## Car Parts Dealers May Buy Repairs October 28-29

J. M. Rodgers, representative of the War Assets Administration, Fort Worth, will make a two-day visit to Amarillo on October 28 and 29, to familiarize automotive and parts dealers, veterans, service garage owners and fleet owners with surplus automotive parts the WAA has for sale.

Rodgers has for the interested parties, a National Consolidated Inventory, giving the number, name and price of all surplus automotive parts available in the entire United States.

Repair shops and garages receive a 50 percent discount from the manufacturers current list price; fleet owners get a 45 percent discount; dealers, both automotive and parts, receive a 55 percent discount, and wholesalers and distributors receive a 75 percent discount. Veterans in any of the above categories get a 75 percent discount.

All purchasers, except veterans, must place a minimum order of \$500 net. Veterans in an emergency, can buy automotive parts without any minimum.

## Services Sunday For Those Who Died At Sea

Special flower ceremonies with contributions of single blooms from each donor will again mark memorial services on Navy Day, Sunday, October 27, for all persons who died at sea during World War II, Eighth Naval District Headquarters announced.

Participants were asked to send one blossom or bud, preferably wild or home grown, and to avoid sending flowers purchased for more than a modest sum.

Flowers received at designated ports before midnight, Saturday, October 26, will be put aboard Navy ships or planes and scattered over the oceans in expression of the sentiments of a grateful world.

Appropriate all-faith services will be held before the take-off and ships and planes will proceed out of sight of land to scatter their floral offerings, the Navy said.

Sponsored by the Navy League, official sponsor of Navy Day, the ceremony will be observed in the continental limits and in Alaska, Pearl Harbor, Guam, Manila, San Juan, the Canal Zone, and the Virgin Islands. Flowers from the United States will not be delivered to ports overseas, since ports outside the continental limits have been designated for local observances only, the Navy explained.

Designated ports are Moobile, Alabama, Corpus Christi, Texas, and Pensacola, Florida for the 8th Naval District. Blossoms should be sent in care of the Senior U. S. Navy Chaplain at the closest of the three ports, district officials said.

Loss of weight is the greatest damage that heel flies do to beef cattle. They lose weight by running from the pests or by refusing to feed and standing in water to protect themselves from the flies. The grubs spend seven to eight months tunneling around in an animal's body. From 10 to 15 percent more feed is required to fatten a grubby steer than a healthy animal, and two pounds of choice meat are lost each time a grub-infested steer is slaughtered. Grubs also ruin hides which are valuable

is the most effective insecticide against the cattle grub, and it can be applied either as a dust for small herds, or as a spray for large herds. An effective treatment, say the entomologists, consists of spraying the backs of the cattle with a mixture of seven and a half pounds of five percent rotenone for each 100 gallons of water.

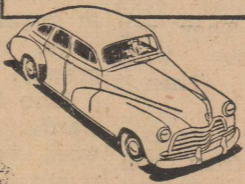

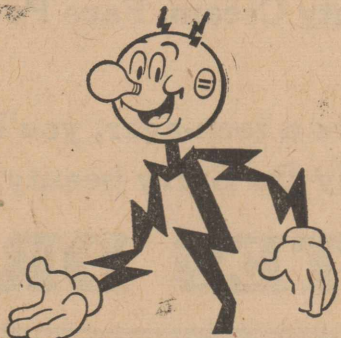

cently released by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in Washington D. C. Indicating that the figure is still on the rise, the Bureau's survey showed a 12 per cent increase since 1945.

Significant point brought out in the study might be that very little of the increase in agriculture's value was the result of improvements of farms and farm property. Very large part of the increase has come from price increases on farm products and from accumulations of money due to large sales. The report indicated that approximately 800 million dollars that were added to farmers' cash holdings during the war will have to be reinvested in improvements of farms and equipment that weren't maintained through the period 1942-45.

Property of farmers' and other owners of farm businesses accounted for 93.2 billion dollars of the total dollar worth of agriculture. The remaining 8.3 billions were taken up by creditor's claims. Although farmers' mortgage debts declined during 1943, they did not decline as much as in previous years, and actually increased in 20 states.

