Parks, Wilfong To Make 4-H Ecology Conference

James Park of Roby and Dale Wilfong of Rotan, both Fisher County 4-H Club members will be among 100 4-H boys and girls and adult leaders attending the seventh annual Texas 4-H Ecology Conference. The conference will be held June 19-22 at the H.E. Butt Foundation Camp at Leakey.

"Purpose of the conference is to provide participants an opportunity to get closer to nature, to develop a better understanding of our natural resources and to discuss and learn ways to utilize these resources more effectively and efficiently," says Tom Davison, conference coordinator and 4-H and youth specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, parent organization of 4-H.

Group discussions throughout the 3-1/2 day conference will center a round environmental

quality, forestry, outdoor recreation, range, soil and water, and wildlife. Each participant will have an opportunity to learn about these vital areas and to contribute his own thoughts and experiences, points out Davison. Discussion groups will be led by Extension Service specialists.

Guest speakers at the conference will be Dr. Fred Smeins, associate professor in the Department of Range Science at Texas A&M University; Bob Ramsy, a rancher at Hunt; Wayne Hamilton, business manager of the Chaparral Ranch at La Pryor; and the Honorable John Brigham, state representative from Temple who is chairman of the Environmental Affairs Committee.

The Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board of Temple is sponsoring a special banquet and the H. E. Butt Foundation is providing the use of its camp.

COMMISSIONERS BEGIN LEGAL GROUNDWORK

Fisher County Commissioners met last Friday morning with Elbert Morrow of the bonding attorney firm of Dumas, Huginen,

Boothman and Morrow of Dallas and laid the groundwork for the legal work in creating the Fisher County Hospital District.

Fisher County Judge Dwight Lovett indicated that the first step would be to call an election after the bill becomes law.

The recently passed hospital bill will become law when the Governor's signature is placed on the bill or 20 days after the adjournment date.

The earliest the people of Fisher County could vote to ratify the bill would be 35 days from the date the election is called. In the called vote the people of Fisher County will be voting on two propositions on the ballot. First, residents will be voting to confirm the hospital district, secondly, to approve 1-1/2 million dollars for the construction in the form of bonds.

If the voters of Fisher County approve the two proposals on the ballot then the county, according to Judge Dwight Lovett, "will just do away with the (recently voted) county hospital bonds."

After the election has been held, the votes will be canvassed. This is to be accomplished within a 10 day period.

As soon as the votes have been canvassed the Fisher County Commissioners Court will appoint 5 members to the Fisher County Hospital Board. These five appointed members will serve until the following first Saturday in April at which time five will be elected by the people in the hospital district. The three elected directors with the highest number of votes will serve for three years and the low two individuals will hold one year offices.

According to Judge Lovett, a hospital board election will be held every year to elect either 2 or 3 directors to 2 year terms.

Gas Shortage Begins To Take Toll In County

In the minds of many people the gasoline shortage is just a scheme by the big oil producers to drive up prices of petroleum products or to scare the Congress to allow them to build the pipeline through Alaska. But regardless of whether the shortage is genuine or manufactured, Fisher County is feeling the first effects of the shortage.

Jack Allen at Jack Allen's Finna Station in Rotan has had to limit his daily sales. "We're rationing just so many gallons a day, then we lock up and go home," said Allen.

Dillard Smith and Shorty Cyphers at Smith and Cyphers Gulf Station in Rotan had to limit the gas sales on one pump to 5 gallons per customer one day last week. "We've started closing on Sundays and have cut our hours down some," commented Dillard Smith.

E. Soliz, owner of Soliz Texaco Station in Roby has not

had to start rationing gas as of yet, but anticipates that he will have to around the 15th of June.

Other service station owners in Fisher County that were contacted have not had to begin the gas rationing process. Erbie Rodgers, owner of Rodgers Exxon Station in Rotan, remarked that he thought he "could buy all (the gas) I want". Roy Parsons at the Exxon station in Roby indicated that he wasn't fixin' to ration gas. "Everything is fine and dandy with me," he said. Alonzo Lujan, manager of the Martinez Conoco Station in Rotan, said that he is not in any danger yet on gas shortages.

