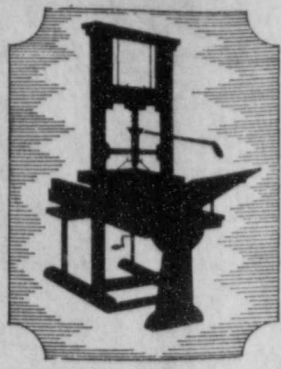

ROBY TRASH SYSTEM KICK-OFF NOVEMBER 1

The Roby City Council met in regular session last Monday afternoon and officially passed a Roby trash collection ordinance to become effective on November 1, 1972.

The ordinance was passed in order to conform to Texas State Health Department directives. The system previously being used by the citizens of Roby was deemed unsanitary and inadequate approximately four years ago. Since that time health department officials have been asking Roby city officials to pass a trash collection ordinance. In recent months officials have been more demanding and most recently insisted that the ordinance be enacted.

The newly passed ordinance is printed in its entirety in this week's paper. City Mayor Cecil King and councilmen Jimmy Price and Jimmy Hayes were quick to offer their assistance in making the new transition a smooth one. "We have tried our best to pass a trash collection ordinance that everyone can live with," said Mayor King. "We realize that there will be some rough spots to iron out and questions to be answered during the first several weeks of implementation," added the Mayor. He remarked further by saying that he hoped all Roby citizens would cooperate with the City in this undertaking and volunteered his time and the time of the com-

missioners to answering any questions that might arise. The Roby dump ground will remain open through Tuesday, November 7, in order for Roby citizens to dispose of their trash on hand and eliminate the obsolete trash barrels. The City of Roby also entered into a contract with the City of Rotan to use Rotan's solid waste disposal facilities. Roby officials signed a contract with the City of Rotan agreeing to absorb one-fourth of the cost of maintaining the Rotan dump ground. Roby will pay \$1,200 per year which has been computed to be approximately one-fourth of the total cost. If this figure is determined to be high

or low at the end of one year it will be adjusted.

Other items discussed at the Roby Council meeting included the motion by Jimmy Price and seconded by Jimmy Hayes to accept the 1973 Roby City Budget. City officials project a budget income of \$105,475 with proposed budget expenditures of \$100,913. This compares with the actual 1972 income of \$97,852.77 and 1972 expenditures of \$102,000.29.

The City of Roby is billing out \$22,327.12 in taxes for the 1971 tax year. Approximately \$5,000.00 of those taxes have already been collected. Taxes billed out in 1971 for the 1970 year amounted to \$21,755.66. Total billing in 1971 compared to 1970 amounts to a \$571.46 net gain. The City of Roby collected \$6,443.10 in delinquent taxes last year and as of this month has only approximately \$2,500.00 in delinquent taxes on record.

September bills of \$1,724.46 were approved to be paid plus a bill from the Fisher County Water Authority for \$2,837.80 representing the amount of 3,299,700 gallons of water at 66¢ per thousand gallons.

Don Waddell Named New Bartlett Co-op Manager

Don Allan Waddell, member service director for Mid-West Electric Cooperative in Roby, resigned his position this week to accept the position of manager of the Bartlett Electric Cooperative in Bartlett, Texas.

Waddell has been member service director for the past 7-1/2 years. He moved to Roby from Abilene where he was associated with the Western Electric Company for 7 years. His duties with Western Electric took him to all parts of the state.

The Bartlett Electric Cooperative is located approximately 23 miles south of Temple, and has a membership of 2,500. It serves the counties of Bell, Williamson and Milam.

Waddell will assume his managers position on November 1st

and will move to Bartlett at that time. His wife Nell and children, Allen and Kerri will join him at a later date.

He has been active in Roby civic affairs for many years. He served as President of the Roby Lions Club, and has been active in the Roby Industrial Foundation, Cub Scouts, Young Farmers and 4-H Clubs. Waddell recently was awarded the second highest award in Texas for his work with the Girl Scout organization in Roby.

