Has Seen Two Court Houses Torn Down

Mr. Finch recalls watching the previous court house being demolished at the same site when he was "just a boy". He also said, "The inside bricks of this one were made in the old brick kiln on Cottonwood Creek near Roby. I have been there many times, but don't think there is any evidence to show its location now".

Waite Finch's parents, Frank and Cynthia Jane (Phillips) Finch moved from Lamar County in 1889 and settled five miles west of Roby. His father was born in Decatur County, Tennessee, and came with his parents to Texas when he was three years old. Our subject was born in Fisher County in 1894.

In reminiscing about his boyhood days, Mr. Finch said, "My education began at a little school house on the old Snyder road about where Tommy Helm's house is now. It was called Chicken Foot School and the few students that attended sat on benches. After that, I went to Centerville and then to Roby. It rained and snowed here a lot more in those days, but we walked right on through the mud or snow. We'd wrap tow sacks around our feet and legs and tie them on with binder twine, take them off when we got to school and replace them to go home in the afternoon. Now, children can't walk a block to school".

In speaking of the place where Frank Finch settled with his family in 1889. Mr. Finch said. "They bought the land for fifty cents per acre. It would now sell for several hundred dollars. Dad

There have been some changes in Fisher County since Waite Finch was aboy. His recollections help us to relive the days when courageous men and women were willing to face the challenges of a new frontier, to establish homes, and to build the communities which we now take for granted. He gives us a lesson in history which enables us to understand that "once upon a time" early history of Fisher County.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY

SECTION 1. The Accumulation of waste, refuse, trash, rubbish and other deleterious substances on the premises of private residences, commercial institutions, vacant lots and in streets and alleys constitutes a public menace and nuisance and greatly/increases the danger of the spread of infections, contagious and epidemic diseases, and it is imperative and urgent for the preservation of health, safety, sanitation, peace and public welfare that proper and adequate regulations be adopted to require property owners, tenants, occupants or lessees to secure containers and receptacles of sufficient size and material in which to deposit garbate, trash and rubbish for collections and removal at regular

SECTION 2. Garbage, trash, rubbish, refuse defined. The term "garbage" as used in the ordinance shall be held to mean all animal and vegetable matter, such as waster material and refuse from kitches, residences, grocery stores, drug stores, butcher shops, restaurants, cafes, hotels, rooming and boarding houses and other deleterious substances.

The term "trash" as used in this ordinance shall mean waste and refuse material such as feathers, coffee grounds, paper of all kinds, boxes, barrels, crates, grass, weeds, shrubs, yard cleanings. grass clippings, leaves, tree trimmings and sweeping from sidewalks. The term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance shall mean waste and refuse material such as tin cans, bottles, glass, rags, rubber, pieces of wood, scraps of iron, tin, wire and other metals.

The term "refuse" as used in this ordinance shall be held to mean all substances included in the terms "garbage", "trash", and

SECTION 3. Garbage Cans and Trash Receptacles Required. That every owner, occupant, tenant or lessee using or occupying and building, house or structure within the Corporate limits of the City of Roby, Texas, for residences, churches, shools, colleges, lodges, commercial business or other purposes shall provide and maintain garbage cans or receptacles of sufficient number and size, as hereinafter specified, to hold the garbage, trash and rub bish that will normally accumulate on the premises.

SECTION 4. Garbage, Trash and Rubbish Can Size and Construc-

tion. Every owner, occupant, tenant or lessee whall provide a container or containers for garbage and rubbish of not less than five (5) nor more than (20) gallon capacity, constructed of metal with a tight

fitting metal lid. SECTION 5. Construction

Garbage containers that have deteriorated to the extent of having jagged or sharp edges capable of causing injury to the garbage collectors or others whose duty it is to handle the container, or to such an extent that the lids will not fit tightly or securely, will be condemned by the City of Roby, acting through the Superintendent of Garbage Department or by the Health Department.

SECTION 6. I ids or Covers to be Kept on Cans or Containers. The lids or covers of all containers shall at all times be kept secure and fastened to that cats, dogs, rodents, flies and other insects may not have access to the contents thereof and said lids and covers shallonly be removed while the containers and receptacles are being filled or emptied as the case may be. SECTION 7. Location of Containers.

