

Defensive Driving Course Planned





Enjoy a Good Breakfast on Easter

BY KATHY JOBE

Make Easter breakfast a "spectacular start" for a very special day. Add your own creativity to a sound nutritional basic plan, and make breakfast memories they'll remember a long

Breakfast should provide about one-fourth of the day's calorie and protein needs -that's easy when you rely on the basic four food groups.

Include something from the meat group, milk group, breads-cereals group and the fruitsvegetables group.

FESTIVE FRUITS, VEGETABLES Start breakfast with a bowl of fresh fruits -- top that with a scoop of sherbet, frozen ice milk or frozen yogurt.

Put a rabbit face on that with raisins, add toothpick ears, and you've got instant delight -- for young and old alike. Or, your family might

like a broiled grapefruit half flavored with cranberry or orange juice.

A bowl of fresh dewberries or blackberries with cream and sugar is a sure hit, too. (Optional: If you're on a diet, then use artificial sweetner and skim milk.)

For a chilly Easter morning, serve a mug of hot tomato juice or soup flavored with bas-

CREATIVE CEREALS Dress up your hot or cold cereals with a bunny face, too.

Banana coins and raisins make impressive eyes, a mandarin orange wedge makes a neat mouth, and a grape or cherry can be the nose. Serve apple wedges on the plate underneath the bowl for an attractive collar.

BUNNY BREAD Bunny bread will fascinate almost everyone. Simply take yeast or biscuit dough, roll into Childress. The large long round "fingers" about 11 inches long. Tie two "fingers" into a loose knot, and pull the pointed ends upward to form ears. Use raisins for the eyes and mouth.

EGGS IN A 'NEST' Serve poached eggs in rice nests for an exciting breakfast entree. gave a brief report on To serve six, you'll need three cups cooked rice, six slices cooked bacon (crumbled), one cup diced cheddar cheese, six eggs and salt and pepper to taste.

Simply mix the rice, bacon and cheese. Put the mixture into a greased flat baking dish $(9\frac{1}{2} \times 13 \text{ inches})$. Make six indentations in the rice, and drop an egg into each. Season to taste. Cover and bake in 350 degrees F. oven until the eggs reach a desired degree of doneness.

'ITALIAN' EGGS Another favorite might be pizza eggs. Just make scrambled eggs, and while they're cooking, add oregano, garlic powder, mushrooms or cooked sausage. Spread tomato sauce on toasted English mutfins, top them with the eggs and sprinkle with parmesan

MORNING MILK MARVELS Milk-group items round out the Easter breakfast menu.

Choose cottage cheese or plain yogurt in a melon wedge, or make cheese toast or a delicious cheese-and-bacon quiche.

Or try breakfast drinks or shakes made in the blender with milk and fresh fruits or spices, such as cinnamon or nutmeg -- or if time is no problem, make Easter eggnog.

Remember, for a good start on Easter morning -- or any morning, eat something! Be sure to include a protein source and a serving from each of the food groups.