Hammers Crack In Albany

The Rotan Yellowhammers were in the game all the way until the last 6 seconds of the first half. That controversial "Touchdown" "no-touchdown" ruling seemed to take the wind from the sails of the Hammer squad and things went to pot the second half.

The Yellowhammers moved the ball from the 28-yard line to the mid-field stripe on their first possession before Earl Ray Pearson was called on to punt.

Pearson booted to the Albany 10-yard line and Rotan's Bub Allen came very close to recovering the ball at that point.

The Hammers held the Albany eleven for no gain on their first three possessions and forced them to kick on 4 and 10 from the 10 yard line. A roughing the kicker penalty against Rotan gave Albany new life and the pigskin at the 25-yard line with 1-10.

Score at halftime was 7-6 in

favor of the Albany squad. Albany scored late in the first quarter and Rotan's William Duke plunged over from the 1-yard line late in the 2nd quarter.

The final two periods were all Albany and they ate up running and passing yardage toward a 33-6 upset victory over the Yellowhammers.

Rotan faces Wylie, strong contenders in the district, this Friday night at 7:30 in the 1972 Homecoming contest.

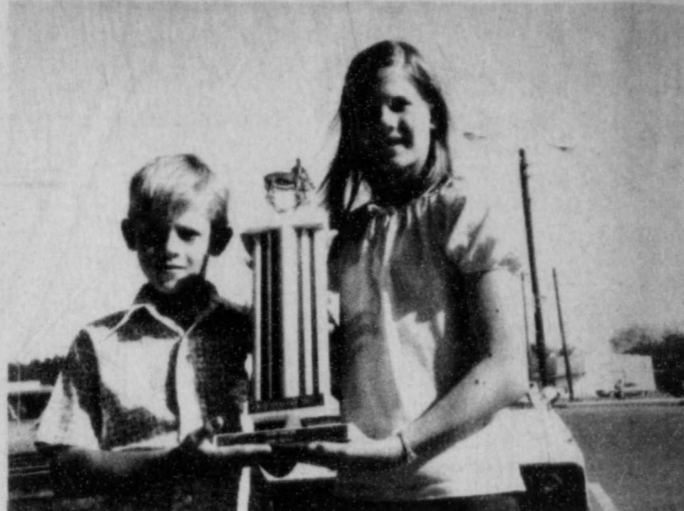

I think at this time our greatest need is a county hospital. I don't know of anything else that would be of as much help to as many people.



