small kitchen a tall stool gives one rest. Much of the work in the kitchen can be done while sitting. If possible a stool with a back should be obtained."

"Kitchen cabinets should be of a height to suit the one who is to use the working space most," said Mrs. Ellison. "If possible all working centers should be grouped as to use. All materials used for baking should be located near the stove. A V or L shaped kitchen saves most steps and makes things more compact. Plenty of storage place is necessary. Putting everything in its place when finished with using it, keeps the kitchen neat.

Furniture in a living room should be arranged in groups. A well lighted place should be selected for a reading center. Comfortable chairs are necessary so one may relax and rest as one reads. Good lights are necessary for night reading. There should be a visiting center with comfortable chairs. Small tables are useful in a living room and add to the appearance as well. Too much bric-a-brac is not desirable. Too much heavy furniture should not be used in a small room. Rearranging the different centers helps to make the room more interesting. This was discussed by Mrs. Luther Browder.

Bronze Turkeys Grow White Feathers

Some Texas producers are concerned because their growing young bronze turkeys are developing many white feathers. Low protein feeding, not breeding is the cause. As a preventative, the adding of five pounds or more of meat and bone scraps, or soybean meal, to each 100 pounds of the feed given the birds, is advised.

As the turkeys molt just before reaching maturity if this is done no off color feathers will appear.

A GHOST RISES

Texas is noted as a land of experiments in colonization and now and then echoes are heard from an enterprise to capitalize the land and climate which began with high hopes in the distant years but crumbled when the unpredictable Texas weather took over. The ghosts of a long-ago settlement in the extreme southeastern corner of Lavaca County are stirring, says County Agricultural Agent G. C. King.

More than 35 years ago, he relates, several hundred families were brought down from the north to colonize the region. Each bought five to 10 acre plots of land and planted orange orchards. A town was laid out, a hotel and a number of homes were built, and a high school erected "In fact, Providence City at one time had a population of 500 persons."

Things went well for a few years, but one winter a bitter blue norther blew in and killed the orange trees. As a result most of the settlers became discouraged and returned north where winter was winter and crops grew only in summer.

As time moved on experience taught that successful farming was in the soil and not citrus. Accordingly, says Mr. King, the owners now are sinking 10-inch wells about 900 feet deep and plan to put most of the land in this one-time settlement into rice this fall.

"It will be the first rice grown in a few miles across the border in Lavaca County," he explains, "but Colorado County rice has done well.

due to manufacturers' backlog of orders for 80 per cent extraction flour. Since there is a much larger scale market for the regular flour than there is for whole wheat, manufacturers are naturally catering to the larger demand.

Probably another reason for the present shortage is that manufacturers produce smaller quantities of whole wheat flour during the summer months. It spoils rather quickly in hot weather and the demand drops at that time.

Now that wheat is becoming readily available, the backlog of

regular flour orders should soon be reduced to the extent that millers will take care of the smaller demand for the whole wheat product.

One million of the World War II veterans who left farms already have or will return to the farms, the Veterans Administration reports. Ninety per cent of these expect to be farm operators.

There are times when your furnace probably acts sluggish, as though it were lying down on the job. You might blame it on the weather or on the type of fuel you are burning, but actually it more than likely would be because of your furnace having a cold in its head. In other words, its breathing channel becomes clogged up.

In the process of combustion, soot and fly ash are given off. They settle in the "head," or radiator, of your furnace, thereby obstructing the flow of air that the fire needs for efficient burning. The furnace is then in distress, but not being human it cannot tell you so.

That is why it is necessary to give your furnace a thorough clean-out every so often, at least once a year. The only way to relieve the clogged-up condition is to draw the soot and ash out by suction, the same as you draw the dirt out of your rugs with a vacuum cleaner. There are heating firms that have special equipment for this purpose.

Of course, the ideal solution is to have a furnace that has no concealed radiator in which to collect the soot and ash. Your next furnace can be of that kind, for there is one now on the market. But until you make the change, remember that a clogged head in your furnace costs you both grief and money. Keep it in good working condition by giving it a good cleaning-out before you have need for its heat this winter.
