Mr. Vance said that while early potatoes doubtless would be welcomed by peoples abroad, their low keeping quality makes it impracticable to try to ship them. Those spoiling in transit wastes valuable shipping space which could have been filled with wheat and other foods of good keeping qualities, he added.

WASHINGTON, June 26. - Congressional conferees agreed Tuesday on a full year's extension of price control after eliminating Senate provisions which would have ended controls on meat, poultry, dairy products, petroleum and tobacco Sunday at midnight. The bill went to the house Wednesday for ratification.

Clearing up other major points which had been in disagreement, the joint committee decided on:

Holding subsidies of all kinds to \$1,000,000,000 and ending food subsidies next April 1.

Creation of a decontrol board, independent of OPA, which could overrule the price administrator or the secretary of Agriculture if they failed to remove controls from specific commodities.

Modification of the Wherry acounts which were effective last January.

Army Order Stresses Fats, Oils Savings

Instructions put out recently by the Army Service Forces, indicates the renewed efforts of the Army to do what every American housewife is now being urged to do-conserve and re-use all fats and oils to help feed starving millions.

"Every source of fats, greases, bones, and meat scraps will be conserved. Those not used for cooking will be salvaged and sold to renderers," the Army says.

"Until fats and oils are again in full production in former Japanese and German occupied territories, the present acute shortage will continue. Spent cooking fats will be strained off and saved in a separate container. Under no circumstances will they be thrown in the sinks or with the garbage.

"Bones and meat scraps of every kind, both raw and cooked will be saved.

"Production, based on man per month (mess count) at supervised messes that strictly observed regulations, shows that the amount of fat salvage per man per month is one pound of cooked grease, 2.35 pounds of bones and meat scraps, and fourtenths of a pound of trap grease."

The early believers were to tarry until they received the Holy Spirit. We need only yield to him for he is present with every believer-the indwelling One-ready to empower and use us.

We need a real revival of the Holy Spirit power in the church, and we need it now. If the church as a whole will not yield to God. let us do so as individuals that we may be witnesses with power.

God is looking for men. He has always honored those who in faith have obeyed his command. The whole history of church and missionary endeavor bears eloquent testimony to that fact.

III. Glad Soul-Winning (Acts 2:46, 47; 5:42).

There are a number of things in this passage. There is the fine fellowship of the believers in the early church. We also note that they were regular in their attendance at the temple. They preached and taught both in the temple and at home. But the significant thing which we wish to note now is that it all resulted in the salvation of souls.

The Lord added to the church "day by day those that were saved," for such is the proper read-ing of verse 47. Day by day souls were won for Christ and added to the church. Why do we not have more churches of that kind today? The church, which is so much the

center of life for Christians, is not as well understood as it should be. We have come to regard it as just one organization among many competing for the attention and interest of men, when it is really a divine, living organism established by Christ as his body and representing him in this world.

The church is made up of those who are saved (v. 47), those who have received the word by faith and witnessed a good confession of their faith in Christ (v. 41). This is a fact to be remembered in a time when there is so much laxness in receiving members into the church. It is not a religious or social club. It is not a rallying place for those who wish to work for some economic, political, or social project. It is not a gathering of good people who wish to share common interests.

The church needs to cleanse its rolls of all unbelievers, all hangerson, and to get back to the purity which it had when only those were received who were manifestly "add-ed" by the Lord (v. 47).

Disabled Vets Producers

Disabled veterans on occupational therapy farms operated in connection with 31 veterans' administration neuropsychiatric hospitals will this year attempt to surpass their last year's record produc-tion of 9,857,000 pounds of foodstuffs valued at \$948,676.

The higher goal set for this year will aid in conserving other foods for feeding the hungry in Europe, but it will also furnish thousands of patients in VA hospitals with fresh vegetables, fruits, eggs, milk and meat. Although the agricultural activities on VA farms are operated primarily to provide beneficial therapy for patients, all of the food grown is used in hospital kitchens and none is wasted.

During the past year, more than 2,000 patients in the 31 VA hospitals spent a total of 2,263,000 man hours cultivating gardens and tending cattle, sheep, hogs and chickens. They provided the dietetic departments of the hospitals with a total of thousands of pounds of badly-needed food products.

