BIRTH OF ROTAN INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION POSSIBLE THROUGH CHAMBER

Directors of the Rotan Chamber of Commerce met for their regular November meeting last Tuesday morning and heard a proposal by Chamber President, Cecil Champion, that directors give consideration to the idea of establishing a Rotan Industrial Development Foundation.

According to Champion, an active Rotan Industrial Development Foundation would serve as the base for seeking new industry and new business location in our community.

"Towns that have a strong industrial development group are in a position to attract new business", said Champion, "we can either sit here and do nothing, or we can organize such a group with the hopes of possibly doing some good for the future development of Rotan", he continued.

Champion cited instances where the West Texas Council of Governments, West Texas Chamber of Commerce and Small Business Administration Area Development Boards are working more and more with local Industrial Foundations on recommending new business location sites.

Fisher County is one of eleven counties in West Texas that has been designated as a depressed county and by being such is entitled to certain assistance from the SBA depressed area assistance program according to Mr. Champion.

Most of the talk at Tuesday's meeting was positive. The func-

tion of the Chamber of Commerce in this instance would be to assist in the forming of such a group. The Industrial Foundation would not be connected with the Rotan Chamber of Commerce.

Rotan Chamber of Commerce Directors are planning to get the feeling of member businesses on the establishment of this new industrial development foundation.

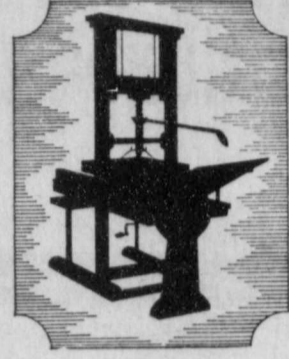

The Rotan FFA Chapter has entered four teams in the District Leadership contest to be held November 8 at Hamlin.

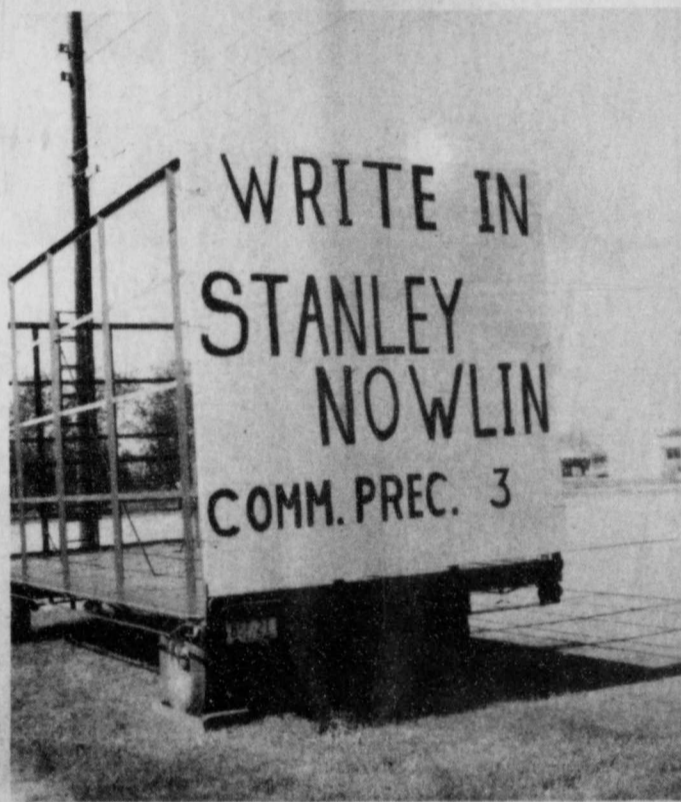

The extra point attempt failed.

Rotan's second score came after William Duke recovered a loose ball at the Rotan 37-yard line. Jones scored the 2nd touchdown after running 32-yards on a keeper play. The extra point attempt failed. Baird came back quickly on the following series to put them in the lead once again by the score of 14-12.

A long pass play with 5:14 remaining in the fourth quarter accounted for Baird's final score of the evening.

The Yellowhammer's last score came with 2:30 left in the game when William Duke plowed 5 yards to make the contest 21-18.