Dewayne Lee and Jack Smallwood at S&L Texaco indicated that they have not had to ration gas but should know something in the near future.

Glen Odum at Odum's Shamrock has received no word on rationing from his distributor and said he can still get all the gas he wants.

Petty Mobil Station in Rotan has been able to get all the gas he wants and indicated that he was still selling it for the same price he has been for the last several years.

John Gray, local Mobil Con-

signee in Fisher County, indicated that diesel fuel was critical. He felt that the gas shortage is going to get worse in the next two or three months.

Six Fisher County Girls Going To Brazil On Lions Club Exchange

On July 3 six Fisher County youths will depart the Lubbock Regional Airport for Brazil, as a part of the Lions International Youth Exchange Program of 1973.

These young people will be staying in their host country for a minimum of six weeks where they will live with host Lion families and participate in day to day activities. While there they will have an opportunity to meet young people their own age and learn about the country, its people and their hopes, desires and ambitions for the future.

The six youths departing Fisher County in this contingent have been carefully selected by their sponsoring Lions Clubs and are a representative group of the area young people. Each youth has studied extensively about his particular town, the West Texas area, Texas as a state, and briefly reviewed the history of the United States so he may be prepared to answer any questions directed to him.

A youth participating in this program has certain responsibilities he is required to fulfill. Briefly they entail the appearance before Lions Clubs and other civic organizations to re-

late the story of West Texas in terms of its people, economics, industry and agriculture, and its plans for future development and expansion as seen from the eyes of its young people. 



Farmers Union Pushing D.C. Farm Bill Fly-In

Consumers as well as farmers will have a stake in the work that Texans will be doing in Washington this week when Texas farmers and ranchers will join agricultural producers from other states in the nation's capitol. Farmers Union members from Colorado, New Mexico, Kansas, Utah, and Texas will participate in a National Farmers Union sponsored Legislative Fly-In program as the United States Senate considers a new farm bill.

Texas Farmers Union officials have labeled the new farm bill a consumer program, because, according to Texas Farmers Union president, Jay Naman, "It will assure the consuming public of an abundant supply of reasonably priced food and fiber, while at the same time providing the incentive for farmers to produce in abundance". Naman said that although the participants in the Fly-In to Washington are primarily working farmers, they go with the backing of their local business communities.

The group will visit with the Texas Congressional delegation and make contacts with congressmen from other states concern-

ing the Senate version of the farm bill, which is expected to be voted on while the group is in Washington. They arrived in Washington on Sunday, June 3, and returned to Texas on Tuesday, June 5.

Farmers Union has expressed general support for the Senate Agriculture Committee approved version of the farm program, but the Texas Farmers Union leadership has called for some modifications to "improve" the cotton section. According to Texas Farmers Union officials, there are some "serious defects" in the cotton section that must be corrected to make the program workable for Texas farmers.

"It is essential that we get a good farm bill passed as soon as possible so that Texas producers will be able to plant next year's crop. Failure to pass a farm bill this summer would leave us without a farm program next year, which would be disastrous to both farmers and consumers," according to the Texas Farmers Union State President.



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

The Seniors report a real good sale at the Hobbs School Saturday.







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Loving Family Name Rich In Texas History

In 1936, the Texas Centennial, an official State Historical Marker was placed at the old home site of Oliver Loving who came with his family to Palo Pinto County in 1855. According to early accounts Oliver Loving and his brother James left their home in Kentucky soon after the death of their father Joseph Loving.

Willie Clytes Cullar states in her "The Loving Family in Texas", that two of the children who made the trip in early childhood said the families came down the Mississippi on flat boats to New Orleans and then up to Shreveport where they landed, bought oxen and wagons and came across to Lamar County.

Finding Lamar County too thoroughly settled for stock farming, the Lovings soon moved farther west and eventually located on the Brazos in Palo Pinto County in 1855.

The name of Oliver Loving was well known to the cattlemen in the days of the great ranches. Perhaps his most lasting claim to fame was connected with the cattle trail which bore his name with that of Charles Goodnight. The Lovings found it imperative to find a new market for cattle. Later cowmen have said that the first herd left Texas for the north in 1866. A letter from a son of Oliver Loving, dated 1857, reports that the cattle had been sold "tolerably well" at \$38 per head, and they had "tolerably good luck" on the trip up to Illinois.

