The newspaper's first place plaque at the statewide level was the first recognition of its type in the 66 year history of the paper and came just one year after being awarded the coveted "general excellence"

award in the West Texas Press Association Better Newspaper Contest in 1972.

"We were exceptionally proud to make the trip to Houston and accept the first place award for the newspaper", said editor Kim Pease. "The most important

thing we do is serve our subscribers and advertisers by attempting to put out a quality well rounded publication each week but any favorable recognition we can bring back to Fisher County is just icing on the cake", said Pease.

Ben Mendoza was awarded a dozen golf balls for making the nearest approach shot on the fourth hole in the two days of competition.



Alton Smith, of Rotan, presented his views on ad valorem taxes to the Texas Constitution Revision Commission in Abilene last Thursday.

Smith, a member of Fisher County Farm Bureau's Constitutional Revision Committee, told the Commission he felt a complete study should be made into the area of tax equalization and that all property should be taxed

equally, whether it be land or savings deposits. He said this would be the best way to protect individuals from discriminatory taxes, he said. "It seems to me there is an inequity here and those of us who own land are being treated unjustly because we have made an investment in real estate."

The local farmer also asked the commission to make an attempt at stricter controls on welfare and unemployment payments. He said, "There is a direct correlation between reduced welfare payments and reduced unemployment because usually for some people the difference between working and not working, isn't worth working for". Smith related this is a particular problem for farm-

Rotan City Council Sets Minimum Violation Fine

The Rotan City Council met in regular session Thursday night, June 14, and voted to establish minimum fines for traffic violations within the City of Rotan.

There have not been established minimum fines in previous years and the new schedule is in accordance with fines charged by surrounding cities. In the future the following minimum fines will be in effect. Stop sign violations, \$10.00; failure to stop for a red light, \$15.00; drunk in public, \$25.00; driving without a license, \$25.00; speeding violations, \$25.00; minor in possession of alcoholic beverages, \$25.00. The motion to establish the above schedule was made by Arvin White and seconded by Lawrence Bredemeyer.

City Manager Kenneth Vann reported to the councilmen present that a total of 16 Rotan young adults had been hired under the new Summer Employment Project. Thirteen boys and three girls will be receiving \$1.60 per hour for a total of 256 hours through August 11, 1973. The City of Rotan will be reimbursed one hundred percent by the West Central Texas Council of Governments for the project.

Councilmen discussed the sewer plant, rural water line, Barth Addition utilities, budget and voted to implement purchase orders by the City of Rotan on all purchases in excess of

\$10.00.

Vann gave a report to councilmen on the swimming pool operation, indicating that the yearly deficit amounting to \$802.00 on the pool had been reduced to only \$246.19 after the first week of operation.

The names of seven individuals to comprise the City Tax Equalization Board was compiled by councilmen at the June 14 meeting. Four of the seven will be on the 1973-74 equalization board.



Accent on Health

Quite often we hear of a friend or acquaintance who has suddenly been stricken with a case of "food poisoning." Or, occasionally, a community may experience an outbreak of food poisoning from foods improperly packaged or improperly handled during and after preparation.

Since summer normally is the canning season when fruits and vegetables are at their peak, now is a good time to re-emphasize canning precautions.

Health authorities in California reported that more than 62 percent of all cases of botulism were due to string beans, asparagus, fruits and other vegetables canned at home. Another 24 percent was due to preparation of animal products. With the great amount of home canning and freezing done in Texas, officials of the Texas State Department of Health are concerned about the possibility of this potentially fatal disease.

You probably have had no problems with home canning and freezing. But then you may have been lucky. How would you answer these questions?

First, do you believe that home freezing is the best method of food preparation, and the least likely to cause the growth of germs?

Is the disagreeable odor evident with spoiled food a sure-fire indicator that the food is spoiled?

Are nausea and diarrhea always the first symptoms of botulism? Before answering these questions, let's take a closer look at what food poisoning really is.

Among bacteria involved in food-borne diseases are three arch criminals of the germ world. These are salmonella germs, staphylococcus and botulism germs.

