



"Look what you did", she said. "I didn't do anything. I cut exactly where you said to cut it", I reminded her.





**Quick Raspberry Flummery** 1 package (10-ounces) frozen raspberries, thawed 1/4 cup sugar 1/3 cup corn starch 1 jar (10-ounces) red currant 1/2 cup water 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Press thawed raspberries through sieve to remove seeds. Mix together berry puree, jelly,  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup water and sugar in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until jelly is dissolved. With a spoon, blend corn starch and  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup water. Stir into berry mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and boils 3 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in lemon juice. Pour into 1 quart mold. Chill until firm. Makes 4 to 6 servings.




