In fact, an extra 335 million pounds of beef is produced in Texas every year from grasses released by the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

Edward E. Thomas of Temple, state conservationist for SCS, said the figures came from a recent study conducted by his of-

"Our survey revealed that in the last 20 years, 5.9 million acres of land has been planted to new grasses released by SCS" 'homas said. "Statewide, increased beef production is averaging 56 pounds per acre per year from these grasses. And the average climbs every year. Thomas admitted that he didn't know how much this af-

housewife. "But take away that 335 million pounds of beef every year and prices would have only one way to go-up," he stressed.

"In the past 25 years, annual beef consumption has jumped from about 64 pounds per person to 113 pounds. Meanwhile, our state's population has increased by more than 50 per cent. That adds to a gigantic increase in the demand beef. "

Without improved grasses and better conservation treatment of grassland, this demand would outstrip available supplies. Thomas said 23 grasses released by SCS are being grown in Texas. Each has its own area to adaptability and is used to fill

a specific conservation need. Two grasses Buffelgrass and King Ranch bluestem-- account

for a major share of the acreage planted. Buffelgrass was released in 1949 and has been planted on 1.8 million acres of land in Texas. King Ranch bluestem has been established on about one million acres since it was released in 1941. Other grasses that have been widely planted include Pensacola bahiagrass, El Reno sideoats grama, and weeping lovegrass.

One new grass that has become very popular with livestock producers is Selection 75 kleingrass.

"We released this grass to commercial seed growers, in cooparation with the Texas Agric tural Experiment Station, in 1969, "Thomas said. "In spite of the fact that seed are expensive and scarce, 132, 000 acres have been established. Increased beef production is

The "Seasonal Borrowing Privilege" could affect an estimated 334 rural banks in Texas. more than one-fourth of all the banks in the state. To be eligible to use the borrowing privilege, banks must be members of

the Federal Reserve System. In addition to rural areas, the change may also increase loanable funds to banks serving communities with other types of seasonal needs for funds, such as resort areas.


Due to its explosive power, gasoline merits careful handling and storage. One gallon of gasoline-vaportized in an enclosed area, mixed with the proper amount of air, and exposed to a spark--will produce an explosion equal to that of 83 pounds of dynamite. With the busy crop season at hand, farmers and farm workers

should be especially cautious when handling gasoline. Gasoline is a threat any time it is present as a vapor in the

air where flame or sparks may be present. This hazard occurs when gasoline is stored near flames and when a tractor tank is filled while the engine is still running, or the operator is smoking.

Some people have been careless in filling gasoline tanks for years without anything happening, so they don't consider these practices dangerous.

However, they have escaped injury only because the proper mixture of gasoline vapor and air wasn't present when the spark occurred.