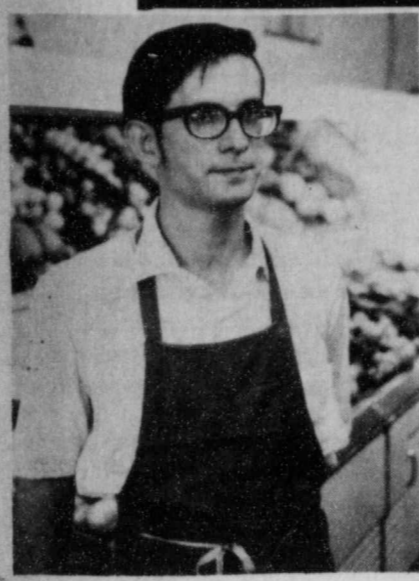
J. L. McCKIGFI, Rotan

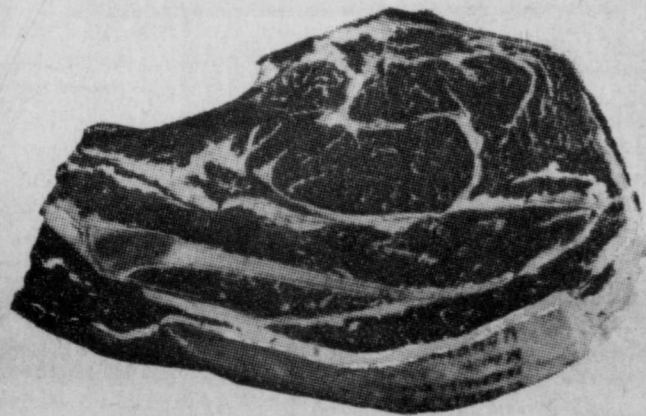

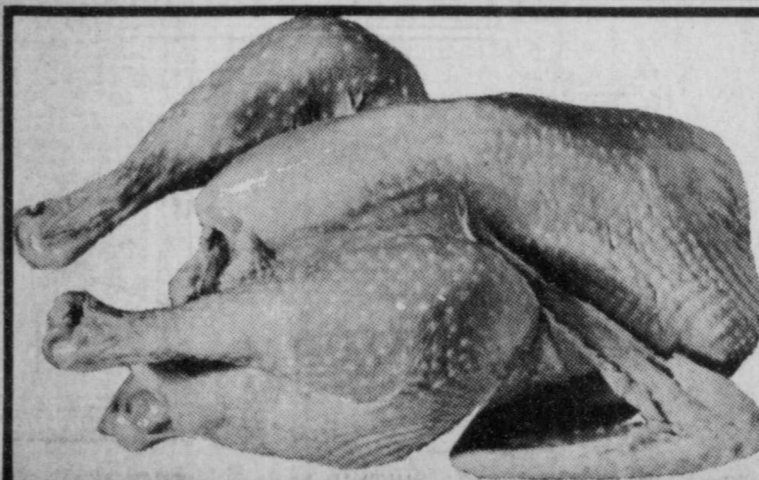



Waite Finch ...

Has Seen Two Court Houses Torn Down

"I have seen two Fisher County Court Houses being torn down and watched the laying of the Corner Stone of this one." The observation was made by Mr. Waite Finch who has been visiting with his daughters, Mrs. Dave Klepper and Mrs. J. C. McCullough, and their families in Rotan.

Mr. Finch recalls watching the previous court house being demolished at the same site when he was "just a boy". He also said, "The inside bricks of this one were made in the old brick kiln on Cottonwood Creek near Roby. I have been there many times, but don't think there is any evidence to show its location now".

Waite Finch's parents, Frank and Cynthia Jane (Phillips) Finch moved from Lamar County in 1889 and settled five miles west of Roby. His father was born in Decatur County, Tennessee, and came with his parents to Texas when he was three years old. Our subject was born in Fisher County in 1894.

In reminiscing about his boyhood days, Mr. Finch said, "My education began at a little school house on the old Snyder road about where Tommy Helm's house is now. It was called Chicken Foot School and the few students that attended sat on benches. After that, I went to Centerville and then to Roby. It rained and snowed here a lot more in those days, but we walked right on through the mud or snow. We'd wrap tow sacks around our feet and legs and tie them on with binder twine, take them off when we got to school and replace them to go home in the afternoon. Now, children can't walk a block to school".

In speaking of the place where Frank Finch settled with his family in 1889, Mr. Finch said, "They bought the land for fifty cents per acre. It would now sell for several hundred dollars. Dad

planted one-half of his farm in wheat and oats and the balance in other feed and cotton and always planted by the sign of the moon. He had twenty-six bee hives; liked to work with them. Bees are smart—they know a lot. Each frame held 5 pounds of honey which we cut into squares and sold, comb and all, at "two-bits" a pound. The chunk honey brought fifteen cents. We used lots of it at home, and we all loved honey.

"After harvest each year we would take our wheat to Stamford and get it ground. We'd have enough flour and bran to last all the next year. In the winter Dad would kill a beef, hand it up in a mesquite tree in the back yard, and it would keep until we ate it up. Nothing bothered it. We also had ham, red gravy and biscuits. You can't get ham like that any more.

"Cattle ran on the free range. In the fall there was a big roundup and each one cut out his own stock and branded them. Buyers came through and bought the cattle; I can remember that Dad once old a big fat cow for \$7.00. Once a Trail Drive went up the old Snyder road which

was only about a mile from us. They had 25,000 head. We could hear their whips popping all the way to our house.