The largest farm is at Chili-cothe, Ohio, where 1,444 acres is devoted to truck gardening, wheat and barley crops and pasture for dairy herds.

Questions and Answers

Q. My husband was killed in action on Luzon and I have had several tell me I may be entitled to get a loan to build a home under the G.I. bill of rights. Is this true? And if it is not, then I as one of the many widows of this war think we should be able to. I have three children and have to pay \$48 per month for rent which I could be putting into my own home.-Mrs. M. S., Littlefield, Texas. S.

A. As a widow you are not entitled to loan privileges under the G.I. bill. You are, however, entitled to (1) all your husband's back pay, plus a gift of six months pay from the army, (2) a pension for life for yourself and a pension for each of your three children until they are of age. Unless you have already done so, you should make application immediately for back pay allowances to claims division. general accounting office, office of

T WILL be interesting to note what will happen when baseball returns to a more normal way of life. We took up this somewhat

twisted matter with Bill Dickey; the Yankees' new manager.

"This has been one of the strangest seasons I've ever run across," the loose-joined "Arkansas Traveler" said. "Suppose, for example, we had known back in

Florida during our **Bill Dickey** training season that

the Yankees were going to get good pitching. That was supposed to be our weakest spot because so many of our men were troubled with bad arms. We would have been picked as one of the surest things of the year, rated well in front.

"But suppose we had known that after six weeks of play our team batting would be around .240 with such fine hitters as Joe DiMaggio and most of the others hitting below .260. Then, we would have been picked far down the list. Hard hitting has been the Yankees' main factor in winning ball games, but as a team we haven't been hitting a half lick."

"You don't think this hitting weakness will last?" we asked.

"I certainly don't," Bill said. "No pitchers are going to keep such hard hitters as DiMaggio, Kellerwho has been our best-Stirnweiss, Etten, Lindell, Henrich, Gordon and the others bottled up much longer. Those fellows can hit. They are naturals. I happen to know that Joe DiMaggio was banking on this season being his best year. I've never seen any one work harder. or try harder or train harder. His fielding and his home-run hitting have been exceptional. I don't believe this slump in hitting can last.

"We may have more trouble with our pitching, with so many really good pitchers bothered with bad arms or backs, but we are due to get much better hitting-and we'll have to get it if we are to win again. We can't win the pennant the way we're going now.'

Dickey and the Red Sox

We asked Manager Dickey what he thought of the Red Sox and the chance the Yankees and other American League clubs had of clos-

ing the gap. "I'll tell you exactly what I think of the Red Sox," Bill said. "I never like to underestimate an opponent. In my opinion, they have a firstclass manager in Joe Cronin, who failed in the past because the winning material wasn't there. Cronin upset isn't going to lose any pennant for his club. Joe will do his share.

Secretary of Labor "Laundry Lew" Schwellenbach is a patient man. He learned the virtue of patience as a Spokane laundryman when he had to handle customers' complaints about frayed collars and lost shirts. Shortly after the talks began, Schwellenbach called on the unions, the shipping people, and government officials to say nothing which would arouse feelings and imperil the negotiations. The very next morning, however, Lew's boss in the White House did exactly the opposite by announcing plans to use the navy to break the strike. This, of course, put the ship owners in a favored position. They were no longer under any compulsion to settle before the strika deadline. When patient Laundry Lew heard this, even he hit the ceiling.



Q. My husband has been in service 16 months, 5 months in the states and overseas 11 months. We have one child. What I want to know is does he get two points for the 11 months overseas. Do they get two points a month now? -Mrs. F. C. T., Marshall, N. C. A. He receives one point a month for each month of service and an additional point for each month overseas, up to September 2, 1945.

Q. My husband has been in service 18 months and overseas 10 months. He has 42 points. All the boys who went with him have already come back. If my husband is still in the hospital, he has been there over 3 months. Do you think he will get home soon?-Mrs. O. C., Tishomingo, Miss.

A. I have no way of knowing how long he will be in the hospital. If he has 40 points, he should be home by June 30, 1946, unless he is detained for some other cause.

Q. I am a widow with four children, my husband died in 1916 during World War I. His death was not connected with the war. I have reared my children from the time of his death until now, 30 years, without an income of any kind. He died before he was enlisted in World War I. Am I entitled to a widow's pension?-Mrs. K. M. C., Union Church, Miss.