The source of salmonella is found in the intestines of human carriers and domestic animals and may be present in meat or dairy products, eggs or egg products. One strain of salmonella contaminated an unchlorinated public deep water supply in Riverside, Calif., in 1966 and produced an epidemic of 15,000 cases of diarrhea.

Staphylococcal food poisoning may occur from a large number of contaminated products. Contamination may be from bovine origin -- in contaminated milk or milk products, or of human origin. Toxin-producing staphylococci of human origin may come from purulent discharges from infections of a finger or hand, nasal secretions, or the apparently normal skin of hands and forearms. This is one reason disposable plastic gloves are widely used by food handlers.

Good sanitation in food preparation, plus proper cooking and quick, thorough cooling of prepared foods, are good insurance against staph and salmonella occurrences.

Botulism is caused by a deadly poison -- a toxin -- produced by a germ found abundantly in the soil. The germ is one of the spore-forming bacteria and is very resistant to normal heat and cold. It can grow without air, which makes it such a sinister threat in home canning. The germ itself doesn't cause illness, but the toxin it produces can be fatal to man. Although some outbreaks have been caused from commercial products, the vast majority of botulism cases have been due to eating improperly processed home-canned foods.

Not let's answer the questions. First, the pressure cooker, method is safer and preferred for canning. Still, precautions should be taken as to length of time and degree of temperature for preparation of any food. Studies on the heat resistance of the spores of the botulism germ prove that home canning by the cold pack method, still widely used in Texas, is extremely dangerous. All home-canned products should be boiled for at least three minutes with thorough stirring before serving.

Second, is odor always evident with spoiled foods? No. Factors such as acidity and nutrient value play a part in odor. Canned foods could be free of abnoxious odor, appear in good condition and still contain organisms of botulism. Never use canned goods that are puffed out on the ends or spurt when opened. And, never taste a suspect, canned food before it is cooked properly. You can even get botulism by smelling a contaminated food.

Third, are nausea and vomiting usually the first symptoms of botulism? Botulism's clinical manifestations relate primarily to the nervous system. Change in voice, such as hoarseness, often is the first sign noted. It is a serious intoxication (not an infection) characterized by weakness, dizziness, headache, and constipation. However, vomiting and diarrhea may occasionally initiate illness. Symptoms usually appear within 12 to 36 hours, sometimes several days after eating contaminated food. About two-thirds of patients die within three to seven days, usually from respiratory or cardiac failure or from infectious complications.







Hard Work, Sacrifices Get Fisher County Man On Top

It is a long way from Fisher County to the resort area of Yarmouth, England where Mr. and Mrs. A.R. (Reeves) Kolb and daughter Linda reside only a block away from the North Sea. Reeves is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alva Kilb, and his wife, the former Billie Lou Fancher, is the daughter of Mrs. Lee Raspberry and the late Buster Fancher.

Reeves and Billie Lou Kolb have four daughters—two sets of twins. The two oldest girls, Sherry (Mrs. Donnie McKenney) and Terry (Mrs. Wayne Holman) reside in Houston. The younger twins, Linda and Brenda, finished high school in Suffolk, England with graduation exercises in London. Brenda is now Mrs. Dave McClannahan and lives in Tampa, Florida.

From their home in Yarmouth, Reeves said in a recent letter, "I left Rotan during the dry season in 1956. At that time I was in the cattle business. I went to work as a welder's helper with Brown and Root in Houston, Texas, because I was strong, bull-headed, and willing to work I made rapid progress with the company. I never had the chance for a good education; if I had, I would probably have

turned it down. I would like to put credit for any success I have had where it belongs, and that's the strict rearing by my mother and dad. They taught me to work hard, use my own mind, and not to shirk any job.

"With Brown and Root I worked up and down the Coast of Mexico, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas. In 1957 I was sent on a job in South America as a welder. After that, I went out on every job possible. Some times I didn't really want to go, but I went in order to stay in good standing with the company. In 1964 I was sent here

to the North Sea to do a job off the Coast of Holland and Germany. This is the roughest sea in the world and the job was difficult. I had seven nationalities on board the barge, while barge, or job, superintendent, I saved the lives of three people by risking my own.

