

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

Wireworms, cutworms, white grubs, and crickets can cause heavy damage to gardens. If you are interested, diazionon should be used and be put down two to four weeks before planting. For 1000 square feet of surface area, use 3/4 cup of 25 percent emulsion concentrate or 1/2 cup of 50 percent wetable powder in $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 gallons of water. Apply the insecticide to the surface of the soil then mix






Creighton Rites Held at Rankin

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
