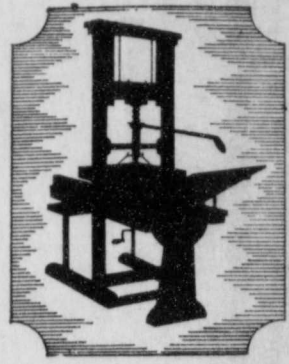

Roby Lions Pass Past Loraine, Forsan Next

A large enthusiastic crowd went to Loraine Friday night to watch the Lions defeat the Bulldogs 27-18 in their first district

game of the season.

Halfback Donnie Stephens scored three of the Lions' touchdowns, and end Frank Castor scored the other. Roby ran 74 offensive plays and Stephens

carried the ball on 32 of those plays for 131 yards. Carlos Jones ran 82 yards in 15 carries. In all, Roby totaled 229 yards rushing, but were hurt by 55 yards

Part Of National Newspaper Week

COUNTY JUDGE, MAYORS COMMENT ON NEWSPAPER

Newspaper, and their fore-runners, have been around for a long time. Probably the first newspaper was TSING PAO, a court journal published in Peking. It is thought to have started as early as the 500's and was continued until 1935. According to World Book Encyclopedia, it was first produced from carved blocks as this method of printing

was used for hundreds of years in China before the paper began publication.

In Europe, newsletters were forerunners of the newspapers. They were prepared by Roman scribes, sent to distant cities in order that businessmen and politicians could be kept informed of happenings in Rome. Another Roman news publication was a posted bulletin which was used as early as 60 B. C.

In American Colonial days news of events from other countries was slow in reaching the newspapers, and the people learned to rely on the journals as a source of information on current happenings everywhere. History of the newspapers in America makes an interesting story all its own.

Newspapers today are of two major types. The larger papers must appeal to readers over a wide area in order to survive. They carry national news and are limited in ability to present local happenings and advertising. On the other hand, there are the smaller suburban papers which give more news of the immediate communities. A county newspaper in a rural area also fits into the later category.

Three recognized leaders in Fisher County were asked for their opinions as to the function and value of a county newspaper such as ours--the combined Roby Star Record-Rotan Advance. Their responses follow.

Fisher County Judge Dwight L. Lovett, says "A local newspaper is necessary because there is no other way that pertinent information can reach as many people. We are interested in what is happening to our neighbors--that is human concern. We need to know all sides pertaining to issues vital to our well being as individuals and as a unit. Again, the local newspaper has a unique opportunity for dispersing information. With this opportunity goes a corresponding responsibility for letting the citizenry know what is going on. Newspapers are one of the few free spirits that we have remaining in our country today. I realize the importance of keeping a free press. The foresight of our Founding Fathers guaranteed this in the First Amendment to the Constitution, and we must not permit infringement on this basic right. I think that our newspaper is doing a good job of telling the local story, facing facts, and joining

hands with YOU, the people, in getting things done."

James Springer, Mayor of Rotan, states, "I feel that the vitality of the local newspaper reflects the vitality of the communities it serves; and consequently, it is imperative to support and encourage our local publication. True and accurate reporting is essential in order for the public to be aware of what is happening in their community--without facts, correct opinions and wise decisions can not be made. Commerce within the community cannot function without communication and with the public. The local newspaper is the cornerstone for this communication.

"It is easy to overlook public service, but day in and day out the local papers contribute far more than their share. We are fortunate to have dedicated journalistic personnel in our community. Our newspaper is entitled to our support."

Roby Mayor, Cecil King, says,

"I like the two former publications combined into one because I am interested in Fisher County, and it is convenient to get it all in one. The importance of a newspaper cannot be over emphasized. Today's news is tomorrow's history, and we are helping to make it. The newspaper records events, stores data, and tells the local story.

"I think that the personnel of our newspaper do a good job of getting newsworthy material and publishing it for the people of the county. All of us, being human, make occasional mistakes; and newspapermen are no exception. I have nothing but praises for the good job our local paper does for the people of Fisher County."

Newspaper Week, 1973, is a time when newspaper personnel dedicate themselves to the purposes which are responsible for survival through the ages--serving the people by presenting all facets of the news in an open and free press.

Orange Machine Plows Up Roscoe

The Rotan Yellowhammers came within 2 feet and 2 seconds of disaster last Friday night as a determined Roscoe Plowboy squad came within one touchdown of tying in the district opener for both teams.

Roscoe made two first downs in the first half of action. They made one of those first downs on their first possession. After running 7 plays on their first possession Roscoe was forced to punt. Rotan took over at their own 35 yard line. The Yellowhammers picked up 2 first downs on their first possession and gained 33 yards but were forced to punt from their 28 yard line.