"In 1970 I was promoted to Project Manager of Heavy Offshore Construction in the North Sea plus advisory work in other places of the world. I was setting structures off Harcourt, Nigeria when war broke out. I finished my job and got out with guns poking me from all

sides. I went back later on another job and was there when it ended. None of this was very pleasant but was part of the job.

"Although I live in Great Yarmouth, England, at any time I may be in London, Scotland, Holland, Norway, Denmark, or Germany. These places are like being at home because they are only an hour or two away by plane. I travel for business, never for pleasure.

"All of my barges and equipment are in Rotterdam, Holland when not in use. At present one of my largest barges would cost about twenty-five million dollars. This barge is four hundred feet long, one hundred forty feet wide and twenty-five feet deep. Down inside, it is like a hotel. Mounted on the stern I have a crane that will lift sixteen hundred tons.

"Our work is setting structures for oil companies for deep sea drilling. Very soon we will be setting the largest structure in the world, its weight is forty thousand tons before loaded with equipment. The water depth will be four hundred twenty feet, deck level five hundred fifty-two feet and over-all height

eight hundred feet.

"I am proud that I have been able to provide well for my family, and am doubly proud to be working for Brown and Root of Houston. I have worked hard—there is no such word as can't.

"All young people should know that you have to sacrifice something to accomplish anything. I need three or four young men right now who are fresh out of college. I want to train them to be barge superintendents. This would entail a minimum of two years of hard work with lots of time at sea away from their families. It is a wonderful opportunity for young men who are not afraid of work. It takes more than an education to succeed in a job. I do not under estimate the importance of an education. My motto is, 'If I had the education WITH my determination, I believe I could turn the world over with a simple rigging'.

"I started with B&R when I was thirty and a half years of age. I am now forty-seven and I will decide in the next two years whether or not I will continue. But how do you quit a job that you have worked so hard for? All that I know is 'job' because that is all I do. When

we go somewhere my wife will say, 'No job talk', so I have to stay quiet—just sit and try to look pretty which is impossible!

"We have had our spree of hobbies. For four years I collected coins. I have approximately thirteen thousand coins from before the time of Christ to date. My wife's collecting is different—not overboard about one thing. We have about one hundred paintings. Linda collects stamps and ash trays. I have helped her with her stamps sometimes purchasing as many as three hundred when I make a trip."

Linda Kolb gives some insight into life of the city of Yarmouth. She wrote, "I will give you a summary of the social activities here. There is a Club called 'North Sea Petroleum Wives Club' which organizes things, and without it, life would be quite boring. Activities include monthly meetings, special holiday dances, bridge, golfing, children's activities and work for charity.

"There is also a men's club that arranges for barbeques and things like that. We are all active members in these clubs. Mother is president of the Bowling League and I am chairman

for children's activities.

"There are approximately 300 families living here in Yarmouth—many more than when we came in 1965. Our Club offers package tours for the American women who are members. These include local travel, Europe and the Middle East. Mother and I have been to the majority of the countries in Europe, but only to Turkey, Egypt and Israel in the Middle East. Daddy doesn't find much time to travel for pleasure."

The distance from Fisher County to Yarmouth, England for Reeves Kolb is not measured in miles alone. It is a measure of ingenuity and determination that makes a success story that could happen only in America.



COUNTY AGENT NEWS

By Richard Spencer



Higher prices for farm products and generally improved economic conditions raised farm real estate prices during the year ending Nov. 1, 1972.

Overall, the United States average per acre value of farmland increased 10 percent in the 48 contiguous states. This was well above the six percent annual average increase since 1960.

In the Southwest, increases in farmland averaged from 8 to 13 percent. Louisiana was the leader with a 13 percent gain. Texas followed with a 10 percent increase. New Mexico and Oklahoma had eight percent gains while Arizona reported a nine percent gain.

Increases of 14 percent and more were reported by 13 states, including Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri, Kentucky and Virginia.

The upward trend should continue through 1973 in response to favorable farm income and a strong nonfarm demand for farmland. The actual rate of increase will depend on credit availability and interest rates, on long-term credit.