"I recall when the railroad came to Rotan. There was only one house here. It was one and a half stories and was located right across the street from the old Farmers Gin. My mother sold butter there and to the railroad crew, and my brother and I delivered it. The crew lived in tents south of where the town now is. An epidemic of smallpox broke out and they died like flies".

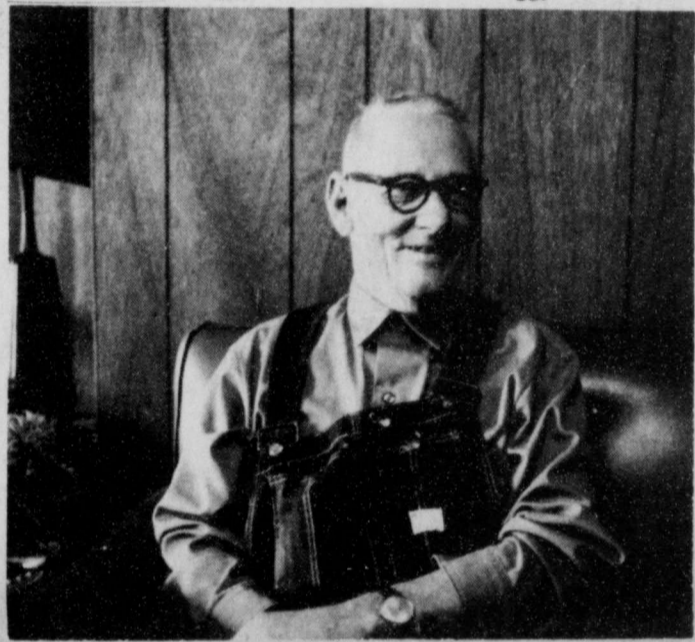
"There were no fences nor roads in those days, and no signs to direct you. We'd just follow a cow trail to Sweetwater, for instance, spend the night in the Wagon Yard, and go back home the next day. I remember when Sweetwater was no bigger than Roby now is. Once a year we went to Colorado City to get salt for curing meat. We'd leave at 3 or 4 A. M., stay overnight at the Wagon Yard, get our provisions early next morning and come home that night.

"Out first buggy was from

Colorado City. My mother raised ninety-nine turkeys. They hauled them over there and traded them for the buggy.

"For fun, the children made their own toys. I made little wagons. Also, we would go hunting--mostly for jack rabbits and rattle snakes. There were lots of blue quail to hunt, too. We'd find lots of buffalo skulls at first, but they were soon all picked up. Then there were ice cream suppers and games like that. Bed and Pillow Mountain, and it really looks like that, was about a mile and half or two miles away. We'd go there and play all day and do without dinner."

There have been some changes in Fisher County since Waite Finch was a boy. His recollections help us to relive the days when courageous men and women were willing to face the challenges of a new frontier, to establish homes, and to build the communities which we now take for granted. He gives us a lesson in history which enables us to understand that "once upon a time" early history of Fisher County.

Roby Trash Collection Ordinance

Being An Ordinance Adopted For The Preservation Of Health, Sanitation And Safety Of The Public And Providing For The Collection, Removal And Disposal Of Garbage, Trash And Rubbish Within The City Of Roby, Texas: Defining Terms; Requiring All Owners, Occupants, Tenants, Or Lessees Of Residences, Churches, Schools, Colleges, Lodges, And Commercial Industrial Business Or Other Buildings Within The City To Provide Containers And Receptacles With Covers For Garbage, Trash And Rubbish; Specifying That Containers And Receptacles Be Placed At Convenient Locations On The Premises Where They May Be Emptied And The Contents Removed At Regular Intervals; Prohibiting Anyone Except Employees Of The City Of Roby, Or Their Duty Authorized Representative From