On Roscoe's next possession James Goodwin stopped Randy Hendricks after a five yard gain and on the following play Host

Carillo received a Plowboy fumble. The fumble recovery led to Rotan's first score for the night. Rotan had possession on the Roscoe 10 yard line.

With fourth down and 4 yards needed for the first down Rotan faked a field goal from the 5-yard line. Mike Cade took the snap, set the ball up in position for James Goodwin to kick the field goal, but at the last second flipped back to Bruce Jones who picked up the first down. On the next play Jerry Gentry carried in from the one-yard line. Rotan led 7-0 with 3:00 minutes still remaining in the first quarter.

Roscoe almost broke the following kickoff but James Goodwin finally pulled speedy Hendricks down at the 37 yard line.

Joe Murphee, Gary Wester, and Bub Allen foiled the first two plays from scrimmage and Joey Vann saved a score as he knocked down a pass on 3rd down forcing the 4th down punting situation.

Rotan picked up four first downs on their next series but failed to put any points on the board. Johnny Hardin intercepted a pass to end the first half.

To begin the second half of action Rotan received the kick and marched a total of 64 yards for their second score of the night. Quarterback Bruce Jones completed a pass to Jerry Gentry setting up a 1-10 from the Roscoe 25 yard line. James Goodwin carried to the 21 and on the next play Jones pitched back to Jerry Gentry who threw to

Joey Vann for the score. The second score came with 8:30 left in the 3rd quarter. The kick for the extra point failed leaving the score 13-0.

On Roscoe's first play following the Yellowhammer score Earl Leach pounced on a loose ball giving Rotan the ball on the Plowboy 29 yard line. Five plays later Terry Lister intercepted a Jones pass and the momentum seemed to switch to the Plowboys.

With 3:45 seconds remaining in the 3rd quarter Gary Wester recovered a fumble at the 46-yard line that led to Rotan's 3rd score of the night. James Goodwin romped 46 yards over right tackle for the score then kicked the extra point leaving the score 20-0.

The Plowboys came alive with 2:00 left in the 3rd quarter when they hit paydirt for the first time. Joey Vann and Reid Cave stopped the attempt for a two point conversion leaving the score 20-6.

Roscoe scored again on a pass play with 9:30 left in the game bringing the score to 13-20.

Jerry Gentry picked up eight points on Rotan's next possession as he darted 57 yards to paydirt and snagged a 2-point conversion pass from Jones. Rotan increased their lead to 28-13 with 8:30 left in the game. Tim Allen spoiled another Roscoe TD by intercepting a pass in the end zone.

Jones intercepted a pass on Roscoe's next possession but a

Mrs. J. L. McCright, Bicentennial Chairman, and Miss Delila Baird, Regent of Anne Pettus Shelburne Chapter of DAR, were guests of the Scurry County Historical Survey Committee in Snyder on October 2nd. "From Buffalo... To Oil, History of Scurry County" was on display. The book, released the preceding day, was compiled by Hooper Shelton in collaboration with the county committee.

Miss Baird spoke briefly to the group concerning the purposes and activities of the National Society and its role of leadership in preparations for the celebration of our nation's two hundredth birthday. Mrs.

McCright explained the local chapter's continuing bicentennial project. She then presented a Bicentennial Certificate to Hugh Boren, Jr. on behalf of the Scurry County Historical Survey Committee for outstanding contribution to preservation and perpetuation of local history and heritage. In addition to the newly published history the committee has placed more than fifty Texas State Historical Markers at various places in the county.

