Sunset Bus Service to Start Coke County April

Something new is coming to Coke County body who wants to save on his gasoline bill. On April 1, Sunset Stag- Bon Spoonts Grocery & es will begin running a bus from Abilene to San Angelo and back to Abilene. The once-a-day route will go through Bronte and Robert Lee. Not only will the new bus service provide transportation for Coke Countians to San Angelo and Abilene, it will place them in a posit-

The schedule calls for the bus to leave Abilene at 7:30 p.m. each day. It will arrive at Bronte at 8:50 and at Robert Lee at 9:10 p.m. Then it will travell on to San Angelo, arriving at 10:00 p.m. On the return trip the bus will leave San Angelo at 10:30 p.m., Bronte at 11:40 p.m. It will continue on to Abilene, arriving at 1 a.m.



New Car Bought For Coke Sheriff

Bids on a new car for the Coke County Sheriff's Department were opened at the Monday meeting of the Coke County Commissioner's Court. The bid of Ivey Motor Co. of Robert Lee for \$6,635 was accepted. The commissioners tabled a request from General Telephone Co. to lay an underground cable across a county road in the east part of the county.

An order was passed to advertise for bids for a new pickup for Precinct 1.

The commissioners voted to update an interlocal agreement with the Texas Association of Counties to update the county's workmen's compensation insurance purchased through the association.

Bills were approved for payment before the commissioners adjourned.



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

Clay Cookware Popularity Revived

By Kathy Jobe

Clay cookware revives in popularity on the homefront.

With the renewed interest in clay cookware, more people are interested in its advantages and disadvantages. ADVANTAGES

Enthusiasts claim that the self-basting action allows use of less-tender cuts of meat with excellent results. The heat of cooking releases steam from the damp clay and the cover holds the vinegar line, use in the steam as well as the food juices.

In addition, little or no oil or gravy is needed -- a plus for weight watchers.

DISADVANTAGES One disadvantage is the pots may stain. Most manufacturers recommend against the use of soap to clear. since soap may clog the pores of the clay. A soapy taste may linger in the cookware.

Also, sudden temperatu- er. re changes may cause cracks. Cold pots put into hot ovens or hot pots placed in a refrigerator could cause problems.

Homemakers who use Mexican or imported pottery for similar coo-

king should consider that such cookware is somewhat different. The glazes often used will affect the water retention and absorbency -- and thus the steam effect during cooking. Also, test the glaze to determine the absence or presence of lead. A simple home test is to fill the cookware half full of vinegar and allow it to stand overnight.

As with many adapted recipes, decrease the liquid by one-fourth. Mixtures cook more evenly if stirred during lived in Atlanta 23 cocking. Place large food pieces around the outside edges with smaller pieces to the cent-

Cooking time will be approximate and require some experimentation. Usually, about one-half the conventional cooking time is required for microwave cooking in clay cookware.
