A smoky little Christmas ...

Mississippi state officials under fire for putting up an artificial holiday tree in the Capitol in Jackson had to deal with real flames after the silk branches caught fire.

The fake tree hadreplaced the real thing amid concern that a live tree was a fire hazard.

The ornately decorated fake tree caught fire and filled the nearly 100-year-old building with smoke, interrupting legislative meetings and forcing the evacuation of about 75 Capitol workers, legislators and reporters for several hours.

There were no injuries and no serious damage. Fire officials blamed the fire on electrical problems with lights at the base of the tree.

"She fell in such a way that she landed lengthwise with the track in a sort of depressed area," said a spokesman for the Bay Area Rapid Transit.

James Belcher, 46, was booked for attempted murder after witnesses said he pushed Fulcher.

Mules, Lady Mules leave mark in tournaments By RONN SMITH

Editor Both the Mules and the Lady Mules made their presence known

in tournaments over the weekend. The Lady Mules won the Mean Green Classic at New Deal and the boys took the consolation bracket in the I-27 Tournament (games played at Abernathy, Hale Center, Idalou and Shallowater).

En route to their title, the Lady Mules swamped the New Deal jun-

ior varsity and Tahoka before taking a hard-fought title win over the New Deal varsity, 44-36.

The boys' start in the I-27 Tournament was delayed a day by bad weather. Then, when play began, they were tripped up by Hale Center 58-35 but roared back to win a big one — 45-40 over the Dimmitt Bobcats.

That could have been the high point of any tournament, as Coach Ralph Mason said it was the first time Muleshoe had beaten Dimmitt in 27 years.

But the Mules weren't through. Before they came home, they dumped Happy — a Class A playoff team last spring that returned all its players this fall — by a 50-35 tally and then buried Whiteface in the consolation final, 94-57.

Girls' coach Shana Simms said, "We played pretty well all three games. In the championship game, we probably slacked off a little in the first quarter, but the girls came back and did very well.

In their tournament opener (Thursday), they downed the New Deal JV 73-21 behind a 25-point showing by Lindsey Field.

Field got a lot of help from Myndi Heathington (15 points) and Britni Gartin (10). "Everybody got to play a lot" against the JV team, Simms said.

School officials air frustration over cleanup

Muleshoe school officials aired their frustration Monday over work done by the consultants working on the cleanup near a leaky underground storage tank.

One of the main complaints was about testing allegedly done three years ago and only recently submitted to the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission.

"The TNRCC doesn't care about the consultant; the consultant doesn't care about our money. It just amazes me how they can spend thousands and thousands of our tax dollars," Board President Cindy Purdy said.

Superintendent David Hutton said the standard for potable water on benzene contamination is 5 parts per billion, and one well near the old underground tank has tested well above that. He said the cleanup includes daily bailing of that well, a process he estimated cleans up about a pint of fuel a day.

"If that product is migrating to that well, then if we can't remove all the free product, we'll have to irrigate from city water or some other source," he said, adding that school officials believe the consultant has not been doing a good job.

Discussion indicated that the district pays the consultant when the on-site work is done and then is to be reimbursed for those expenditures — but is just now being reimbursed for work done in 1996.

Hutton said recent meetings appear to have been productive, adding that state Rep. Pete Laney's office has been helpful. Hutton also said that at one meeting he asked why the TNRCC had not been more responsive in suggesting ways of dealing with the problem, one TNRCC staff member gave him a personal beeper number to use to get results in the future.

In other business, assistant superintendent for instruction Adrian Meador gave the board an update on possible advanced placement classes the district may begin offering through South Plains College.

The Y2K scenario is ripe for fraud opportunities. Consumer and business groups remind the public to be aware of possible scams that are sufacing as the big day approaches:

 Opportunists looking for investors to finance phony Y2K

· Financiers offering "safe" investments that supposedly are not subject to Y2K problems.

· Phony security systems that offer to protect valuables or to "house sit" during New Year's celebrations.

· Consultants or businesses selling services or software that aren't Y2K compliant or don't fix Y2K problems as promised. Some products reportedly are designed to create changeover failures.

· Solution providers pitching miracle Y2K solutions at prices that sound too good to be true (and usually are).

• Retailers charging exorbitant prices for serves and so-called survival supplies (i.e., generators, bottled water, candles, communication devices, canned foods, "guaranteed" access to fuel, etc.)

A key piece of evidence in the case was a stuffed toy duck found in Rowton's car shortly after the slaying and found in a sealed box at the Bailey County Sheriff's Office in October, after jury selection had begun in Rowton's trial.

