County 4-Hers Will Attend A & M Round-Up

It's Roundup time in Texas once again--4-H style, that is, Texas 4-H Roundup, one of the oldest annual statewide 4-H events in the nation, is slated for June 5-6 at Texas A&M University.

More than 1,800 4-H boys and girls from throughout the state will be participating and will bring with them a multitude of talents and abilities as they compete in more than 30 contests and demonstrations ranging from livestock judging to public speaking.

Fisher County 4-H members who will be attending include the Livestock Judging team, Terry Posey, Mark Guelker, Glen Wilfong and Dale Wilfong. Also Audrey Carey will participate in public speaking. County Extension agents Mrs. Alice Balenger and Richard Spencer will accompany the 4-Hers.

In addition to the 4-Hers some 600 adults, including county

Extension agents, 4-H leaders, friends of 4-H, mass media representatives, contest donors and members of the board of directors of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation, will also be on hand. T. Louis Austin of Dallas chairs the board. 4-Hers attending Roundup have already been named county and district winners in the various demonstrations and contests. Only first and second place winners in district competition at the senior level (14 years of age or older) are eligible to compete in the state event. There are 13 districts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the parent organization of 4-H.

This year's Roundup will officially get underway with a general assembly at 5:30 p. m. on June 5 in G. Rollie White Coliseum on the A&M campus. Special awards will be presented to 10 individuals, businesses and

mass media representatives who have made outstanding contributions to 4-H. The awards will be provided by the 4-H Foundation.

Twenty-six outstanding 4-H adult leaders (two from each Extension district) will be recognized at a luncheon on June 6.

Contest winners and donors will be honored at a special recognition program that evening.

4-H Roundup is the highlight of the 4-H year in Texas. 4-H enrollment continues to increase and now totals more than 120,000 youth between the ages of 9 and 19.

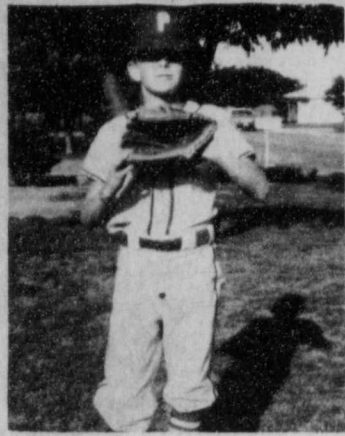
I am trying to earn enough money of my own to replace this bicycle with a new ten speed one.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Time to spray for the pecan nut casebearer in Fisher County is rapidly approaching. From observing the emergence of pecan nut casebearermoths, insecticides should be applied during the period of May 31- June 4.

Commercial orchard producers should time applications exactly by inspecting large numbers of nutlets for eggs and damage. Control measures should be carried out when the first pecan nut casebearer damaged nutlets are found. The time at which controls are needed may vary from orchard to orchard.

Insecticides that might be used for casebearer control are

Guthion, Zolone, Sevin, Malathion and Toxaphene. Follow instructions given on the label for mixing and applying these insecticides. For best results apply insecticides to the point of run-off.

A second insecticidal application 7 to 10 days after the first will give maximum protection from the pecan nut casebearer. The need for a second application in larger orchards should be based on observation of the nutlets for eggs. If egg-laying continues for four or five days after the first application, a second application will be needed.

Bill Wallace Life Movie At Rotan Baptist

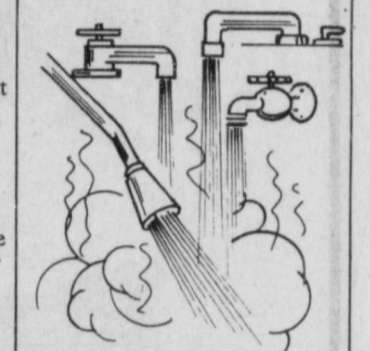
The movie of the life of Bill Wallace will be shown Wednesday night at the First Baptist Church of Rotan. Time for the showing is 7:30 p. m.
