Census Forms In Mail Today

Citizens of Coke County and everyone else in the United States is due to receive a census form beginning today (Friday) in the mail. It is the first step in the gigantic job of conducting the decennial census.

Coke County residents are requested to fill out the forms and hold onto them until a census worker calls to pick them up. Most areas of the country will mail the forms back, but this district of West Texas is one of the few where they will be picked up. Federal law directs that all questions be answered honestly. The law also provides that any information disclosed in the census is confidential and cannot be revealed.

Everyone in Coke County is urged not to mail the forms in but to wait for an enumerator to call for them.





Ideas Wanted On Conservation

USDA's Soil Conservation Service (SCS) is currently making a study of alternative ways in which a National Plant Material Centers Program can be conducted that responds to resource conservation needs. The SCS is asking the public for their views on alternatives under consideration and for other proposals.

The SCS, in cooperat-

ion with other federal

and state agencies

and through other arrangements, presently operates and maintains 22 plant materials centers in the U.S. Each center develops new plants for conservation purposes in the geographic area it serves that are released jointly with the state's agricultural experiment station and other state and federal agencies to commercial growers for production. The plant materials center serving Texas and Oklahoma is located at Knox City, Texas. Selection-75 kleingrass is the best known grass in this area that was released from the center The range of alternatives being studied for conducting a National Plant Materials Centers Program vary from continuation of the program as is to transferring complete operations and management of the centers over to non-federal entities. First, the SCS needs to know what the public needs and wants -and possible alternative ways national consials might be met. Additional information