Senior District Judge Jack Young presided over the trial. Witnesses included Sheriff Coy Plott and Judge Marilyn Cox.

Weather may get frightful, but catalogs are delightful

OK, so there are days when the weather just doesn't make you want to get outside and dig - or anything else.

But there are still nice days, and things that need doing in the garden when the weather is good.

First, though, let me once again stress that advice from experts isn't always gospel. In checking one of my guidebooks, Successful Gardening Month-by-Month by the Sunset magazine people, I discovered a real booboo.

While the Sunset books are about as reliable as any, this particular book advises people who live right here in our area to start their tomato and pepper plants in December.

You'll recall (for those who read the papers that ran it) my column of Thanksgiving week advised planting those things in January IF you are prepared to give them considerable protection once you set them outside. Otherwise, plant in February or even March.

The Sunset books says that by planting them in December, they'll be ready to transplant by February. They certainly will be ready to transplant by then, but we'll be facing two more months of snow and hard freezes.

Checking the book more closely, it seems that in this one instance



they lumped us in with Phoenix, which doesn't usually get a hard freeze all winter.

Other than that little faux pas, the book offers these suggestions:

• If you haven't already mulched bulb and perennial beds, it's not too late — also around shrubs that may not be completely winter-

• Catch the temperature above freezing and water any dry spots in the garden. Well-watered plants survive severe freezes much better than stressed ones. (This can certainly be critical with our dry winds in addition to cold temperatures.);

• It's a good idea to protect the trunks of newly planted trees and shrubs - not only against sunscald, but if you live without a yard fence you need to protect these plants from gnawing by rabbits until the bark gets tough. There are plastic tubes on the market to fulfill both functions, and also to protect evergreens from drying winds. If you just need varmint protection, a circle of wire around the plant will work;

· On a clear day when the temperature is above freezing, spray fruit trees and roses with dormant oil to kill overwintering insect pests. These oils can be mixed with lime sulfur or fixed copper.

In addition to the magazine's suggestions, I would say that if you still have spring-flowering bulbs that haven't been planted, get them in the ground! Remember that with the warm weather we had last winter, the crocus were blooming by mid-January — just four weeks from now. The bulbs wouldn't have time to develop much of a root system and put on much of a show by then, but at least you'd have them established for next year.

Also, for any type of evergreen but especially broad-leafed species such as hollies, mahonias or (if anyone is growing them here) the evergreen types of azaleas and rhododendrons), apply an antidessicant.

This is a substance that retards moisture loss, and it will be a huge help to these plants in surviving our dry winter winds.

Anti-dessicants may not be available at smaller garden centers, but they are available locally

if you search them out:

Speaking of the garden center, now is the time to make sure you have bone meal, so you'll be ready to apply some to bulb beds and peonies during January. Many other plants also benefit from this slowrelease fertilizer.

Let the games begin! The spring seed catalogs have begun to arrive.

Now, I'm an advocate of buying seeds and plants locally when they're available. I know that the big mail-order houses have 800 numbers now, and you can call them for authoritative information on any garden topic. I know that sometimes people in local businesses don't have first-hand experience with every plant and may not be able to give you the answer you're hunting. I also know that a \$5 seed purchase isn't going to make or break a business. But if we ALL make \$5 seed purchases from our local garden center ... you see the point.

That said, there are some seed catalogs that are worth having whether you buy from them or not. Some have excellent growing instructions; some are like encyclopedias or reference works.

One of the latter comes from Thompson and Morgan, P.O. Box 1308, Jackson, N.J. 08527.

The selection of vegetable seeds

is pretty much "normal," but when it comes to flowering plants including even some trees and shrubs — for temperate climates, this is one of the biggest seed sources in the world. It was originally a British company, but opened American offices several years ago.

If you can claim to be familiar with more than three-fourths of the flowers in this catalog, I'll buy you a Coke.

Alene Bryant and Betty Jo Davis, weight recorders, were present for the weigh-in and to give the results.


The best loser was Mollie Davis, with Sánchez as first runner-up. Tying for second runner-up were Cherryl de Graffenreid and Joline Franklin.

The Christmas party for TOPS No. 34 will be held at the next meeting — at 5 p.m. Dec. 16 at the same site.



"We held them to four points in the second half, so we really stressed defense," she added.

Double-figure performances included Clements, again with 26 points (and 13 rebounds), Mason with 16 points and Darrell Lewis with 13 points.