The Rotan squad successfully engineered an on side kick that was recovered by Bobby Rodgers and Morris Womack and has possession at the 50-yard line with 2:15 remaining in the contest. At this point in the

Hobbs Three Part Singers Busy Group

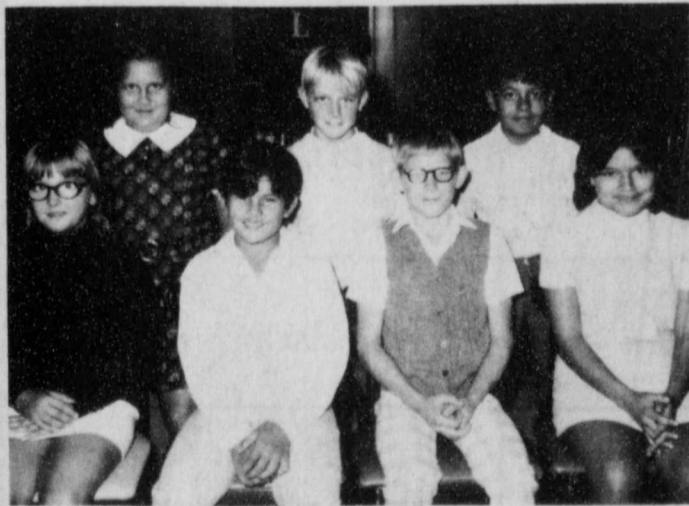



Texas Farm Bureau Has Largest Member Gain

The Texas Farm Bureau registered its largest membership gain in 17 years during 1972 and also reached an all-time high in number of members, according to J. T. (Red) Woodson, president of the state farm organization.

Total membership as of Oct. 31 (end of the organization's fiscal year) was 136,931 member families, a gain of 9,529 over last year, making the 20th straight year for the TFB to show an increase in members. Tabulations were completed Nov. 6.

A total of 171 of the 206 organized county Farm Bureaus showed an increase over last year. Harris County won honors as the largest county FB in the state with 2,274 members and also enrolled the most new members, a total of 479.

Woodson attributed this year's exceptional growth to the organizations' successes in several areas:

"In state legislation, we were successful in securing appropriations for animal health, research and other agricultural programs and a relaxation of strict farm trailer brake and light requirements.

"We have experienced dramatic success in service-to-member programs, saving farmers and ranchers of Texas \$4 million in group purchases of tires and batteries alone.

"We have added some attractive new programs to further serve our members. Some 158 counties are enrolled in our Group Accidental Death Insurance Program, with more than 100,000 persons covered. In addition, 153 county Farm Bureaus have adopted our property protection plan for the posting of property in accordance with the new anti-trespass law we were successful in getting passed in the last regular session of the Legislature."



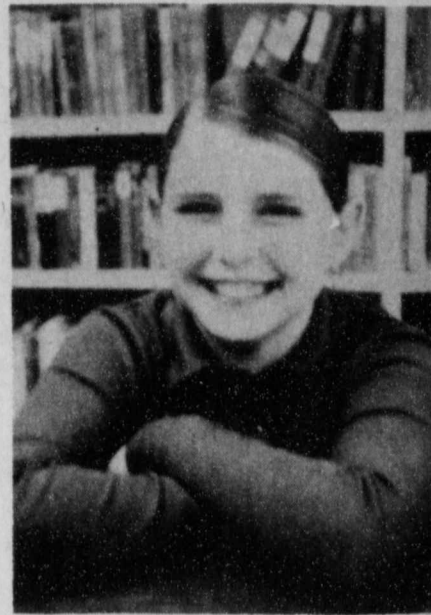
Tammy Stuart, Roby 5th grade

Pork chops, mashed potatoes, and gravy--they way my mother cooks them. Then I like green apple pie, hot, with ice cream. And, I like to ride horses.



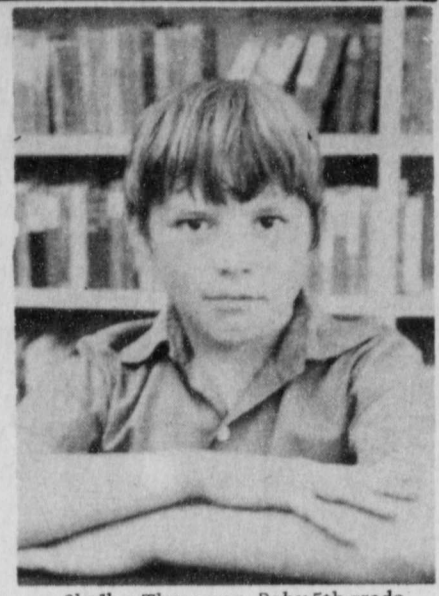
Kevin Rivers, Roby 5th grader

Water melon! Yellow meated ones, and a little salt. And for dessert I like plain chocolate cake with chocoalte icing. And swimming is my favorite sport.