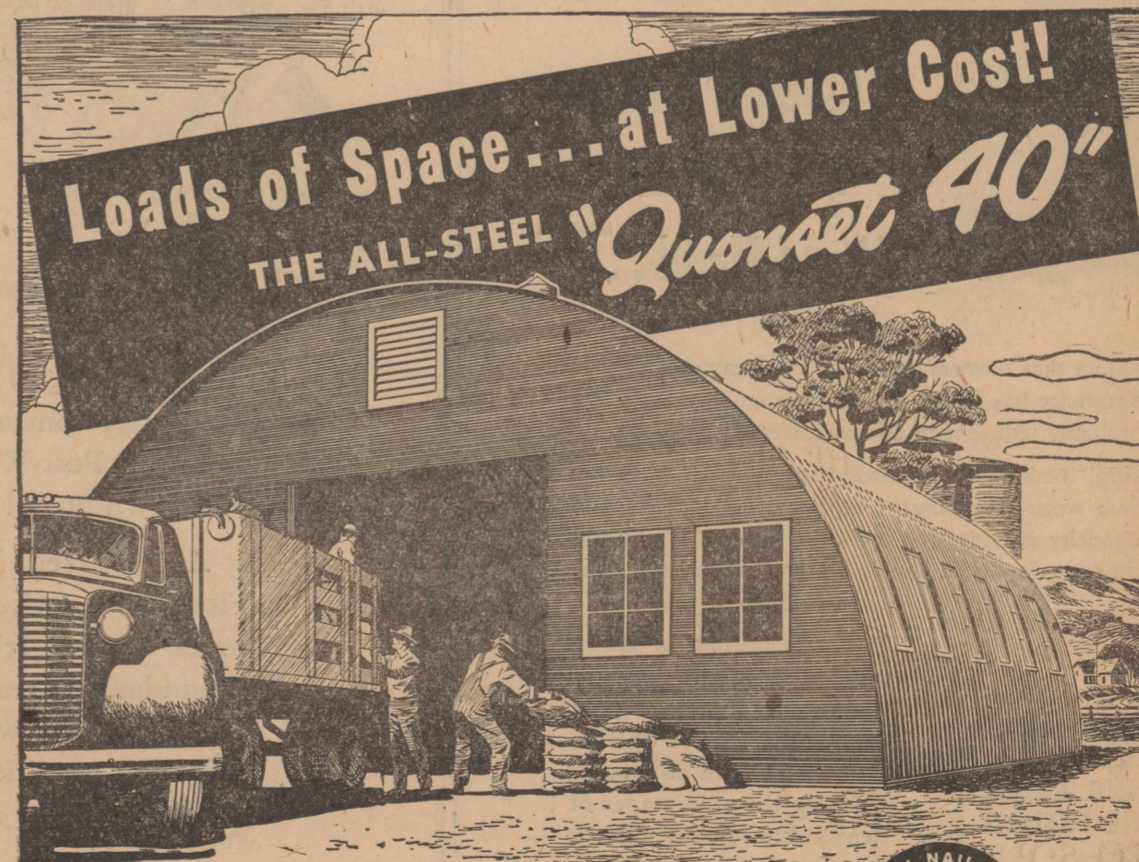

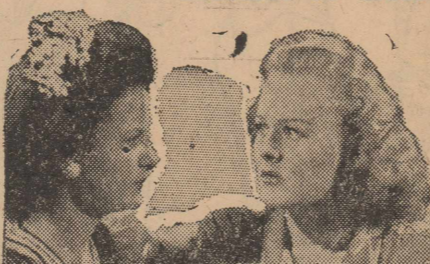

#### PAUL'S WIDENING FIELD OF SERVICE

**LESSON TEXT—Acts 13:1-5, 13, 14, 44-46, 48, 49; 14:26, 27.**  
**MEMORY SELECTION**—But when it pleased God . . . to reveal his Son in me, that I might preach him among the heathen.—Galatians 1:15, 16.