Emptying Containers Or Receptacles Or Transporting The Contents On The Streets And Public Thoroughfares; Fixing Schedules, Of Reasonable Charges To Be Made Against Owners, Occupants, Tenants And Lessees Of Buildings And Premises Receiving The Service; Requiring The Director Of The Department Of Public Health To Make Periodic Inspections Of Buildings, Premises And All Places Where Garbage, Trash And Rubbish May Accumulate And Enforce And Administer The Provisions Of The Ordinance; Providing A Saving Clause In The Event Any Part Of The Ordinance Should Be Declared Unconstitutional; Fixing A Penalty For The Violation Thereof; Repealing All Ordinances Or Parts Of Ordinances In Conflict Herewith; And Providing An Effective Date.

removal of the normal accumulation of all garbage of each family unit once each week, and the collection and removal of the maximum of eight (8) cubic feet or the volume of two (2) twenty (20) gallons cans or receptacles or trash and rubbish once each week.

SECTION 12. Charges for Commercial and Business Service.
The collections and removal of garbage, trash and rubbish from houses, buildings and premises used for commercial and business purposes shall be daily, five days each week. Charges for this commercial and business service, which are fair and reasonable shall be a minimum of \$3.00 per month.

The basis of the service charge will be on the number of collections each week and the cubic yardage of such garbage, trash and rubbish.

The representative of the City shall determine the cubic yardage of garbage, trash and rubbish and the service charge, which shall be approved by the City Manager.

SECTION 13. Wet Garbage

All garbage or trash and rubbish that is mixed with water or liquids shall be drained before being put in the can or receptacle. All garbage, which has been drained shall be well wrapped in paper or other combustible material before being deposited in can.

SECTION 14. Heavy Accumulation of Broken Concrete, Etc.

Heavy accumulation such as brick, broken concrete, rock, stones, ashes, lumber, cinders, dirt and plaster, sand or gravel, automobile frames, dead trees, and other bulky, heavy material shall be disposed of at the expense of owner or person controlling same under the direction of the City Garbage Superintendent.

SECTION 15. Heavy Accumulation of Manure, Etc.

Manure from cow lots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts and waste and oils from garages and filling stations, shall be disposed of at the expense of the party responsible for the same under the direction of the City Garbage Superintendent.

SECTION 16. An Offense to Violate Ordinance

The Health Ordinance required that all premises, both vacant and occupied be kept in a clean and a sanitary condition at all times.

The City Garbage Department will not make collections of garbage, trash or rubbish or tree limbs and shrubbery cuttings, where same is not prepared for collection and placed as designated by the terms of this Ordinance and failure to comply with this provision will be an offense and each day's failure to comply will constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 17.

The meddling with garbage cans, trash or rubbish receptacles in any way, pilfering, scattering contents and junking in any alley or street within the City Limits of the City of Roby is prohibited.

SECTION 18. Protection of Cans or Receptacles.

The contents of all cans and receptacles shall be protected so that the wind cannot blow and scatter same over the streets, alleys and premises of the City.

SECTION 19. Service Charge Place on Water Bill

To avoid duplication in billing and as a convenience to the public, fees for the service herein provided for shall be billed on the monthly water bills, and shall be promptly remitted to the City of Roby monthly as the same accrues. Failure to pay such fees when due shall be considered as if the water bill is delinquent and the City may, at its option, discontinue water service until the delinquent fees are paid.

SECTION 20.

It is hereby made the duty of the Superintendent of Garbage and the Director of the Department of Public Health of the City of Roby or his representative, to make inspection trips at regular intervals to determine whether or not the garbage, trash and rubbish is being properly collected, removed and disposed of as required by the provisions of this or any other applicable health ordinance, and in the event it is found that the Ordinance is being violated, appropriate and timely action shall be taken to insure a fully compliance with its said provisions.

SECTION 21. Complaints

Do not enter into controversy with workmen concerning garbage collection. To make a complaint, call the City Office-Phone 776-2271. In making a complaint, be sure to give name and address.

SECTION 22. Penalty for Violation of Ordinance

Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and each offense and each day's continuance of failure to comply with the Ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 23. Effective Date of Ordinance.

That this Ordinance become effective and in full force and effective on November 1, 1972