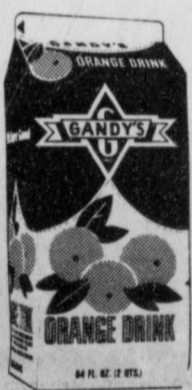

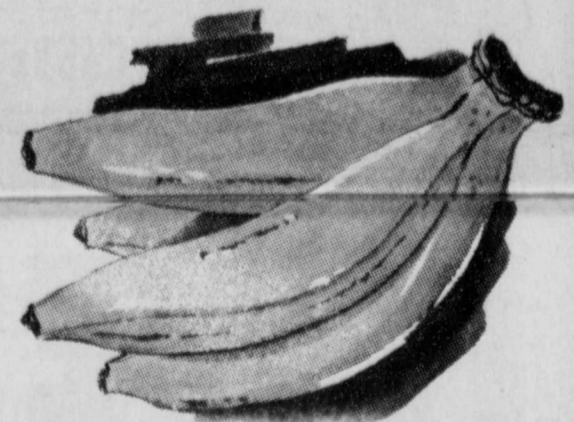

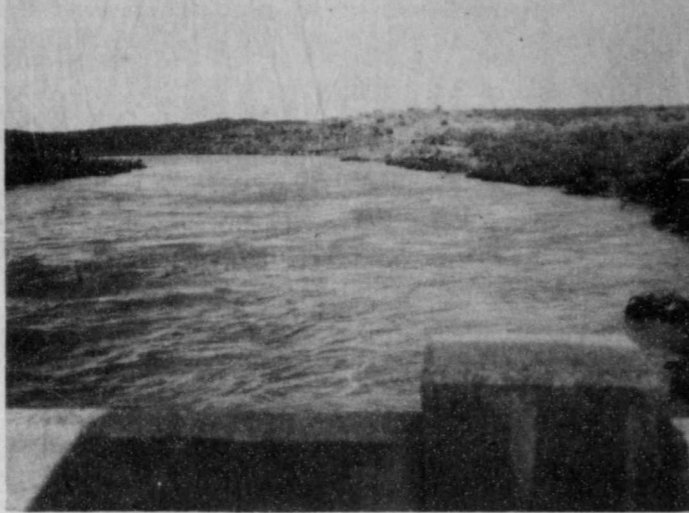

Take Action Now To Save Our Water

"The conservation of one of our most important natural resources-water-is becoming more important as the demand for water keeps increasing," stated Gerald Harmon, Soil Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

According to a pamphlet released by the USDA, "Conservation and the Water Cycle", about 80,000 cubic miles of water evaporates from oceans and about 15,000 cubic miles evaporates from land sources each year. About 95,000 cubic miles of water are moving between the earth and sky at all times. Only about 24,000 cubic miles of water falls on land areas.

The amount of water that falls on the United States averages 30 inches per year or 4300 billion gallons per day; however, about 70 per cent of this amount returns to the sky because of evaporation. Approximately 30 per cent or 1200 billion gallons of water per day is available for human use. At the present time a person in the U. S. uses about 1500 gallons per day for his needs and comfort including recreation, cooling, food production, and industrial supply.

Much of the available water is wasted because it runs off unprotected land into streams and rivers and eventually into the ocean without ever being put to good use. Conservation practices

such as stubble mulching, terraces, and grassed waterways on cropland, and brush control, range seeding, and proper grazing use on rangeland help to slow down runoff water so that more of it will have a chance to soak into the soil. Whether we will have enough water to meet future needs depends upon action taken now to retain as much water where it falls as possible. Conservation practices applied by farmers and ranchers play a big part in keeping runoff to a minimum. As a result, soil is kept in place and does not pollute rivers, streams and lakes.

Youth Fascinated With Ancestors

"A people which takes no pride in the noble achievements of remote ancestors will never achieve anything worthy to be remembered with pride by remote descendants," wrote Lord Thomas McCaulley during the preceding century.