God uses men to accomplish his high and holy purpose of preaching the gospel in all the world. They must, however, be men who have been called by the Holy Spirit, prepared and sent out by him. They must be willing to labor and to sacrifice without limit for his glory.

Paul was such a man, and as we study the widening sphere of his service and influence, we catch a vision of what missions should mean in the church.

**I. A Missionary Call (Acts 13:1-4).**  
Much discussed among earnest Christians is the question of what constitutes a missionary call.

The need must be brought home to the individual believer's heart by the Holy Spirit, and he must give a conviction that one is to go out to meet that need.

Note that the call came through a live, active and well-equipped church in Antioch, a city of Syria. It was a cosmopolitan church—read the names of those who served there. They were of many nationalities and of various occupations and social positions. In the midst of that group were two exceptionally able preachers, Barnabas and Paul. They all loved the Lord and served him.

To such a church the Holy Spirit can speak, be heard and obeyed. Notice that they gave of their best, at the direction of the Spirit, not withholding it for themselves (cf. II Sam. 24:24). Good wants our best.

Sent forth by the Holy Spirit these men went promptly and willingly. Why should the Lord have to plead, and prod, and wait for his people to obey him?

**II. A Missionary Conquest (Acts 13:4, 5, 13, 14, 44-46, 48, 49).**

To trace this first missionary journey it is well to look at the map illustrating the Acts and epistles at the back of most Bibles.

It will appear at once that it was not an easy itinerary these men undertook. It involved travel by sea, through difficult country, and often among hostile and hateful peoples.

God does not call his servants to an air-conditioned arm-chair evangelism. His Word must go out where it has never been heard, and that means pioneering among the most backward of peoples, the neediest of this earth. It means working in rescue missions, in thankless and difficult pastorates; yes, anywhere the Divine Executive, the Holy Spirit, may direct.

Paul met both popularity and persecution, and that not far apart. After the experience of acceptance and rejection on the island of Cyprus (Acts 13:7, 8), Barnabas and Paul went to Antioch in Pisidia (a different city than Antioch in Syria; see map). Here they were invited to preach in the synagogue and Paul was blessed in the presentation of a powerful gospel message. Read it in Acts 13:16-41. It met with such a response that the people "besought that these words might be preached to them the next Sabbath" (v. 42). So great was the popularity of Paul's message that the whole city came the next Sabbath "to hear the Word of God." What a wonderful sight that must have been.

But wait—there is something else here beside popularity, and its name is jealousy (v. 45). It caused the Jews to blaspheme as they contradicted Paul's preaching.

Jealousy always makes a fool out of the one who yields to it. Yet this green-eyed monster is permitted to go right on hindering the work of God. The result in this case was that Paul turned from the Jews to the Gentiles with the gospel, to their great joy and delight. This is a great turning point in the history of the church.

Now the preachers turn homeward to Antioch in Syria, and there they had

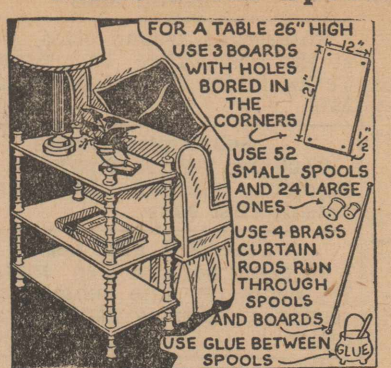
**III. A Missionary Conference (Acts 14:26, 27).**

Nothing stimulates missionary giving, and praying, and going in a local church like a live missionary conference, where those who have been on the field come back and tell what the Lord has done as they went out to serve him.

It is good to know that what the Lord led men out to do has been fulfilled. That completes the circle of divine guidance and blessing, and strongly encourages us to go again—and others to go for the first time—to do missionary work for God.

The church which does not have such an annual missionary conference misses a blessing and an opportunity for enlarged vision and service. No pastor or church can afford to miss such an open door for the working of the Holy Spirit of God.