Mrs. Cullar states in her book, "In 1860 Loving took up the trail to Denver where the discovery of gold had caused many new settlements to spring up. The route led through Indian territory. It was the first Texas herd that entered Colorado territory." These cattle were sold profitably, but before he could start home the Civil War began. It was only through intercession of friends, among whom Kit Carson is named, that he was allowed to return to a secessionist state. Oliver Loving set out for Texas, along with his small trunk of gold dust under the seat of his wagon.

Although Texas was not devastated by actual fighting, the people found themselves bankrupt at the close of the war. The cattle industry was at a standstill. Cattlemen turned to the west in search of markets; and again, Oliver Loving led the way in blazing a trail that was a bonanza for the industry. In 1866 he and Charles Goodnight joined forces to establish the route that bears the name, Loving and Goodnight Trail.

In 1867 these brave frontiersmen set out on the disastrous drive that resulted in the death of Oliver Loving. Historians have recorded these events with varying degrees of reality and folklore. Loving was wounded by Indians and died at Fort Sumner on the twenty-fifth of September, 1867, at the age of 54. He was buried temporarily in a metal casket at the fort and was later brought home by his son Joseph. He is buried at Weatherford, Texas. The Loving-Goodnight Trail soon became an important route; its impact

on the cattle industry of Texas is immeasurable.

Oliver Loving's sons continued in the cattle business. His oldest son was used for many years by the grandson who bore his name. According to a great-grandson, Ted Loving of Rotan, "Three sons came farther west. In the early 1880's George, Jim and Joseph Loving came into the Double Mountain area. They traded jewelry and other valuables for a half-section homestead with a half-dugout. They traded for horses which were taken back to Parker County and traded for cattle. For some years the three brothers operated as partners, running the Three L brand. Their extensive holdings were later divided and grandfather (Joseph Loving) later moved to Rotan and operated a Livery Stable in the early days of the town. His last ranch home was where Roy Edwards now

lives.

"My parents were Don Joseph Loving and Tennie Cryte. Only three of their children still live here - my brother Lewis, sister Catherine Bruce and I. The Loving families, like many other ranchers, lost their holdings during the terrible drought". Mrs. Cullar states, "The physical traces of the frontier have dwindled to such things as old letters, old guns, and rings made of Colorado gold dust; but emotionally, the tradition of the frontier is sturdy. Sons and daughters of the family who do not have Loving as a surname, receive it as a given name. They realize vaguely, but respectfully, that there is reason for its perpetuation. They feel it is wise to keep the pioneer idea in the mind of the youngest generation, which in a world where civilizations still oppose each other, may yet find itself on a

new frontier".

Thanks to Mrs. Cullar, the Loving genealogy and history has been preserved for posterity. Gabriel Loving, Jr. is recorded as a Lieutenant from N. C. in the American War for Independence. His son, Joseph, was the father of Oliver Loving who came to Texas. It is recorded in history that "Oliver Loving was one of the most striking figures in the early cattle industry; yet he lacked the picturesque vices of the frontier".

"The past is prologue", has been said many times. The days of the trail drive and of Indian depredations are in the past, but are all a part of the colorful heritage that makes local history live. Because of his great contribution to the development of the cattle industry, the name of Oliver Loving is found in the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City.

Preston Morrow Jr Ends LSU Banking Conference

Preston Morrow, Jr., National Bank Examiner, U. S. Treasury Department of Houston is one of 365 bankers graduating from the School of Banking of the

South at Louisiana State University. Classes started May 21 and continued through June 2, covering advanced study in all phases of banking, economics, and finance.

The School, sponsored by bankers associations of fifteen southern states, requires attendance at campus sessions for 3 years, plus extensive home study work during the remainder of the year. An outstanding faculty of more than 100 bankers, businessmen, economists, and educators teach courses dealing with modern bank management service and operations. During their three years at LSU, banker-students receive a total of 180 hours of classroom instruction, 30 hours of review, organized evening study, and written final examinations at the end of each year. Since the school began in 1950, graduation certificates have been awarded to 3,687 students.