Mark Guelker and James Park will be attending the first Texas 4-H Congress to be held in Houston July 10-13.

The Congress will focus on Citizenship with 4-H'ers from every Texas County having the opportunity to participate. The boys are both members of the County and District Council.

In early July, over 23,000 Texas farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin.

Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254

counties in Texas and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry—agriculture. This is a cooperative effort in USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.



Order For Election For Creation Of Hospital District And The Issuance Of Bonds.

The State of Texas
County of Fisher

WHEREAS, under the provisions of S. B. No. 447, Acts of the 63rd Legislature, Regular Session, 1973, provision is made for an election to be held within the area of the proposed Fisher County Hospital District upon the question of whether the Fisher County Hospital District shall be created and established with the authority to levy annual taxes, and whether said District (in the event same is created) shall be authorized to issue bonds for the purpose hereinafter set forth and in accordance with said law, it has been and is hereby determined that such election should be ordered; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COUNTY JUDGE OF FISHER COUNTY, TEXAS:

Section 1: That an election be held on the 28 day of July, 1973, which date is not less than thirty-five (35) nor more than sixty (60) days from the date of this order, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of the proposed Fisher County Hospital District, including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"Shall the Fisher County Hospital District (with boundaries being all that territory situated in Fisher County, Texas) be created and established with authority to levy taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on each \$100 valuation of all taxable property within such District subject to hospital district taxation for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's indebtedness and its maintenance and operating expenses?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"SHALL the Board of Directors of the Fisher County Hospital District (in the event the District is created) be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of ONE MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,500,000) for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping the same for hospital purposes, and for any or all of such purposes, and shall there be levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District, subject to Hospital District taxation, sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due

(providing such tax, together with all other taxes of the District shall not exceed in any one year the rate of 75 cents on each \$100 valuation), said bonds to be issued in one or more issues or issues to mature serially or otherwise not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates as in its discretion the Board of Directors shall determine?"

Section 2: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with V. A. T. S. Election Code, so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the foregoing propositions which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"The Creation of Fisher County Hospital District, providing for the levy of a tax not to exceed 75 cents on each \$100 valuation upon all taxable property situated within said District subject to Hospital District Taxation, and providing for the assumption by such District of any and all outstanding Bonds and Indebtedness heretofore issued for Hospital purposes by Fisher County and by any City or Town within said County."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"The Issuance of \$1,500,000 Bonds"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left side of each of the propositions. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

Section 3: The polling places and election officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

Precinct Number 1: Firemen's Hall, Roby, Texas; Mrs. H. T. Neve, Presiding Judge; Kyle Moore, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct Number 4: Agriculture Bldg., Roby, Texas; Mrs. P. G. Campbell, Presiding Judge; Mrs. J. T. Fegan, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct Number 6: School House, McCaulley, Texas; Mrs. W. A. Polk, Presiding Judge; Doris Reed, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct Number 10: Community Center, Rotan, Texas; Melvin Clements, Presiding Judge; Bobby Hayes, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct Number 12: Police Station, Rotan, Texas; Mrs. J. A. Finch, Presiding Judge; Lawrence Weatherman, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct Number 13: School House, Community of Hobbs; David Williams, Presiding Judge; Ivey Jones, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct Number 17: Community Center, Community of Capita; Glenn Webb, Presiding Judge; Bennie Kidd, Sr., Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct Number 18: Community Center, Longworth, Texas; Bert Killingsworth, Presiding Judge; W. P. Schubert, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct Number 22: School House, Sylvester, Texas; A. J. Hill, Presiding Judge; Faye Dozier, Alternate Presiding Judge; Special Canvassing Board: Mrs. Wayne Purley, Presiding Judge; Geneva Perkins, Alternate Presiding Judge.

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least three (3) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than three (3) additional Clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

Section 4: Absentee voting shall be conducted at the County Clerk's Office in the Courthouse, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V. A. T. S. Election Code.

