Your Home

Do you have any rooms that are hard to heat? There is a furnace fan on the market which can correct that trouble, and the nice part of it is that instead of increasing your fuel cost, it will actually save you money.

This fan is not the ordinary blower type, but is a large-bladed four propeller device which is placed in the top of your warm air furnace. It both pulls and pushes the air—pulling the hot air off the furnace, so that it is not wasted in heating up the basement, and then pushing it through the ducts so that every room gets more heat, faster.

What is known as a limit control is part of the installation, it being an automatic instrument which turns the fan on and off according to a pre-determined temperature setting in the furnace hood. This automatically prevents the furnace from over-heating, due to carelessness or any other abnormal condition.

Installation of this fan in your furnace will give you a practical forced-heat and air-conditioning heating plant, equal in results to the more elaborate automatic heating systems costing several times as much. All of the circulating air is filtered, taking out all dust. In the heat of summer it can be operated as a central cooling fan, with your registers acting as cooling blowers.

The ADA has a national program calling for (1) expanded research to find the causes of and new means of preventing dental diseases; (2) dental health education for all; and (3) dental care projects for every community, particularly for all children.




