A few days after reading this brief essay on luck and work, I was the weed-end guest of a friend at his shooting lodge. There above the immense fireplace extending across the end of the living room

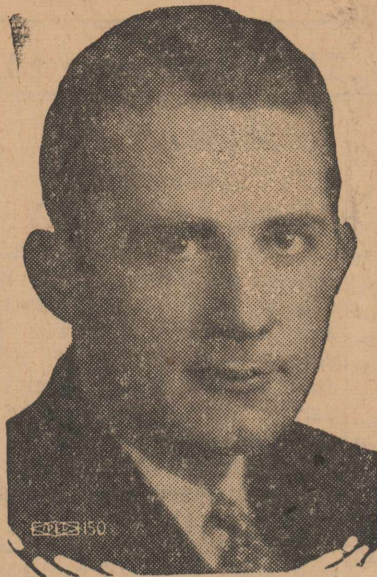
was another motto. It seemed to go hand in hand with the one seen a few days before. It read:

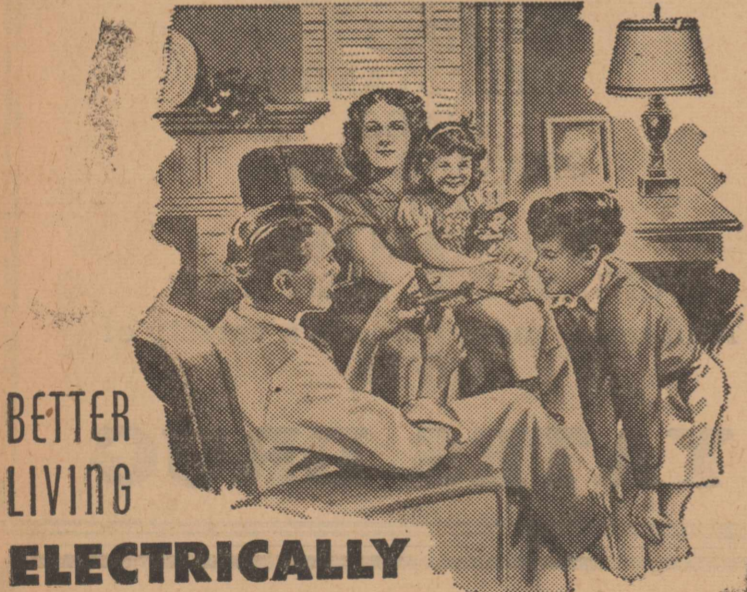

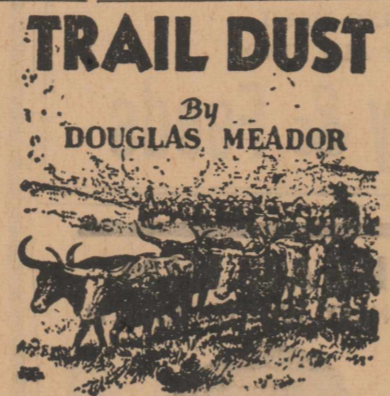

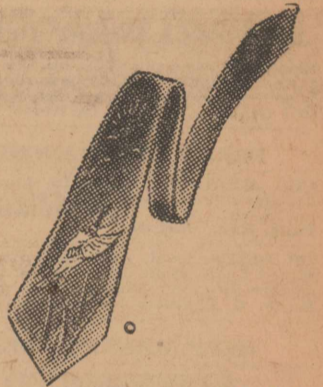