ON ELECTION DAY the polls shall be open from 8:00 o'clock A. M. to 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Section 5: Said election shall be held under the provisions of Article IX, Section 9, of the Constitution of Texas, and S. B. No. 447, Acts of the 63rd Legislature, Regular Session, 1973, which Constitutional and statutory provisions shall also govern the holding of the election where in conflict with the General Laws of the State regulating elections.

Section 6: All resident qualified electors of the area of the proposed District, including those who own taxable property in the proposed District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. At said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the

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Four Local Artists Selected To Receive Recognition For Painting

In the last half of the 19th century there was a tremendous vogue for "pictures with a story". One of the most popular artists was Sir Lawrence Alma-Tadema a Dutchman by birth and an Englishman by naturalization. In 1857 he won his first recognition and a gold medal for his historical painting set in the middle ages.

Before Alma-Tadema died in 1912 he had been knighted by Queen Victoria. He was also honored by Belgian, Prussian, German, French, Spanish and Dutch governments. His paintings were popular on both sides of the Atlantic, and reproductions adorned almost every classroom on this continent between 1875 and 1914. Following this era historical paintings fell more or less into oblivion. At the present time there is a resurgence of interest in this type of subjects. Currently there is an exhibit of Alma-Tadema's paintings at the Metropolitan in New York, and the value of his paintings is on the rise.

In Texas, there is a newly organized association for the encouragement of cowboy paint-

ings as separate from merely western art. Fisher County is fortunate in having a number of artists who are interested in painting historical subjects. Four of these were chosen from the recent Art Show sponsored by the local Palette and Brush Club for recognition by the Bicentennial Committee of Anne Pettus Shelburne Chapter, DAR of Rotan. The artists were honored at a morning coffee in the home of Mrs. Whit Clark, chapter vice-regent. On exhibit at the meeting were paintings by Mrs. Jimmy Hayes of Roby, Mrs. Dale Cave of Hobbs, and Mrs. C. A. Ragan of Rotan. Another honoree, Mrs. Calvin Phillips of Hobbs, was unable to be present.

Judy Hayes showed three historical paintings. Her Still Life, "Jug and Bucket", is of an old cedar water bucket and crock jug, which only a few decades ago represented a way of life. They are now only memories and relics. Her second picture, an old time ranch house, is typical of many that were once in this area. Also shown was "Remembered", picture of an old farm house where her mother lived as a child. Mrs. Hayes prefers to paint in oils and her

favorite subjects are landscapes and character paintings. She lives in Roby with her husband, Jimmy, and three sons, Jamie, Chris and Wesley.

Doshia Cave brought two

paintings to show at the meeting. These were the "W.W. Cave House", built in 1915 in Hobbs community; and the old "Hodges House" at Claytonville. She also prefers oils for her paint-

ings. She and her husband, Dale, reside in Hobbs Community. They have two daughters, Janiece Stephenson of Abilene, and Judy Gordon of Hobbs; and one son, Windle Cave of Hobbs

and six grandchildren.

Eltha Ragan's historical painting was entitled, "Old Homestead". It is of the house where the artists spent her childhood. Mrs. Ragan has been painting for about fifteen years and considers it a way of life. Although using some historical subjects such as "Old Homestead" and the Double Mountains, she prefers impressionistic paintings. Mrs. Cave lives in Rotan.

Also honored, but unable to attend the meeting, was Marie Phillips. Paintings noted for this honor included one of hunting dogs with setting in the pecan orchard on the old J. F. Clegg farm in Long Horn Valley, a picture of a cowboy drinking from a stream while his horse stands patiently by, and one of the late Parker Kennedy on his horse. The hunting dogs and cowboy were painted for Mr. and Mrs. James Ratliff, and the picture of Parker Kennedy is property of Mrs. Kennedy. The artist and her husband, Calvin Phillips, reside in Hobbs Community.

Each of the four artists were presented a Bicentennial Certificate in recognition of their contribution in preserving local history and heritage. Presentation was made by Mrs. J. L. McCright, chairman of the bicentennial committee of Anne Pettus Shelburne Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, of Rotan.

The artist with an interest in historical painting makes a tangible contribution to preservation of America's heritage for future generations.