Blake Allison Hale, 12-year old son of John Ross and Margie (Bigham) Hale, is fascinated with the history of his pioneering ancestors. Before Blake was old enough to read he listened intently as his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Darthulia Hale, recounted stories of the Hittson and Millsap families. Her mother's scrapbook was a reliable source of information.

Blake is the fourth generation of the Millsap line to be born in Fisher County. His great-great grandfather, Royston Whatley Millsap, was among the earliest of the permanent settlers. He was born in Parker County, Texas, the son of Fuller Millsap and his wife Elizabeth Ann Pollard, both of whom are buried in the family cemetery near Millsap in Parker County.

Mrs. Darthulia Hale states, "At present the house still stands where Fuller Millsap reared his family and helped with other early pioneers in West Texas to fight off the Indians. It is a double log cabin which, in addition to being the family home, also served as Post Office and Stage Coach Station. Here R. W. Millsap was born."

"The Hittsons had moved to Palo Pinto County, Texas in 1855. The historic old family cemetery dating back to 1861 in on

a high hill at the ranch. It marked the cross-roads for travel in the pioneer days when Indians were menacing the wagon trains and raiding the homes of that sector. The Hittson name has been identified with the Cattle Industry in West Texas for many years. The family still owns the original ranch in Palo Pinto County."

Pioneers who settled the west were always moving on to new frontiers. And so it was with the Millsaps. Mrs. Hale continues, "R. W. Millsap moved to Fisher County about December of 1882, bringing Darthulia Beck Hittson as a bride. They were married in Palo Pinto County earlier that year. They first settled on the Clear Fork of the Brazos River south of where Rotan is located. A daughter, Lena May, was born there in 1883, three years before the county was organized. Several years later they moved near Royston, filling on state land, and later went to Stonewall County where he worked as a cowboy and Commission Buyer on the Billy Hittson Ranch. While living there their third child, John Hittson Millsap, died after having been bitten by a rattlesnake.

With older children off to school, the younger child or infant finds the home and neighborhood quieter or slightly deserted.

Rather than a lonely time, for him this can be a special time. There are experiences parents can provide a child in the form of games and play that will greatly influence his intellectual ability later on.

There's no guarantee, but the latest research in child development strongly suggests that. The most helpful sorts of experiences for your baby are easy for the parents to supply and great fun for both parents and child.

Stressing importance of games as a source of learning and growing experiences.

As an important source of learning and growing experiences, games or their completion should not be used as a test for the child. Games should teach the child and the child should be allowed to establish his own goals for them.

Three fundamentals to help parents provide the child with experiences for learning and growing are: First, help the baby develop basic skills, such as

focusing his eyes, and a little later distinguishing differences among almost identical objects. These skills will have an immediate pay-off in fun and later pay off in his ability to perform more complicated jobs such as reading and thinking.



MOTIVES FOR LIVING

As basic motives for Christian living, there stands on the one hand love and reward and on the other fear and punishment. One is the power of constraint-"The love of Christ constraineth us" (2 Cor. 5:14); the other is the power of restraint-"Vengeance becometh unto me, I will recompense. And again, The Lord shall judge his people. It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God" (Heb. 10:30-31). The Christian's moral conduct is the result of how these two forces of love and fear operate in his life. One restrains him from acting in a certain way and the other constrains him to act in a positive way. If either is destroyed, his conduct generally deteriorates.

Any religious theory which could convince you that there is absolutely no danger of your ever falling from God's grace, no matter what you do, tends to take from you one of the God-given motives for purity of thought, holiness of living and godly conduct. An injustice is performed in that there is created within you a false sense of security. The power of restraint has been removed. The doctrine of "once saved, always saved," or "the impossibility of apostasy," is such a theory.

On the other hand, any theory that does not exalt the love of God and tends to set forth only the severity of God and the fear of punishment renders an injustice to you in that it robs you of the vitality necessary for higher living- the power, the meaning and the strength for righteous living that comes through the constraint of love. "We love because he first loved us" (1Jn. 4:19). "The goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance" (Rom. 2:4). "Behold then the goodness and severity of God" (Rom. 11:22).