Rotan Book Review Club Meets Tuesday

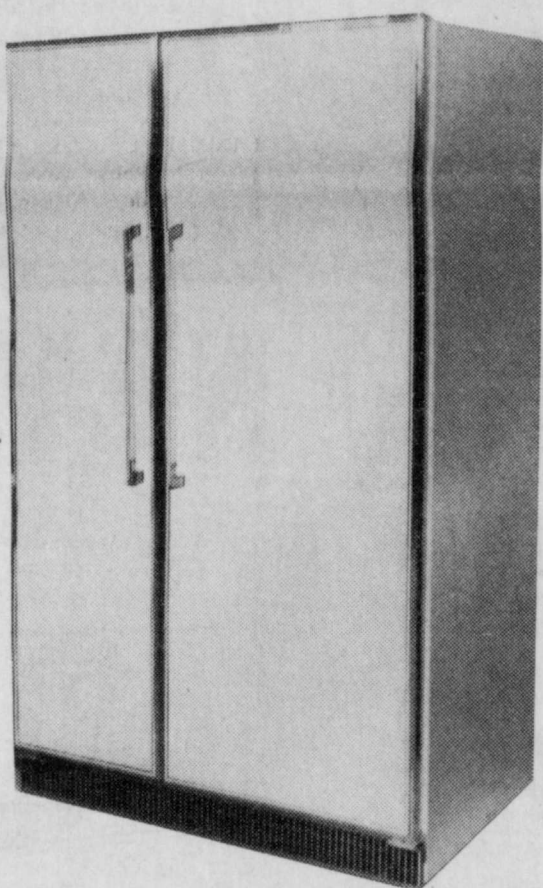

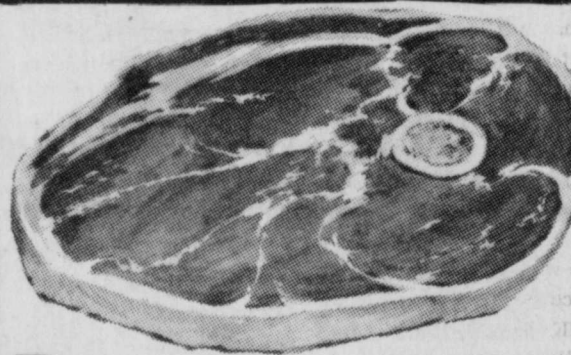

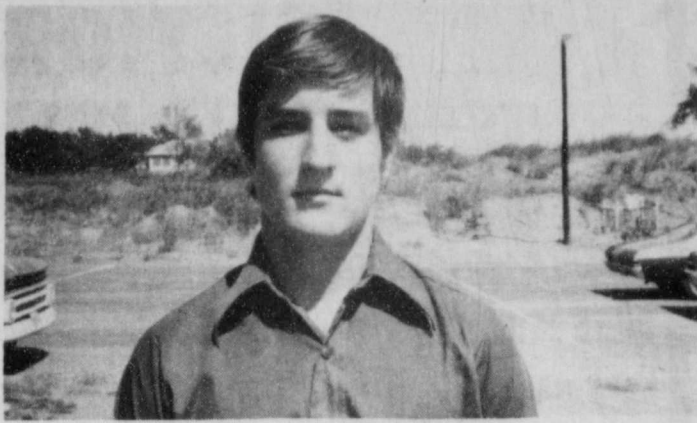

Supplemental Security Income Information

(Ed. Note: This is #2 of a series of articles on a new program under Social Security.) By R.R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager Social Security Admin., Abilene, Texas.

I'd like to go into a bit more detail as to what information we require as to the income and resources of those asking for Supplemental Security Income (SSI).

First, we will need to know about any wages, in cash or in kind, currently being paid, for present or past services. Next, we will inquire into gross and net income from self-employment.

Then, third, we look into any unearned income: Social Security, Railroad Retirement, Federal Civil Service, state or local pensions, unemployment compensation, Veterans Administration Pension or Compensation, royalties, dividends, interest, rents, workmen's compensation, private pension, insurance annuity or proceeds, cash support or expenses paid by another.

Fourth, to measure assets or resources, we'll inquire into ownership or real estate and/or other property of value. Some examples of the latter would be motor vehicles, insurance policies with a cash surrender value, cash on hand, checking account, savings and loan accounts, U.S. Savings Bonds, stocks, bonds, and other items readily convertible to cash.

Fifth, we'll go into property and valuables not readily convertible to cash such as jewelry, hobby collections, antiques, etc.

A later article will discuss the guidelines that will be used in evaluating the above and determining the number of dollars (from 1 to 130) due the individual or (from 1 to 195) due a couple. In the meantime remember that questions and inquiries in person, by mail, or telephone are welcomed by our

staff.

Sunday, October 7, through Saturday, October 13, 1973 has been Designated as NEWSPAPER WEEK in our Nation. The theme for this year's observance is, "Newspapers: Your Foundation For Free Choice".

Newspaper Week affords an opportunity each year for citizens to pause briefly for a critical analysis of the services performed by your local press, and for the personnel of the newspaper to evaluate their role in reporting pertinent information to the people they serve. Newspapers are, first of all, partners with the public. They are the voice of the people. YOUR newspaper places emphasis on LOCAL news

and strives to present a true picture of what is happening in the community. People can be depended upon to make right decisions when they have all of the facts, and it is the responsibility of the newspaper to provide facts when there is occasion for civic action. This is truly your foundation for free choice.

During CONSTITUTION WEEK, September 17 through 23, many newspapers throughout the nation stressed the importance of the preservation of the freedoms we are guaranteed under our Constitution. Not least among these is the concept of a free press as a foundation for a free country. This

concept was expressed by Sir William Blackstone before the American Revolution when he stated in substance that liberty of the press is essential for a free state. He stressed that there should be no previous restraints upon publication, but not freedom from censure when in error.

The Founding Fathers of the United States knew that there were fears of democracy as well as of despotism. The best cure they found for these fears was the guarantee of freedom of speech and freedom of the press. James Madison drafted the first of the Ten Amendments which came to be known as "The Bill of Rights". This states,

"Congress shall make no law abridging the freedom of speech or of the press."