In residential areas, receptacles as required shall be placed inside of the property line at the edge of the alley where there is no alley fence, and where there is an alley fence the receptacle or receptacles must be placed against the outside of the fence. Where there is no alley, the receptacle or receptacles must be placed in front of said property between the sidewalk and curb at a place most accessible to the collectors. Under no conditions will City vehicles or Employees be allowed to enter private property for the purpose of picking up garbage.

SECTION 8. Business Establishments Business establishments which have wet garbage are required to use the same type of container as for residences and such containers shall be placed in the alleys where there is an alley and where there is no alley, containers must be placed on or near the curb line of such place of business. Business establishments having such quantities of waste paper to make use of barrels impracticable are required to prepare waste paper in containers easily accessible to the garbage collector.

SECTION 9. Requirements on Weight and Length of Units

The total weight of each garbage can and contents of each trash and rubbish receptacle and contents shall not exceed seventy-five (75) pounds so that each can or receptacle may be removed conveniently; in the event trash and rubbish is of such a nature that it cannot be put in the receptacle, it shall be carefully prepared in units or pieces under seventy-five (75) pounds in weight and and placed at such point as the representative of the City shall find and designate to be the most accessible for collecting and removing. Tree limbs, shrubs and hedge cutting shall not exceed five (5) feet in length and shall be prepared in pieces or units under seventy-five (75) pounds in weight and placed in an orderly manner at such point as the representative of the City shall find and designate to be the most accessible for collecting and

SECTION 10. Burning of Trash or Garbage

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to burn trash or gailage within the City Limits of Roby Texas.

SECTION 11. Charges of Trash or Garbage

The collections and removal of garbage, trash and rubbish from houses, buildings and premises used for residential purposes shall be once each week. Fair and reasonable charges for this residential service shall be and are shown in terms of dollars and cents in a column for a calendar month as follows:

SECTION 12. Charges for Commercial and Business Service. The collections and removal of garbage, trash and rubbish from houses, buildings and premises used for commercial and business purposes shall be daily, five days each week. Charges for this commercial and business service, which are fair and reasonable shall be a minimum of \$3,00 per month.

The basis of the service charge will be on the number of collections each week and the cubic yardage of such garbage, trash

The representative of the City shall determine the cubic yardage of garbage, trash and rubbish and the service charge, which shall be approved by the City Manager.

It is hereby made the duty of the Superintendent of Garbage and the Director of the Department of Public Health of the City of Roby or his representative, to make inspection trips at regular intervals to determine whether or not the garbage, trash and rubbish is being properly collected, removed and disposed of as required by the provisions of this or any other applicable health ordinance, and in the event it is found that the Ordinance is being violated, appropriate and timely action shall be taken to insure a fully compliance with its said provisions.

SECTION 21. Complaints

Do not enter into controversy with workmen concerning garbage collection. To make a complaint, call the City Office-Phone 776-2271. In making a complaint, be sure to give name and address, SECTION 22. Penalty for Violation of Ordinance

Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and each offense and each day's continuance of failure to comply with the Ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.



SECURITY OF THE BELIEVER

Two erroneous views are held in regard to the Biblical doctrine of the security of the believer. One is so bedded in doubt as to believe there can be no real security at all and the other so engrossed in misinformation as to think there is no danger at all of being lost.

There is no more place in the scheme of redemption for God's child "cowering and cringing, afraid he's not going to make it," than there is for one saying "I cannot do otherwise than make it; I cannot fall, " Both express a lack of faith in God. One is to wallow in the mire of his own lack of confidence and in pessimism and the other is to revel in his own opinion without the support and testimony of God's truth. One lacks confidence in God and the other lacks evidence from God to support his posi-

The Apostle Paul set a pattern for believers when he said, "I know Him whom I have believed, and am persuaded that He is able to guard that which I have committed unto Him against that day" (2 Tim. 1:12-an expression of confidence); and again, "Ibuffet my body and bring it into subjection, lest by any means after I have preached to others, I myself should be rejected" (I Cor. 9:27- an awareness of danger).

"Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation, or anguish, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword?.... Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him that loved us. For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things to come not powers not height not depth not any other creature shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 8:35-39).

No external power nor outward circumstance can separate us from the love of God and cause us to fall. The fall of the believer can come only by his neglect of his own soul. For this reason Jude admonishes, "Keep yourselves in the love of God" (Jude 21).


