"I recall when, as a very small child, I heard two of the original five men who formed the Colorado Cattle Company relate the early history of the 18 Ranch which was located primarily in Fisher County It also included some range in north Nolan and east Scurry Counties. These men stated that in 1881 five small cowmen pooled their fi-


