flour. Tamwheat 101 is better adapted to dryland than Sturdy, but its straw may be too short for effective combining under dryland conditions. It is susceptible to leaf and stem rust therefore, it is not recommended in areas where these diseases are

Centurk is a hard red winter wheat variety developed by the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station and Plant Science Research Division of the USDA. It has high yield potential and has yielded well under both irrigation and dryland on the High Plains and Rolling Plains of Texas. It is taller than Caprock and slightly shorter than Tascosa under most conditions. The lodging resistance of Centurk is better than most commercial varities but less than Sturdy, Centurk has moderate resistance to leaf and stem rust. Its test weight is satisfactory and usually better than Sturdy. Centurk is recommended for dryland and irrigated wheat production on the High and Rolling Plains It has good milling and baking quality. Centurk will perform well north of Dallas except severe leaf and stem rust may reduce yeilds in some areas.

The easy-to-care for crape myrtle is becoming a popular plant around the state. In fact, it's he official "beautification tree" of many towns and cities.

Few plants offer as much beauty for so little care. Large spikes of brightly-colored flowers cover the plant for long periods of time, even during the hot Texas summer. The blooms come in shades of purple, lavender, pink, red and white plus many varia-

The new dwarf varieties offer much versatility. These smaller plants are often used in mass plantings as well as in areas where larger plants are not appropriate. Heavy pruning during the winter causes these dwarfs to bloom even more profusely.

The beauty of the tree- type crape myrtle is not limited to its flowers. Its trunk has an almost sculptural quality after the tree is several years old. This is especially apparent during the winter when its branches are bare. Thus, limiting pruning to only the small branches allows the structure to develop and become more apparent.

In some areas of Texas these attractive plants give an added bonus in the form of excellent fall leaf color. In the Panhandle area they sometimes freeze to the ground in winter but come up from the roots the following spring and provide their usual colorful summer blooms.

Although adaptable to a wide

myrtles do best insunny locations with good, well- drained winter wheat which will be avail- soil. By applying a complete fertilizer annually, the plant will grow faster and bloom more. However, there may be little or no blooming if planted in shady

> These versatile crape myrtles are easily propagated from cuttings taken in early winter. These cuttings should be placed in a moist media to root. Transplanting is easy and presents no special problems. Although the larger specimens should be dormant when moved, nursery- grown plants can be moved anytime if handled properly.

Handsome crape myrtles are often found around deserted farms and home sites. This shows that they are quite rugged and thereby need little care to produce showy blooms.

Powdery mildrew is probably the worst pest of these plants. This disease is raually reduced if the plant is located in a sunny area. Powdery mildew can be controlled by spraying with Actidione PM or Benomyl.

New and improved varieties of crape myrtle are sought through research. Much is being done to develop plants having more vigor, faster growth, larger mature sizes and powdery mildew resistance.

Many consider crape myrtles to be nearly ideal plants, so improved varieties should be even more valuable.



They joined a party of forty persons and flew to Miami to embark on a Carribean Cruise. Their ship was the M/S Skyward of the Norwegian Carribean Lines which carries only tourists. The luxury liner, also serving as hotel when in port, had almost eight hundred passengers and a crew of four hundred aboard. It also carried its own doctors and nurses.

A "Cruise News" was issued each morning giving the program for the day. In scanning the daily sheet one wonders how time or interest remained for sight seeing. In talking with Mrs. Kennedy and Mrs Tutt, both agree, "The entertainment was grand! No one could do it all. There were three bands on the ship and many other entertainers. " Mrs. Tudd added. "The thing I wanted most to see was the Lord Saints Steel Band. This is a calypso band with an interesting history of ingenuity and and inventiveness -- an example of creativity using materials at hand. The first shore excursion was on Haiti. Mrs. Tutt reviewed a bit of the Island's colorful history. "This was the first place that Columbus landed on Dec. 6, 1492. Here were built the first forts, houses, churches, monastaries and towns of the new world. Evidences of old forts and walls are still to be seen. Its history includes rule by the Spanish, Dutch and French. It became the second American Republic when the people declared themselves independent from France in 1804. It has remained independent since that time. Although a republic in name, most of its rulers have been unscrupulous dictators."

Mrs. Kennedy, who leaves the history to her traveling companion, says, "My most vivid memory of Haiti is the great poverty that is noted on every side. The roads are lined with beggars. Women carry every thing on their heads, and what they don't carry the donkeys do. Men are not seen bearing loads. The soil is good and crops include sugar cane, corn, all kinds of tropical fruits, coffee and almonds. The women sell or trade the produce mostly with each other. Cooking is done on the ground near their little huts."

Both ladies, being in ranching business, were acutely aware of the condition of the livestock. They reported few cattle on the island of Haiti, and these were staked to trees. The hogs wore yokes, noises were very sillan. All of the livestock seemed to be of an inferior quality and extremely poor. There is no grain for the livestock. The population is dense and food

All these are breeds of cattle, hogs or horses. They're listed in the Livestock Directory published by the Texas Department of Agriculture. If you would like to purchase any of the above breeds plus the better-known breeds you can find breeders and their addresses in the directory.

In all, there are 29 different breeds of cattle, three breeds of goats, 11 breeds of horses, nine breeds of sheep, and 10 breeds of swine from which to choose. More than 2,500 breeders are listed in the directory.

The largest single group is Hereford Breeders with a total of 420 listed; second largest in the cattle category is Charolais with 307 breeders listed.

New grasses, forbs, legumes and other plants under evaluation at the center will be discussed during the day. Some 1200 strains of 325 plants are being grown at the center.

Chief goal of the SCS plant materials work is to find new strains of plants that will solve specific conservation problems. Since livestock and wildlife coexist on the same land, the search extends to grasses, legumes, forbs and shrubs which have dual values. Such plants are needed by landowners and operators for including in range seeding mixtures, for use in travel lane seedings, in border plant-

ings, or for other uses. Strains that appear promising at Knox City are then grown and evaluated under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections that prove superior to other plants availalbe commercially are then released by conservation districts to seed growers. These producers than grow seed and sell it to the public.

A new grass variety, Mason sandhill lovegrass, was certified and released earlier this year as a result of work done at the center in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Selection 75 kleingrass was released in 1968. Other grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include El Reno. Uvalde and Vaughn sideoats grama;King Ranch bluestem; green sprangle-
