

On Hamlin's first possession Mike Cade nailed Bill Cork, the





I am not a "Campbellite" because there is no salvation in the name Campbell (Acts 4:12).

I am not a "Campbellite" because I cannot read about any such people as "Campbellites" in the New Testament (I Cor. 4:6 ASV;

2 Jn. 9; I Pet. 4:11). I am not a "Campbellite" because the Bible condems such human designations as being divisive and carnal (I Cor. 1:10-13;

I am not a member of the "Campbellite church" because there is no such institution found in the Bible.

I am not a member of a "Campbellite church" because if such institution could be found in existence, it would be no part of the New Testament church.

I am not a member of any "Campbellite church" because the Lord didn't build it and "except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it" (Psa. 127:1).

I am not a "Campbellite" because I am a Christian.


To sum it up, I am not a Campbellite for the very same reason that I am not a Baptist, Methodist, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Catho-

### Marine Wishes He'd Taken College

In today's unsettled world our young men have found themselves faced with years of military service before they can embark on their chosen careers. They have reacted in various ways. Most have accepted the service as patriotic duty.

Many young men, accepting the certainty of military assignment, enter the branch of service they choose and take advantage of the opportunities offered for personal growth. They can return home better equipped for going about the business of life. Education, job training, travel and rubbing shoulders with the people of many lands and cultures broaden their horizons. They have a better perspective of this world in which they live. Some, with definite goals, save a part of their earnings to help in furthering the plans that were interrupted. Rotan's Pete Garcia is in this category.

Pete, home on a ten-day leave, is visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Garcia, Sr. and his: three brothers. He graduated from Rotan High School in 1970. In January of the following year, after carefully weighing alternatives, he volunteered for service in the marine corps. This is his

"I had my basic training at the San Diego Marine Corps Depot. From June to August of 1971 I attended engineering school in North Carolina and graduated with a diploma. I ranked 5th in the class. I was then assigned to Camp Lejeune in that state. There were times when I thought I'd never make it, but once out of basic it wasn't bad."

Pete's overseas tours read like a travelog although accomodations were not those of a luxury liner. Of the times aboard ship he says, "It usually takes us ten to twelve days at sea, to get to the different ports. Being cooped up on board ship with little to do can get boresome. There are movies, also cards, scheckers and other games. Each Sunday there are Church Services aboard ship for both Catholics and Protestants. When on base there

"After several days of inactivity on board ship, it is great to hit shore for a few days. When we land for an operation are first on the beach. We set up the camp sites the first two days and clean up the last day. My assignments are easy now as most of the time I supervise on the operation. Sometimes I ask to get in and work. "

Pete's first overseas tour lasted three months. The first stop was a seven day operation at a port in Turkey. He recalls, "At this time I was awarded the Marine Corps Commendation Ribbon. From there we continued on to Athens, Greece for two weeks vacation, rest, and recuperation. Later, we toured Naples, Italy-- also Rome and Pompey. From Italy we went to Palma, Spain for a seven day operation. Heading for home we crossed the Atlantic in 15 days.

"After two days at Camp Lejeune I was sent to Puerto Rico. I was stationed there at Camp Garcia for about forty days. I worked with helicoptors, keeping them in good condition and with infantry men training for combat duty. I was back in the states four days before Christmas and was home in time for New Year's with my family. After my ten day leave was up I was sent to Maine for cold weather training. It was something of an endurance test as the temperature was 29 degrees and lower and we stayed out in the snow eleven days. The last of January found us back in North Carolina,

on a six month Mediterranean Cruise. This took us to ports in



### Preamble To The Constitution

We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, to ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of

The United States Constitution is the supreme law of the land. It establishes the form of the United States' government, and the rights and liberties of the American people. It was adopted September 17, 1787. It consists of a preamble, 7 articles, and amendments which have been added since its adopton on September 17,

The framers of the Constitution could look back on all of English history since King John granted the Magna Charta in 1215 and on all of American history since the first assembly at Jamestown in 1619. The constitutional government of the United States emerged from a study of these hundreds of years of trial and error. The resulting document with its great principles has kept in tune with needs of an expanding nation. Amendments have expanded powers and base of the government but have not changed the

By an Act of Congress and by proclamation of the President of the United States each year, the week from September 17 through 23 is observed as Constitution Week. It is sponsored each year by the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

In observing the week, we should remember the words of Daniel Webster: "It is the people's Constitution, the people's government, made for the people, and answerable to the people. " It provides the foundation for a free prosperous life for all. However, this is true only if in each generation every citizen claims it and works for it. Through neglect or indifference these rights may be lost. The greatest need of America's citizens is to get back to a firm reliance on the protection of, and obedience to, Divine Providence. Read the Preamble again and you will find within these words the ardent hope of the human heart, and the high aspirations of







soap or detergent and chlorine bleach if safe for fabric; otherwise, soak item inoxygenbleach then wash.

For non-washables, take to a dry cleaner (be sure to identify the stain for his information). UPHOLSTERED PIECES, MAT-

TRESSES, RUGS AND CARPETS Brush off mold with a broomoutside, if possible.

Use vacuum cleaner with correct attachment on surface to draw out more mold-remember mold spores go into the vacuum cleanser, so dispose of bag or sweepings outside to avoid scattering spores.

If article remains damp, use electric heater or fan to dry it, Sun and air thoroughly to stop mold growth.

(If mildew remains, sponge upholstered pieces or mattresses with thick dry soap or detergent suds and wipe with clean, damp cloth. For rugs and carpets, sponge with thick dry soap or detergent suds using clean, damp cloth or electric shampoo machine. If possible, let article dry in the sun).


