





The ideal athletic trainer is a "trouble shooter" for the squad. He is an efficiency expert in mental and physical condition. Taking trouble as a matter of course he strives continually to keep the entire squad fit to win. And he works closely with the team physician to accomplish this goal.

The trainer's problems may include sickness, ineligibility, injuries and mental states; in short, anything that interferes with the functional efficiency of the squad. He cannot predict beforehand what particular types of handicaps he will be called on to remove.

He can have no set procedure. He may need to treat blisters, or homesickness, sprains or fatigue, Charley horses or "blues." Injuries vary with the season and with the sport; for example, the cartilage injury in the knee is common to football but extremely rare in track, the "shin splints" of track are uncommon in football,

to sell wheat in December will sell December futures contracts to cover his inventory. In December, the farmer would then cancel this commitment by repurchasing the futures contracts and deliver his grain to his normal market. A forward contract is a writ-