A. No, since your husband was never in the army, you are not entitled to a veteran's pension.

Q. My husband was discharged from the army November 21, 1945. He had a war bond coming at that time and hasn't received it as yet. Where should I write to find out about this?-Mrs. J. L. C., Lewisport, Ky.

A. Write to war bond division, S. army, 4300 Goodfellow blvd., St. Louis 20, Mo.

Q. My husband was drafted into the army in August, 1944. He landed in India in August, 1945, and is still there, not expecting to be home any time soon. How many points does he have?—Mrs. M. D. P., Blue Springs, Miss.

A. As of September 2, 1945, your husband had 13 months' service, or 13 points, plus 1 month overseas or an additional point. If he has no children and no decoration or battle stars, he then has 14 points. No, he will not continue to earn points after September 2, 1945, the army now considering length of service. Q. I am the mother of a service-

"The Red Sox have the strongest team they ever have shown. They have a fine infield and a strong out-They have had the hitting field. and the pitching-and I honestly think that so far they have out-hustled the rest of us.

"This doesn't mean," Dickey said with a grin, "that I am picking the Red Sox to win the pennant. I think we can catch them, but I know we can't wait too long. They are too good to be given any big lead, and I believe the Yankees are just beginning to realize this. They have been strong on both offense and defense and they've fine spirit.

'What about the rest of the league so far?" we asked.

"You can't overlook Washington," he said. "This is a good, steady, consistent club all along the line. You also will see Detroit get much better pitching than the Tigers have known thus far. Their pitching has been like the Yankees' hitting-too far below normal to remain that way. When their pitching gets as hot as it can get, and they begin to hit nearer their stride, you'll see a big change."

Dickey, who has the full support of Larry MacPhail, and who has enjoyed so many years of training under Joe McCarthy-the manager Bill ranks far above all others in baseball—is giving everything he has to the job of making good. With a cool head and a stout heart with which to work, he doesn't expect to pick up all the needed managerial details in a few days or in a few

Bill has the complete affection and respect of his players, and it is my opinion that he will make few mistakes in directing up to the hilt the material he has at hand. Like other great catcher-managers-Bill Carrigan and Mickey Cochrane, for example-he has been in the best spot to know what is going on, especially in the direction of a pitching staff that still is uncertain.

No one knows better than Larry MacPhail and Bill Dickey that the Yankees need one or two more ballplayers to carry anything like an even chance to overtake Boston.

Finally, he sent Assistant Sec. of Labor John Gibson to the White House with a personal appeal to the President to refrain from prejudicing the negotiations. Truman agreed, issued a statement saying the government hoped for settlement, did not want to be put in the position of breaking the strike.

CABINET CONFIRMATIONS

American history shows that Presidents of the United States have had more difficulty with senate confirmation of the secretary of the treasury than any other cabinet post. In all, 10 different votes have been cast by the senate defeating confirmation of cabinet members.

The first of these was Andrew Jackson's fight to appoint 'Roger B. Taney as secretary of the treasury. Jackson was defeated.

Second senate battle was Presi-Tyler's attempt to appoint dent Caleb Cushing as secretary of the treasury. Tyler forced three different votes in the senate to confirm Cushing, but lost each time by large majorities. Tyler also had trouble appointing David Henshaw as secretary of the navy, and James M. Porter as secretary of war.

The next senate fight over cabinet confirmation occurred in the administration of Andrew Johnson, when he attempted to appoint Henry Stanbery, as attorney general, but was defeated.

Calvin Coolidge also lost a fight to appoint Charles B. Warren as attorney general.

The first vote on Warren was the famous occasion when Vice Pres. Charley Dawes failed to be present. His excuse was that he was napping and his alarm clock failed to go off. However, Coolidge, who never got along with Dawes, always suspected that his vice president wanted to avoid being put on the spot by a tie vote, which he, as presiding officer, would have had to break. * * *

CAPITAL CHAFF

Six-foot, eight-inch high governorelect Jim Folsom of Alabama is going to be a political force to be reckoned with. He has six months to plan his strategy before taking office, and one move he will make is to spend one month in Atlanta as a guest of Georgia's hard hit-ting Gov. Ellis Arnall. 



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