Thomas Jefferson cautioned, "Our liberty depends on the freedom of the press and that cannot be limited without being lost." Without freedom of the press people would not have the information to participate intelligently in a democratic form of government. Without a free press freedom could not survive. The liberty of the press, guaranteed by the First Amendment in the Bill of Rights, carries a corresponding responsibility. It requires the printing of information which individuals may or may not want divulged. The press owes the people absolute

honesty, a look at all sides of an issue, and responsible reporting.

Nobody will deny that newspapers play an important role in the American way of life. So far they have been able to stay free of such government regulations as FCC which plagues the news programming of television. By its nature it is in a better position than any other media to keep the people informed on vital happenings.

In every corner of America dedicated men and women are working on newspapers ranging in size from our weekly county paper to the largest daily in the nation. Each labors seriously for the community in a variety of

ways. They do it because they believe in America and its Constitutional form of government. They realize that if freedom of the press is lost, none will be free for long.

America approaches its bicentenary. The year 1976 marks the 200th anniversary of our nation. This makes us aware of the foresight of the men who made the concept of a free press the foundation for a free country. It is estimated that eight out of any ten persons in the United States read a newspaper each day. The public's esteem of the press will never decline as long as the press never loses its faith and esteem of itself. The liberty en-

joyed by the press belongs to the people. Newspaper people have a personal commitment of both work and service. Newspaper Week 1973 is the occasion they will use for renewal and re-emphasis of that commitment as they continue to be the foundation for free choice of a free people. The newspaper today is an institution with a creed, a mission, and dedication. It is a faithful partner joining hands with the people to get things done.

PSAT TEST

This fall Juniors at Rotan High School will have the opportunity to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) as an important step in making college plans.

This test, to be given at Rotan High School on Tuesday morning, October 30, is designed to measure the student's verbal and mathematical aptitude--two abilities that research has shown to be important in doing college work.

In addition to helping find out more about the student and his abilities, the PSAT/NMSQT can lead him to other opportunities. The PSAT/NMSQT Student Bulletin, available from school counselor, Pat Hamric, describes:

--how to enter the competition for scholarships administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

--how you can enter your name in the College Board's Student Search Service (SSS) files so you can get information from colleges that may be looking for students like you.

To help interpret and make the best use of the student's test scores, the student will receive a booklet called "Your PSAT/NMSQT Scores" with his score report which will explain how to estimate SAT scores.

Then, by using such College Board services as The College Handbook and College Locator Services, the student can compare himself with enrolled students at hundreds of colleges and universities as well as find out his chances of getting into, and succeeding at the college of his choice.

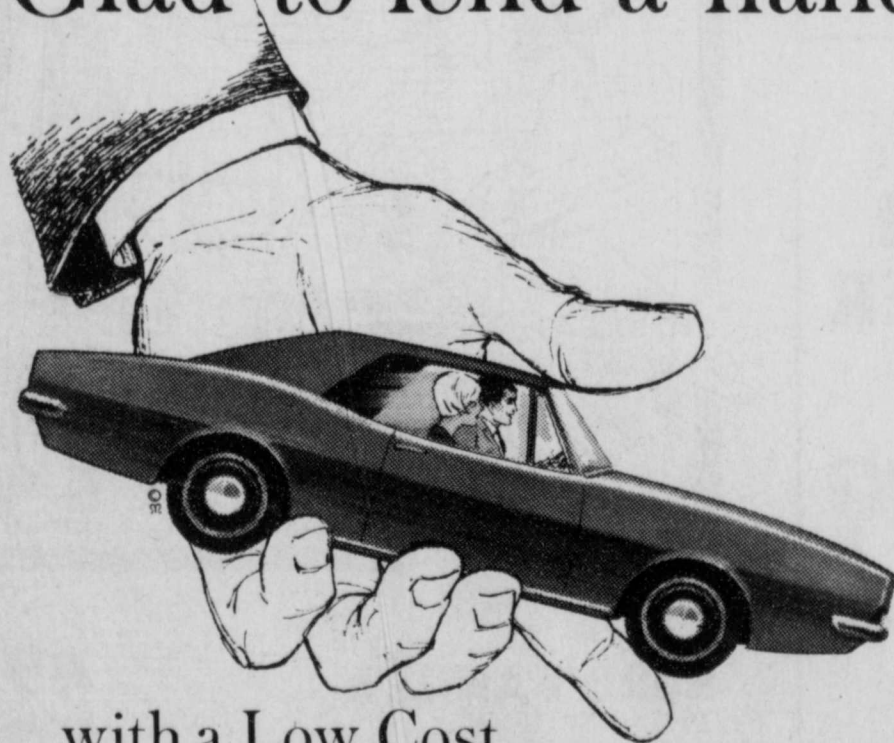