Fred Byerly...The Weatherman

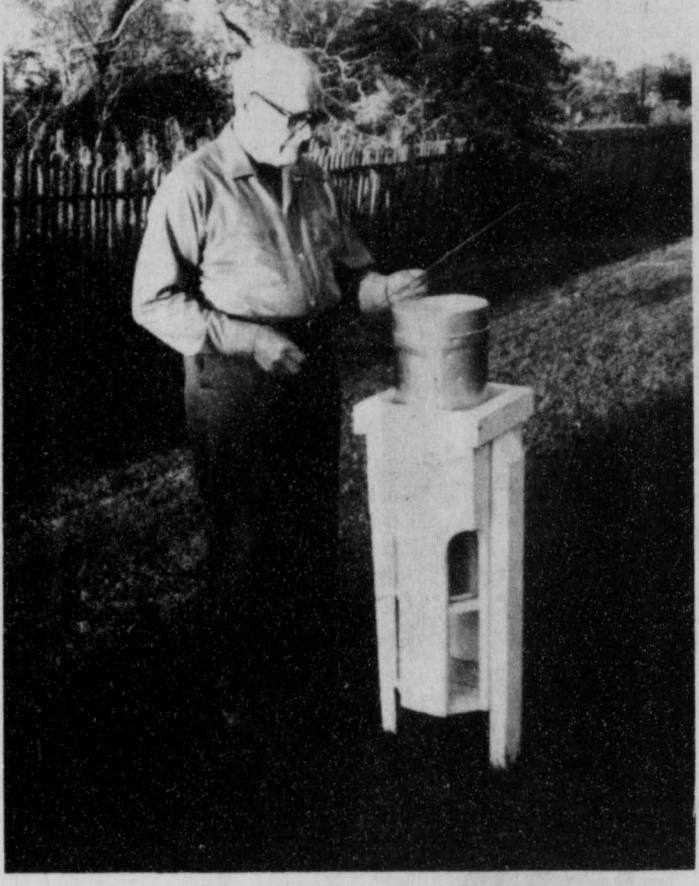

The weather! Everybody talks about it, complains and speculates. Throughout the years it continues to be a theme for popular songs. We say, "This has been the hottest summer I've ever known, or the coldest winter, longest drought..." Our recollections are often inaccurate because we are overly influenced by the present. No two people can agree, it seems, even on the amount of precipitation at any given time.

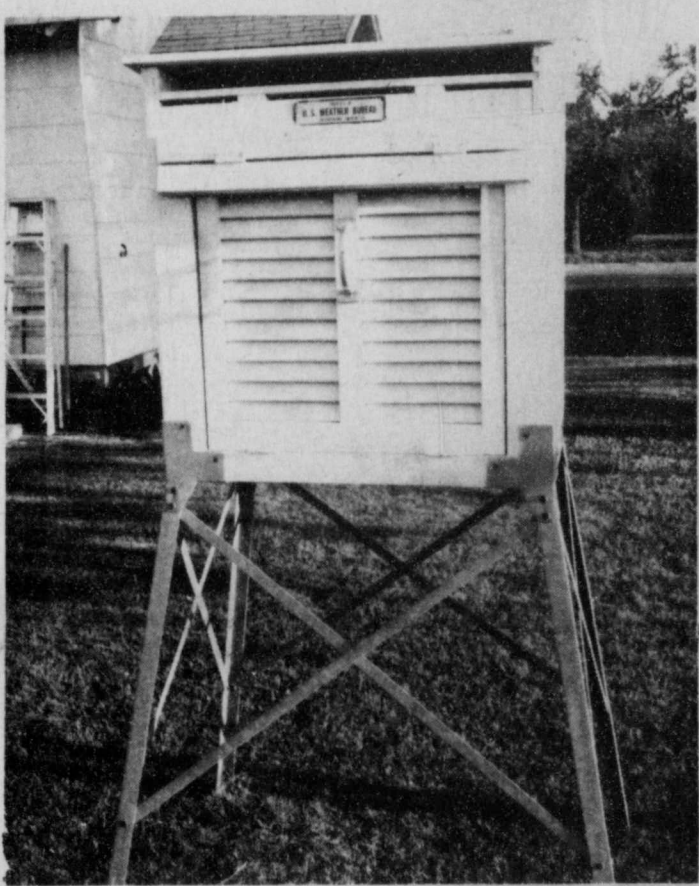
One resident of Fisher County is qualified to speak with authority regarding temperature and rainfall for this area. Recently Fred Byerly of Rotan received a letter which stated in part, "September of this year marks your completion of 80 years as a cooperative weather observer. We join the Secretary of Commerce, the Administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and the Director of the National Weather Service in congratulating you on this outstanding record of public service."