"This program makes an important contribution toward improving and increasing the type and quality of banking services being offered in the South," said Charles Cassidy, Director of the School. Mr. Cassidy is chairman of First State Bank and Trust Company, Bogalusa, La.

Current enrollment includes bank officers and bank supervisory personnel from more than 20 states and Central America. In addition to varied class lectures, instruction concentrates on banking and business case studies.

Roger Graham Finishes Oil Short Course

Eight petroleum engineers representing five major oil companies have completed a week-long Oilfield Automation Short Course at Texas Tech University conducted by the University's Electrical Engineering Department.

The course provided the visiting engineers with an intensive survey of current oilfield automation technology and was taught by Prof. Darrell L. Vines, Donald L. Gustafson, Stanley R. Liberty and Perman Plott.

The instruction and laboratory work are designed for petroleum, mechanical, chemical and electrical engineers who now are, or will be, involved in any phase of oilfield automation, Dr. Vines said.

Participants have been given insight into the structure, philosophy and potential of oilfield automation while developing an excellent foundation for their own ideas," said Vines who served as director and principal instructor for the course.

Elmer Martin Fuel Shortage

State Representative Elmer Martin has voiced his serious concern over the growing shortage of vital supplies of butane, propane and diesel fuel and has urged the Texas Railroad Commission to do all within its power to solve the problem.

Rep. Martin was co-sponsor of a House resolution that sought to bring a halt to the fuel shortages that are hampering farming and other commercial activity as well as household use. "Out-of-state shipment of Texas' fuel products should be halted immediately," Martin urged, "until the needs of our local consumers are fully met."

"We must stop sending our valuable and irreplaceable natural resources to huge storage depots hundreds of miles from Texas while leaving our own citizens unable to operate their tractors and pumps or to fuel their cook stoves," Martin said. Martin also warned that the

fuel shortage could curtail production of many agriculture commodities and drive consumer costs higher and higher. "If farmers are unable to get enough fuel to maintain a high level of production, then a shortage will soon develop with prices going up and up. This would add further to our already too high rate of inflation," Martin said.

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COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Texas cotton farmers can look forward to another good crop year if weather conditions don't affect production too severely.

Overall, the cotton picture looks good going into the 1973 season. In many cases, the situation is similar to last year. Crop contracting is active in southern areas of the state, with many farmers contracting for good prices-up to 35 cents a pound. The demand should again be strong this year, perhaps more so than last year since acreage allotments have been cut by 13 percent throughout the United States.

The 1973 crop should get off to a good start with favorable soil moisture levels over all the state. On the gloomy side, reduced government payments and increased production costs will lower net income for the coming season.

Looking at the demand picture, world consumption of cotton for 1973-74 is expected to be up one million bales over the record 57 million bales for 1972-73.

Carryover in the U.S. last August was 3.4 million bales, the lowest in 20 years. By August 1 of this year, carryover is expected to be up a million bales even though exports are expected to increase from 3.3 million bales last season to 4.4 million this year.

Texas farmers will produce about 3.5 million bales this year compared to 3.9 last season. Most will stay close to their allotments as cotton prices are expected to be somewhat lower while feed grain prices are zooming. However, some of the set-aside acres that have been freed recently may encourage addi-

tional plantings.

Nationwide, production for 1973 is expected to total about 12.5 million bales, down from the 13.5 million bales last year. The 1972 crop was the largest since 1965.

The first Texas 4-H Congress July 10-12 in Houston, will involve members between the ages of 15 and 19 in developing program ideas that reflect the concerns of young people.

There are two objectives for the Texas 4-H Congress. One is to identify specific areas of concern to older youth that have the potential for inclusion in the ongoing 4-H program. County Extension agents and 4-H leaders want additional programs that will complement their efforts in meeting needs and interests of older youth.

A second objective is to provide a program that will be of interest to Congress delegates. The Texas 4-H Council, a representative group of older youth, has recommended an emphasis on human values and the role they play in decision-making.

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