"Every day many organizations and individuals in governmental activities as well as in private enterprises use the valuable information made available only through your efforts and wholehearted support. Please accept the enclosed emblem as a small token of the high esteem with which your service is held. We hope you continue to find your weather work interesting and many more years are added to your worthwhile record of public service." The emblem referred to in the letter is an attractive lapel pin bearing an eagle, the number 80 on a crest, and designating government service. Mr. Byerly is getting quite a collection of them, each different in coloring and number of years service beginning with the fifteenth and presented for each additional five years. He recalls the occasion of the presentation of the twenty-fifth year emblem when he appeared on television in Abilene. Mr. Strohler of the Weather Bureau made the award. Area residents have been aware of the fact that Mr. Byerly had the official weather gauge but few realize the amount of time and dedication required for the accurate records he keeps. It is all volunteer service without remuneration and is an every day job. The official equipment includes two thermometers which register the high, low and present temperatures for each twenty-four hour

period. The rain gauge has been worked out and carefully inspected to that it is the most accurate that can be found. Mr. Byerly keeps a daily record sheet showing the high and low temperatures as well as any precipitation that falls within the twenty-four hour period from 7 A.M. to 7 A.M. He also records the time rain begins to fall and when it ceases. Any time there is as much as one-half inch he calls the Weather Bureau in Abilene. He notes if the day is clear, partly cloudy, or cloudy. He also tells you when it thundered and didn't rain, when there was excessive wind and estimated velocity, and storm damage in the area. The daily report is recorded on an official chart and sent each month to the Weather Office in Fort Worth. There, it becomes a part of the records of the National Weather Service.

When asked how he became involved in this volunteer work, Mr. Byerly said, "I more or less inherited it. A man at Claytonville who had kept the rainfall record for a long time gave it up in 1926. Lon Adams decided to take up the responsibility and I went with him to get the equipment. Later, when Lon moved away for a time, I was persuaded to keep it. That was thirty years ago. I have the daily rainfall records from 1926, but have had the thermometers for only ten years." One ponders why a person will devote so much time to a volunteer service. It is not for recognition because few people are aware of it at all. Mr. Byerly enjoys doing this because he knows it is beneficial for the country. He said, "At first I didn't know the data was used so widely. It is important in predicting the weather. County Agents use it for making a summary. I have been called on for information by the Soil Conservation Service, and West Texas Utilities. A number of school groups have come to see the equipment. In some isolated instances, the records have been used in court cases where damage claims were dependent on moisture." West Texas, of course, is noted for its unpredictable weather and many jokes have been told about it. Fred Byerly, even with his official knowledge, wouldn't venture a forecast. According to Boyce House, noted recorder of many tall tales of Texas, "No one would predict weather in West Texas but newcomers or fools". Our official weather observer would qualify as neither.



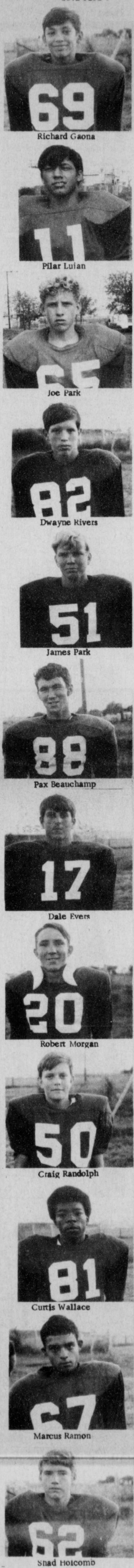
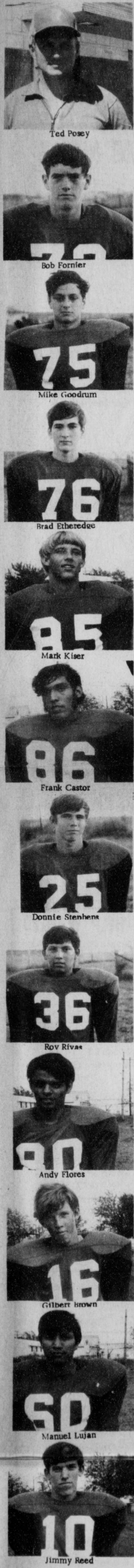
